FIRST DAY—TUESDAY MORNING.

October 24, 1905.

The Missouri Baptist General Association was called to order in its seventy-first annual session by Moderator E. W. Stephens. The meeting was held with the Baptist Church at Warrensburg, Mo. The hour of assembling was 10 o'clock in the morning.

The meeting of the Ministers' Conference on the preceding day was largely attended and full of interest, not only to the pastors, but to all who were able to be present.

The Moderator referred feelingly to the fact that one year ago Dr. S. H. Ford, who entered into rest in July of this year, led the opening devotional service.

He then called Rev. W. R. Painter of LaGrange to read the scriptures and Rev. J. C. Maple of Armstrong to lead in prayer.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS.

To the Missouri Baptist General Association:

Dear Brethren—By the grace of God we come to you with this our sixteenth annual report. Our Corresponding Secretary, Dr. Manly J. Breaker, thus summarizes his year's work: Days on field, 91; places

visited, 80; miles traveled, 16,825; conventions attended, 5; associations attended, 30; addresses made, 107; letters sent out, 15,251; pages of literature printed, 265,500; distributed, 1,065,283; columns of matter written for the press, 145.

An itemized statement of receipts has been printed, and will be widely distributed. In condensed form it will also appear in the statistical tables appended to the minutes of the General Association.

Eight years ago, when our Corresponding Secretary made his first report, our total receipts were \$11,762.08; this year they are one hundred and sixty- per cent greater. During that time the membership of our churches has increased from 138,000 to 155,000, or twelve and a half per cent.

Thus it will be seen that, while we rejoice in being able to report marked progress, especially in offerings for foreign missions, we are yet far behind our \$20,000 for home and \$30,000 for foreign missions. Missouri Baptists have been very greatly blessed this year in being the hosts of all the Baptists of North America. This is a unique distinction, and we were in hopes that it would stimulate our interest in the great causes of home missions and foreign missions, but St. Louis association is the only association which shows marked effects in decidedly increased offerings.

During the year several matters have especially engaged the attention of the Board. One is the matter of expenses on which we have bestowed much attention. We heartily believe that not one cent more of money should be spent in expenses than is absolutely necessary to the efficiency of the work. It will be seen from the report that the rate of expense is three per cent less this year than last year, and your Board expresses the opinion that constant effort should be made to reduce expenses as contributions are increased by the co-operation of our pastors and the increased liberality of our people.

Also we have been much concerned about the development of the very large number of churches which hold themselves aloof from participation in our great missionary enterprises. This aloofness is not, in many cases, the result of opposition, but of indifference. And this indifference comes from lack of information, both general and particular, on the part both of churches and pastors. Very many of the churches and pastors referred to live in the Ozarks of Missouri, but not by any means all of them. We are profoundly convinced that the work of supplying the necessary particular information, and thus of enlisting these pastors and churches, cannot be done except by a joint effort on the part, at least, of the State Mission Board and our Board. Therefore we proposed to the State Mission and Ministerial Education Boards a joint campaign of education and enlistment in South Missouri, but were unable to secure their co-operation in the joint effort. Nevertheless, this, it seems to us, is the greatest missionary problem in our great State, and we earnestly hope that these other boards will yet join us in a serious effort to solve it. Till it is solved, no matter what otherwise may be our achievements, we are weakened and shamed while the great body of our brethren take no part in any large obedience to our Saviour's greatest command.

After conference with Dr. Mable, our Corresponding Secretary, promised to secure the money necessary to build a hospital for our Dr. H.

East in his great and needy field. And God graciously moved our honored Bro. W. G. Tyzzer, of the Mayfield Sanitarium, and the Third Church, St. Louis, to give the \$1,500 needed for that purpose. At the same time Dr. and Mrs. W. H. Mayfield resumed their payment (\$600 a year) of the salary of Dr. J. W. Lowe, in North China.

Our noble ladies have undertaken to raise \$1,600 to build the Effie Sears Memorial School for Girls at Pingtu, China, and these sisters always accomplish that they undertake. Spurred by their example, our Corresponding Secretary promised Dr. Willingham to raise \$4,000 to build a chapel (or church) for Bro. W. H. Sears. Bro. S. Y. Pitts nobly undertook, without salary, to raise this sum, and he secured some \$1,600, but had to abandon the work in order to take Sister Pitts to Florida. Bro. Sears, relying on us, has gone ahead with the work, and we must finish raising the money by January 1, 1906.

Just now there is most urgent need for much more educational work by Baptists on the foreign fields: We have surpassed others in evangelism, but have fallen far behind others in affording opportunities of Christian education to our converts and their children. No longer can we continue to occupy this inferior position. Here at home we are pre-eminent in affording opportunities of Christian education. There is, if possible, much greater need that we should be at least equal with others abroad. Hence our Boards in Boston and Richmond are making earnest effort to raise large funds for education. At the anniversaries our Corresponding Secretary promised on our behalf to raise, in addition to our regular gifts, \$50,000 for this great purpose, half for Boston and half for Richmond. It is proposed to secure this sum chiefly from individuals, and in payments running over four years. We ask that in adopting this report the General Association will give its most hearty endorsement to this effort.

These special features of our work this year have all been in behalf of Foreign Missions, because there was urgent need for them, and we were asked to engage in them. As soon as they are out of the way, we hope, after conference with the Boards in New York and Atlanta, to engage in some special effort in behalf of home missions. Meantime we heartily commend to our sisters the most worthy enterprise of enlarging the capacity of the noble Baptist Missionary Training School in Chicago, under the management of the Woman's Baptist Home Mission Society.

The financial reports herein submitted have all been carefully audited by the Auditing Committee of the Board.

We gratefully record our appreciation of our Corresponding Secretary, Dr. Breaker, in his untiring and able service in the work you have committed to us.

Tralle and Byrd Duncan to bear the greetings of the Association to the Normal School at 10 o'clock Thursday morning.

Mrs. W. A. Kingdon, Recording Secretary of the Woman's Committee on Missions, read the report of that committee.

ANNUAL REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSION BOARD TO THE MISSOURI GENERAL ASSOCIATION.

At the first meeting of the year your Woman's State Committee of Missions unanimously voted to work under the name of Woman's Mission Board. Five regular and several called meetings have been held, all in St. Louis, except the Spring Quarterly, which was held in Kansas City. Notwithstanding the serious illness with which our Corresponding Secretary has had to contend, good work has been done. The columns of the Missionary Interchange in the Central Baptist, edited by Mrs. M. J. Breaker, have presented the work from week to week. Our sincere thanks are extended to the Board of Home and Foreign Missions, and to the Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools for their generous appropriations towards the expenses of the Woman's Mission Board. It is our prayer that the gifts may be blessed to the extension of Christ's kingdom. Our Missionary Headquarters at the World's Fair proved a great success. The cordial welcome extended by our hostesses made a visit to its attractive rest rooms a pleasure indeed, and the little chapel, where we believe souls were led to Christ, became holy ground.

