1834 SEVENTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL SESSION 1911

St. Louis, Missouri, October 17, 1911.

By common consent the following resolution, presented by R. K. Maiden was adopted.

RESOLUTIONS.

For the purpose of unifying and promoting in our state the cause of Christian education under Baptist auspices.

Resolved, That the Moderator shall appoint a special committee of five, whose duty it shall be to nominate an Educational Commission of thirteen, to be elected by this body, said committee to be so constituted as to fully and fairly represent, as far as possible, all the parts and educational interests of the state.

And further resolved, That it shall be the duty of said Educational Commission to make, during the year, a thorough study of our educational condition and needs and report to this body at its 1912 session some plan for the correlation, equipment and endowment of our schools.—R. K. Maiden.

The tellers for the election of officers reported as follows: E. W. Stephens, Moderator; Com P. Storts, Assistant Moderator; A. W. Payne, Secretary; and Minetry Jones, Auditor.

The Moderator spoke of his appreciation of the honor conferred upon him for this the fourteenth time. He also paid tribute to the fathers who met in the Annual Session with the Second Church in 1871. He then introduced Assistant Moderator Com P. Storts, who spoke briefly. The Secretary announced that T. D. Martin would act as Assistant Secretary.

Rev. W. C. Bitting, pastor of the Second Baptist Church, was introduced and welcomed the Association in the behalf of his church and of the Baptists of St. Louis. Rev. W. M. Vines, pastor of the First Baptist Church of St. Joseph, responded with words well chosen and fitly spoken.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Rev. D. J. Evans, Dean of the School of Theology in William Jewell College. The text was the eight chapter of Mark. The theme: "The Power of the Cross."

HOME AND FOREIGN MISSION BOARD.

The report of the Board was presented in printed form, and after discussion adopted.

HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS.**Twenty-Second Annual Report of the Board of Home and Foreign Missions.**

On the resignation of Dr. J. C. Armstrong, Sept. 30, 1910, the office of Corresponding Secretary was made vacant. This vacancy came at a critical time for the work, as the churches should have had the help of new plans early in the year, and there was some disadvantage in committing difficult problems to a man of inexperience in the duties of Corresponding Secretary. But time has proven that we made no mistake in the choice of his successor.

Our new Secretary, H. E. Truex, has been in office eleven months, and has given efficient and satisfactory service.

The Status of the Work.

Churches throughout the state have given large place to general denominational endeavor. Our receipts are \$57,703.85 as against \$58,374.47 for last year, but in this last amount is included \$5,000 for the Will Mayfield Hospital in Huchow, China, given by Brethren Mayfield and Tyzzar. Special contributions fall much below this figure this year.

The records of 1910 show that \$21,326.61 was given to Home missions and \$37,047.86 to Foreign missions; the records for this year show that 784 churches gave \$20,736.86 to Home Missions and 818 gave \$36,966.99 to Foreign Missions.

Baptist Alliance.

It is worthy of note that quite forty Missouri Baptists attended this great meeting in Philadelphia last June, of whom at least thirty have visited our district associations, bringing to them a wider, healthier vision than they have hitherto had. Your board considers its thanks due these busy brethren for their time and co-operation and hereby acknowledges its gratitude on behalf of the churches of the state.

Apportionment.

For two years the apportionment plan has included State, Home and Foreign Missions. Last November a carefully prepared leaflet was sent to every church in the state, naming amounts asked of the Baptists for the three items just mentioned and requesting a definite amount for each object, designating the amount.

The response elicited by this plan divide the churches into at least five classes:

1. Those that regard the apportionment as a maximum figure and stop with that.
2. Those that regard the apportionment as a reasonable requests and try to reach it.
3. Those that for various reasons think the figures too high and excuse themselves from reaching the apportionment.
4. Those that either never hear of the apportionment, or hearing, cast it into the waste basket.
5. Those that question the right of any committee to ask a church for any amount.

An Examination

Of the minutes of the General Association for 1910 will

show four classes of churches, made up with reference to their financial service.

Class A—16 churches. Those that gave more than five cents per week per member for missions, District, State, Home and Foreign.

Class B—901 churches. Those that gave less than five cents per week per member for Missions.

Class C—769 churches. Those that gave less than five cents per week per member for all purposes.

Class D—200 churches. Those without sufficient data for classification.

Classes A and B furnish apt pupils in a school of finance; C is composed for the most part of churches unacquainted with the service of money and needs denominational incorporation, while D includes non-reporting churches. Your board believes an effective appeal could, and should, be made to each class by the apportionment committee.

Breaker Memorial.

\$241.54 have been added to this fund during the year, the amount in bank now being \$2,121.37. Pledges to the amount of \$6,000.00 have been secured for this fund, conditioned on raising the entire cost of the building, \$15,000.00. Our relation to this enterprise, and the need for it at Shanghai, seem to urge upon us the speedy completion of this fund, more than half of which is now in sight.

We would recommend that the following inscription be fixed in a suitable place upon this building:

Stackhouse, Secretary of the Laymen's Missionary Movement of the Baptists; Samuel Zane Batten, Chairman of the Social Service Commission of Northern Baptist Convention.

Seminary work was presented by Dr. W. J. McGlothlin. A collection of \$575 in cash and pledges was taken.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted—

Resolved: That only recognized denominational agencies and institutions should be accorded space in the associational meeting place for exhibiting their goods.

Tuesday—Evening Session.

This session was devoted to the report of the Laymen's Committee.

Rev. W. F. Roberts of Slater led the Devotional Service.

The speakers were: Howard G. Colwell on the Men and Religion Forward Movement; R. R. Fleet on Vitalizing the Country Church; W. T. Stackhouse on the Laymen's Missionary Movement.

The report adopted was as follows:

REPORT OF LAYMEN'S COMMITTEE.

At the 1910 session of the General Association the state was divided into 30 Laymen's Conference Districts and the recommendation was made that a Laymen's Conference be held in each one of these districts during the ensuing Associational year. A committee of three was named for each one of these districts and a list of the districts and committees

printed in the minutes of the Association, pages 58-61.

So far as the committee is informed, not very many conferences have been held. A very profitable one, however, was held in Fulton in May. The best work in the state has been done in District No. 1 in Northwest Missouri under the leadership of some of the brethren in St. Joseph.

It was also recommended at the 1910 session that a Laymen's Directory, containing the names of the men and boys of the Baptist Churches of Missouri be compiled under the direction of the Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools. Secretary West prevailed upon your chairman to undertake this work. Suitable blanks were prepared and sent to the clerks of all the churches he could locate. In 61 Associations 1,552 churches were written to, many of them the second time. The responses contain some material which may be of some benefit in understanding the situation in Missouri. Lists of male members were received from 585 churches. In all, names were collected to the number of 17,969.

The value of this list, to our minds, is exceedingly doubtful. It contains 17,969 names. Doubtless 50 per cent or more of these names represent non-active church members. It would cost any Missionary Board in stamps and stationery \$353.98 at 2c per, or \$530.97 at 3c per to circularize this list of names once. These lists have been collected at an expense in stamps and stationery of \$59.50. An issue of 500 copies could be printed for a few hundred dollars. It might prove worth while to get out the Directory. We do not wish, however, to assume the responsibility of seriously urging the publication of these lists in the form of a Directory.

Recommendations.

We, your committee, recommend,

First, That the Conference Districts, as created last year, and the committees for the same, as published in the minutes of the General Association, stand for at least another year.

Second, That the committees in each district be urged to hold one Laymen's Conference during the coming Association year and report the results of the same to the chairman of your committee.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

The fiscal year which we are just closing has been an unusual one in several respects which directly affected the work of your Board. The protracted illness of the Corresponding Secretary, the extreme heat and long continued drouth of the summer, together with the burden of debt we had to carry, have caused the Board to strive to conduct the work during the whole year, with extraordinary prayerfulness and thoughtful care.

The amount of State Mission work carried on by this Association has been increasing steadily from year to year. Especially has this been true during the past ten years. Every year, the calls for aid from District Associations, from struggling churches, and from promising fields where we had no churches, have been more than before. It has been this increasing and seemingly imperative demand, which has caused your Board, each year, especially during the past five years, to make notable enlargement in their work, in hopes that they might be able to show the churches the need of this enlargement, and get them to supply the funds necessary for it. Many of the churches did increase their offerings, but on the whole the increase was not enough to cover the increased expenditure. The result is that we closed the year at Nevada, with a debt of about \$10,000.

Your Board, at its first meeting this year, was confronted with requests for help aggregating nearly \$75,000. Mindful of the indebtedness of the Board, and of the vital importance of most of the fields asking for aid, they set themselves, after earnest prayer for divine guidance, to so cut down the appropriations, as to enable them to pay off this debt, without seriously crippling the work. This was done with tender sympathy, but with firmness, and when it was found that the total was too large, the entire list was gone over, and further reductions were made. After a laborious session, covering a whole day of continuous and painstaking work, in which they had gone over the list and examined the condition of each applicant with minute detail, your Board, with faith in God and in the Baptists of Missouri, adjourned its first meeting, to go home and undertake, what every member felt, would be a most strenuous year's work.

