CONSTITUTION OF THE MISSOURI BAPTIST GENERAL ASSOCIATION

- Art, 1. This body shall be called the Missouri Baptist General Association.
- Art. 2. The object of this Association shall be to extend the Kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ, and to provide a convenient and efficient means of co-operation of the churches in their work of Missions, Education and Philanthropy.
- Art. 3. This Association shall be composed of accredited messengers and life members as follows:
- Sec. 1. Any Baptist church in the State of Missouri shall be entitled to one messenger and one additional messenger for every one hundred members or a fraction thereof above one hundred.
- Sec. 2. Any Baptist District Association shall be entitled to one messenger.
- Sec. 3. Such persons as have hitherto been admitted as life members of this Association shall be accredited as messengers at large.
- Art. 4. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Secretary and Statistical Secretary, who shall be chosen at each annual session. They shall serve from the close of the annual meeting of the Association at which they are elected until the close of the next annual meeting of the Association, or until their successors are elected.
- Art. 5. This Association shall adopt by-laws and rules of order for the conduct of its business not inconsistent with its constitution.
- Art. 6. This Constitution may be amended only at an annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of the enrolled messengers, provided notice of such amendment has been given in writing at the annual meeting next preceding.

BY-LAWS

Art. 1. Duties of Officers

Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside

over the meetings of the Association, keep order, take the vote on all questions properly brought up and perform all other duties usually performed by a presiding officer.

The Assistant Moderator shall act as Moderator in the absence of the Moderator.

- Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep correct minutes of all the proceedings of the Association and prepare the same for publication. It shall be the duty of the Statistical Secretary to collect, digest, tabulate and present to the General Association such statistics and data as will accurately convey to our people the work and standing of our denomination and especially the work in our State, and to perform such other work in the line of statistics as the General Association and the Executive Board may from time to time require of him. Each of said secretaries may appoint such assistants to aid him in the transaction of the business of his office as he may desire.
- Sec. 3. The officers of this Association shall be chosen by ballot, each messenger casting one ballot; a majority of the ballots cast being necessary for an election.

Art. 2-Board

Sec. 1, Structure of

There shall be an Executive Board in charge of the missionary, educational and philanthropic work of the Association.

The Board shall consist of thirty members of which at least one-third shall be women. The Moderator of the Association shall be ex-officio a member of the Board.

The Board shall be elected at the annual meeting of the Association. Those first elected shall divide themselves into three equal classes, one of which shall serve for one year, one for two years, and one for three years.

After the first year ten members of the Board shall be elected at each annual meeting of the Association to serve for three years.

Sec. 2. Organization of

The Board shall elect a chairman, a vice-chairman, and a recording secretary, who shall serve without pay. It shall also

elect a treasurer who shall also be the treasurer of the Association. He shall have custody of all the funds that may come into the possession of the Board; shall disburse them only as directed by the Board for the purposes for which they were given; whose accounts shall be properly audited; and who shall give such bond as the Board shall require.

No salaried employee of the Board shall be a member thereof.

Sec. 3, Powers and duties of

General

The Board shall determine the times and places of its meeting; may fill vacancies occurring during the year; may adopt all necessary regulations for the conduct of its business; may appoint such committees as it may deem wise; and shall report annually in writing to the Association.

It shall present annually to the Association, for apportionment among the churches a state budget derived from and conforming to the apportionment received from the Southern Baptist Convention, or such parts thereof as it may deem wise and the amount required for the state mission work, to which shall be added such amounts as the Association itself may decide upon for other purposes.

Specific

(1) Missionary work-

The Board shall appoint a general superintendent of missions, a secretary for woman's missionary work, and such other workers as occasion may demand, and its means may permit, for the promotion of the interests of Home and Foregin Missions, State Missions, Sunday school work, Baptist Young People's Work, Colportage, and Bible work.

The women on the Executive Board shall be a committee to whose care shall be infirusted the conduct of the Woman's Missionary work in the state.

It shall devise means for the creation and increase of a fund to be used for assisting Baptist churches in Missouri to erect meeting-houses by gift or loan under such conditions as may be wise. No appeals for missionary funds for any purpose shall be made in the state without the approval of the Board.

(2) Educational Work.