We present the report of our Corresponding Secretary, Miss Eleanor Mare:

"Our Societies have been at work this year along the lines of prayer for missions, the study of missions, and gifts for the support of woman's missionary work. He alone who receives the prayers of the saints as sweet incense knows how frequent or earnest they have been. The fact that 126 orders have been filled for the program prepared by this Board is an indication that the study of missions has not been neglected; and

many of our Societies follow the United Study Course, while others prepare their own programs. The gifts for women's missionary work have been:

Many homes of missionaries have been brightened by gifts of clothing and supplies sent by Societies. Their value is reported at \$2,070.81. The work of the year has been done by 207 societies and 17 Junior bands. Twenty-eight new societies have been organized. The Corresponding Secretary has written 2,856 letters; visited 57 places; forwarded 55 subscriptions for missionary periodicals, and distributed large quantities of literature. The Associational and District Secretaries have proved very helpful where they have been at work, especially in planning for Association meetings, and preparing for the organization of new societies. We have secretaries in 32 associations, who report 278 letters written and 41 visits made. The 24 traveling libraries have been in 43 places, informing and interesting their readers in missions.

The ultimate object of all our work is that women everywhere may learn of Jesus and be saved from lives of sin to lives of service. The work of those women missionaries who minister to women and children at home and abroad has been greatly blessed during the year in the salvation and development of many precious souls.

It is evident that the women of Missouri ought to have a much larger part in this work. In our own state are many places where women missionaries are needed, and the women of our churches can and ought to furnish the means for their support. In home and foreign fields the need of women workers was never so great as now; nor has their work ever been so successful. Our gifts are far too small. We need the co-operation of every Baptist woman in our State. We need young women's societies, and we need to train the children to have a part in this work. We ask the encouragement of all our pastors, in whose ranks we find many helpful friends. And we ask on the part of every woman in our churches a careful consideration of the value and needs of woman's missionary work. With the help of all and with the blessing of Almighty God, we desire this year to make a decided forward movement, and to speed the glad tidings to every place where Christ is not known. For this we labor and pray."

ITEMIZED REPORT.

The itemized report shows amount of contributions from Women's Missionary and Aid Societies. Of the 207 societies named, 169 have given for foreign missions; 131 for home missions; 88 for State missions; 47 for district missions; and 61 for the Expense Fund. Gifts from individuals are not included in the itemized report.

JUNIOR HONOR ROLL.

Seventeen bands of children have received the blessing that comes from cheerful giving. The Willing Workers of Second Church, St. Louis, lead the list with \$30, given for foreign missions; the Junior Union of Nevada comes next, having given \$15.85 for foreign and \$5.00 for home missions; Grandin Junior Union gave \$10.00 for foreign, \$2.00 for home and \$3.00 for State missions; Fairfax Junior Union gave \$15.00, and Fee Fee Jewell Band gave \$10.00 for the support of a child in heathen lands. The other bands contributing are: Milan Junior Union, \$3.30 for foreign missions; Carondelet Willing Workers and Delmar Avenue Junior Union, each \$5.00 for home missions; Moberly Sunbeams, \$1.00 for foreign and \$2.50 for home missions; Lafayette Park Junior Union and Water Tower Sewing School, each \$4.00 for home missions; Fourth Church Sewing School, \$4.00 for foreign mission; Kossuth Avenue Willing Workers, \$1.00 for foreign and \$2.00 for home missions; Paris Junior Union, \$3.00 for home missions; Rolla Junior Union, \$2.00 for home missions; De Soto Baby Band, \$1.35 for foreign missions, and Unionville Junior Union, 50c for foreign missions.

We hereby give notice that next year the following amendment to the constitution will be offered:

In article four strike out the words "Women's State Committee of Missions," and substitute the words, "Woman's Mission Board."

TUESDAY EVENING.

Rev. J. H. Dew conducted the devotional service.

Rev. T. P. Stafford led in prayer.

Copies of Diadem, as sung at the Baptist World's Congress, had been secured by Dr. M. J. Breaker. The choir of the Warrensburg Church led in the singing. It was indeed inspiring to hear the entire Association join in the rendition of this arrangement of "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," as sung by English Baptists.

The discussion of Home and Foreign Missions was resumed.

Rev. C. N. White of Smithton, at the request of Corresponding Secretary Breaker, related his experience in enlisting country and village churches in contributing to missions.

Rev. A. J. Barton of the Home Mission Board at Atlanta spoke on the work of the Board, especially that among the negroes.

Rev. H. C. Mabie of the Missionary Union, Boston, spoke of the opportunity to evangelize China, Japan and the whole world in the immediate future.

The report of the Board of Home and Foreign Missions was then adopted.

Adjourned, with prayer by Rev. W. O. Anderson.

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

Rev. R. L. Davidson of Kansas City conducted the devotional service.

At the beginning of the business session W. S. Crouch led in prayer.

A telegram of greeting was received from the Missouri students at the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. The Secretary was instructed to respond to the greeting.

Rev. R. L. Davidson offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, that a committee of seven be appointed on Christian Stewardship, whose duty shall be to stir our Baptist brotherhood to a recognition of their stewardship by addresses, Bible readings, conferences and the distribution of suitable literature, and that this committee be authorized to draw upon the treasuries of the Home, Foreign and State Mission Boards, pro rata, to the amount of one hundred dollars to meet its expenses in carrying out this resolution.

The Moderator announced R. L. Davidson, J. W. Milion, Rush G. Harper, C. B. Littlefield, E. W. White, F. S. Casey, Howard P. Smith and Louis Hoffman as the committee.

Corresponding Secretary of the Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools T. L. West read the report on Sunday Schools. The report was discussed by H. E. Tralle and O. L. Wood and then adopted.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT.

An intimate acquaintance with the word of God, as revealed to us in the Bible, is a blessing worthy of being striven after by all our

people. "Thy word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my pathway;" "The entrance of Thy word giveth light."

It is with the purpose of getting all our people everywhere to study the word of God that we are engaged in Sunday school work. We hold that a properly conducted Sunday school is a study service for the church, not for the children alone, and a few consecrated ones, who meet week after week to teach them, but for the whole church, young and old. Our ideal in Sunday school work will not be attained till we have every one of our churches meeting every Sunday to study the word of God. At present we are far from this ideal. There are at least five hundred Baptist churches in Missouri that have no Sunday school at all. Many of the churches that have schools turn it all over to the children and the few teachers that are striving to do something in this important work.

It is for the making of more Sunday schools and the improvement of those we already have that your Board is laboring. In this labor we gratefully acknowledge the aid we are receiving from the American Baptist Publication Society in giving us free of cost to our Board the services of Bro. H. E. Tralle, who is laboring with tremendous energy and wisdom, giving all of his time to the Sunday school work in this State. Bro. Tralle reports during the past year 365 days of labor; 27,531 miles traveled; 101 institutes and conventions assisted; 527 sermons and addresses delivered, and 653 professions of conversion under his preaching.

We also express our gratitude for the aid we are receiving from the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention in the Sunday school services of Bro. R. M. Inlow, who gives a part of his time to work in our State. He reports 294 days of labor in Missouri; 158 institutes and conventions held; 91 sermons and 158 addresses, and 40 professions of conversion.

We are happy to report that we believe our Sunday school work to be in a better condition than we have had it for a great number of years. Statistics show that we have more Sunday schools than ever before, and we believe that they are doing better and more intelligent work.

We recommend a continuance of the plan of co-operation in this work with our National Sunday School Boards.

Recording Secretary J. C. Armstrong of the Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools read the report of that Board.

STATE MISSIONS.