Immediate steps were taken to inform the churches of the condition of the Board, and to call on them for special efforts to aid in lifting the work out of its position of embar-

rassment. A special letter, signed by every member of the Board, was sent to every church in the state through its pastor and clerk. The \$65,000 which this body in its session at Nevada deemed necessary for the payment of the debt and the conduct of the work during the year, was apportioned among the churches as equitably as could be done, and at the proper time, each church was urged to strive to raise its apportionment. Your Board believed that by scaling down the appropriations, and by strenuous efforts to increase the collections, they would be able both to meet the current expenses for the year and to pay off the indebtedness.

But the illness of the Corresponding Secretary which took him out of the work for about three months, and the severe drouth and heat of the summer, together with the fact that so many churches failed to meet their apportionment, while a great many have given nothing at all, have caused us to fall short of our expectations. We are compelled, therefore, to have to report a considerable debt still remaining upon us, which will be shown by the report of the treasurer.

In spite of all these hindrances, we have been able, by the grace of God, to accomplish magnificent results by the labors of our faithful missionaries this year.

Our Plan of Operations.

Your Board saw no reason for changing the plans by which we have been working for the past several years, and so during the year have operated in the same departments as before, viz: 1st. The Missionary Pastors' department, in which we aid weak and struggling churches to support their pastors. In this department, we had a total of 89 workers.

who supplied 110 churches and stations. 2nd. The District Mission Department, in which we co-operate with the Boards of District Associations in supporting missionaries on their fields for the building up of weak churches, and the organization of new ones wherever they find them needed. In this department, we aided in the support of 19 men who supplied 50 churches and stations, in addition to their evangelistic work. 3rd. The department of work among our citizens of other tongues. In this we had eleven workers in three different languages, viz; German, Swedish and Italian. 4th. The department of State Evangelism for furnishing well equipped evangelists to aid our churches in revival meetings. Of these we had for a part or all of the year, 14 men, including three singers. 5th. The department of Women's work, especially for women and children. Of these we had five. 6th. The work among the students of the State University, in which we engaged two senior students, one man and one woman, to work among their fellow students. 7th. The department of Sunday Schools, in which we are striving to increase the number of our schools and to make those we have, better schools.

In addition to this, the American Baptist Publication Society has kept four colportage wagons in the state working in co-operation with our Board. In all these departments, our labors have been richly blessed, and we again express our gratitude to God for his unfailing mercies.

The Wide Significance of Our Work.

Looking at it from a purely local standpoint, the work of "State Missions in Missouri" is vast in its scope and significance. Of our three and a quarter millions of people, over two millions make no personal profession of faith in Christ. It is ours to press the claims of the saving mercies of God's grace upon these people, who are as much lost without Christ as are the heathen in foreign lands.

But our work has a wider significance. In evangelizing Missouri, we are taking a large hand in evangelizing other large sections of our country. Your Secretary, while in California during the past summer, found that thousands of Missourians are now making their homes in that balmy climated land. In the thickly settled regions around Los Angeles, we found almost a dozen churches whose pastors are Missouri men, and in many of them the Sunday School superintendent,

and many of their most active lay members are from Missouri. What is true of Southern California, is true also in large measure, of the whole Pacific coast, of New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado, Northern Texas, and Oklahoma. History shows us that Missourians had a large hand in bringing all that western country under the dominion of the stars and stripes. By the grace of God, we are having also a large hand in bringing under the dominion of the King of Kings.

Special Attention.

Every phase of our work is important, but in its progress, some things are pressing to the front which demand immediate and special attention. Of these we note:

1st. Among the 1900 churches in Missouri, there are many where pastors and churches are actively opposed to our organized mission work. There are many churches which are indifferent to their duty in this matter. This statement ought to be taken into account in comparing the number of Baptists in our state with the amount of money raised. We believe the Board ought to continue its efforts to enlist delinquent churches, and also to give aid and encouragement to the brethren who are attempting to win over the churches and pastors who have been opposed to organized work.

2nd. We call again the attention of this body to the condition of our country churches. Many of them are pastorless and have been so for years. They have many good members, but seem to be helpless for lack of leaders. Unless something is speedily done for them, many of them will die.

Your Board has found that the most effective way by which we can help these churches, is to aid the Boards of the District Associations to place good, effective missionaries in the fields with living salaries, who shall visit the churches and hold revival meetings if necessary, but to labor especially to locate pastors with them. The District Boards, and the State Board, if necessary, must aid in the support of these pastors, till the churches get on their feet. This method is no experiment. A number of our associations for the past year or two, have been working it, and the results have proven the efficiency of the plan. We believe that this association, if necessary, ought to aid every association in the state in keeping a missionary in its field.

3rd. Missouri has a greater number of large and growing cities than most of the states, and these cities furnish great and urgent fields for mission work. It is worthy of note

that during the past decade or two, the growth of our Baptist churches have not kept pace with the growth of the cities. This is especially noticeable in St. Louis and Kansas City. In these great centers of population, mission work is an expensive business, but it is a business we cannot neglect except at our peril. We are glad that these cities have awakened to the importance of this work, and have engaged such men as Rev. S. E. Ewing, and Rev. O. P. Joyce, to look after this enterprise. Our State Board is glad to give large aid in their support.

4th. Church Building fund. Hundreds of our churches are worshipping in school houses, and many are using houses jointly owned with some other denomination. No Baptist church can do its best work without its own place in which to meet for worship. We believe that the most of our churches could build for themselves comfortable houses, if we could give them a little encouragement and help. This Association ought to take some steps, as soon as practicable, for the creation of a Church Building Fund, from which small gifts and loans could be made to churches erecting houses. In addition to the good this would do in other ways, it would stop the indiscriminate solicitation of our stronger churches, by those who are striving to build. We have a nucleus of such a fund, but your Board has been so burdened with providing means for its growing missionary operations, that we have not been able to give much time and labor to building up this fund.

Bequest.

We desire to acknowledge the bequest of \$2,000 to the work of our Board by our dear brother, the late Henry N. Mills of Kansas City. This money will be safely invested, and the interest only used year by year, for the preaching of the gospel in Missouri. Thus, "being dead, his works do follow him." We commend his example to those to whom God has given money.

Helpful Agencies.

We acknowledge with pleasure the help we have received from the Woman's Board of Missions in supporting our women workers, and from the American Baptist Publication Society, and the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention in the support of our Sunday School Secretary.

The Prospect.

As we look into the future, we see no indications that we shall be able to "let up" in this work. Instead of diminishing, the demands for it are growing greater and more imperative year by year. The battle is on, and this is no time for the militant hosts of Missouri Baptists to retreat. The forces of evil are aggressive, and are pressing hard all along the line. Your Board is unwilling to turn our state over to "the evil one," and the only way we can prevent this is by the earnest, faithful, persistent preaching of the gospel of Christ. That is the one and only "power of God unto salvation" on this earth, and it is going on from victory. God has committed to our hands the work of giving the gospel to the lost ones in our state, and it is to united, prayerful and aggressive undertakings in this divine business that we are calling the Baptist hosts of Missouri today. We believe that in a time like this, God will not hold him guiltless who refuses to answer this call.

The Challenge.

While we rejoice in what God is enabling us to do, yet we feel that we are not reaping the mighty harvests which we know He is able and willing to give. We are profoundly of the conviction that His words, spoken long ago through one of His prophets, are coming to us today, as a challenge to our faith and obedience. "Bring ye the whole tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house, and prove me herewith," saith Jehovah of hosts, "if I will not open the windows of heaven and pour you out a blessing that there shall not be room enough to receive it." Let the Baptists of Missouri prove the Lord in this thing, and glory will crown their labors.

Recommendations.

In view of the vast importance and pressing needs of this enterprise, we recommend;

1st. That this Association instruct the incoming Board to call on the churches to furnish not less than \$40,000 this year, in addition to what shall be received through the State Evangelists and other sources, and that apportionment be made among the churches on this basis.

2nd. That the churches be asked, to make an increase above their apportionment, as much as they can, to pay off the remainder of the debt that has been on the Board for the past two or three years.

Corresponding Secretary T. L. West read the report. After discussion by James Rider, R. F. Carroll, J. A. Francis, W. A. Lumpkin, S. M. Brown, Lee Harrel, L. M. Proctor and H. F. Geidinhagen the report was adopted.

The Committee on Nominations reported:

Preacher of the Introductory Sermon: J. E. Dillard, Alternate H. W. Cole.

Wednesday—Morning Session.

D. H. Harris presented the report of the Board of Curators.

STEPHENS COLLEGE.

Forty-one years ago in this Second Baptist Church of St. Louis the General Association adopted Stephens College as the State Baptist Female College of Missouri. The action was taken after a year's consideration, that period having been permitted in which other localities and institutions could enter into competition for this distinction. The matter was lengthily discussed on either two or three days of the session

of the Association, and the decision was finally reached by a practically unanimous vote. It has been confirmed at every one of the forty sessions of this Association held since.