The Board shall have general oversight over any institution of learning which shall place itself under its supervision and shall comply with the following conditions: The president, a majority of the members of the managing board and of the teachers shall be members of Baptist churches; it shall not be conducted for private or corporate gain, but all moneys received in excess of operating expenses shall be expended for improvements or shall be added to the permanent endowment; it must conform to the educational standards prevailing in this state; it must each year give a reasonable amount of distinctively religious instruction; it shall make no general canvass for funds without the approval of the Board; it shall submit its books and work to the inspection of the Board whenever requested; it shall make annual report to the Board covering all matters required by the Board.

The Board shall keep itself fully informed as to the conditions and needs of all schools under its supervision; shall approve arrangements for all general campaigns for funds; shall conduct a continuous campaign of enlightenment as to the claims and needs of our schools, and, in general, shall promote in every way possible the cause of Christian education in this state.

The Board shall co-operate with the schools themselves in the raising of funds for ministerial education and for special training in religious work.

The interest of no educational institution shall be presented on the floor of this Association without previous approval of the Board.

The property of each educational institution co-operating with the Board must be safeguarded to the denomination.

(3) Philanthropic work-

The Board shall have general oversight over all philanthropic institutions in the state which shall place themselves under its supervision and shall comply with the following conditions: The chief executive officer of each one and a majority of the members of the managing board shall be members of Baptist churches; and their election shall be subject to the approval of the Association, these institutions shall be engaged principally in the care of the sick or of orphans or the aged or other needy

persons; they shall do as much work as possible gratuitously; they shall not be conducted for private or corporate gain, but all moneys received in excess of operating expenses shall be exended for improvements, or shall be added to the permanent endowment; they shall have been recommended by the Board for affiliation with the Association; their properties shall be safeguarded to the denomination; they shall make no general canvass for funds without the approval of the Board; they shall submit their books and work to the inspection of the Board whenever requested; they shall make annual reports to the Board concerning all matters required by the Board.

The Board shall keep itself fully informed as to the conditions and needs of all philanthropic institutions under its supervision; shall approve arrangements for all general campaigns for funds; shall conduct a continuous campaign of enlightenment; as to the claims and needs of our philanthropic institutions; and in general, shall promote in every way possible the cause of Christian philanthropy in this State.

The Board shall co-operate with the institutions themselves in raising the funds for carrying on their work.

The interests of no philanthropic institution shall be presented on the floor of the Association without the previous approval of the Board.

The property of all philanthropic institutions under the supervision of the Board must be safeguarded to the denomination.

Art. 3.-Time and Place of Meeting

The Association shall meet annually on the Tuesday after the third Sunday in October at such place as it may choose at the next preceding meeting.

Art. 4.—The Committees and Their Duties

- Sec. 1. The Moderator shall appoint the following committees to report at the current meeting of the Association.
- (a) A committee of three on place of meeting and preacher of introductory sermon for next meeting of the Association.
 - (b) A committee of three on resolutions.
- (c) A committee of ten on nominations. This committee snall be appointed at the morning session of the second day of

the meeting and shall make nominations for officers of the Association and for members of the Executive Board. Said committee shall also submit or present to the Association for approval, confirmation or election, as the case may be, or for such other purposes as may be required by the charter or by-laws of the institution concerned, or as may be requested by the managers thereof, the names of all persons, necessary to fill vacancies on the managing Boards, or bodies, by whatever name known, of the following Baptist institutions, to-wit: Jewell College, at Liberty, Missouri; Stephens College, at Columbia, Missouri; LaGrange College, at LaGrange, Missouri; Southwest Baptist College, at Bolivar, Missouri; Missouri Baptist Sanitarium at St. Louis, Missouri; Missouri Baptist Orphans Home, at Pattonville, St. Lous County, Missouri; Missouri Home for Aged Baptists at Ironton, Missouri; Missouri Baptist Ministers Aid Society, at Mexico, Missouri; Missouri Baptist Historical Society, at Liberty, Missouri; Missouri Baptist Assembly at Arcadia, Missouri; The Baptist Bible Institute, at New Orleans, Louisiana; and of such other institutions as may from time to time become affiliated with or subject to the control of the Missouri Baptist General Association. Its report shall be presented at the first session of the last day of the meeting of the Association. If no other nominations are made, the vote upon the report of this committee may be taken viva voce.