In presenting to you our report of work done by our Board during the past year, we are happy in the belief that this is the best report we were ever able to make to this body. This is true in the increased number of workers we have had, in the larger amount of money we have expended, and in the larger results we have been permitted to reap from our labors. In all of this, we desire to acknowledge the goodness and mercy of God, without whose continual aid and blessings we could have accomplished nothing.

ENLARGEMENT.

In the first meeting after the association last year the Board took steps towards carrying out the instructions of this body, and made appropriations on the basis of the expenditure of \$30,000 during the year. How well we have succeeded in carrying out these instructions, the report of the Treasurer will show.

NUMBER OF WORKERS.

During the year the Board has had employed for a part or all of the time 122 workers. They were distributed as follows: 82 missionary pastors; 13 district missionaries; one general missionary among the Swedes; one general missionary among the negroes; 12 students who worked as missionaries during the summer; 4 women workers; 8 State evangelists, and the Corresponding Secretary. In addition to these, we have had the services of two Sunday school workers; 4 colporteurs and one chapel car man, no part of whose salaries is paid by our Board, making the total number of workers under our direction for all or a part of the time this year, 129.

SUMMARY OF RESULTS.

We are well aware that it is impossible to set down in figures anything that will adequately express all of the labors, and struggles, and successes of our faithful workers. The least of their labors are those that can be expressed in figures. Nevertheless, these figures give us some idea of the rich blessings God has bestowed upon us during the year, and we gladly give them. The 122 workers, whose salaries were partly paid by the Board, report: Days of labor, 25,898; sermons, 11,919; professions of conversion, 4,761; baptisms, 3,563; additions by letter and restoration, 1,861; churches organized, 12; Sunday schools organized, 49. In addition to these, our Sunday school men, colporteurs, and chapel car man report: 795 professions of conversion; 103 baptisms, and 83 by letter as a result of their work, making the grand total of professions of conversion under our workers during the year, 5,546, and of baptisms, 3,666. Counting all that have come in by baptism, letter and restoration during the year, we have the grand total of 5,347 additions to our churches as a direct result of the labors of those working under our Board this year.

Surely God is leading us on in this work, and it is our plain duty to follow the leading of His guiding hand.

We pause here for a moment to pay a tribute of respect to the memory of our beloved brother, J. N. Hartley, one of the most consecrated and effective laborers we ever had associated with us. His work in organizing and building up the church at Savannah, county seat of Andrew county, was phenomenal. Beginning with nothing, about three years ago, we have there now a strong working church of 144 members, with a church house that cost about \$12,000, all paid for. While in the midst of his labors and usefulness, during the latter part of September,

our Heavenly Father called him, and he laid down his work, which he was doing so well, and went to join the company of the "just ones made perfect." His body was laid by loving hands in its resting place in the beautiful cemetery at Savannah to await the resurrection morn. No monument of marble has yet been raised over his grave. It makes no very great difference whether that is ever done or not. The church at Savannah, into the building of which he poured all the energies of his being, will ever stand as a monument to his consecrated and efficient labors. Truly "the memory of the just is blessed." We extend to sister Hartley and her children our sincerest sympathy in their bereavement.

OUR WORKERS ON THEIR FIELDS.

If time permitted it would be a pleasure to us to name our workers and their fields one by one, and tell of the peculiar conditions and difficulties, and prospects of each one. But with a list of 129 laborers, such an undertaking here is plainly impossible. We shall therefore have to content ourselves with a brief reference to what is being done on a few of our fields as illustrative of the character of work we are trying to do.

OPENING NEW FIELDS.

Among the most destitute sections of our State, from a Baptist standpoint, are our northern counties bordering onto Iowa. In these counties are great stretches of territory in which Baptists are not known. In it are hundreds of towns and a number of county seats in which we had no church. Three years ago Unionville, county seat of Putnam county, was one of these. Realizing the strategic importance of this place, we instructed Bro. W. A. Pipkin, then one of our district missionaries, to go there with his tent and begin a series of meetings. As soon as he had the meetings well started, we had Brother J. H. Dew, one of our State evangelists, to join him, and together they continued the meetings just 40 days. The result of their labors was the organization of a Baptist church, with additions that gave them just one hundred members. But the missionary and evangelist had to go to other work, and there was the new church, without pastor and without house in which to meet. Here came in the work of our Board with a missionary pastor. As soon as the meeting closed the Board urged the church to call a pastor, offering to pay half of his salary till they could grow in strength. They were happy in securing the services of Rev. O. L. Wood, whose labors there through the past three years have been greatly blessed. During that time they have built and paid for a splendid house on one of the most desirable lots in the town, and the church today is one of our strongest churches in north Missouri. They now have a membership of 255, and a Sunday school with average attendance of over 150. In addition to this, that church maintains three mission Sunday schools in the surrounding country, so that through it, the gospel is literally being preached in "all the regions round about." We give this as an illustration of how we are trying to open up new and difficult fields. It also shows how beautifully the different departments of our work fit into, and supplement each other. We have undertaken work on this same

plan at Bethany, Belle, Owensville and other places, with most happy results. There are yet remaining hundreds of places in our State where a like work might be done.

HOLDING TERRITORY.

This oft-times is the most tedious and difficult work we have to do, and this is the work committed to our missionary pastors. They take up the work where the missionary or evangelists leave it, and undertake the building up and development of the churches. The Board is giving much of its thought to this important enterprise, a large majority of our workers being missionary pastors. *These men are doing faithful service* in our large cities, and in many of our smaller towns, and in the country. Their duties are often burdensome, and their salaries pitifully small, but they toil on, in their labors and sacrifices of love. God bless our missionary pastors. We had 82 of them during the past year, but ten times 82 could hardly do the work that needs to be done in our State.

CO-OPERATION WITH DISTRICT ASSOCIATIONS.

Many of our district associations are unable of themselves to employ men who are capable of doing the work that needs to be done in their territory. The State Board, realizing this, has uniformly offered to join with these associations in the support of efficient men. The good character of the work done by men thus employed is illustrated in the case of Brother J. A. Francis, in Pulaski county, and of Brother James Rider, who works in Spring River Association, covering the mining districts around Carthage and Joplin. Especially has the work of Brother Rider been blessed. He has the faculty of gaining the ears of the people and great crowds attend upon his ministry wherever he goes. During the past year he was instrumental in leading more than three hundred persons to accept Jesus as their Savior. We notice at length this department of work, because we believe it opens the door for very effectively building up the cause of Christ in many places of our State that are now comparatively destitute. Our greatest need in this department is good, effective men. Men who are willing, gladly to endure the sacrifices and hardships that it necessarily entails. A great number of the District Associations are already making application to your Board for co-operation with them during the coming year, and we heartily commend these applications to the incoming Board.

EVANGELISTS.

The plan of employing our evangelists, which we inaugurated five years ago, grows in favor with our well to do business men who are taking part in it, and the work of the evangelists is coming more and more into favor with our churches. All of our pastors are glad to get good, safe, reputable, consecrated men to aid them in their work. During the past year, we have had eight men employed in this department for all or a part of the time, and they have not been able to respond to more than one-fourth of the calls that have come to them for their services. We are sure that it was by following the leading of God's hand

that this work was inaugurated, and we are equally sure that we ought to press it with all the vigor possible.

OTHER WORKERS.