To secure this adoption of the College as a state institution the Curators deeded all of its beautiful grounds, worth then between \$50,000 and \$100,000 to this Association and besides paid off a debt upon the College of some \$30,000. The money for the payment of this debt was by private contributions, most of it being by the Curators individually and at great personal sacrifices and financial embarrassment to some of them.

In addition to these donations James L. Stephens, of Columbia, promised to contribute \$20,000 towards an endowment and afterwards paid all of it.

These donations were made upon the pledge of this Association that the College would be made for girls what William Jewell was for boys, and those who deeded the College to the Association and paid off its debt and contributed to its endowment did so in the confident faith that this pledge of the denomination would be fulfilled.

But it has not been fulfilled. Forty-one years have passed without the denomination at large having done practically anything towards its enlargement and endowment. The locality in which the College is situated has contributed nearly all that the institution has received in the way of its development. Those who gave the College to the denomination have borne substantially all the burden of its administration and growth.

It has grown splendidly. Over one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars worth of buildings and equipment have been added to those already standing upon the grounds, while the endowment fund, originally \$20,000, by judicious investment, has been more than doubled. A fair valuation of all the property now is about \$200,000 or \$250,000, or considerably more than double its valuation when it was deeded to this Association.

Its situation in the educational center of the state is ideal, while its buildings and grounds are beautifully and splendidly adapted for their purpose.

In order to accommodate its continually growing patronage and to provide indispensable facilities a large musical conservatory and more boarding room had to be added. The Curators a year ago also purchased the furniture and other equipment, abolished the lease system and have been and are now conducting the institution directly. Between five and

ten thousand dollars will have been expended by the close of this year upon streets and sidewalks surrounding the College property. The size of the Endowment Building in Columbia was doubled at an outlay of \$12,500.

All these expenditures aggregate now about \$80,000, which is a mortgage upon the property. All of this indebtedness was either ordered or approved by this Association. The Curators are without money to pay this debt, and the incomes from the students will not be sufficient to pay it. Therefore their only recourse is to lay the matter before the denomination for it to do with its own as it may deem best.

In the opinion of this Board but two courses are open to this Association to which this College belongs. One is to pay off this debt and provide for it an adequate endowment. The other is to let it be sold under the mortgage. To return it to those who gave it is now impracticable, in fact impossible. All those who have donated to it could not be found, and to return to some and not to others would involve interminable trouble, friction and discord. Some of the largest gifts have been by those who had no interest in the College before it was deeded to this Association. A notable case is that of the late R. E. Sappington, who contributed during his life \$10,500 to the College. He recently died and in his will he left several thousand more. His donation is represented in the splendid chapel built within the past fourteen years. There are numerous others who have made similar contributions which have added materially to the assets of the College and in equity should share equally with those who were the original owners of the property. All the latter have already relinquished all claim to the College, few of them want it back.

When this College was deeded to the General Association a provision was inserted in the deed providing that should it cease to be a Baptist institution it should revert to its donors. Objection was made to the provision in the deed, and it was voluntarily waived by all the heirs of the original donors, and then by decree of the court the College and all of its property was deeded without condition or reservation to this Association which may do with it as it pleases.

That the opportunities of this College are as great, greater than they ever were is a proposition too plain to need elucidation. If a state college for the training of girls was needed by the Baptists in 1870 it is as much needed in 1911 as the population, the denomination and the demands of 1911 are

greater than those of 1870. It is as true now, truer now than then that there are as many reasons why girls should be trained in Christian service as men, as many reasons why they should have technical instruction in the Bible, should be equipped for Sunday School work and mission service. Is it not as important that the mother who comes in close contact with the plastic mind of the child should be as intelligent in the Bible as the father? Is not the home at last the greatest nursery of the church for the religious life, and the mother the most important factor in society? Are not women doing largely the work of the church, in the missionary and other societies and in the Sunday School?

Why should there not be in Missouri a school to equip women for work in the foreign field? There are more women missionaries than men, and they are doing as faithful service.

Our Board has recently adopted a full scheme of study for a Bible Department. It provides for training women in all departments of Christian service, and if established and properly sustained would make this the greatest religious school for girls in the land.

We respectfully submit that to call a college denominational and to retain the name Baptist at the head of it, is a misnomer, a delusion, a snare, a fraud, until that college is doing distinctively denominational work, makes religious instruction a conspicuous and vital feature, and is performing such service as to make it worthy of its name. The only reason that this college has not had such a department is because the trustees have not had the money to establish it.

That a school devoted almost exclusively to literature, art, physical training, music and domestic science should be called Baptist is a perversion of the name, and is sailing under false colors.

The opportunity is before the Baptists of Missouri to either make this College a great blessing to the women of Missouri, a powerful agency for good, or to let it die. A contribution of \$25,000 would enable it to go ahead, one hundred thousand dollars would put it upon its feet in fine condition, a half million would make it the greatest Baptist Female College in the land.

What shall it be? Shall it live or shall it die? These questions must be answered here and now.

D. H. Harris, President; J. E. Thornton, Secretary.

The discussion was by D. H. Harris, Mrs. W. E. Harshe, E. W. Stephens, and W. J. Williamson.

A collection of \$9,500 with \$1,500 conditional was taken. It was ordered that the Curators take immediate steps to put a man in the field to raise the balance needed. The immediate call is for \$25,000. This amount to be followed by raising \$100,000.

A resolution was passed asking the pastors of the state to have a Stephens College Day within the next sixty days.

The report was adopted.

Closing prayer by Rev. S. F. Taylor.

Wednesday—Afternoon Session.

Rev. D. P. Montgomery was in charge of the Devotional Service.

The Moderator offered prayer preceding the business session.

The First order was the Annual Meeting of the Missouri Baptist Historical Society.

Professor R. P. Rider made a brief report of the work of the Society. The Committee, R. P. Rider and J. C. Maple, reported progress in preparing biographies and asked for a committee on publication. E. C. Griffith, H. E. Tralle and S. Y. Pitts were appointed.

John W. Million delivered an address on "The Country Church."

H. E. Truex offered the following resolution which was adopted:

MINISTERS AND RAILROADS.

Inasmuch as in former years our ministers enjoyed favors in the Southwestern Passenger Association within the bounds of the State of Missouri, which during the recent rate war were suspended, but are now restored in contiguous states

Be it resolved, that we hereby most earnestly express our appreciation of these former favors and believe that a restoration of the same means, the recognition and advancement of peace, morality and religion in the state through men who are public servants of every good cause, and especially would it be considered a favor to our constituency, numbering 215,000 Baptists throughout the state.

Be it further resolved that a committee of three be appointed to call on Mr. J. E. Hannegan, Chairman Southwestern Passenger Bureau, Liggett Bldg., this city, during the sessions of this body, if possible, and make such representations to him as shall be in accord with this resolution, and that E. W. Stephens, John W. Million and W. J. Williamson constitute such committee.

The meeting adjourned at 3:15 until 7:30 p. m., in order that those who desired might visit the Missouri Baptist Orphans Home, at Fee Fee, Pattonville, Mo.

Wednesday—Evening Session.

Rev. S. E. Ewing led the opening service. It was a study of St. Louis City Missions.

Rev. J. F. Love led in prayer.

The evening session was given to a mass meeting in the interest of State Missions. The speakers were Samuel Zane Batten on "The New Past," and Donald Duncan Munro on "Incarnated Ideals." Corresponding Secretary T. L. West closed the discussion on State Missions by a report of the condition of the work.

Recording Secretary J. C. Armstrong of the Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools announced the meetings of that Board as follows: "The quarterly meetings of the Board for the year to come will be held: On the fourth Tuesday in January and July in Kansas City, and on the fourth Tuesday in April in St. Louis. The fiscal year of the Board will close hereafter on September 30 of each year."

Rev. J. B. Benton offered the closing prayer.

Thursday—Morning Session.

At 9 o'clock the Association was called to order by singing. The prayer was offered by Rev. S. S. Keith.

The first order was the report of the

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Rev. C. M. Truex read the report.

LA GRANGE COLLEGE.

1910

The past year in LaGrange college history has been one of varied incident and of decided progress. This is the first complete year since the change of administration and the financial re-organization of the college. In the spring of 1910, upon the resignation of Dr. John W. Crouch, who had been conducting the school upon the "lease plan," it was deemed wise by the board of trustees to change the plan. They assumed responsibility for teachers' salaries and all expenses and took direct management and control into their own hands. The executive board of the Wyaconda Association, working in harmony with the trustees, put a man into the field to lead in raising an endowment of \$50,000 for the college. At the recent meeting of the associations in Northeast Missouri, the Baptist people have given hearty endorsement to this forward movement. Wyaconda association has pledged the salary of the financial secretary, Rev. J. D. Scott, for the associational year and continues the same trustees in charge of the college.

The presidential leadership of the college has changed during the year. For a time an acting president was in charge. In June 1911, Professor Ransom Harvey, D. D., who had been for seven years teacher of Bible Philosophy and Theology, was elected president.