- Sec. 2. The moderator elected for the ensuing year shall appoint the following committees:
- (a) A committee of three on arrangement of business to present at the next annual meeting a program for that session.
 - (b) A committee of three on religious publications.
 - (c) A committee of three on obituaries.

Article 5. Miscellaneous

- Sec. 1. The meetings of this Association shall be given to the promotion of its objects in such manner as may be determined by the committee on arrangements for business.
- Sec. 2. Preachers employed or aided by organizations affiliating with this Association shall be of good standing and tried piety and shall belong to Baptist churches in Missouri.
- Sec. 3. In case of interruption of the regular meeting, of this body or failure through unforseen events to hold the regular

meeting of the Association at the time and place appointed, the Executive Board shall have the power to call a meeting of the Association at such time and place as it may determine.

- Sec. 4. No appeal for funds shall be made at any session of the Association, nor shall any collection be taken at such meetings, except by a special order of the Association.
- Sec. 5. The expenses of this association and of the Executive Board shall be paid out of funds received for state work except where special arrangements are made between the Executive Board and organizations benefitted.
- Sec. 6. The meetings of this association shall be opened and closed by prayer.
- Sec. 7. In the absence of the Moderator and the Assistant Moderator, the Secretary shall call the Association to order, and in case the Secretary should also be absent, the brother appointed to preach the introductory sermon shall do so, and preside until the Association is organized.
- Sec. 8. Any question that may arise, not provided for in the foregoing rules, shall be decided in accordance with "Parliamentary Laws," by F. H. Kerfoot, L.B., LL.D.
- Sec. 9. All reports of the regularly organized state work and of all standing committees and of all special committees or commissions appointed at the last preceding session of the General Association must be ready in typewritten or printed form and handed to the clerk on the first day of the Association.
- Sec. 10. These By-Laws may be amended only on the last day of an anual meeting by a majority vote of the messengers enrolled, provided a notice of such amendment has been given in writing on the first day of said annual meeting.

BY-LAWS OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD OF THE MIS-SOURI BAPTIST GENERAL ASSOCIATION

Article I.

Article II of the By-Laws of the Missouri Baptist General. Association is hereby made the governing instrument of the Executive Board.

Article II.—Meetings

- 1. The Executive Board shall meet at Kansas City, unless otherwise ordered, on the second Tuesday of January, April and July and on Monday preceding the meeting of the General Association at the place where the Association meets.
- 2. Special meetings may be called by the Executive Committee at any time and place it may choose.
- 3. A majority of the entire membership of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article III. Co-operation with Southern Baptist Convention

The Executive Board recognizes the Southern Baptist Convention as the body with which this Board and the General Association of Missouri shall be in co-operation.

Article IV. Co-operation with District Associations

The Executive Board recognizes the necessity for co-operation with the district associations of the state and that the Executive Boards of those associations are the proper mediums through which such co-operation should be carried out.

Article V. Committees

The Chairman of the Executive Board shall appoint the following committees to consist of three persons each unless otherwise specified.

- 1. There shall be an Executive Committee of seven, of which the Vice Chairman of the Executive Board shall be chairman. It shall have charge of the business of the Board between its quarterly meetings and shall make reports of its work at each meeting of the Board. The Executive Board may from time to time prescribe the duties of and what business shall be transacted by the Executive Committee between the meetings of the Board.
- 2. The ten women members of the Board shall constitute a committee on Women's Missionary Work in the state, shall nominate for election by the Board a secretary for women's work, and shall use every means for the continuous development of the women of the churches in the support of missionary work

now conducted by women and, also, of the general missionary work of the churches.