It is with pleasure that we call attention to the excellent service that was rendered by our students who labored as missionaries during the summer, and to the magnificent work done by our four colporteur, and by Brother Jacobs, with the chapel car, "Messenger of Peace," and we hereby express our thanks to the American Baptist Publication Society, which is furnishing us, free of cost to our Board, the services of those men. We shall give opportunity of speaking of their work during the discussion of this report.

OUR WOMEN.

We desire to announce the hearty co-operation of our Women's Missionary Societies in our endeavors this year. Miss Eleanor Mare, the Secretary of the Woman's Board of Missions, has labored faithfully to keep the societies informed as to our work; and, as they have learned more about it, they have increased their offerings to help us. We recommend that the incoming Board continue to share equally with the Board of Home and Foreign Missions the expenses of these good women in the conduct of their work.

FINANCIAL LIMITATIONS.

During the year our Board received from the Board of Home and Foreign Missions a proposition to unite with them and the Board of Education in employing two field secretaries, at a salary of about \$1,200 each, to carry on a campaign of education, especially with our churches in Southern Missouri; but the Board, after a careful consideration of the subject, felt compelled, because of a lack of funds, to decline to go into such an agreement.

WORK YET TO BE DONE.

While we greatly rejoice in the glorious results of our labors during the year just closed, we desire to direct your attention to the tremendous work that yet remains to be done in our State. When we consider the vast and widespread destitution that is yet hardly touched by our endeavors what we have accomplished dwindles almost into insignificance in the comparison.

The 152,000 Baptists we now have in Missouri live mostly in the central counties of the State. In most of the counties of our northern and southern borders, the religious destitution is appalling. In Stone, Taney, Ozark and Douglas counties, bordering onto Arkansas, we have not more than a dozen or so little country churches, and only one Sunday school in all these counties so far as we can learn. In Ste. Genevieve and Perry counties we have only six little country churches, with not a single Sunday school. In Schuyler county, up on the northern border, we have eight or ten little country churches not one of which has preaching

more than one Sunday in the months, and not a Sunday school in the county. In the six or eight counties around St. Louis, destitution reigns almost supreme so far as Baptists are concerned. In St. Louis county, outside of the city of St. Louis, we have four little country churches. In St. Charles county we have only the one little church in the city of St. Charles, and that one is struggling to maintain its existence. They have had no pastor since God took to himself our beloved Brother James Reid, less than a year ago. Time would fail us to speak at length of the destitution in St. Louis with its 750,000 people, and only 10,000 Baptists—of South St. Louis, with a population of 250,000 people and only one self-sustaining Baptist church—of the destitution in Kansas City with its rapidly growing population—of the needs for work in St. Joseph and in Joplin and in Springfield, and in hundreds of our smaller towns, not to speak of the country. But we can not desist without saying something about our large and increasing foreign population. Of our three and a half millions of people, nearly one-third of them are foreigners, mostly Germans. These people make excellent citizens, hardworking and prosperous, but are very difficult of access with the pure gospel. It is these people, with their foreign religious training, that are threatening the very life of some of our most cherished institutions.

When we think of all of these things, the problem of evangelizing Missouri wells up into tremendous proportions, and we may well ask ourselves whether or not we are doing anything adequate to the accomplishment of the task before us.

ENCOURAGEMENT.

But over against this colossal undertaking we have many encouragements for pressing on with brave and steadfast hearts. The first and greatest of all of these encouragements is our confident belief that God is with us in it. "If God be for us, who can be against us?" His presence is manifested continually by the rich blessings he is pouring out upon the labors of our workers. In no state in the union are the results of the work of state missions larger, in proportion to the number of men employed, and the amount of money expended, than they are in Missouri.

The second encouragement is the favor that God is giving our work with all our people. We are confident that we do not overstate the facts when we say that never were the Baptists of Missouri more heartily united on anything than they are now on our State Mission work. And last, are the hundreds of open doors that are awaiting the coming of our laborers. From all over our State urgent calls are coming for evangelists and missionaries and pastors, and fields that are "already white to the harvest" are awaiting the coming of the laborers. How long shall we wait before we enter these open doors, and reap the rich harvests? The harvest time is already on us. If we delay, others will enter and reap the rewards.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

In view of all of these facts and conditions, we most heartily recommend that this body instruct their incoming Board of State Missions

and Sunday schools to enlarge their operations during the coming year to the utmost limit, and that they call on the churches to furnish during the year not less than \$35,000 for its maintenance. We would further recommend that the Association instruct the Board to continue the plan of co-operation with other agencies that have so effectively aided us for the past few years.

WEDNESDAY EVENING.

The evening session was given to a mass meeting in the interest of State Missions.

Rev. J. A. Jordan, Missionary Colporter, in charge of Colportage Wagon No. 43, spoke of his work in Southeast Missouri.

Rev. G. W. Hatcher read the report of the Curators of Stephens College.

REPORT OF STEPHENS COLLEGE.

More has been done in the strengthening of the endowment of Stephens College during the past year than in any period of its history. In 1870 the late James L. Stephens, in consideration of the college having been adopted as the State female institution, gave to it an endowment of twenty thousand dollars, for which he gave his note and continued to pay annual interest upon the same until 1876, when the General Association to which the college had been deeded surrendered to him his note and accepted in lieu thereof sixteen improved lots of ground in Columbia, Missouri, valued at \$24,000.00 and yielding an annual rental at that time of \$1,600.00. This property continued to yield this rental for a time, but was afterwards allowed to get out of repair so that the income was materially reduced from time to time until the trustees determined to secure a decree of court directing their sale and the reinvestment of the proceeds in more productive property. This decree was obtained and a number of these lots have been sold for \$10,000.00. Those remaining unsold will increase this amount to about \$14,000.00. Of this sum \$12,000.00 was invested in business property in Columbia, yielding an annual rental of \$1,800.00, or six per cent upon \$30,000.00. The trustees have erected an addition to this property at an expense of some \$10,000.00, which will yield a rental of some \$1,700, or \$1,800.00, rendering it practically certain that the college will have, after the paying of all insurance, taxes and repairs a permanent income of \$3,000, or six per cent on \$50,000.00, instead of \$20,000.00, the amount of the original endowment. To do this it will be necessary to carry a debt of some \$10,000.00 upon the property, but this will easily be paid in less than five years, when the college will have a permanent endowment from property in the center of Columbia, which will always yield a net interest of six per cent upon \$50,000.00.

The Curators feel that the friends of the institution have reason to be congratulated upon this favorable investment of the endowment. It

is but the nucleus of what should be a much larger one. They look forward confidently to the time in the no distant future when the Baptists of Missouri will swell the amount to \$100,000.00 and more.

The college buildings have been put in excellent repair during the summer and were never in such condition as the present. Old out buildings have been removed and new ones substituted, the main building has been painted and re-papered; the chapel has been furnished with electric lights and frescoed and the roof thoroughly repaired.

The college never had a better faculty nor was it ever under better business management. The attendance of pupils is greater than for several years and would have been beyond the capacity of the building but for an unfortunate and groundless report of the prevalence of typhoid fever in Columbia having been published throughout the State about the time of the opening. The Curators can most cordially commend the management in all departments.

