FIRST DAY—Evening Session.

MONDAY, October 22, 1894.

1. At 7 o'clock P. M. the Missouri Baptist General Association met in its sixtieth annual session in the meeting house of the First Baptist church, Louisiana, Mo.

Dr. W. Pope Yeaman, the Moderator, called the body to order, and asked Bro. S. M. Brown to lead in singing, "How firm a foundation, ye saints of the Lord." The Moderator then read the ninety-first Psalm and led in prayer.

2. Dr. J. B. Fuller, pastor of the First Baptist church, Sedalia, Mo., preached the annual sermon. Text: Matt. 28:19-20. Theme: The mission of the church; hindrances, and helps." After the sermon Bro. B. E. Harl led in prayer.

3. The Moderator announced as the committee on enrollment, brethren M. Riggs, John Herndon, and S. H. Morgan, who subsequently reported as follows:

4. Adjourned until 9 o'clock to-morrow, A. M. Benediction by Dr. S. H. Ford.

SECOND DAY—Morning Session.

TUESDAY, October 23, 1894.

5. The Association met at 9 o'clock. Sung, "Jesus, Lover of my soul;" and prayed with Bro. L. M. Berry leading.

6. Proceeded to permanent organization. Tellers were appointed as follows:

For Moderator: Ernest Cook, J. C. Pollard, and J. B. Stark.

For Assistant Moderator: Wm. Shelton, W. S. Pease, and J. R. Green.

For Secretary: J. E. Norvell, S. H. Pollard, and S. G. Givens.

7. The tellers reported Dr. W. Pope Yeaman elected as Moderator, who, on taking the chair for his eighteenth year, made some very appropriate and feeling remarks, in which he stated that this was his twenty-fifth consecutive annual meeting with the body.

The tellers also announced the election of—

Assistant Moderator—Hon. T. M. James, Kansas City.

Secretary—Sam Frank Taylor, Columbia, Mo:

8. James L. Applegate, of St. Louis, was elected Auditor by acclamation.

9. The Moderator announced the following Committee on Order of Business: J. T. M. Johnston, S. M. Brown, J. F. Cook, L. B. Ely, and A. E. Rogers.

10. Bro. J. M. McManaway, the pastor of the church in Louisiana, gave hearty words of welcome, which, at the request of the Moderator, were happily responded to by Bro. G. L. Black.

11. Bro. W. J. Patrick offered the following resolution which was adopted:

WHEREAS, Dr. G. W. Hyde, who by his presence in this body twenty-six consecutive sessions, won for himself the honorable title of "Father of the House" is now detained at home by physical inability

Therefore resolved, That the Moderator and Secretary be instructed to communicate to him our fraternal interest in his recovery and well-being.

14. The report of the Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools was read by Secretary W. T. Campbell.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF STATE MISSIONS AND SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

To the Missouri Baptist General Association:

DEAR BRETHREN:—It is with feelings of gratitude to the Giver of every good and perfect gift, that we come again before you to make our annual report, and as your servants to render unto you an account of our work.

The Lord has spared the life of each member of the board, and has enabled us to hold five meetings in His name, all of which have been well attended, harmonious and had marked evidences of the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

Immediately after the appointment of the board at Carrollton, it met and organized by re-electing W. F. Elliott, President; James Reid, Recording Secretary; John A. Guthrie, Treasurer; and W. T. Campbell, Corresponding Secretary, and then adjourned for ten days to meet at Moberly to finish laying out the work for the year.

The board found itself greatly embarrassed at the outset, with not only an empty treasury, but a \$3,000 debt and a large number of pressing applications for aid.

It was decided at the beginning to limit the appropriations this year to \$10,000, which, with the debt, would equal about the amount that was raised last year. In compliance with the instructions of the association an appeal was sent out by the corresponding secretary to all who had made contributions last year, and in response to this appeal about \$1,243 was raised towards paying off the debt.

The board earnestly sought for information concerning the needs and importance of fields making application for aid, and prayed to be guided by the Holy Spirit, and then made the appropriations accordingly; at the same time we realized our inability to help many worthy and important places, and the cause has suffered because of it, for it is impossible to do \$20,000 worth of work with \$10,000.

A great work has been done for which we are thankful to Almighty God, but we are sure the Baptists of Missouri do not yet fully realize the importance attached to their state missions, for there is an actual demand for twice as much money to be spent on the field as we are now spending.

The board has endeavored to carry on the work as economically as was consistent with the demands upon us, ever keeping in mind the purpose for which our fathers in the gospel organized the association, and to make the limited means placed at our disposal do all the good possible.

Rev. A. J. Hess was re-elected general missionary for southeast Missouri, but he declined to accept, and so the board has had no general missionary in the field but has referred all such work to the corresponding secretary with such voluntary aid as he could secure.

Early in the year an effort was made to secure the services of an evangelist for the State, but without success.

THE WORK DONE.

The corresponding secretary has given his entire time to the work, with a special view of getting the work better organized and systematized, and trying to get pastors to take collections in their churches for this work without depending upon a visit from an agent, and it is at least gratifying that some progress has been made along this line. He has spent considerable time in the field, and at the same time the work in the office during his absence has been promptly attended to as far as possible. His report shows:

Days of labor, 330; days from home, 215; sermons, addresses and lectures, 206; letters written, 1,050; postal cards written, 175; circular letters sent out, 4,200; prayer-meetings attended, 50; churches visited, 120; churches dedicated, 2; conventions attended, 10; district asso-

ciations attended, 20; miles traveled, 14,170; tracts giving facts and figures about the work, and other information, 25,000.

The board has continued to co-operate with the city mission boards in St. Louis and Kansas City in trying to check the powers of Satan and advance the cause of Christ.

In Kansas City considerable progress has been made. *The Immanuel church* has had the wise and efficient labors of Dr. A. C. Rafferty, and while the church has been strengthened and built up in doctrine the population is so vacillating they have lost by removals almost as many as they have gained, so that numerically they have just about held their own. This is an exceedingly difficult field, made so by circumstances hard to overcome. The church is now taking steps to pay off a troublesome church debt (but I believe all church debts are troublesome).