The endowment has reached the sum of \$39,000. This represents not large gifts of the wealthy, but a multitude of small gifts from people in humble circumstances. When our Baptist brothers and sisters with larger resources come to our help, we will sweep past the \$50,000 to the \$100,000 goal.

The Approved Summer School has been a successful feature of our work for several years. Many teachers are in attendance and the grades made are accepted and endorsed

without examination upon State and County teachers certificates. The attendance this last season of 1911 was the largest since the inauguration of this department. At the close of the session every teacher in attendance had secured a position, and the demand for teachers exceeded the supply. Many students who have no intention of teaching, make grades in regular college subjects in the summer session.

We have had a good opening this fall. A goodly number of new students are enrolled. We cannot match some schools in numbers. We do not desire to do so. We believe in the mission and method of the small college. We believe we have as choice a body of bright, select, studious, enthusiastic young Baptists, however, as can be found in all the land. Among them are a number of new recruits for the Christian ministry. The music department is well patronized and in charge of a competent instructor. We are constantly increasing the quantity and improving the quality of the work done. LaGrange now covers four full years of academic study and four years of collegiate study. Our faculty is composed of college and university trained men and women. The faculty, friends and patrons of the school are facing the future with increased confidence.

WILL MAYFIELD COLLEGE.

This Institution was founded in the year 1878 for the purpose of educating the young men and women of this section—partially preparing them for a useful life, which at that time was otherwise impossible.

It has succeeded wonderfully, having representatives all over this, as well as many other states, who have received their early training at this school.

It has long since surpassed the fondest hopes of its founders—having withstood the ills of which all struggling institutions are heirs, and to-day it stands free from debt, no incumbrances whatever.

The enrollment this year is the best in its history. The enrollment is made up of the most conscientious class of young people in our country—consisting of young men preparing for the ministry, others who are going to make teaching a profession, and others for various other avocations. We are using every endeavor to start all who come our way, out

on life's uneven journey with a God given experience founded upon true principles.

There is no division of the state that needs young ministers more than does southeast Missouri. There is no section which needs a thoroughly trained church membership more than does this.

It is our purpose through Christian Education to do what we can to take southeast Missouri for Christ, at least we are contributing what we can that way. We sent out last year twenty-five young men and women into the teaching profession together with other avocations and into other schools, whose influence we are sure will be for the upbuilding of the Baptist cause.

This is the only Baptist school in southeast Missouri—a section of country much larger than many of our Commonwealths. If we need anything it is Christian Education. If we need a school anywhere it is a well equipped college in southeast Missouri. This one is established and on the road to success. Why not push it? Let us make it an honor to our denomination.

The young men and women of southeast Missouri are just as bright and are just as capable of development as are the students from any other country. We have found some of the truest types of Christian character here that we have ever met anywhere. This kind of material is here in abundance. Why not the Baptists take charge of it and cultivate it for God's Holy Work.

Some may claim that we can send our young men and women to our other schools in the state, but after a moment's thought and investigation we find that such schools as Harvard University have more than forty-five per cent of their attendance within a radius of one hundred miles of the institution. If such world-famous universities as Harvard cannot draw a larger per cent than that mentioned above, it will be useless for our institutions to think of doing so. The question arises: If our Baptist young people will not go to our schools, what are we to do but bring schools to them. That is what we have done. Shall we support it or will we let it struggle on in the best way it can. There are members on the Board of Trustees who have been serving in one capacity and another for thirty years. Shall we let their efforts go without reward? I think not. I don't think it is Baptist training to let things go that way.

We are making an effort to endow the school. It is needed very much for more efficient work. We need more teachers

and larger salaries. To supply these needs more money is necessary. It is not our plan to go in debt. So we have to pay our teachers a bare living salary.

We need the prayers, sympathies and some money from the Baptists of Missouri. Will not your honorable body give us some encouragement along this line? If you will, we will try to make our school and your school an honor to the Baptists of Missouri.

LEXINGTON COLLEGE FOR YOUNG WOMEN.

Lexington College comes to the Association this year with the most encouraging report in its history. Every room in the entire College is full. The smiles of the Lord are upon the College. There is great enthusiasm in every department of the College life. Great outlay has been made in the matter of new equipment.

The religious life of the College is very marked. The Y. W. C. A. is doing a noble work and the Mission Classes are full of life. We now have the largest classes in Bible in the history of the College. We were the first College in the West to put in a course in Christian Pedagogy. The President holds this chair and intends to make it the most prominent in the College.

Every girl in the College is required to attend Sunday School at the First Baptist church in Lexington, every Lord's day. We allow dancing at no time. Cards are not allowed in the College. Lexington is distinctively a Baptist Christian College.

The source of greatest joy to us is in the recent action of the Board of Trustees. They have launched a campaign to raise \$100,000.00 for the enlargement and endowment of the College. An old friend of the College has started off the subscription with a queenly gift of \$20,000 which we now have in hands. This noble daughter has thus proven that she is one of America's greatest women. Scores of others will follow her example. Within the last ten days about \$5,000 have been added to this queenly gift. And we have every encouragement to go forward in this the greatest work ever undertaken by Christian men and women. We have no debt to hamper us. We have the noblest and longest list of Alumnae in the West.

These with hundreds of friends will rejoice at the opportunity now afforded them of making this our oldest Baptist College the greatest in the land in number and power as it has always striven to be in quality.

Last but not least the standard has been raised so as to require four years work above the high school for graduation in the Literary department. The time has come when we must have one high standard College in the West for our girls. There is no College in the West of a Christian character where our girls may be trained for the teaching profession. We propose to meet this need.

The College has gone to great expense in renewing the equipment and in enlarging the teaching force. About \$10,000 worth of pianos have been placed this year. A new organ has been placed for the use of pipe organ lovers and students. This department is attracting wide attention.

The immediate plans of the College are to erect first of all a very large co-operative building for the use of girls who are not so situated as to pay the price required now by all first class Colleges such as Lexington is. This new building is to have an auditorium and a few lecture rooms and room for 100 more girls. This building we hope to have ready for next year's work. About one-half of the money will go for endowment, the interest of which shall go as a loan fund for girls who wish an education. Pray for us, Brethren, and help us in this great enterprise. Your oldest daughter is now 57 years old and you are justly proud of her. We are sure you love her as you should your eldest child. With all our hearts we are trying to give this illustrious daughter her rightful place at the head of Western Colleges for young women.

HARDIN COLLEGE.

Hardin College brings greetings to the Missouri Baptist General Association.

Our dormitories are well filled with boarding students and we have a good enrollment of day students. Including Dr. Tralle's day students in Teacher Training work for Sunday Schools, the total enrollment is 201.

Considerable interest in religious work has characterized the life of the college all along. There is not only no lagging of interest in religious matters, but really a considerable in-

crease. The Y. W. C. A. has had an active branch in the College for years. This Association is starting off with a good enrollment this year. The young ladies hold a regular prayer meeting on each Wednesday evening.

More than ordinary interest has been noticeable in Mission Study since we have had the regular lecturers on Missions. Dr. Milford Riggs' missionary lectures last March (1911) were very much enjoyed. Dr. Ray spoke entertainingly to the school Friday, the 13th of this month.

In 1910-11 there were two regular Mission Study classes and one Missionary Reading class, 27 students enrolled. Since Dr. Ray's visit, the 13th of this month, there have been enrolled 50 students for Mission Study work.

A general Bible Reading Circle has been organized for ten minutes a day with the Bible, 16 students enrolled. Several students have enrolled for the Helen Gould Bible contest.

The new department of Religious Pedagogy, the first chair of the kind established in the state, is the greatest step forward taken by the college in many years. This chair was founded this year by the Board of Trustees and Dr. H. E. Tralle called to it.

The courses in Religious Pedagogy, as they are now being conducted in Hardin College, include the following: (1) Courses in Bible Study, each class two hours a week for the school year—the origin and inspiration of the Bible, manners and customs of Bible times, Bible geography, Bible institutions, the Bible by periods, the Bible by books, Bible biography, Bible doctrines, the Bible as literature, the Bible in personal work, the life of Christ, and the life of Paul; (2) A course in Psychology, two hours a week for the school year—the general principles of psychology, the psychology of childhood, the psychology of religion, the psychology of sex, the psychology of study and other applications of psychology; (3) Courses in the study of missions—the various phases of missions are studied by selected groups of students; (4) An Elementary Sunday School Training Course, two hours a week for the school year—studies in psychology, the Bible, the laws of teaching, the art of story telling, methods and management; (5) An Advanced Sunday School Training Course, two hours a week for the school year—a more thorough study of the subjects included in the elementary training course, with additional studies in missions, in church and denominational history, and in personal work.

The two training courses (4) and (5) more than meet the

requirements of the International Sunday School Association in the First Standard Course and the Advanced Standard Course, and our students will receive the International diploma and also the diploma of the denomination with which the student is connected, in addition to receiving credit in the college. None of the courses in Religious Pedagogy are required at the present time. They are elective, but they are open to all students who are prepared to take them and who can do so in connection with other studies. The fact that eighty-three have voluntarily enrolled in the classes in this new department at the start is striking proof of its value in the college.