The institution is out of debt, the buildings are in good repair, the endowment has been nearly quadrupled, the management is good, the attendance excellent. The school needs more buildings. It should have at least double, if not three or four times its present accommodations for students. It could surely fill them. But it feels sure that with judicious business management and a thorough understanding of conditions these will come at no distant date. While it is now self-sustaining, by the accession of more buildings, it could be made so profitable as to render its business alone sufficient to provide for all future demands without calling upon the denomination for help.

It is no mendicant or beggar. It is in no destitute condition. It is self-sustaining. It owns over \$150,000.00 of property free of debt, located in an educational center and it is owned and controlled exclusively by Baptists. It offers a rare opportunity for Baptist patronage and benevolence. It is a heritage of the fathers, who thus builded wisely for their daughters as they had already provided for their sons. We believe that we to whom this trust has been committed will foster it as faithfully as we have any other interest committed to us, and not this college only, but all others under Baptist control. We are amply able to sustain every college or academy or school belonging to our beloved denomination.

That Stephens College is entering a career of prosperity such as it has never known we have all faith. That the denomination, which sought and adopted it and pledged itself to its maintenance will faithfully fulfill its pledge, we have the fullest confidence and hope.

The report of the Board of Trustees of William Jewell College was read by Rev. J. E. Cook.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF WILLIAM JEWELL COLLEGE.

Dear Brethern—The college closed a successful year in June, with an enrollment of 317 students from 20 states and countries. Sixteen young men were graduated with the degree of A. B. The college enrolled 117 students for the ministry. There were no deaths during the year.

The most distressing incident in the year was the outbreak of smallpox. The school was closed for about three weeks. In all nearly sixty patients were treated in the Brown Gymnasium, which was converted into a temporary sanitarium. There were no fatalities and none were disfigured. Great credit is due Dr. Hooser, one of our students, for the ministry, for his faithfulness and ability in this crisis. When school reconvened the faculty and students were surprised beyond measure. The outbreak of smallpox had caused no perceptible loss in the number of

students. The bravery, loyalty and fidelity to one another among our students can not be praised too extravagantly.

During the year there was a great work of grace in the student body. Many were converted. In fact few were left unconverted, and there were none whose hearts had not been moved upon by the Holy Spirit.

During the summer the buildings were thoroughly repaired, cleaned, re-papered and painted and the grounds cleared of all weeds and rubbish of all kinds. The old college and the campus were never so beautiful as they are this fall. Ely Hall was re-painted and papered out of the Ely Fund, at the suggestion of Mr. Herndon Ely.

School opened this fall with two new teachers. Professor Elmer C. Griffith, Ph. D., now holds the chair of History and Political Science, made vacant by the departure of Dr. Smith. No man has ever brought to the college a better scholastic record than Dr. Griffith. His reputation as a man of honor is without a spot. Wherever he has taught he has won the reputation of being the best teacher in the institution. He is an agreeable associate and a man of gentle manners and dignified conduct. He is withal a sturdy Baptist of the old-fashioned type. The academy is enriched by the presence of Mr. G. Garland Riggan, A. B., of the University of Virginia.

The college has had the greatest opening in its entire history. Already there are 340 men on the grounds, which is only three short of the highest total enrollment the college has ever had in any single year. It is confidently hoped that 400 resident students will matriculate this year. About 140 students for the ministry are now in attendance. These happy results were obtained very largely through the loyalty and efforts of the old students. All the members of the Faculty joined in a systematic attempt to increase the enrollment. The alumni and the students joined heartily in the undertaking, with the splendid results that I have detailed.

As will be seen by the Treasurer's report, there was a considerable deficit on current expenses. Our noble, consecrated and efficient President, for whom we continually thank God, is now in the east to see if the Lord has any money there for William Jewell College. Enlargement of our entire plant, teaching force and endowment at once is imperative. We need new dormitories, a science hall, library building, a hospital, administration building and chapel, and an alumni house. The grounds ought to have the immediate attention of a splendid landscape gardener. An increase of the productive endowment to a million dollars must be sought for and prayed for by the Baptists of Missouri at once, and we need at least \$200,000 for buildings. The churches of Missouri are all urged and requested to contribute liberally to Ministerial Education. The college can not do the work required of it on its present resources. The college is giving this year free tuition to 140 ministerial students, and free tuition to 30 or 40 sons of ministers, and free tuition to perhaps a dozen worthy but indigent Christian young men. In addition the Board of Ministerial Education is supporting over fifty students for the ministry, through what is known as janitor work in the college, at an expense of more than four thousand dollars. The

time is at hand when the college must ask the churches of Missouri to support wholly this benevolent work. It ought to be possible, considering the importance of Christian education and ministerial training, to raise from the churches of Missouri fifteen or twenty thousand dollars each year for the great benevolent work of William Jewell College.

During the meeting at Chillicothe the Trustees of Southwest Baptist College and of Grand River Baptist College made overtures to the Board of Trustees of William Jewell College, for the purpose of turning over the properties of these two schools to this Board, to be conducted as academies. At this, its first opportunity, the Board desires to report what has been done in this connection. It has been agreed by our Board that as soon as \$25,000 can be secured as endowment for Grand River, and a floating debt of say \$1,000 paid off, the Trustees of William Jewell College will undertake to conduct the Grand River Baptist Academy at Gallatin. Some legal complications have arisen, and there is now in court a friendly suit to perfect the title for the purpose above mentioned. When this is done, if the enterprise meets the approval of the General Association, this Board will put into the field in North Missouri, a brother to secure this endowment, to be held in trust by William Jewell College for the use and benefit of the Grand River Baptist Academy.

In regard to the work at Bolivar, considerable more progress has been made. A deed in fee simple of the property of the Bolivar school has been made to the Trustees of William Jewell College, and the deed is held now by Mr. Luther James of Kansas City, Mo. As soon as \$20,000 can be raised in good notes and securities, William Jewell College has agreed to undertake the administration of the college at Bolivar, as the Southwest Baptist Academy allied with William Jewell College. Brother E. S. Graham, by the joint action of the two Boards, was put into the field last year and sufficient money has been subscribed to meet all of the floating indebtedness of Bolivar. By the approval and at the suggestion of this Board of Trustees, the Board at Bolivar elected Rev. J. W. Rucker to be President, and he has opened the school this year with wonderful enthusiasm and with every prospect of doing a splendid work for the Baptists in Southwest Missouri at Bolivar. This Board, as individuals, agreed to become responsible for the salary of Brother Rucker, in case the income of the school at Bolivar was not sufficient to pay him a living of \$1,200 a year. It is the intention of this Board to ask Brother Rucker to take the field to secure now the \$20,000 endowment, to be held in trust by this Board for the use and benefit of the work at Bolivar.

We report with sadness the death of Brother W. R. Wilbite, for many years a loving and loyal member of this Board.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ORPHANS' HOME.

In making this report, your Committee feels it is fitting that, first of all, we should put upon record our profound appreciation of the faithful and eminently efficient work done by those who are directly responsible for the being, and for the maintenance, of our Orphan's Home.

Some of those who twenty years ago and more thought and prayed and planned and gave that this institution might be, have been gathered to their fathers. "They rest from their labors;" but "their works do follow them." The influence of their consecrated lives and labors abides.

Others of them, however, with us, thank God, remain; and to them have been added many, whose hearts and heads and hands and means seem to be greatly enlisted in this blessed work. And today we all rejoice together for the greatly enlarged usefulness of our Orphans' Home in the near future.