Early in the year, D. G. Daily resigned at the *William Jewell church*, and a call was extended to Judson A. Elliott, who is at present pastor and doing a good work.

The *Walnut Grove church* attempted to become self-sustaining at the close of the first quarter but as they expect to build it will be necessary to aid them again next year.

Charles E. King, a William Jewell student, resigned the pastorate at *Elmwood church*, and Alpha Ingle has been called for all his time and the church has a hopeful outlook.

The *Centropolis church* has had the services of C. Q. Rider, a student at William Jewell.

At the *Tabernacle church*, S. M. Brown, pastor, "The work has been enlarged and strengthened through the blessings of God."

"An arm of the church has been extended to Leeds, a suburb on the southeast of the city. Here a house of worship with lot has been purchased; regular weekly preaching services are maintained with an afternoon Sunday school—average attendance, 65. The church also has charge of a mission work on Seventeenth street. This is located in the heart of the city. A neat chapel has been provided by an addition and repairs to the hitherto uninviting, uncomfortable place. In this work the church has been aided by the Blue River Association and by a few kind brethren and sisters in the state. Here a weekly preaching service, with afternoon school are also maintained. The average attendance at the school is now seventy. There are in the church several business men who have been licensed as lay-preachers, and a large part of the work in these missions is done by these faithful brethren. The church feels that it has only begun the prosecution of a work of extension which promises much for the future."

The churches in St. Louis report statistics only. See statistical table.

The board has continued to aid three churches in Springfield. J. L. Taylor has preached for the Boulevard church two Sundays in the month. W. P. Broadbeck resigned at Front street early in the year and J. W. Laster was called to succeed him, but the salary being inadequate for his support, he resigned, and the church now has J. W. Warren as supply. They have their new meeting house inclosed. E. T. Sloan has done a good work at East avenue church, and shown himself to be one of our best missionaries. His church becomes self-sustaining.

In St. Joseph the board has aided the Wyatt Park church in the support of S. L. Dulin, who resigned during the last quarter, and Savannah avenue church for a short time in the support of Grant Creekmore, who resigned early in the year.

Joplin First church. J. W. Keltner, pastor, writes: "We are grateful unto God for making our fifth annual report of work done in Joplin. When I look back over these years, my heart is melted into thanksgiving and gratitude for the support given by the board, and for the wonderful blessings of God upon his work. From thirteen members, without prestige socially, financially or religiously, in five years we have grown into two churches with four hundred members and \$20,000 worth of property. The mission that the First church established has grown and spread all over south Joplin and has two missions of its own. The First church will need \$6,000 to pay its indebtedness and finish the building, but the property is safe. The depression in mining interests has caused the burden to fall heavily on a few."

South Joplin or Blendville. N. D. White, pastor, has talents specially fitting him for work in this mining district. His church will ask no further aid from the board. Bro. White has just been elected missionary in Spring River association.

George S. Maness resigned at Rolla, October 1. The church has a beautiful brick house inclosed, on which they have a debt of \$700, which they are paying off in monthly payments and they concluded to try to get along without a pastor till this is done.

At Cameron the church is still struggling with a debt of \$4,500, which they are making an effort now to reduce. Their plan is to carry \$1,000, raise \$2,000 in Cameron, and they ask the people outside for \$1,500. They have good property and are worthy of help. R. L. Kirkland resigned April 1, and the church has lately called A. G. Sawin whose acceptance depends upon the aid given by the board next year.

W. C. Armstrong resigned, at Willow Springs in July. The church there has a debt but hope to be able to pay it off next year.

The church at Cape Girardeau has made a great step forward. C. T. Daniels resigned in December, and the church, after a glorious

revival conducted by C. F. J. Tate, called him as pastor. It is now self-sustaining.

G. W. Reeves resigned at Morley and Oran to accept the care of Doniphan church for all of his time.

B. R. Patrick resigned at Calvary (Hannibal) April 1, and the church called J. R. Kennerly.

F. M. Shoush resigned at Farmington early in the year, and the church had the services of Prof. J. W. Campbell for a short time, and then called A. E. Spring.

A great many other churches have been aided but report statistics only, and for work done see statistical table.

The following churches have become self-sustaining: Kirkwood, Cape Girardeau, Morley, Oran, Blendville (South Joplin), and East Avenue, Springfield.

They asked the board for an appropriation of \$400, and they raised \$200 of this themselves, and sent it to the board promptly every quarter. In addition to this they have taken collections from their churches for state missions. They have aided in the support of *John Rosen, pastor at Swedeborg,* and *Rev. A. P. Greene, pastor at Springfield.*

Colored People. The board has aided in the support of Rev. H. N. Bouey, corresponding secretary of their state convention, and financial agent of Macon Baptist College, who has done a faithful year's work in trying to elevate the condition of his people. See his report in table of work done.

NEEDS OF THE FIELD.

1. Many of our district associations are badly in need of financial aid to enable them to secure the services of men of ability, of evangelistic talents, who can aid pastors in holding meetings, as well as to teach the churches to observe all things that Christ commanded.

2. There are many county seats and other towns, which are centers of influence where there is no Baptist church, but there ought to be.

3. Many of our churches are in need of leaders who can instruct them along lines of scriptural and systematic benevolence and who will bring to their consideration the great needs of our various mission interests.

4. Our mission interest in the state needs to be unified and organized so that one interest will not interfere with another.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

1. We would recommend the continuation of the plan of co-operation between district and state boards, as was recommended last year, and that the plan be emphasized and pushed.

2. That the General Association appoint a committee to prepare a letter for churches and the District Associations, so as to secure uniformity, and to have it printed, provided they can do so without cost to the Association.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The board has continued the policy of carrying on the Sunday School work through our regular missionaries and mission pastors, whose reports show the following Sunday School statistics:

Number of churches reporting Sunday Schools, 40; number of Sunday School teachers, 373; average attendance, 3,092; number of schools organized during the year, 10; number of Sunday School addresses by missionaries, 131.

While we may regret that more has not been done, yet we are sure that our Sunday School work is advancing. We have on an average better lesson helps, better informed teachers, more conversions from the Sunday School ranks and more church members in our schools than ever before; still there is room for improvement.