- 3. A Committee on State Missions which shall co-operate with the General Superintendent in the work of the Missionaries, Colporters, Sunday School Workers and Evangelists employed by the Board, to which committee may be referred all matters pertaining to state work and said committee shall report to the Executive Board at its regular meetings.
- 4. A Committee on Home and Foreign Missions whose duty it shall be to see that relations are maintained with the Missionary Boards of the Southern Baptist Convention, promote the interests of the churches in the work of Home and Foreign Missions, and do such other work as may increase the co-operation of the Baptists of the state in missionary enterprise outside of Missouri.
- 5. A Committee on Education whose duty it shall be to see that the functions of this Board with reference to educational institutions described in the By-Laws of the General Association are properly discharged, shall take such steps as may be necessary to execute the duties prescribed for them and shall make reports at each meeting of the Board.
- 6. A Committee on Philanthropy which shall see that relations are maintained with the various philanthropic institutions in the state which put themselves under the supervision of the General Association, investigate all institutions which desire to come into the nominal relations, obtain full information of these enterprises and report to each meeting of the Board.
- 7. A Committee on Finance to consider and report on all financial matters which may come before the Board and to adopt such measures as may promote the financial welfare of the General Association.
- 8. An Auditing Committee of three persons, none of whom shall be either members or employees of the Executive Board, whose duty it shall be to examine the books of the treasurer as may be requested by the Board.

Article VI. Workers

For the purpose of carrying out the plans of the Association, there shall be elected the following workers:

- 1. A General Superintendent whose duty it shall be to superintend the entire work of the Board in all its departments and have general charge of the educational, missionary and philanthropic interests of the state. For this service, he shall receive such salary as may be agreed upon by the Board and himself.
- 2. A Secretary for Women's Work, who shall have general charge of the work of the Executive Board in co-operation with the Missionary Societies and Circles of the state who shall promote the interests of the women in their special enterprises, and also in the general denominational enterprises under the direction of the Board. For this service, she shall receive such salary as may be agreed upon by the Board and herself.
- 3. A Secretary or Secretaries for Sunday School and B. Y. P. U. Work, who shall have charge of the work of the Board in fostering Sunday School and B. Y. P. U. For such services, he shall receive such salary as may be agreed upon.
- 4. All Department Secretaries and other workers shall work under the supervision of the General Superintendent of the Board, it being the duty of all workers to stimulate the interests of the churches in all the enterprises fostered by this Board. They shall seek to develop methods stimulating benevolences, shall do everything in their power to enlist the sympathy and cooperation of Baptists throughout the state in the work of the General Association. For their services, they shall receive such salary as may be agreed upon between them and the Executive Board.

Article VII.

These By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the entire membership of the Board at any regular meeting thereof, provided a written notice of such proposed changes is given at the previous meeting of the Board.

To the Executive Board of the Missouri Baptist General Association: We, your committee appointed at the last meeting to submit a revised draft of the By-Laws of the Board, beg leave to report as per the foregoing.

CONSTITUTION OF THE MISSOURI BAPTIST AS-SEMBLY

Article I. Name

The name of this organization shall be the Missouri Baptist Assembly.

Article II... Object

The object of this organization shall be the unification, edification and enlistment of our Baptist people in Christian service.

Article III. Membership

The membership of this assembly shall consist of Messengers from Young People's Societies, Sunday Schools, missionary organizations and Baptist churches in Missouri desiring to cooperate.

Article IV. Management

The management of the assembly shall be under the control of the Executive Board of the Missouri Baptist General Association.

Article V. Officers

The officers shall be a president, three vice-presidents, a recording secretary, a corresponding secretary and a treasurer. Each of these shall perform the duties usual to their respective officers and shall be elected annually by ballot, except the treasurer. The treasurer shall be elected by the property committee of the assembly.

Article VI. Meetings

This organization shall hold an annual assembly at Arcadia Heights beginning the first Monday in August, or such date as may be agreed upon by the program committee, on one day of which shall be held the annual business meeting of the assembly.

Article VII. Amendments

This constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the assembly by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting, notice thereof having been given in writing three days previous, such amendments to be subject to the approval of the Executive Board of the Missouri Baptist General Association.

BY-LAWS

Article I. Officers

The officers of the assembly shall constitute an advisory committee, work when called upon, in conjunction with the program and property committee and to arouse and awaken interest and enthusiasm throughout the state in the annual meeting.

Article 11. Committees

The president shall appoint a committee of five on Nominations. Committees of five on "Program and Curriculum" and "Property and Finance" shall be appointed by the Executive Board of the Missouri Baptist General Association at its regular meeting in October of each year.

Article III. Duties of Committees

Section 1. Committee on Nominations. It shall be the duty of this committee to make nominations to the assembly at its annual meeting for the officers of the assembly.