It would be hard, indeed, to find anywhere an institution whose affairs have been more wisely and economically administered than have been the affairs of this institution during all the twenty years of its history. Surely those in charge of this particular "business of the King" have been sustained and led by grace and guidance from on high; and most heartily do we congratulate them on the splendid success which under God, has crowned their self-denying labors.

The work of the past year has been eminently satisfactory. On October 1, 1904, there were 72 children in the home. From that date to October 1, 1905, 88 children were received into the home; and during this period 68 children were dismissed from the home; 4 were adopted, 2 indentured, 1 returned to friends, 2 on trial, and only 1 death.

A total of 160 children were cared for during the year, 92 of them being in the home at the present time; and their presence there is a most pathetic appeal to all for sympathy and for help.

The home has an invested endowment, at 5 and 6 per cent, or \$23,-257.15. This endowment should be largely increased, and that as rapidly as possible.

The treasurer's books showed a balance on hand, October 1, 1904, of \$345.08; during the year, received from all sources, \$6,489.20, making a total, of cash on hand for the work of the year, of \$6,834.28. The total expenditures for the year have been \$5,938.92, leaving a balance in the treasury of \$895.36. For this splendid showing those in charge of this work deserve the thanks of all good people.

For some years it has been known that the usefulness of the home was limited by lack of room. And so, at the last meeting of the Missouri Baptist General Association, a committee was appointed to secure a site for new and more commodious buildings. This committee has done its work. Ground has been bought. And the task before us now is to raise the money for the erection of these proposed, and much needed, new buildings.

Towards the accomplishment of this, that ought to be an easy task, encouraging progress is being made.

The need is great. The work is blessed. The Christ's little ones are suffering everywhere. Piteously they appeal to us. And it were hard, indeed, we think to invest money in any other way that would tell so directly and so largely for the glory of God in the help of humanity. "In as much as ye have ministered unto one of the least of these, ye have ministered unto Me."

It was moved and carried that the Missouri Baptist General Association appoint a committee of three to co-operate with B. Y. P. U. in this work. W. O. Anderson, Com. P. Storts and J. E. Franklin were appointed.

Rev. R. K. Maiden called up the amendment, of which he gave notice one year ago.

Rev. F. C. McConnell moved its adoption.

Rev. R. K. Maiden moved to refer it and other amendments to a committee of fifteen.

Rev. Claude Kelly moved that "the subject of amendments to the Constitution, relative to the matter of one Board, be referred to a committee of fifteen, composed of five from the Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools, five from the Board of Home and Foreign Missions and five at large, which committee shall report their recommendation at the next session of the Missouri Baptist General Association."

The motion was adopted.

Rev. M. J. Breaker moved that the following be referred to the above named committee, and it was so ordered:

Make article five read: Membership in this body shall be as follows;

(1.) The life members already constituted may remain.

(2.) Any regular Baptist church in Missouri which may contribute annually to State Missions or Home Missions or Foreign Missions under the direction of this General Association, shall be entitled to send one representative, and an additional representative for each additional five dollars, after the first one dollar, provided that no church shall send more than five representatives.

(3.) Any member of any regular Baptist church in Missouri may make himself (or herself) an annual member by the payment during the year of twenty-five dollars to the State, Home or Foreign mission work of this body.

Rev. J. E. Cook moved that the committee of fifteen hereinbefore mentioned be requested to take into consideration the entire Constitution of the body, and to recommend any amendments or changes that, in its judgment, would result to the advantage of the Missouri Baptist General Association.

The motion was unanimously adopted.

Rev. M. J. Breaker presented the following notice of amendment to the Constitution:

I hereby give notice that at the next session I will offer this amendment to the constitution, to wit, to strike out in article 17 the words: "And notice of such amendment must have been given at the annual meeting preceding."

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

Resolved (1) that, with grateful hearts, we recognize the goodness of our Heavenly Father manifested during the past year in the general prosperity of our churches and in the advancement attending our missionary and educational efforts. And particularly do we rejoice in the enlarged number of baptisms reported by our State missionaries.

(2) That we record our highest appreciation of the excellent provision made for the comfort of this body by the First Baptist Church of Warrensburg, Pastor Campbell and wife, together with all their assistants; and also our gratitude for the courtesies and hospitality of the citizens of Warrensburg and for kindnesses shown by our brethren of other faiths. We also very especially wish to thank the Christian Church for the free use of their building.

(3) That we cordially thank the railroads for favors shown us, and the editors and reporters of the local papers for their full and accurate reports, especially Mr. John R. Reavis of the Warrensburg Star, and Brother Wallace Crossly, editor of the Daily Star. We also thank them for free copies of the papers placed every day on the reporters' table.

(4) That we recognize with pride and gratitude the courageous, honorable and righteous fight being made by our Governor, Joseph W.

Folk, against lawbreakers and lawlessness. We heartily approve his brave and consistent policy of law enforcement and pledge to him our sympathy and co-operation.

(5) That we endorse and call upon all our people to support the work of the Anti-Saloon League in our State, and that we urge President Roosevelt to make mention of the subject of temperance in his next message to Congress.

(6) That we recommend to our pastors and churches the plans of the Christian Stewardship League as a means of stimulating enlarged liberality to the Lord's work.

Rev. J. N. Prestridge offered prayer.

Rev. J. C. Armstrong moved that the address of Rev. W. J. Williamson be printed in tract form.

It was so ordered.

The Moderator announced the *Committee of Fifteen on Amendment to the Constitution: At Large*—C. M. Truex, J. D. Biggs, I. W. Read, J. W. Taylor, Byrd Duncan.

Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools—S. M. Brown, R. L. Davidson, J. C. Armstrong, J. T. M. Johnston, J. T. Morris.

THE YEAR'S WORK.

NURSES TRAINING SCHOOL.

The Nurses Training School is conducted under the joint direction of the medical staff and the head nurse, Mrs. Fannie E. S. Smith. The course of instruction given by the sanitarium is thorough and most satisfactory in every way. There are thirty-eight pupils now in the school, twelve of them are in the senior class, eleven in the intermediate class, and fifteen in the junior. The course of study is three years. Five were graduated in May, last.

In closing this annual report the Managing Board desires to express its appreciation of the hearty support which is being accorded the sanitarium by the medical profession and by the brotherhood throughout Missouri. It is our purpose to continue to serve the denomination in the future as in the past.

Rev. J. H. Eager spoke in regard to the endowment fund of the seminary.

Rev. J. C. Armstrong offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That we approve and endorse the plan to raise \$60,000 for the endowment of a John A. Broadus Memorial chair in the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, and that we heartily commend the same to the prayers and liberality of the Baptists of Missouri.

Rev. J. H. Dew moved to make Missouri's share \$5,000.

It was so ordered.

Rev. J. C. Maple announced the following officers of the Missouri Baptist Historical Society: J. C. Maple, president; R. S. Duncan, vice-president, H. E. Truex, secretary and treasurer; R. P. Rider, custodian.

Rev. J. E. Cook moved that in the "Schedule" "Education" be changed to "Christian Education."

It was carried.