An examination of seventy-five minutes of District Associations in Missouri shows that forty-five associations report 664 Sunday Schools with an enrollment of 42,364 pupils, and an average attendance of 33,796. Twelve associations report 94 Sunday Schools, but do not give the attendance; while eighteen associations had no Sunday School statistics, but many of them spoke of having good Sunday Schools; so that it is safe to say that there is something over 900 Sunday Schools in the state. Many of our churches occupy union houses and claim they can not keep up a Baptist school, while there are a great many others who could have Sunday Schools that have none; still we have reason to thank God and take courage in this department of our work.

20. The Association met at 7 p. m. Sung, "There is a fountain filled with blood." The prayer was led by Bro. D. T. Denman.

21. After further discussion by R. P. Johnston, and W. T. Campbell, and the taking of a collection to pay off the debt, the report of the Board of State Missions and Sunday schools was adopted.

22. The following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, there has been some discussion of the matter of unifying the work of the Missionary Boards of this Body, therefore,

Resolved, That the chair appoint a committee of seven to consider the subject and report to-morrow.

The Chair announced the following brethren as this committee: M. J. Breaker, W. J. Patrick, R. P. Johnston, H. A. Gass, W. R. Wilbite, A. F. Baker, and O. L. Brownson.

23. Bro. J. S. Kirtley read the report of the committee on Orphans' Home.

REPORT ON ORPHANS' HOME.

For eight years and seven months the Baptist Orphans' Home of Missouri has lived a phenomenal life. In that time \$27,876 have been expended in its support; \$30,350, including interest, have been spent in buying and improving property; 821 children have been cared for, 97 of whom have been adopted into good homes. It now has a plant worth over \$30,000 where, during the past year, 136 children have been cared for.

This has been administered with great skill and wisdom. The expenses of conducting it are met every year by the voluntary offerings of the Baptists throughout the state. We are glad to report that the offerings of money, clothing and produce from over the state increase year by year, and God is laying this gentlest and loveliest of all our charities on the hearts of his people.

The past year has been a gracious one. A superb matron, an excellent teacher and gentle nurses have served faithfully. In the school there has been an average attendance of 35. One of the events of the year has been a legacy of \$2,000 left by brother Verdner Suter, of Palmyra. We expect that the Lord will inspire others to remember the orphans in the same way. Christ is our Elder Brother and when Christian men make their wills they are under the same moral obligation to remember Him and His cause in the world, as to remember other members in the family. Last year we reported a debt of \$3,500 on the property. This year it is only \$1,500. Aside from the Suter legacy the Baptists outside of St. Louis have not given one-tenth of the amount spent in acquiring the property. We now ask the brotherhood for \$1,000 of this \$1,500, and promise that the ladies will raise the balance in St. Louis. By the first of January the debt can be paid, and then the Home enters on a new epoch in its history.

Let the brethren remember that the Home is dependent on them, for its support and that it requires more than four thousand dollars annually to carry it on.

THIRD DAY—Morning Session.

WEDNESDAY, October 24, 1894.

25. The Association met at 8:45 A. M., and engaged in devotional exercises led by Bro. S. Y. Pitts.

26. At 9:10, the Moderator took the chair; and, after singing, "What a friend we have in Jesus," the body was led in prayer by Bro. J. S. Buckner.

27. The following resolutions, offered by Dr. E. H. Sawyer, were referred to a committee, and were subsequently favorably reported back by them, and adopted as follows:

WHEREAS, The constitution of the United States of America guarantees civil and religious liberty to our people, we look with apprehension upon any encroachments upon these rights by legislative enactments or executive caprice. For nearly a decade we have witnessed with increasing alarm, the appropriation from the public treasury of money in aid of religious organizations contrary to the spirit of the constitution, and inimical to public policy. We have seen the halls of congress desecrated by an unseemly religious rite, and the revenue service of the government placed at the disposal of ecclesiastical functionaries, thereby provoking religious controversy and encouraging political corruption;

Therefore, be it *resolved*, That *first*, we, representing 125,000 Baptists, met in the General Association of Missouri, this 25th day of October, 1894, hereby deplore those legislative and executive acts, by which the public revenue and the political honor of this country have been invaded. *Second*. We protest against the appropriation of moneys to various religious bodies for so-called educational work among the Indians, by which during the past eight years four millions of dollars (\$4,000,000) have been drawn from the public treasury, about three-fifths of which has been given to the Roman Catholic church.

Third. We urge upon the Bureau of Indian Affairs the suspension of contracts with sectarian schools.

Fourth. We recommend to our representatives in congress the framing of such legislation as will prevent, so far as possible, the appropriation of any of its general revenue for the purpose of founding or sustaining any sectarian schools or colleges, or any other institutions of ecclesiastical origin or connection.

Resolved, second, That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to each of Missouri's senators and representatives in congress, to the:

Secretary of the Interior, and to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF WILLIAM JEWELL COLLEGE.

With feelings of mingled gratitude and anxiety we present this, our forty-fourth annual report.

The Lord is signally blessing our college, and we are anxious to show our gratitude by providing such facilities as its increasing prosperity demands.

The enrollment of last session was 247. This was 19 more than matriculated the previous session.

The work of the session, facilities considered, was excellent. Harmony, good will and hard work prevailed throughout.

The death of one of our ministerial students, Ben Powell, of Odessa, Mo., was a source of grief to the school and community. He was a noble boy with strong faith in God, and though only in the morning of life he died like a veteran with the words of victory on his lips. His last utterances linger on our hearts as a benediction from Heaven.

The number of students for the ministry in attendance last session was 88, of whom seven were among the graduates.

The management of the library in its present cramped quarters could hardly be more satisfactory to all concerned. The privileges of a reading room during all hours of the day are greatly appreciated by the students.

Needed repairs and such improvements as were imperative were made on the buildings during the summer.

The present session opened with much the largest attendance we ever had. To date 255 have matriculated; of these 85 are students for the ministry and are sons of ministers. A large number of the young men now here are professed Christians, and we have great hopes of the salvation of others during the session.

The William Jewell Student, a college monthly, edited by the students, has proven an important factor in advertising the school.