Hardin College is to-day recognized by the Missouri State University as fulfilling the requirements of a Junior College in all departments except Natural Sciences. With the exception of the Sciences Hardin has been entering her students Junior for years in the State University. Another Hardin graduate has entered the University this year and has been admitted to the Junior class.

Hardin's endowment continues to grow. It is at this writing \$83,000 plus. We are planning and hoping for additional buildings. We need more room. J. W. Million.

WILLIAM JEWELL COLLEGE.

Trustees.

The trustees of William Jewell College submit to the General Association of the Missouri Baptists the following as their annual report for the year 1911.

Last year we were saddened to report the recent death of our president, R. E. Turner. This year we report with great sorrow the death of James L. Applegate on May 12, 1911. The trustees, at their June meeting, adopted the following resolution, which was transmitted to the family of Mr. Applegate:

"The Trustees of William Jewell College, in regular meeting assembled, having heard of the death of Brother James L. Applegate, direct the secretary to spread on the records of

this Board, and to send to the family of Brother Applegate, the following appreciation:

"In 1872 James L. Applegate became a trustee of William Jewell College. Prior to that time he had been a friend and supporter. For the past forty years few men have given William Jewell more prayer and thought, love and labor than James L. Applegate. His gifts in money have been large and exceedingly liberal. His loyalty to his associates, on the Board, and his loyalty to the officers, faculty and students of the college has been truly marvelous. It furnishes this Board with a blessed memory and a personal incentive to fidelity on the part of every member.

"Brother Applegate's services as treasurer of the College marked a new era in the business affairs of the institution. The College will ever be indebted to the life and labor of James L. Applegate.

"The trustees wish at this time to express this appreciation of Brother Applegate and to extend to his wife and children their sincere love and sympathy."

The loss of James L. Applegate to the Baptist denomination and to William Jewell College is very great, greater, perhaps, than anyone can realize now. History will discover that he was one of the first to engage in any good enterprise. Whatever cause he espoused, and whoever he loved, he was singularly loyal to, and devoted to throughout his life.

The school year which closed in June, we think, was the best in the history of the college. Thirty men were graduated with the degree of A. B.; 553 resident students were enrolled.

Discipline was easily maintained during the year. Cases of moral delinquency were very rare.

The work of the students was satisfactory except in a few cases. The faculty is raising the standard of work and scholarship constantly. In inter-collegiate contests William Jewell men were singularly fortunate. They won all of their debates by unanimous decisions, also the State Oratorical medal.

The religious life of the students last year was more vigorous than for many years.

The trustees, on hearing the reports of the faculty at the annual meeting, felt called on to pass a resolution of thanks and commendation for the excellent work done by the faculty in the past year.

As will be seen from the report of the treasurer herewith submitted, the college has increased largely in assets during the past twelve months. The income of the college during the past year has not been materially increased for the reason

that some securities hitherto stable have passed their dividends. Also, many contributors to the half million dollar fund have deferred their first payments, without interest. In addition, some \$60,000 in cash was invested in the new dormitory, which did not produce any income the past year. The current expenses of the college have not materially increased during the past year.

The trustees have found it necessary to add some new members to the faculty. Mr. Roy I. Johnson, A. M., of Chicago University, has been elected Associate in English, Moses L. Crossley, Ph. D., of Brown, has been elected Associate in Chemistry, and Paul Rider, A. M., William Jewell, has been elected Associate in Mathematics. All of these men are at work and give fine promise.

Mr. C. F. Kemper, the secretary of the Y. M. C. A., supported by the students themselves, is well adapted to his work, which is a very important one.

The trustees report, with pleasure, the favorable decision by the Missouri Supreme Court of the annoying tax case which has been in the courts for the last decade. All the properties and endowments of William Jewell College are now exempt from taxation.

Professor D. J. Evans, dean of the School of Theology, reports 262 ministerial students and two graduates with the Th. B. degree.

The trustees desire to express their gratitude and thanks to the Publication Society and to the Sunday School Board for the services of Rev. R. L. Davidson as lecturer and teacher in Sunday school work. Much interest has been awakened among the students by Brother Davidson.

The new dormitory, which has been named New Ely Hall in honor of L. B. Ely, is about completed. It is a large, plain but imposing building, entirely fire-proof, and it is believed to be the equal in every respect of any other dormitory building in the entire country.

The trustees desire also to acknowledge their obligation to the General Education Board, of New York, for their prompt compliance with the terms of their gift of \$125,000, which made possible the recent improvements and the added endowment to the college.

The trustees again reaffirm their appreciation of President Greene, and express their thankfulness to God for his continued health and strength.

MISSOURI BAPTIST SANITARIUM.

The Missouri Baptist Sanitarium Association presents this its annual report to the Missouri Baptist General Association.

With regret we announce the death of James L. Applegate, one of the charter members of the Association, and during the entire history of the Sanitarium a member of the Managing Board, for many years a member of the Executive Committee. He was true and loyal, faithful and efficient in his service to the Sanitarium. He went to his heavenly home from Pasadena, California, May 10, 1911.

In accordance with provisions of our constitution we call the attention of the Association to the vacancy caused by the death of James L. Applegate, and another by the removal of C. R. Gray from Missouri, and ask that the Association nominate their successors on the Association of Fifty.

You are also requested to nominate the successors of the following members of the Managing Board whose term of three years' service expires this year: W. J. Williamson, J. T. M. Johnston, S. E. Ewing, A. W. Payne, J. P. Greene, J. H. Roblee and I. H. Cadwallader.

The Endowment Fund of the Association now amounts to \$49,140.87, all of which is invested in securities of recognized value except \$1,448.23 which is cash in the bank.

Mrs. I. H. Cadwallader, Superintendent, and Dr. I. H. Cadwallader, Physician-in-charge, have rounded out eleven years of successful work in managing the institution. Their report shows the total value of property now to be \$161,142.45. Added to this are drug and surgical supplies, accounts receivable and cash which increases the total value to \$175,725.49.

During the past year 1,365 patients have been treated.

The total charity work so far as patients are concerned, amounted to \$9,122.14. The institution has been reimbursed on account of this by the Women's Charity Board, and the Junior Charity Board \$1,065.00, by the Hospital Saturday and Sunday Association \$2,804, leaving the net charity work of the institution during the year closing Sept. 30, 1911, \$5,352.64.

The Nurses' Training School has an enrollment of 48. Fourteen graduated at the commencement in May.

The greatest need of the institution now is a new building erected on the spacious grounds in front of the present buildings. It is hoped that some plan can be devised in the very near future by which at least \$100,000 can be spent in a thoroughly modern, fire proof hospital building. This is needed to place the institution on the foundation which the importance of the work demands. We ask the co-operation of the brotherhood in making this possible.

MISSOURI BAPTIST MINISTERS' AID SOCIETY.

In the year 1885 in pursuance of an action of this Association there was organized a Missouri Baptist Ministers' Aid

Society and it was regularly incorporated under the laws of the State of Missouri. Its object as stated in its constitution was "to provide funds for resident Baptist ministers who have become, whilst engaged in preaching the Gospel in this state, unable by reason of old age, infirmity, sickness or misfortune to support themselves and also for the assistance of families of such ministers living and dead whose pecuniary condition is such as to justly claim the benevolent offices of this Society."

The affairs of the Society, it was provided, were to be managed by a Board of nine trustees to be selected from the Society, which is composed of annual and life members, the annual membership fee being one dollar and the life membership twenty-five dollars. Meetings were to be held semi-annually, one of them during the session of the General Association, at which time the treasurer was to submit a full report of all receipts and disbursements during the year.

As will be seen from the report of the treasurer hereto presented, the endowment fund now exceeds ten thousand dollars and is safely secured and yielding six per cent interest per annum, all the interest being paid to date. There are also on hands in current funds \$2,391.82, and in addition thereto unpaid pledges upon life memberships amounting to several hundred dollars. The total assets of the Society may, therefore be estimated at about \$15,000.00.

There is no more important trust under the management of the Baptists of Missouri and none which promises larger and more needed benefit. Its endowment should be increased speedily to \$100,000 and more until its revenues are such as to guarantee to our Baptist ministers who may become disabled that they will be properly cared for. The interest income should be sufficient to admit of appropriations running to \$12 to \$18 per month, whereas now appropriations must run to something like \$3 to \$5 per month. Such a mere pittance as this is not in keeping with either the real spirit or the financial resources of the great Baptist denomination of Missouri.

The Board of Trustees have decided that four of the nine members of the Board of Trustees be located in the same town so that the vacation work of the Board be attended to without expense to the Society, and so that conferences concerning appropriations may be held with the least inconvenience. Of these four members, three constitute the executive committee and the fourth is treasurer, who is not to be a member of the executive committee, according to the constitution (see Art. 3).

MISSOURI BAPTIST ORPHANS HOME.