Section 2. Committee on Program and Curriculum. It shall be the duty of this committee to arrange lectures and courses of study, provide speakers and teachers, grant credits and award diplomas as directed by the Executive Board of the Missouri Baptist General Association.

Section 3. Committee on Property and Finance. This committee shall have charge of the property throughout the year, and shall care for and improve the same as instructed by the Missouri Baptist General Association.

Article IV. Amendments

These By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the assembly by a majority vote, provided notice of same is given in writing on the second day of the assembly, and has been approved by the Executive Board of the Missouri Baptist General Association at its regular previous meeting.

Later, each new pastor responded briefly to the welcome. The following new pastors were introduced: Wm. Henderson Barton, Compton Heights, St. Louis; H. A. Porter, Third Church, St. Louis; H. L. Fuhr, Salisbury; J. M. Haymore, General Missionary, St. Louis; A. F. Crittenden, Festus; J. Pendleton Scruggs, Cape Girardeau; R. L. Payne, Warrensburg; Titus W. Beasley, La Grange; W. E. Darrow, Southwest, St. Louis; J. B. Trotter, Fifth Street, Hannibal; Paul Settle, Liberty.

NINTH ANNUAL REPORT OF EXECUTIVE BOARD OF MISSOURI BAPTIST GENERAL ASSOCIATION

October 1, 1923, to September 30, 1924.

Arthur J. Barton, General Superintendent

It is with a profound sense of humility and of thanksgiving to our gracious Lord and Master for His continued presence, blessing and guidance that we, your Executive Board, present this annual report. The year has been one of earnest prayer and effort on our part and as this report with its exhibits will show it has been one of abundant blessing from our Heavenly Father. No word at our command would adequately express our gratitude to Him from whom have come the blessings upon our labors and to whom all praise and glory are due.

Change in Working Forces

With the first of February, our former General Superintendent, Rev. O. L. Wood, who for the past four years had served in that office faithfully and well, was succeeded by Rev. Arthur J. Barton, formerly pastor of Calvary Baptist Church, Alexandria, Louisiana. In making this record, your

Board desires to express for itself and for you the high esteem in which we hold Dr. Wood as a Christian man and minister and our sincere appreciation for his faithful service. In his new field of labor as pastor of the church at Gallatin, he is giving hearty co-operation and loyal support to all of our work. We will follow him with our affectionate interest and prayers.

Your present Superintendent, who prepares this report, has been fully introduced to the Baptists of the state and has received from them a generous welcome and a hearty response to all of his plans and efforts for which he and your Board are deeply grateful.

Effective May 15, 1924, Rev. George W. Graham, who had served several years as District Secretary of St. Louis District, resigned the position to accept the pastorate at Fayette, Missouri. Brother Graham had been active and diligent in looking after the interests of our work in his district. In compliance with his wishes, the Board accepted his resignation. We rejoice in the blessings of the Lord upon his labors both as District Secretary and in his present pastorate. The Board did not immediately elect his successor. In July, 1924, Rev. J. M. Haymore, pastor of First Baptist Church, Decatur, Georgia, was elected as General Missionary, to reside at St. Louis and to have general oversight of the work in that section and to render special service in other parts of the state as occasion may require. He entered upon his duties August 15. The change of office from District Secretary to that-of General Missionary suggests a slight change of emphasis and policy which will be more fully set forth in another paragraph of this report.

During the year Rev. E. J. Rogers resigned as Statistical Secretary, finding that the exacting duties of his pastorate would not allow him to give the time necessary to perform the duties of the office. Rev. S. E. Ewing was elected to fill the vacancy and was asked to combine the duties of Statistical Secretary with those of Recording Secretary. The duties of the two offices overlap to a degree and it appears to your Board that it would be a wise and economic thing to combine these two offices permanently. Any brother performing the service should receive appropriate compensation and there should be suitable allowance of clerical help.