VARDENAN HALL.

This institution established at the instance of Dr. Greene has proven a success even beyond its expectation. It means economy and comfort to students, and has therefore, had much to do in our increased attendance.

HOME FOR SMALL BOYS.

The temporary arrangement made for the accommodation of small boys for the academic department has succeeded well, and demonstrates the value Wornall Academy will be to the college when, in good providence of God, it can be built.

PRESSING NEEDS.

More room is a crying necessity. Every room everywhere about the college is now occupied. The janitor has to live out in town, and not a few students are living in rented rooms in town and taking their meals at the hall.

The good of the college demands the erection at the earliest day possible of an *Assembly Hall*.

This would conserve not only the interests of physical culture, but it would be economy and a great convenience to the college in connection with all our public gatherings. Without such a building our

Annual Commencement, instead of being an occasion of pleasure to the public, and to the college, an advertisement, is a thing rather to be dreaded, because a hardship to all concerned.

The work of the sisters in furnishing rooms in the hall and cottages is advancing quite well; some thirty of the rooms have been taken.

While the finances of the college are in a safe and healthy condition as shown by the annual report of the finance committee, it is all important that donors make payment of notes or pledges as soon as possible.

In conclusion we record with sorrow, but we trust in the spirit of submission to the Master's will, the death, since our last meeting of our beloved brother, W. P. Crosswhite, of St. Louis, leaving a vacancy on the Board of Trustees—as also in our hearts.

The following to his memory was adopted at our commencement meeting last June and made a matter of record in our minutes.

IN MEMORIAM.

In the death of Bro. W. P. Crosswhite this board has lost a valuable member, and the cause of education a devoted friend.

He was a strong man, gentle in spirit, modest in bearing, wise in counsel and lovely in Christian character. His memory is precious among the trustees of William Jewell College. Under a sense of personal bereavement we desire to extend our sincerest sympathy to his wife and family.

The report having been presented as a matter of information—it having not yet been adopted by the Board itself—on motion, the rules were suspended, that discussion of the college affairs might now be had. Speeches were made by brethren L. B. Ely, J. P. Greene, and J. J. Stogdale, and a collection was taken for a Gymnasium.

29. The report of the Board of Curators of Stephens College was read by the secretary, Bro. G. W. Hatcher.

REPORT OF CURATORS OF STEPHENS COLLEGE.

Since our last report this college has experienced a mingling of shadow and sunshine.

In the early spring Pres. Barrett was stricken down. It was evident to him as well as to his physician and friends that his work was done. The work he loved so well and to which he was so well adapted, had to be given up. He was anxious about his successor. He.

desired the future prosperity of the institution to which he had given the best years of his life. In looking about for one, who was fully competent to carry forward to a glorious consummation his unfinished work, he selected Rev. S. F. Taylor, of Liberty, Mo., and transferred to him his unexpired lease to take effect July 1, 1894.

The Lord permitted him to live to see the close of the collegiate year and then on July 7, 1894, called him into joy and rest. About the time Pres. Taylor expected to take the field and make a personal canvass for the college, he was stricken down and for weeks was in bed, and not until late in August was he permitted to do any work. His brethren shared with him his anxiety and doubts as to a successful opening. But in spite of all discouraging circumstances the opening was good and the attendance has increased until there is to-day a total enrollment of over one hundred, with a greater number of boarders than were enrolled last year, with bright prospect of a continued increase.

Having been enthusiastically elected by the board, Pres. Taylor accepted the position on the condition that the board make some necessary repairs, including steam heating apparatus. This has been done, and in addition to improvements made by the board, the President has completely renovated the building, putting in new furniture throughout, also new carpets, thus giving the interior a neat, new and cheery appearance, and giving each young lady a comfortable and convenient room. All this has been done at a cost of \$4,500, and of this amount \$4,000 was raised in Columbia.

Impelled by his inclination, as well as by his obligations to the denomination in the state, Pres. Taylor has been careful in selecting his faculty, to call to his aid pious, Christlike Baptist men and women. With two exceptions, each teacher in the building is a thorough Baptist, in full sympathy and harmony with the denomination and not afraid to let that fact be known. Of the other two, one is a pious devoted Christian, a member of another denomination, but working harmoniously with the faculty; the other is not a church member, but a Baptist in sentiment and we believe, a Christian gentleman. So that in faculty, policy and work done we can safely say, Stephens college is *Christian and Baptist*.

In Stephens college, with its magnificent campus and creditable building, with its cottages donated by Hon. J. L. Stephens, the General Association has property worth at the lowest calculation \$100,000, a plant that will well repay close, careful cultivation.

It is not in point of equipment what it might be, nor what it ought to be. It needs, as it has needed for years, a chapel. It needs society halls; it needs a larger art room. This department has entirely outgrown the present accommodations and must be enlarged. The young ladies have not room to work and lack of

room will tell on the work and put pupil, teacher and college to a disadvantage.

We appeal to you brethren for help, and urge upon you the importance of redeeming at once pledges so often made, to put this, your own female college, upon a more substantial financial basis. With our location, buildings and faculty, give us the financial aid that we need and have a right to ask and expect, and you will have in this institution a Baptist female college, equaled by few and surpassed by none in this land.

We believe the time has come for the General Association to take hold of Stephens college in earnest and do something for it, something worthy the denomination and the institution.

For this we will ever pray.

FIRST ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO THE MISSOURI BAPTIST GENERAL ASSOCIATION.

The Board of Education appointed at the last association met for organization February 6th last, in St. Louis.

W. M. Senter was elected president, E. W. Stephens, vice-president, A. D. Brown, treasurer, and Ernest Cook, secretary.

The president and secretary were instructed to prepare and send out a circular letter to all of our schools for the purpose of "thoroughly investigating the condition and wants of all our denom-

inational schools in Missouri" in accordance with the constitution of this board. The following questions were asked in the letter just referred to.

1. Please send us copies of your charter and deeds. If you are a stock company, please state the amount of stock in the hands of Baptists. What is held by others?

2. Please state the actual amount in hand of endowment. How is it invested? Is any of it limited in the conditions of its use? How much? What limitations? What buildings and value?