The Missouri Baptist Orphans Home has a magnificent and commodious property beautifully and conveniently located at Pattonville, Mo., eight miles from St. Louis on the St. Charles car line. It has completed twenty-six years of history, and stands a monument to the self-sacrificing love of our devoted Baptist women, assisted by a host of true men and little children who would not despise one of God's little ones. The Home was founded for the care and training of orphans, half-orphans and children of indigent parents; these last are sometimes the most needy and just as worthy of our love and support.

The members of the Managing Board and all officers are members of Baptist churches; the employees as far as possible to secure it, are all exemplary Christians who love little children. Religious influences are exerted and instruction given in the Home. The children old enough are required to attend school, Sunday school and church. Several have united with the church on the profession of faith the past year. Believing that God's ideal for the child is the family, children are placed in Christian homes wherever possible; and so, while many are received every year, many are wisely placed and the number in the Home remains about the same. The Home has room for two hundred children and if sufficient funds were in hand to provide food, clothing and nurses for them we could soon greatly enlarge the usefulness of the institution.

REPORT OF TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

Your special committee on temperance was created by an act of this body at its 1910 session. The resolution calling for the committee reads as follows:

"Resolved further, That the Moderator appoint a committee of five, which committee shall represent this body in all possible and suitable ways during the year and make re-

port on the temperance question to this body at its 1911 session."

Nothing has been done by the committee, as such, during the year. The question of the absolute prohibition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors within the state, pending at the time of the appointment of your committee, went down in temporary defeat. So, for a time, we know not how long, our great state, in the fields of politics and commerce, is under the domination of the brewery regime. And for the present, at least, the friends and promoters of political decency, moral cleanliness and civic righteousness, "though hard pressed, are not hemmed in; though perplexed are not driven to despair." We honor the 208,000 voters of our state who, in deference to the right and in the fear of God, cast their ballots for the overthrow of society's greatest and most cruel enemy.

We beg to call attention to the fact that the liquor interests of the state, emboldened by the victory won at the polls last November, are pushing the advantage thus gained to fasten itself yet more firmly upon the state. The brewery program seems to be to retrieve lost counties, defeat at any cost any other counties from going "dry," hold the balance of power over the political parties and still further control and corrupt the politics of the state. We would urge upon the Baptists of our state vigilance and courage in combatting the power and policies of the liquor traffic. We favor any honorable means that may be used to curtail the power and lessen the corrupt effects of the vicious business. County prohibition is good as far as it goes. We give hearty endorsement to the proposition to enact a "county unit" law and a "ward local option" law, both of which will lead ultimately to state-wide prohibition.

This body, representing 190,000 white Baptists, puts itself on record as affirming that the saloon is essentially and universally a corrupt institution; as immoral in its nature and demoralizing in its effects.

We condemn as unjust the handicap put upon prohibition states by the interstate commerce law, or by that construction of it, which allows the shipment of intoxicating liquors into territory where its sale and manufacture are prohibited by law. This, in effect, if not in purpose, plays into the hands of the brewers and bootleggers. This handicap should be removed and this injustice discontinued.

We condemn also the federal government for the part played by it through its system of government license, in aid-

ing and abetting the violation of law in prohibition territory. We believe that the federal law should be so changed that government license would not be granted to any person not holding municipal, county and state licenses.

We urge the Baptist Denomination of Missouri to use its influence in bringing about the passage of the so-called Curtis-Miller Bill now pending in our National Congress, which law will prohibit the shipment of intoxicating liquors into prohibition territories. This may be done by writing personal letters to our representatives urging such a measure.

APPORTIONMENT COMMITTEE.

Your Committee met immediately after the adjournment of the General Association last year and prepared the apportionments to the churches. A circular was issued concerning our State Budget. Copies were mailed to the pastors and clerks of all churches in the State. A letter was also sent to each pastor asking his interest. An appeal was also issued to a large number of prominent laymen to join with the pastors and clerks of the churches in promoting the raising of the State Budget.

The other members of your Apportionment committee wish to express their appreciation of the work which has been done by the Secretaries of the Board of Home and Foreign Missions, the State Mission Board, and the Woman's Mission Board, upon whom has fallen most of the burden of making the apportionments.

1. The work of your Committee is so closely related to the three Boards just mentioned, that it cannot be understood without reference to their reports. We submit the following table as a summary of the financial results of the year's work.

* Of this sum the Woman's Board gave \$978.94 for a Woman's Training School in Shanghai and other objects and \$5 for the German Conference for foreign missions; Total \$1,046.30, which with \$62.36 for "Breaker Memorial," makes \$1,108.66 the figures in the report of the Woman's Board.

** Of this sum \$62.31 for the "Breaker Memorial" is not reported this year by the Board of Home and Foreign Missions.

From this table it will be seen that the Women of our state have been very successful, and in some cases have exceeded their apportionments. 224 Women's Societies contributed to Foreign Missions; 202 to Home Missions. Twenty-eight Young Ladies' Missionary Circles contributed to Foreign Missions; 18 to Home Missions. Thirty-two children's Bands contributed to Foreign Missions and 14 to Home Missions.

Seven hundred and eighty-four churches have contributed to Home Missions; 818 to Foreign Missions; and 866 to State Missions.

The minutes of the General Association for 1910 report 1886 churches. The figures just given mean that 1,102 churches in the state gave nothing to Home Missions; 1,080 gave nothing to Foreign Missions; and 1,020 gave nothing to State Missions.

The receipts of our Home and Foreign Mission Boards were \$670.62 less than for the previous year. But last year's report included a special donation of \$5,000 from two persons for a special Foreign Missionary enterprise. The special contributions this year fell much below that figure. The churches, apart from such special individual contributions, gave more during the year just closed than ever before.

II. The classification of churches in the report of the Home and Foreign Board is worth emphasizing.

(1.) It is interesting to know that none of the sixteen churches in the state that gave more than 5 cents per week per member for missions of all kinds, District, State, Home and Foreign, has impoverished itself. All are flourishing.

(2.) Nine hundred and one churches, about half in the state, gave less than 5 cents per week per member for all sorts of missions.

(3.) Seven hundred and sixty-nine churches gave less than 5 cents per week per member for all purposes whatsoever, including current expenses, Missions and philanthropies.

(4.) There were 200 churches from which no information sufficient to justify classification has been received.

These statements indicate our tremendous field for education and inspiration. Should our pastors carefully ponder their obligations of leadership, 185,000 Missouri Baptists would be so organized and educated that within the next year the classification just indicated would be greatly changed.

III. **The Apportionment Idea.** Experience with the Apportionment plan has revealed five attitudes toward it. These, as indicated in the report of the Home and Foreign Boards, are:

(1.) The Apportionment is a maximum figure, and nothing beyond that is expected.

(2.) The Apportionment is a reasonable request, and an honest effort is made to reach it.

(3.) The Apportionment is too high and therefore no attempt is made to reach it.

(4.) The Apportionment is entirely disregarded, and communications with reference to it are ignored.

(5.) The right of any Committee to ask any church for anything is denied.

It is exceedingly significant that there are the fewest possible number of churches that have regarded the Apportionment as a minimum, and have exceeded the request. All honor to those who have striven to see how much they can do for the advancement of the Kingdom of our Lord.

Some statements seem expedient.

(1.) The work of Missions is not a task imposed upon the churches by outside ecclesiastical authority. It is an obedience to the command of Jesus Christ. It is the chief business of each local church, which exists for no other purpose than the evangelization of the world. Moreover, the impulse to give as much time, strength, and money as possible for the evangelization of the world is the very essence of the regenerated life. No one should regard a fraternal request for a specific amount of money for God's work as a demand upon the local church by an external ecclesiastical authority.

(2.) Boards and Societies of the General Conventions, as well as the Boards of our State Association, are simply the agencies of the churches, which collect, unite, and expend the comparatively small sums of money contributed by individual churches for the evangelization of the world. Precisely because no church alone can spread the gospel over the world; it is necessary to have these agencies. They are the creatures and conveniences of the churches. They have no power over the churches, and disclaim authority. It is the solemn, moral obligation of the churches to sustain the agencies which they themselves have created.

(3.) Apportionments by the General Conventions to the States request only what is actually necessary for carrying on the work. Common sense must approve the business-like method of finding out exactly the cost of our denominational enterprises, and of obtaining support for them, rather than depending upon uncertain and unknowable and variable gifts which hitherto have burdened our agencies with debt, and increased administrative expenses by the necessity for borrow-

ing the money.

(4.) The spirit of fraternity, which is an evidence of genuine discipleship to our Lord, should move every Baptist church to co-operate with every other Baptist church, in the glorious work committed to all disciples by our Lord. No church liveth unto itself. There is a species of ultra-Baptist church independence which is practical selfishness. When a church, because of its independence, ignores its obligations to Jesus Christ and to sister churches by refusing to share in the support of the kingdom of God, it uses a true ecclesiastical principle to excuse the repudiation of a supreme spiritual responsibility.

(5.) Every church which isolates itself from others deprives itself of the inflow of all the benedictions which can come into its own life only through union with other churches. The very life and sympathy of a church depend in no small measure upon its fraternal relations in service for Jesus Christ.