The report on "Religious Literature" was presented.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

This is a reading age. Men reach conclusions more by reading than by listening. It is not recognized, as it should be, that the greatest audience which one has is that which reads what you say, rather than that which hears what you say. There is no agency which reaches as many, goes as far or is as powerful as the printed page. We would, therefore, recommend:

1. That, as during the past year, so this year, commending the masterly presentation of denominational information by our missionary secretaries, we would recommend that *every effort be made, and every facility offered* these agents to continue presenting to the great audience of readers all of the facts obtainable.

2. Appreciating the value of our denominational papers, in being potent factors for the development of our denominational life, as a matter of reciprocity, if from no other standpoint, we would urge pastors to make an earnest effort to have placed in every Baptist home one or both of our State papers.

3. Recognizing the value of a world wide view of missions, first hand and fresh, we would earnestly urge that the missionary literature published by the General Boards be given a prominent place in our church and home life.

4. Our future prosperity as a denomination depends upon the development of our young people. "Service," published by the National B. Y. P. U., and the B. Y. P. U. Quarterly, published at Nashville, are endeavoring to meet the wants of the young people. We commend these publications.

5. We recommend that our Sunday schools use the literature of our two publishing houses, that at Nashville and Philadelphia. By all means let us sustain our own publishing houses.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OBITUARIES.

REV. JAMES REID.

Brother Reid was born in Lincoln county, Mo., February 18, 1838. Under the teaching of the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church he became a Christian, and received his first impressions to preach the

Gospel. In 1867 he united with the Dover Baptist Church in Pike county, Mo., and was baptized by Rev. M. M. Modisett. He was subsequently ordained by the Dover Church and entered upon his first pastorate at Jackson, Cape Girardeau county, Mo., where he remained eight years. He was afterwards pastor of Prairieville, Nolx Creek, Walnut Grove, Vandalia, St. Charles and Jonesburg churches.

Brother Reid was prominently identified with the educational and mission work of Missouri Baptists. His deep piety and native good sense made him a valuable member of the various boards to which he belonged. His guileless nature and bright, cheery disposition combined to make him a most charming companion. His preaching was plain, practical, effective; and he left to the world the legacy of a noble and useful ministry.

He died on Sunday, February 12, 1905.

REV. SAMUEL HOWARD FORD, LL.D.

For over half a century the subject of this sketch has been a conspicuous figure in Baptist affairs, not only in Missouri, but throughout the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention, and he has not been unknown even beyond the field of his great activity. As a preacher, author and editor he has wrought well.

Samuel Howard Ford was born in London, England, February 19, 1819. He came to America when but a child. His father, Rev. Thomas Howard Ford, was one of the pioneer preachers in central Missouri. The family home was near Columbia, where both the father and mother died when the son was but a lad. Kind friends cared for him until he reached manhood.

He was licensed to preach in 1840. He was ordained in 1843 in Little Bonne Femme church, Boone county. His first pastorate was Jefferson City, Mo. Then he took charge of the North church, St. Louis; then at Cape Girardeau, Mo., he wrought. Later he went to the East Church, Louisville, Ky.

The crowning work of his pastoral life was with the Central Baptist church, Memphis, Tenn., where he preached for seven years. Under his ministry a house of worship was built at a cost of seventy-five thousand dollars. The membership of the church was increased from 75 to 450. Other pastorates were Fee Fee, near St. Louis, and Park Avenue, St. Louis.

In 1853 he began editorial work, being at the same time one of the editors of the Western Recorder and of the Missouri Baptist, a paper published by Thomas Ustic, from March 1, 1860, to June 15, 1861, when the adversities of the war caused it to cease publication. During this time Dr. Ford resided in Louisville, Ky.

For over fifty-five years he was editor of Ford's Christian Repository. In this work his wife, Sallie Rochester Ford, participated largely. The Repository was recognized as the medium through which Dr. Ford sent forth the best fruits of his thought, and he was a vigorous thinker, and also through which he afforded opportunity for the promulgation of Baptist doctrine and teachings, as presented by other pens than his own.

He was a constant attendant upon the meetings of the Missouri Baptist General Association, of the General Association of Kentucky, and of the Southern Baptist Convention. Of the latter body he was one of the vice-presidents. It is said that he was present at the last meeting of the Triennial Convention, and at the earliest meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention. He seldom failed to meet with the Missouri Baptist General Association, on the floor of which body he was listened to with interest. He numbered among his personal friends all the pioneer preachers of the West and South. He knew personally most of the leaders in the Baptist hosts of America, during the last half century.

As an author he wielded a facile pen. His chief works were: "Brief Baptist History," "The Great Pyramids of Egypt," "Historic Mine Stones," "Complete Ecclesiastical History" and "What Baptists Baptize For." All these books attained a wide circulation.

IN MEMORY OF OUR SISTER, MRS. H. E. TRUEX.

We do not question the wisdom of our Heavenly Father in removing our sister from the scenes of earth, nor do we complain at His dealings with us, however mysterious they may now seem.

Hers was a life of consecration and a service of love in the Master's cause. Always cheerful and gathering inspiration from the brighter side of life, full of hope and characterized by a simple, childlike faith in God that never faltered in darkness or difficulty.

Beyond the touch of sin and suffering, beyond the power of death to harm, our sister is with her Lord, enjoying an eternity of service and praise. Let us rejoice in the hope that "some sweet day" we shall join her in that Land of Light and Love where partings are never known.

Joseph Nicholas Hartley was born October 19, 1866, at Knoxville, Tenn.; died in Savannah, Mo., September 8, 1905. Age, 38 years, 10 months and 20 days. He was converted and united with an humble country Baptist church near his father's home while in his teens.

In the fall of 1892 he entered the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky., where he spent two years. While in the seminary he served churches in Tennessee, Kentucky and Indiana. From the seminary he went to the pastorate of the Baptist church at Eldorado, Ark.

Failing health, want of a change of climate, and a desire to get into a state where the denomination would be free from the unhappy divisions then existing in Arkansas, led him to visit Savannah church late in the spring of 1902 with a view to the pastorate. After hearing him, the little church gave him a hearty and unanimous call, and he preached on the first Sunday in July his initial sermon as pastor.

MRS. MARY M. WILLIAMS.

The subject of this paragraph was the widow of William Harrison Williams, former editor of the Central Baptist. She departed this life at the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. W. McGlothlin, in Louisville, Ky., on Friday morning, July 14th. She leaves five daughters, Mrs. John T.

Long of St. Louis; Mrs. Everette Gill, Rome, Italy; Mrs. W. J. McGlothlin, Louisville, Ky.; Mrs. Andrew Johnson, St. Louis, and Miss Bessie O. Williams, Louisville, Ky.; and one son, Rev. William Harrison Williams, Springfield, Ky. Dr. J. P. Greene of William Jewell College, conducted the funeral of Mrs. Williams at the Third Baptist church, St. Louis, Sunday afternoon in the presence of a circle of sympathetic friends. Her husband died August 23, 1893. Side by side their bodies rest in the family lot in Bellefontaine Cemetery, St. Louis.

For twenty-three years she was the editor of the Silent Hour and Family Departments in the Central Baptist. Her work there was a blessing to many.

Mrs. Williams was a woman of large usefulness and influence. During the many years of her connection with the Third Baptist church, St. Louis, she was active in the women's societies and in other departments of the church work. She was sympathetic, constant and helpful. In her the distressed found a ready listener and a safe counselor. She has rounded out a useful life and hers is a rich and abundant entrance into the better land.