3. What indebtedness have you? How much is current? How much is evidenced by notes or mortgages?

4. How many teachers have you? How many are Baptists? If any are not Baptists, please say what they are. What is the total amount paid this current year for instruction in all departments? How much does the president receive?

5. How many scholars have you enrolled this year? Male? Female? Under thirteen years? Between thirteen and sixteen? Over sixteen? How many are doing real college work? From Baptist families? From families not Baptist? How many have professed conversion this year? Number of students for the ministry? How much aid furnished students for ministry aside from tuition? How much free tuition, students for ministry included, and other help to needy students?

6. What instruction is given in the Bible? How many students in the study of the Bible? What instruction is given in religion and morals? Is church history taught?

7. Have you any needs pressing so as to endanger the life of your institution? Please state them in detail. Have you any needs that seriously hinder your usefulness? What? Have you any plans for enlargement and development? Please state in detail.

The following schools have replied to the letter sent out and have expressed a willingness to co-operate with the work of this board, namely:

William Jewell College, Stephens College, Grand River College, LaGrange College, McCune College, Hardin College, Clarksburg College, Southwest Baptist College, Webb City Baptist College, Pierce City Baptist College, Farmington Baptist College, Mayfield-Smith Academy.

We regret that we can not make satisfactory report to the Association of the condition, wants, operations and finances of these schools. The replies of the schools have been sympathetic and cordial but have not furnished the desired information. We have had no agent and have had to rely upon the secretary for all work done in this direction which was necessarily limited by the demands of his own pastoral work. We are inclined to believe that accurate and

complete information and statistics can only be obtained by some one who can go in person to each of our schools and work out on the ground all the questions necessary to a full and complete understanding of the educational situation in Missouri.

So far as the investigation has gone, we are unable to see that any of the above schools are not under Baptist control or that they are not working in harmony with and to the interests of the denomination; and so we feel we can commend them all to the sympathy and support of the brethren according to their individual merits.

We may perhaps give in a general way some information regarding our schools which will help towards a better understanding of their conditions and wants.

We have already heard of William Jewell College and Stephens College and it seems to be our plain duty to still further enlarge the work at William Jewell and to redeem the pledge of this association to endow Stephens College.

It is a pleasure to speak of the condition of Hardin College. This institution is out of debt and has \$50,000 endowment. The buildings are beautiful and commodious, but are already taxed with 142 boarding pupils. The enrollment this year is 208 and will probably exceed any other year in the history of the college.

Pres. Yancey says: "The constant aim of the college government is to make the religious element in the school the controlling force in the development of character."

Grand River College has opened well this year with eighty-nine students, of whom about seventy are in the collegiate department.

The Bible is a text-book and students are graded in Bible recitations as in other studies.

An addition to the college building is in course of erection. The whole building after completion will have fifty elegant and commodious rooms. There will be no debt and the property will be worth thirty thousand dollars.

There is a small endowment of three thousand dollars. Dr. Yeaman says: "We are sadly in need of help. We must have a provisional endowment of not less than three thousand dollars a year for five years. With this provision secured the institution will be beyond peradventure." The life of our denomination in this part of the state is linked with the fortunes of Grand River College.

LaGrange College has opened well for the twenty-ninth time under President Cook. The students are of superior character; they are young men and women; the average age is seventeen.

A strong religious spirit pervades the entire institution. All the teachers are Baptist. There are eight students for the ministry

at LaGrange and she has eleven this year studying in theological schools.

The school has always stood loyally for the inspiration and authenticity of the Holy Scriptures and has been devoted to the interests of Christ and the denomination.

The institution is out of debt and has a few thousand dollars of endowment. She greatly needs better buildings and more endowment and the wonderful and noble record of the past can not be maintained unless these are provided.

McCune College has opened for the first time under Pres. H. J. Greenwell. He comes to us a brother approved and beloved. About sixty pupils are enrolled, the teaching force is good and all departments are well equipped. More endowment is the crying need and a keener sense of loyalty on the part of the brethren living in Salt River Association.

Southwest Baptist College has opened with 97 students mostly in college studies.

Pres. Burks says: "A small endowment will put us beyond the possibility of a failure." The college is practically out of debt and is fairly well supplied with buildings. A good work in the past commends it to us for the future.

Pierce City Baptist College, says the president, R. D. Swain, is "starting new—worse than new." "The school is opening up as well as could be expected under the circumstances." Difficulties of one sort and another closed the school last year, but its friends are now hopeful that success is in sight.

Webb City Baptist College has not yet opened for business, but is in process of building. Already the house is up to the third story. The building is to cost with the grounds about \$30,000, and the location seems to be in the center of a large and growing population. They have as yet no president and have not perfected all their plans for securing the last few thousand dollars. The trustees hope to open school in September, 1895.

Clarksburg College has \$1 scholars at present and more are coming.

There are seven in faculty. The buildings have been repaired recently and are in good condition.

President T. S. Creekmore feels that he has great reason to be encouraged at the outlook.

Farmington College was destroyed by fire last spring without insurance and there was already a debt of several thousand dollars upon the property. President Jennings has about secured the debt and is now completing a better building than the old one, which he hopes to finish with little or no debt. He has in hand all but about one thousand dollars.

Mayfield-Smith Academy has changed hands during the year. Prof. Graham has gone into public school work and the trustees have re-called as principal Prof. Groves.

We have not been able to get any information regarding the opening this fall.

By order of the Association, we include in this list the Negro Baptist College at Macon City.

For carrying out the purposes of the constitution of this Board it is our intention as soon as practicable to undertake to endow a president's chair in each of our Baptist schools in the state. We shall seek to draw out towards this end the entire local strength of the institutions aided. We shall also be sure the institution is firmly and safely allied to our denomination and that the funds obtained are securely and sacredly invested and preserved. The order of our help will be determined by the needs of the schools and their importance as centers of denominational influence.

It is the earnest hope of the Board that this vital question may receive the sympathy, prayer and substantial help of all the Baptists of Missouri—our brethren and fellow workers.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON REVISION OF PLANS.