IV. The Culture of the Field. The classification of churches given above, both as to the amounts of their contributions, and as to their attitudes toward the Apportionment idea, indicate the work which our General Association should do. Patiently and lovingly we must seek to bring ourselves to realize the greatness of the needs of the various fields in which we work, the largeness of our ability to supply these needs, and the call for united effort to bring our resources to the relief of the pressing needs. We urge:

(1.) The interest of pastors. The pastor is trusted with leadership. Many councils for the ordination of pastors, in addition to the usual examination of candidates, are now asking about the interest of men who offer themselves for the ministry, in missions, philanthropies, and the wider denominational work. There is hardly a limit to what can be done by a tactful, patient, faithful minister who has the love of his people. We suggest that ministers' conferences also should frequently concern themselves with the united work of their churches.

(2.) That each district association appoint a committee to assist the State Apportionment Committee in creating an interest in the State Budget. The members of these committees could confer in connection with the meetings of the district association and at other times. The State Budget should have a prominent place at the meeting of each district association. The associational committee could greatly develop the interest of the churches.

(3.) The use of literature. A denominational paper should be taken by every family in each church. We cordially thank our papers for the large help they have given to our Boards and our Apportionment Committee. The Annuals of the Northern and Southern Baptist Conventions should be read by all our ministers and members who wish to be intelligent concerning our denominational work. Much literature upon our Missions and the Apportionment work of both Conventions is issued for gratuitous distribution, and may be had by application to the Secretaries of our State Boards. If our people would read the literature which is now issued the educational result will be large.

(4.) That each church should have a financial system. Any system is better than annual collections for the different objects. The important thing is that the thoughtful minds and loving hearts of our pastors and interested members should plan some system and give themselves patiently and perseveringly to the achievement of the plan.

(5.) That the enthusiasm generated by the Laymen's Missionary Movement and the Men and Religion Forward Movement should be utilized. Every church should organize its men, and the brotherhood should enter into the work of Missions so enthusiastically supported by these general Christian movements among men.

V. We call the attention of the Association to the amendment to its By-laws proposed by the Apportionment Committee last year and recorded in the Minutes of 1910, page 25.

VI. We recommend to the Association that it accept the requests of the Northern and Southern Baptist Conventions as indicated in their Apportionments to the State of Missouri, and instruct the Apportionment Committee to apportion the amounts among the churches as fairly as possible.

How small this total State Budget seems for the 185,000 Baptists of Missouri, especially when the financial ability of many of them is remembered. An average of one dollar from every Baptist in the state would more than raise the apportionments. Is that too much to aim for? Thousands can give larger sums. Very few can give nothing.

The Apportionment Committee confesses its fallibility. It claims only to have done the best it could. It welcomes brotherly criticism and is grateful for any information it receives that will enable it to do its work better. It is to be taken for granted that errors will be made. It should also be remembered that such mistakes are only those of the head and not of the heart. The committee asks all the churches to consider its delicate task, and also to co-operate with its efforts to do its duties faithfully.

In Memoriam.

Rev. Nicholas Allee passed to his reward in February at the age of sixty-nine years. He labored in the ministry in and around California, Missouri, where he spent his last days.

Deacon James L. Applegate died in May in Pasadena, California. He was for many years a member of the Board of State Missions, for thirty-five years Auditor of the General Association; he served as Treasurer of the Third Baptist church of St. Louis, treasurer of the fund for Aged Ministers, and was some time treasurer of William Jewell College. He moved his membership as he changed his residence and is now with the church triumphant.

Deacon Angus C. Avery of Clinton, Missouri died in September, aged seventy-five years. He was closely identified with the Clinton church from its organization as Sunday School Superintendent, Clerk and Deacon. He served as Clerk and also as Moderator of Tebo Association. He was a life member of this body and served as Assistant Moderator. At our last session he was a member of the committee on obituaries.

Rev. James Brassfield of Mercer, Missouri, fell asleep in Jesus last October at his home. He was one of the pioneer preachers in North Missouri, working in and around North Grand River Association. He passed to his reward at the age of about seventy years.

Rev. Edward Forest Dawson died at his home in Carrollton, Missouri, in July at the age of forty-five years. He studied in William Jewell College and at the Louisville Seminary. He served the churches and people of Carroll county. During the last eight years he was unable to fulfill the duties of a pastor but was Probate Judge at Carrollton and was called often to officiate at funerals and weddings. He was faithful in details and a genuine friend.

Rev. L. P. Drake passed to his heavenly reward in June. He was pastor at Cabool, Missouri. He was a Kentuckian by

birth, a Missourian by choice and a child of God by redemption. He was about forty-eight years of age.

Rev. Z. T. Eaton died at Aurora, Mo., January 2, 1911, aged about 62. He had preached about 40 years in southwest Missouri.

Rev. R. H. Gore died at Pomona, California, in February in middle age. He was born near St. Joseph, Missouri, and graduated from William Jewell College in 1897. He was a faithful, loving preacher.

Rev. Ninian W. Halcomb died in Texas in March. He graduated from William Jewell College in the later seventies, and was for a time a missionary in China.

Deacon Thomas H. Hickman, of an illustrious Baptist family spent his entire life in Boone county. He died in April in the house in which he was born, aged seventy-five years. He was a member of the Board of Curators of Stephens College, and for forty-two years Clerk of Little Bonne Femme Association.

Rev. W. B. Hooser, M. D., died in Wyoming, August 11, 1911. He served several of our smaller churches in Missouri and did a great work as minister in Kansas City. His zeal for the Master would not let him rest here, but he rests yonder.

Mrs. Elizabeth Hunter died in March at her home in Paris, Missouri, at the advanced age of ninety-four years. She had been for eighty-three years a Baptist.

Rev. T. L. Lewis labored efficiently in Missouri pastorate. He died last February at Missoula, Montana, at the age of sixty-eight years.

Deacon John Mare of the Lafayette Park Church in St. Louis died in August at the age of seventy-five years. Born in England, he was converted under the preaching of Charles H. Spurgeon. He was for forty years a Sunday school teacher or superintendent. He was the father of Miss Eleanor Mare, the Corresponding Secretary of our Woman's Mission Board.

Rev. P. H. Taylor was born in England. He came to Missouri and gave the vigor of his manhood to the Master's cause in our state. He was an efficient District Missionary in North and Central Missouri. He died at his home near California, Missouri last April.

Rev. J. D. Thomason came from Virginia and was ordained by the church at Blue Springs in 1884. Several years he was pastor of that church and he labored with effectiveness in and around Saline Association. He was a helpful member of the Blue Springs church until his death in February at the age of sixty-four years.

Rev. J. Q. Partee came from Kentucky and gave to Missouri the strength of his manhood in pastoral work at Vandalla and Marshall. He died at Berthoud, Colorado, last March at the age of thirty-five. His widow and two children live at Vandalla, Mo.

Rev. Arnold Pfister died at his home in Kidder, Missouri, in March. He had been a soldier in the army. He was converted under the preaching of G. A. Crouch and was an amiable and honored Baptist minister.

Rev. Alexander W. Sutton of Milan, Missouri, died in June. He had held pastorates in Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Washington and in Missouri. He was a lover of the Bible and lived an exemplary life.

Rev. George A. Crouch came from East Tennessee to Missouri, in 1868. More than fifty years he was active in the ministry, baptizing more than three thousand people and fully twenty were led into the ministry under his care. He died at his home in LaGrange last March at the age of seventy-five years.

The speakers were Rev. W. E. Sallee of China, Rev. A. J. Vining of the Russian work and Rev. J. F. Love of the Home Mission Board.

Rev. H. E. Truex offered the following resolution which was unanimously adopted.

BAPTIST SCHOOL IN EUROPE.

Whereas the Baptist World Alliance proposes to establish a Baptist seminary upon the Continent of Europe for the education and training of ministers and leaders, and whereas England proposes to furnish the campus and the foreign boards in Richmond, Boston and London will appropriate \$6,000 each per annum for its maintenance; and whereas it is agreed that American Baptists shall give \$125,000 for buildings and equipment therefore,

Resolved, that we commend most affectionately Brother A. J. Vining, the American representative of the Baptist World Alliance, to our pastors and churches, for the raising of \$5,000 from Missouri Baptists.

Moderator E. W. Stephens led in a collection which resulted in \$5,700 for the Baptist School in Russia.

MISSOURI BAPTIST MINISTERS' CONFERENCE.

The Seventh Annual Meeting of the Missouri Baptist Ministers' Conference was held in the Second Baptist Church, St. Louis, Mo., October 16th, 1911. The meeting was called to order by the President, Rev. Milford Riggs, at 2:00 p. m. After devotional services led by the President, Rev. Horace W. Cole addressed the conference on "Pastors at the Missouri Assembly." He said: 1. We all need to sit down and learn how from our leaders in special lines. Enthusiasm is good, but we need more. 2. The special reasons urged why the pastors should attend the Assembly were for its Relaxation, Comradeship, Stimulation, then Pastors should be there to preserve its Spiritual tone, and help make it a means in denominational life.