W. R. WILHITE.

William Rice Wilhite was born in Boone county, and died on his farm near the place of his birth in October, 1905. He was about 75 years of age. He belonged to a family whose name has been closely and honorably identified with Baptist history in Missouri. He had for many years been a deacon of the Walnut Grove church. Was, at the time of his death, a member of the Board of Curators of William Jewell and Stephens Colleges. Formerly was a member of the State Mission Board, and for many years was a faithful attendant upon the sessions of the General Association. He was twice a member of the Missouri Legislature. His was a forceful personality in church and State.

The report was spoken to by S. F. Taylor, M. J. Breaker, James L. Applegate, J. F. Kemper and A. W. Payne.

The meeting adjourned with prayer by Rev. J. E. Sims.

FRIDAY EVENING.

The evening was given to the Baptist Young People's Union of Missouri. Rev. Milford Riggs conducted the opening devotional service. He also set forth the Sacred Literature Course for this year, and asked for an interchange of opinion as to the methods of conducting the class this winter. This was a profitable half hour.

Moderator J. F. Kemper took the chair in order to dispose of some business.

It was ordered:

1. That the clerk superintend the printing and distribution of five thousand copies of the minutes of this meeting.

2. That the secretary be allowed the sum of \$200 for his services in collecting the statistics, and for superintending the printing and distribution of the minutes.

3. That the following Boards pay the cost of the secretary's services and of the minutes, each paying the percentage indicated: Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools, 41 per cent; Board of Home and Foreign Missions, 41 per cent; William Jewell College, 6 per cent; Stephens College 6 per cent; Missouri Baptist Sanitarium, 6 per cent.

Rev. M. J. Breaker moved that the Board of Home and Foreign Missions and the Board of State Missions be authorized to jointly choose delegates to the Baptist Conference of North America.

Rev. D. J. Evans spoke on "Soul Winning."

Rev. J. H. Dew conducted the closing consecration service, at which five professed conversion.

And the seventy-first annual session of the Missouri Baptist General Association closed.

The Association adjourned, to meet at Cape Girardeau Tuesday, October 23, 1906, at 10 o'clock in the morning.

CONSTITUTION OF THE MISSOURI BAPTIST GENERAL
ASSOCIATION.

Article 1. This Association shall be called the Missouri Baptist General Association.

Art. 2. The object of this Association shall be to extend the Kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ, especially in this State.

Art. 3. The time of this Association shall be given to the promotion of its objects in such manner as may be determined by the report of the Committee on Arrangement of Business, when said report has been adopted at each meeting of the Association.

Art. 4. There shall be appointed annually committees on the following subjects: First, on Religious Exercises; second, on Arrangement of Business; third, on Nomination of Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools, Board of Home and Foreign Missions, Board of Trustees of William Jewell College, Board of Ministerial Education, Board of Education and Board of Curators of Stephens College, on the Woman's State Committee of Missions of nineteen members; fourth, on Religious Publications; fifth on Obituaries; sixth, on Baptist Orphans' Home; seventh, on Resolutions. Of which committees second, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh shall be appointed for the year previous to which they are to report, and the Moderator may fill all vacancies that may occur during the year.

Art. 5. This Association shall be composed of representatives of Baptist Churches and Associations contributing to its funds and co-operating in its objects, together with such persons as have hitherto been admitted as life members.

Art. 6. Any church of like faith which may contribute ten dollars to the work of the Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools shall be entitled to a representative and to an additional representative for every five dollars; and every Association auxiliary to this body shall be entitled to representation on the same terms as churches, or be entitled to one representative for every one hundred dollars spent in missionary work upon its own field; provided, that no church or association shall be entitled to more than five representatives.

Art. 7. All Associations auxiliary to this Association shall report annually to this body the result of the missionary work, a synopsis of which shall be published with the proceedings of this Association.

Art. 8. The State Missionary and Sunday School business of this Association, during its recess, shall be conducted by a board consisting of a chairman, recording secretary, corresponding secretary, treasurer and fifteen other members, all of whom shall be members in good standing of Baptist churches, who shall be chosen annually and continue in office until a new election, three members of whom, including one of the officers, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The officers shall perform their duties gratuitously, except the corresponding secretary, who may also act as general agent. Meetings of the Board shall be held quarterly, or oftener, if deemed necessary, and special meetings may be

called at any time by an officer of the Board, of which due notice shall be given. The time and place of the quarterly meetings of the Board, for each year, shall be agreed upon at the first meeting of the Board, and public notice shall be given of same. The Board may fill all vacancies in their own body during the year.

Art. 9. The Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools may, from time to time, appoint such missionaries and agents for the prosecution of the legitimate work of this body as they may deem best.

Art. 10. The Board of General Home and Foreign Missions, consisting of nineteen members, shall have charge of raising in this State and of forwarding funds for these missions. It shall have power to choose its own officers and agents, and shall make to the Association full annual reports of its operations.

Art. 11. The Board of Ministerial Education shall have power to organize societies for raising means to promote ministerial education in connection with William Jewell College, and shall co-operate with its Board of Trustees, as far as the college charter may allow, in accomplishing the purpose of this body in founding it. The Board of Trustees of William Jewell College, and the Board of Curators of Stephens' College, shall report the operations and finances of those institutions at each annual meeting of this body. The Board of Education shall thoroughly investigate the condition and wants of all our denominational schools in Missouri; and shall have power to organize an auxiliary board of women to aid in raising money, and to raise money to afford temporary relief and to endow any Baptist school in Missouri. The said Board of Education shall make yearly reports to the Association of its doings and of the operation and finances of the schools co-operating with said Board of Education. The Board of Education aforesaid shall consist of nineteen members, who shall be elected annually by the Association, and shall continue in office until the new Board of Education is elected.

Art. 12. The preachers employed or aided by this Association shall be of good standing and tried piety, and shall belong to some Baptist church in this State.

Art. 13. The Association shall meet at such time and place as it may elect.

Art. 14. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Secretary, Assistant Secretary and Auditor, who shall be chosen at each annual session. The Moderator, Assistant Moderator and Secretary shall be chosen by ballot, each member casting his own ballot, and by a majority of the ballots cast. The Secretary is to appoint his own Assistant.

Art. 15. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the body, keep order, take the vote on all questions properly brought up, and perform all other duties common to such officer. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep correct minutes of all the proceedings of the Association, and to prepare the same for publication; he may select an assistant. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to examine the report of the Treasurer of the Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools and report on the same to the Association.

Art. 16. In case of interruptions in the regular meetings of this body, the Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools shall have power to call meetings at such time and place as they may think best.

Art. 17. This Constitution may be amended only at an annual meeting, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, and notice of such amendments must have been given at the annual meeting preceding.

RULES OF ORDER.

1. The meetings of this Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. In the absence of the Moderator and the Assistant Moderator, the Secretary shall call the Association to order, and in case the Secretary should also be absent, the brother appointed to preach the introductory sermon shall do so, and preside until the Association is organized.

3. Any question that may arise, not provided for in the foregoing rules, shall be decided in accordance with "Parliamentary Law," by F. H. Kerfoot, L. B., LL. D.

4. The decision of the Moderator on points of order shall stand as the judgment of this body, unless reversed by a vote of the Association. Any member shall have a right to appeal from the decision of the chair.

5. The foregoing rules may be altered or amended at any annual meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.