I. Your committee learns some facts:

1. That collecting and expending the funds of the Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools costs annually about fifteen per cent. of the gross receipts of that board.
2. That collecting of funds for the Board of Home and Foreign Missions costs about twenty-five per cent. of the receipts.
3. That the number of churches contributing to one or other of the three objects is about 400 out of some 1,700 churches, or about 20,000 Baptists out of 120,000, 16 1-3 per cent.
4. That there is no way of making material increase in the number of contributors, or the amount of contributions, or of diminishing materially the amount of expenses without better enlisting of the pastors and churches in this work.

II. We make some recommendations:

1. That the purpose of the financial agents of this body be very largely that of organizers and educators as well as that of collectors.
2. That the association appoint a committee of five members from each board to mature plans for the better prosecution of this work, which committee shall report at the next meeting of this General Association.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS.

At the end of this, its fifth, year it is with pleasure that the board can announce the co-operation and sympathy of every church in Missouri which contributes to Home and Foreign Missions. Whatever divisions may have existed in the past have disappeared, and Missouri Baptists are in harmony in their mission work. The leaven of unifi

cation has been at work and has leavened the lump. No church and no missionary society now decline to join in the Missouri plan.

After its appointment at Carrollton last year the Board re-elected Rev. B. G. Tutt corresponding secretary of the Foreign Mission Department, and W. L. Boyer corresponding secretary of the Home Mission Department. Both have given themselves with great zeal and faithfulness to their work.

The quarterly meetings of January and April were held at Columbia and were well attended, and the July meeting was held at St. Louis. Representatives of the various churches of the city were present and all joined in cordial expressions of sympathy and of assurances of a determination to co-operate with our plan.

The secretary of the Home Mission Department also reports 374 churches contributing, an increase of 58 during the year, and 67 associations, an increase of 10. The contributions to the department are only \$169.38 less than in 1893.

There has been a decrease in the contributions of the Foreign Mission Department below those of 1893, which is largely accounted for by the reaction from the centennial effort of 1893, the debt of the State Mission Board and the financial depression. However, they are nearly as large as were the contributions of 1892.

The total contributions for the two departments have been \$14,806, nearly an average of the gross collections for the four years preceding, making the total collections of the Board during the five years of its existence \$76,361.17, or an average of over \$15,000 per year. So far as we are advised the general boards, north and south, are satisfied with our work, and the plan grows continually with our people. In its efforts to secure increased interest in Home and Foreign Missions much depends upon the pastors of the churches, whom we urge to aid in bringing these causes before our people and in developing the missionary spirit along all lines.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

LIBERTY, Mo., Oct. 22, 1894.

To the Brethren of the General Association of Missouri Baptists:

DEAR BRETHREN:—It is with supreme pleasure and profound gratitude that we render this our report of the interest you have committed to the hands of your Board of Ministerial Education.

During the year of 1893-94 the college enrolled eighty-eight ministerial students. Of this number seven graduated last June—six with the Bachelor's Degree, one with the Master's. Fifty-eight of this number have entered college again this year. These, with twenty-seven new students, bring our present enrollment up to eighty-five, just one-third of our college enrollment.

It is with genuine Christian delight that we note the earnestness of these dear young men as they recount to the Board their struggles, their hopes, their faith in ultimate success through the aid of their Heavenly Father. Their childlike faith would at times be touching if it were not so eminently sensible.

As we look into the future through the lens furnished by the Theological Department of William Jewell College the prospects of the Baptist cause in Missouri for the time soon to come seems full of promise.

The honored financial secretary of the Board of Ministerial Education, was at his own request released from the service of the Board for one-half his time. This release took effect January 1, 1894. Since

then he has done the office work and given two Sundays per month to work in the field for the Board.

Collections have been made amounting to \$2,184.13 in cash. This represents only the money passing through his hands into the treasury of the Board. Many gifts have been made to the cause indirectly, an account of which he does not render here as they came to the students independent of the Board.

Of the above amount the Woman's Missionary Society gave \$195.15. This, however, does not embrace all that the sisters have given—many donations having come in from various sources independent of the sisters' society.

Much has been accomplished by way of helping students to secure work by which many greatly aid themselves and some make their entire support.

The expenditures for the year for the services of the financial secretary and traveling expenses are \$828.36.

Additions to the Permanent Fund:

An aged brother has executed a will giving at his death \$4,000 to the Board.

Rev. John A. Blanchard of Greene county, Missouri, has deeded a farm valued at \$6,000 to the Board. This deed is on record and in the possession of the Board.

The secretary has preached eighty-three sermons, given fourteen Sunday school talks and assisted in four ordinations.

The deficit on current expenses above reported was \$1,634.20, so it will be seen that if the \$1,639.12 for Benevolent work and interest had been provided in some other way, the Sanitarium would have been self-sustaining on a basis of dollars and cents, or a strict business basis. The year has been a depressing one, as before stated, and the time from which the Benevolent work is estimated includes the dull months of the year for our work.

It pains us to report that we were compelled to renew the principal note of \$5,000, which fell due February 17, 1894, for want of funds to pay it. Another note of \$5,000 will be due next February, and we cannot now see how it can be paid. The mortgage indebtedness gives us great anxiety, but our trust is in God and the liberality of the brethren.

The religious meetings held in connection with the Sanitarium continue to be productive of much good, especially those on Sunday afternoon. The power and presence of the Holy Ghost is felt at every meeting.

It becomes our painful duty to report two deaths on our Sanitarium Association Board, William P. Crosswhite and John T. Davis.

These vacancies were filled at the recent annual meeting of the Sanitarium by the election of Dr. A. A. Kendrick and F. H. Ludington, both of the city of St. Louis, and as John Caro Russell resigned, H. B. Scammel, also of St. Louis, was elected to fill his place.

In our last report we referred to the fact that the Managing board had decided to employ, as soon as possible, a first class business manager, and in regard to that matter we beg to report it resulted in the selection of Bro. John Gallup, Jr., who took charge under written instructions defining his duties on March 1, 1894. Brother Gallup has rendered most efficient service and we feel sure no mistake was made in his selection.