H. S. Hartzog, a layman, spoke on "More Men for the Ministry." Some would say that the shortage in the Ministry is due to the smallness of salary, but it is not. School teachers are paid less than the ministers and there are plenty of them. The attraction in any occupation is its prizes. Nor is the shortage due to its lack of spirituality, or decline in oratory, or its resentment of ecclesiastical shackles, but the answer to our problem is that we do not pray as we should for "more laborers" to be sent into the harvest.

Evening Session.

The first speaker at the evening meeting was Dr. W. J. McGlothlin of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky. His theme was "The Vital Ideal in the Ministry." With some, he said the ideal was theological, with others literary, with others still ecclesiastical and with a few financial. There is also, he said, the popularity ideal, but none of these are fit to be the controlling ideal. The vital ideal is the production of life. The preacher is a spiritual Biologist, a spiritual Horticulturist, the only man who gives all of

his time to the building up of life. This ideal if in control would put all the institutions of Christianity in their proper place. It would give a proper relation and attitude to society. In proportion as we keep our eye on this ideal we have freedom in the adoption of methods. A proper ideal will put us into harmony with God. No one of us can imagine a higher being than a man except a higher man. What kind of men are you producing, and how many of them?

Dr. C. Lewis Fowler spoke on "The Church and the present day Social Problem." He said, there is a problem. One characteristic of our times is the crowd. Another characteristic is agitation. There is a sense of social maladjustment, a contradiction between economic conditions and spiritual ideals. Out of this conviction comes all our secret orders, political parties and the like. This seems to be an age of Ultra-materialism, yet the chief characteristic of this day is the very opposite. If the church had been true to its ideals, Christian Science would have been impossible. The depopulation of many of our churches is a revolt against materialism. The great social leaders are clamoring for righteousness. The cry of the age is for a practical Christian life, a social and ethical gospel. The gospel alone can solve the problem, neither Charity, nor communism, nor legislation, can.

A business session was held. Rev. Milford Riggs was elected President and Warren P. Clark, Secretary-Treasurer, for the ensuing year. Brethren C. C. Hatcher, E. F. Wright, and J. E. Dillard, were selected as committee on program with the officers. No collection was taken.

Constitution of the Missouri Baptist General Association.

Article 1. This Body shall be called the Missouri Baptist General Association.

Art. 2. The object of this Association shall be to extend the Kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ, especially in this State.

Art. 3. The time of this Association shall be given to the promotion of its objects in such manner as may be determined by the report of the Committee on Arrangement of Business, when said report has been adopted at each meeting of the Association.

Art. 4. There shall be appointed annually committees on the following subjects: First, on Religious Exercises; second, on Arrangement of Business; third, on Nomination of Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools, Board of Home and Foreign Missions, Board of Trustees of William Jewell College, Board of Ministerial Education, Board of Education, Board of Curators of Stephens College, and Woman's Mission Board; fourth, on Religious Publications; fifth, on Obituaries; sixth, on Missouri Baptist Orphans' Home; seventh, on Resolutions. Of which committees second, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh shall be appointed the year previous to which they are to report, and the Moderator may fill all vacancies that may occur during the year.

Art. 5. This Association shall be composed of representatives of Baptist Churches and Associations contributing to its funds and co-operating in its objects, together with such persons as have hitherto been admitted as life members.

Art. 6. Any church of like faith which may contribute to the Mission funds of this Association represented by the Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools and the Board of General Home and Foreign Missions shall be entitled to a representative and to an additional representative for every ten dollars additional to the first one dollar; and every Association auxiliary to this body shall be entitled to representation on the same terms as churches, or be entitled to one representative for every one hundred dollars spent in missionary work upon its own field; provided, that no church or association

shall be entitled to more than five representatives.

Art. 7. All Associations auxiliary to this Association shall report annually to this body the result of the missionary work, a synopsis of which shall be published with the proceedings of this Association.

Art. 8. The State Missionary and Sunday School business of this Association during its recess, shall be conducted by a board consisting of a chairman, recording secretary, corresponding secretary, treasurer and fifteen other members, all of whom shall be members in good standing of Baptist churches, who shall be chosen annually and continue in office until a new election, three members of whom, including one of the officers, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The officers shall perform their duties gratuitously, except the corresponding secretary, who may also act as general agent. Meetings of the Board shall be held quarterly, or oftener, if deemed necessary, and special meetings may be called at any time by an officer of the Board, of which due notice shall be given. The time and place of the quarterly meetings of the Board, for each year, shall be agreed upon at the first meeting of the Board, and public notice shall be given of same. The Board may fill all vacancies in their own body during the year.

Art. 9. The Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools may, from time to time, appoint such missionaries and agents for the prosecution of the legitimate work of this body as they may deem best.

Art. 10. The Board of General Home and Foreign Missions, consisting of nineteen members, shall have charge of raising in this State and of forwarding funds for these missions. It shall have power to choose its own officers and agents, and shall make to the Association full annual reports of its operations.

Art. 11. The Woman's Mission Board shall consist of nineteen members. Its work shall be to promote the cause of missions among the women throughout the State and it shall be auxiliary to the other mission boards of this Association.

Art. 12. The Board of Ministerial Education shall have power to organize societies for raising means to promote ministerial education in connection with William Jewell College, and shall co-operate with its Board of Trustees, as far as the college charter may allow, in accomplishing the purpose of this body in founding it. The Board of Trustees of William Jewell College, and the Board of Curators of Stephens College, shall report the operations and finances of those insti-

tutions at each annual meeting of this body. The Board of Education shall thoroughly investigate the condition and wants of all our denominational schools in Missouri, and shall have power to organize an auxiliary board of women to aid in raising money, and to raise money to afford temporary relief and to endow any Baptist school in Missouri. The said Board of Education shall make yearly reports to the Association of its doings and of the operation and finances of the schools co-operating with said Board of Education. The Board of Education aforesaid shall consist of nineteen members, who shall be elected annually by the Association and shall continue in office until the new Board of Education is elected.

Art. 13. The preachers employed or aided by this Association shall be of good standing and tried piety, and shall belong to some Baptist church in this State.

Art. 14. The Association shall meet at such time and place as it may elect.

Art. 15. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Secretary, Assistant Secretary and Auditor, who shall be chosen at each annual session. The Moderator, Assistant Moderator and Secretary shall be chosen by ballot, each member casting his own ballot, and by a majority of the ballots cast. The Secretary is to appoint his own Assistant.

Art. 16. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the body, keep order, take the vote on all questions properly brought up, and perform all other duties common to such officer. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep correct minutes of all the proceedings of the Association, and to prepare the same for publication; he may select an assistant. It shall be the duty of the Auditor to examine the report of the Treasurer of the Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools and report on the same to the Association.

Art. 17. In case of interruption in the regular meeting of this body, the Board of State Missions and Sunday Schools shall have power to call meetings at such time and place as they may think best.

Art. 18. This Constitution may be amended only at an annual meeting, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, and notice of such amendments must have been given at the annual meeting preceding.

RULES OF ORDER.

1. The meetings of this Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. In the absence of the Moderator and the Assistant Moderator, the Secretary shall call the Association to order, and in case the Secretary should also be absent, the brother appointed to preach the introductory sermon shall do so, and preside until the Association is organized.

3. Any question that may arise, not provided for in the foregoing rules, shall be decided in accordance with "Parliamentary Law," by F. H. Kerfoot, L. B., LL.D.

4. The decision of the Moderator on points of order shall stand as the judgment of this body, unless reversed by a vote of the Association. Any member shall have a right to appeal from the decision of the chair.

5. The foregoing rules may be altered or amended at any annual meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

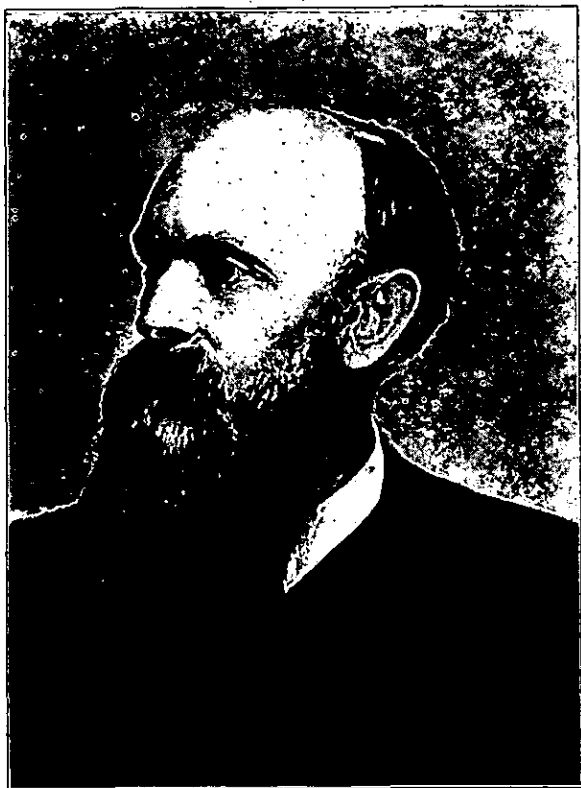