In concluding this report we feel constrained to again request the prayers, sympathy and material aid of the great Baptist brotherhood of our state in this glorious work, it being our opinion that you cannot find a more Christ-like work. We again invoke the blessing of our kind Heavenly Father on this the annual gathering of His saints, trusting that we may even have a more spiritual meeting than at Carrollton last year.

REPORT ON OBITUARIES.

Since our last annual gathering the reaper has been busy garnering in, and many who, for years, stood with us, and worked with us, and prayed for us, have gone to their rest and reward, leaving behind them hallowed influences and pleasing memories. While we cherish the name and memory of each we make special mention of the following:

Rev. Thomas Washington Barrett was born in West Virginia, in 1835; baptized in Marietta, Ohio, in 1856; came to Missouri and was educated at William Jewell College; ordained to the ministry, October 28, 1860. Served as missionary in North Liberty Association in 1860; was pastor at Weston in 1861; Leavenworth in 1862; St. Joseph in

1864; Financial Agent of Sunday School Board of Southern Baptist Convention, for North Missouri in 1866; General Agent and Missionary of General Association in 1866 and 1867; recalled to Weston in 1868; served Hannibal church in 1869; Jefferson City in 1873; called to the Presidency of Stephens College in 1883, where he faithfully served until his death, which occurred in Columbia, Missouri, July 7, 1894. In every position found, from the time he entered the state until he went to heaven, he was the same cultured Christian gentleman. He fairly won the love and confidence of all with whom he came in contact, and held it to the last. When he died, the General Association lost a strong supporter and leader, the brotherhood a tender, loving and helpful counselor, the College to which he gave eleven years of his life, a warm friend, and the world a noble Christian man.

REV. A. W. CHAMBLISS. (*Data to be supplied.*)

Rev. W. H. Pulliam. Born in Virginia, March 1, 1827; came to Missouri in 1836 and settled in Marion county, where he lived and labored forty-five years. He preached in Marion, Knox, Shelby, Clark and Scotland counties. He preached at one of his churches, where he had been called for life, the Sunday before his death. On Saturday, December 16th, 1893, he died at his home in Memphis, Missouri, in his sixty-seventh year. In the pulpit he was inspiring, convincing, and helpful and in private life, tender, loving and true.

Rev. James S. Green. Born in Virginia; lived in Monroe City, Missouri, for years and died in Palmyra in 1894. A strong man and useful in his day and generation.

Rev. W. S. Tucker, died at his home in Bowling Green, November 11th, 1893. He was an earnest, zealous minister and a devoted pastor.

W. P. Crosswhite, died in November, 1893. He was a strong man, gentle in his spirit and modest in his bearing, wise in his counsel and lovely in his Christian character. Was, for a number of years, a valuable member of the Board of Trustees of William Jewell College and a devoted friend of the cause of Christian education.

Jesse E. Bryant. Died in June, 1894. He was an exemplary Christian, a true Baptist, and for years was a staunch friend and liberal benefactor of William Jewell College and the work of the Baptists in Missouri.

Geo. Rhodes. Died, January 1, 1894, at the remarkable age of ninety years, six months and sixteen days. He was, for years, a faithful deacon in Good Hope church, in Saline county, and for a number of years was a judge of the court of the same county and so discharged his duty in that relation as to leave his impress for good on all his constituency. He was a man of God, and a large contributor to the Lord's cause.

We also mention lovingly the names of Rev. S. E. DeRacken, Wm. Kellbuck, of Randolph county, and Samuel Nowlin, Montgomery City, as deserving a place in our memory as brethren and collaborators.

RELIGIOUS PUBLICATIONS.

Your committee on Religious Publications respectfully reports:

We hold it to be a demonstrated fact, that the religious press is a powerful agency for the discrimination of truth and inspiration to duty. Among our denominational publications, the *Central Baptist*, *American Baptist Flag* and *Christian Repository* still maintain their hold upon the brotherhood. We are glad to say that the *Central Baptist* under the editorial leadership of Rev. J. C. Armstrong, D. D., is ably carrying forward the work marked out by our late Brother Williams and in the same noble spirit of denominational loyalty.

The Sunday school board of the Southern Baptist convention is enjoying a phenomenal growth, and is contributing largely to the successful prosecution of the convention work. The board has a full set of periodicals, owned by the convention, and known as the Convention Series of Sunday School Helps, the *Teacher*, the three grades of *quarterlies*, *Kind Words* for young people, the *Gem* also a weekly for children, the *Young People's Leader* for young people's societies with a full line of Sunday school supplies. This department of the convention work has developed into a magnificent business enterprise. It has not only paid all of its expenses but in two years' time has contributed to Sunday school missions in the south more than thirteen thousand dollars (\$13,000) in cash and several thousand dollars in gifts of literature to mission schools. This was all done out of profits from the business. The periodicals are of excellent merit and moderate in cost, of good mechanical execution and distinctively missionary in their teaching. The genial and efficient Dr. T. P. Bell as corresponding secretary with headquarters at Nashville, solicits the patronage of all who appreciate good literature and desire success to the work of the convention.

The American Baptist Publication society with headquarters in Philadelphia in charge of Col. Banes the corresponding secretary who recently succeeded to the office of the lamented Dr. Griffith, is our senior publication society, and has won a place second to none, among the great publishing companies of the world.

It is our Baptist Bible society sending out 85,000 copies of the scriptures annually, and in many different languages. It is our Baptist Tract society. It has distributed nearly 43,000,000 pages of tracts. A single one of these tracts is known to have led forty persons, in one year, to obey Christ.

It is our Baptist Sunday school society. It has organized 9,918 new schools, and has helped multitudes of weak schools besides.

It is our Baptist Colporter Missionary society. Its missionary colporters have visited 1,245,488 neglected families, have baptized 24,349 persons, and organized 1,085 churches.

It is our Baptist Book Concern. It prints and distributes each year about 36,000,000 of publications, little and large. Its Sunday school supplies are more extensively used than any other house in the world with one exception.

Constitution of the Missouri Baptist General Association.

ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be called *The Missouri Baptist General Association*.

ART. 2. The object of this Association shall be to extend the Kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ, especially in this state.

ART. 3. The time of this Association shall be given to the promotion of its objects in such manner as may be determined by the report of the Committee on Arrangement of Business, when said report has been adopted at each meeting of the Association.

ART. 4. There shall be appointed annually committees on the following subjects: *First*, on Religious Exercises; *second*, on Arrangement of Business; *third*, on Nomination of Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools, Board of Home and Foreign Missions, Board of Trustees of William Jewell College, Board of Ministerial Education, Board of Education, and Board of Curators of Stephens College; *fourth*, on Religious Publications; *fifth*, on Obituaries. Of which committees, *fourth* and *fifth* shall be appointed for the year previous to which they are to report, and the Moderator may fill all vacancies that may occur during the year.

ART. 5. This Association shall be composed of representatives of Baptist churches and associations contributing to its funds and co-operating in its objects, together with such persons as have hitherto been admitted as life members.

ART. 6. Any church of like faith which may contribute Ten Dollars to the work of the Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools shall be entitled to a representative and to an additional representative for every Five Dollars; and every association auxiliary to this body shall be entitled to representation on the same terms as churches, or be entitled to one representative for every One Hundred Dollars spent in missionary work upon its own field; provided that no church or association shall be entitled to more than five representatives.

ART. 7. All associations auxiliary to this Association shall report annually to this body the result of their missionary work, a synopsis of which shall be published with the proceedings of this Association.

ART. 8. The State Missionary and Sunday School business of this Association, during its recess, shall be conducted by a Board consist-

ing of a Chairman, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and fifteen other members, all of whom shall be members in good standing of Baptist churches, who shall be chosen annually and continue in office until a new election, three members of whom, including one of the officers, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The officers shall perform their duties gratuitously, except the Corresponding Secretary, who may also act as General Agent. Meetings of the Board shall be held quarterly, or oftener, if deemed necessary, and special meetings may be called at any time by any officer of the Board, of which due notice shall be given. The time and place of the quarterly meetings of the Board, for each year, shall be agreed upon at the first meeting of the Board, and public notice shall be given of the same. The Board may fill all vacancies in their own body during the year.

ART. 9. The Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools may, from time to time, appoint such missionaries and agents for the prosecution of the legitimate work of this body as they may deem best.

ART. 10. The Board of General Home and Foreign Missions, consisting of nineteen members, shall have charge of raising in this State and of forwarding funds for these missions. It shall have power to choose its own officers and agents, and shall make to the Association full annual reports of its operations.

ART. 11. The Board of Ministerial Education shall have power to organize societies for raising means to promote Ministerial Education in connection with William Jewell College, and shall co-operate with its Board of Trustees, as far as the college charter may allow, in accomplishing the purpose of this body in founding it. The Board of Trustees of William Jewell College, and the Board of Curators of Stephens College, shall report the operations and finances of those institutions at each annual meeting of this body. The Board of Education shall thoroughly investigate the condition and wants of all our denominational schools in Missouri, and shall have power to raise money to afford temporary relief and to endow any Baptist school in Missouri. The said Board of Education shall make yearly reports to the Association of its doings and of the operations and finances of the schools co-operating with the said Board of Education. The Board of Education aforesaid shall consist of nineteen members, who shall be elected annually by the Association, and shall continue in office until the new Board of Education is elected.

ART. 12. The preachers employed or aided by this Association shall be of good standing and tried piety, and shall belong to some Baptist church in this State.

ART. 13. The Association shall meet at such time and place as it may elect.

ART. 14. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Secretary, Assistant Secretary and Auditor, who shall be chosen at each annual session. The Moderator, Assistant Moderator and Secretary shall be chosen by ballot, each member casting his own ballot, and by a majority of the ballots cast. The Secretary is to appoint his own assistant.

ART. 15. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the body, keep order, take the vote on all questions properly brought up, and perform all other duties common to such officer. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep correct minutes of all the proceedings of the Association, and prepare the same for publication; he may select an assistant. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to examine the report of the Treasurer of the Board of State Missions and Sunday schools, and report on the same to the Association.

ART. 16. In case of interruption in the regular meetings of this body, the Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools shall have power to call meetings at such time and place as they may think best.

ART. 17. This Constitution may be amended only at an annual meeting, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, and notice of such amendments must have been given at the annual meeting preceding.

RULES OF ORDER.

1. The meetings of this Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. In the absence of the Moderator and the Assistant Moderator, the Secretary shall call the Association to order, and, in case the Secretary should also be absent, the brother appointed to preach the *introductory sermon* shall do so, and preside until the Association is organized.

3. Any question that may arise, not provided for in the foregoing rules, shall be decided in accordance with "Mell's Manual of Parliamentary Practice."

4. The decision of the Moderator on points of order shall stand as the judgment of this body, unless reversed by a vote of the Association. Any member shall have a right to appeal from the decision of the Chair.

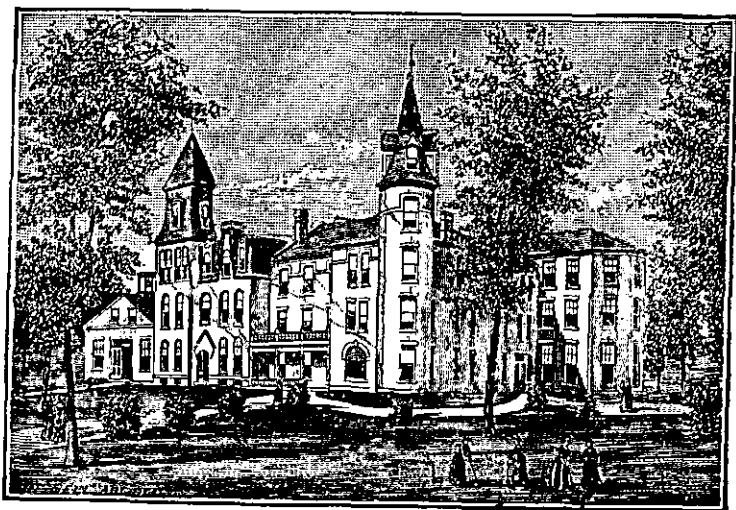
5. The foregoing rules may be altered or amended at an annual meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

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