Offices of The Board Enlarged and Better Equipped

The offices of your Board have been located on the third floor of Terminal Trust Building, Kansas City, Missouri, for the past two years. When the present Superintendent took charge the question of continuing the office at this location or of removal to a down town office building came up for consideration. The Executive Committee left the matter largely to the judgment of the Superintendent. After full and careful consider-

ation of all phases of the question, it was decided to continue the offices at the present site but with some increased equipment. Four additional small rooms with eastern frontage were secured. The Terminal Trust Company had the entire suite redecorated and we made some increase in equipment including plain office rugs, telephone extensions, a push bell system and other like modern conveniences. The Board now has as comfortable and convenient a suite of rooms for its work as could be desired. The location is in one of the growing centers of the city and is entirely convenient and accessible. The Board formerly paid \$100.00 per month. The rental is increased by only \$25.00. The same amount of space in a down town location would cost from \$250.00 to \$300.00 per month. Our lease runs to the close of 1925.

Thanks to Courteous Railroads

Railroads, like all other great industrial concerns, are dependent immediately upon the physical and material welfare and prosperity of the country. Like all others, therefore, they are dependent indirectly upon the educational, moral and spiritual forces which lie back of all material prosperity. It is a commonplace now to say that commerce follows the missionary. Everything that the Baptists of Missouri do through their co-operative life and work expressed by the General Association makes large contribution to the development and prosperity of the industrial concerns, railroads included. Many of the railroads have come to recognize these principles and, therefore, give every reasonable encouragement and assistance to our efforts. We desire here to record and publicly to express our sincere thanks and appreciation to the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy; Chicago Milwaukee and St. Paul; Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific; Kansas City Southern; Missouri Pacific; and St. Louis-San Francisco Railroads for their generous recognition of these principles and for their sympathetic attitude expressed in transportation for the General Superintendent. We hope and believe that next year all of the railroads in Missouri will be equally considerate.

Departments of Woman's Work and Sunday School and Young People's Work

We herewith present as a part of this report the reports of these two departments prepared by their respective heads, Mrs. J. G. Reynolds and Mr. J. C. Hockett. We rejoice in the continued faithful and fruitful serve ice of these heads of departments and in the enlarged effort and increased good fruits in these spheres of our activity. Each department records marked growth. We are rapidly approaching the day when the women of our churches shall be thoroughly organized and shall become through their societies one of the mightiest of Kingdom forces. Our Sunday school and

B. Y. P. U. work in many instances is handicapped by the lack of suitable buildings and equipment. With the increasing interest in these phases of our work and with the growing revolution in church building plans and construction, we expect more and more to see our Sunday school and B. Y. P. U. organization systemized and strengthened and the attendance upon the teaching and training services of the churches greatly enlarged. Nothing that we do is of more vital importance than the work of these two departments. The religious atmosphere of the churches, like that of the homes, is determined largely, mainly we may say, by the intelligence and zeal of our good women. Like all other things of growth, our churches must assimilate the young life. They are to grow and thrive. We rejoice in the growth of the work and expect to see still larger things.

Reports of District Secretaries and General Missionary.

We submit as a part of this report the reports of the District Secretaries, F. Y. Campbell and J. S. Deaton, for the year and of George W. Graham for the time he served and of General Missionary J. M. Haymore for the time he has served. These brethren have given themselves wholeheartedly to the work. We commend them for their faithfulness and rejoice in the blessings of God upon their labors.

We give the following summary of work done by District Secretaries, Associational Missionaries and Missionary Pastors for the year. This summary bears its own message and indicates in abundant measure the blessing of our Savior upon the labors of His servants. We ask for it careful and thoughtful consideration. It will be noted that throughout the year we have had in our employ besides the District Secretaries and General Missionary the following:

Reports of Institutions

Reports have been received from the several educational and benevolent institutions. We request that they be presented by the heads of the institutions to the Convention at separate times in two groups as follows:

- (1) Reports of all the colleges to be read at one time followed by such considerations as the General Association may desire to give to them and such action as it may wish to take;
- (2) Reports of the several benevolent institutions to be presented in another group for like consideration.

Word and Way Campaign

One of the most interesting and distinctly fruitful pieces of work which your Board has carried forward during the year now closed was the campaign for the enlargement of the circulation of the Word and Way. At a meeting of the Board in St. Louis, April 8, upon recommendation of General Superintendent the Board voted unanimously to put on a special campaign during the early summer months. Full conference was had with the editors and business managers of the Word and Way and the campaign was first put on for the two months of June and July.

For this special effort the Word and Way granted our request for a very generous introductory offer, the subscription price being put at \$1.50 per year for single subscriptions and \$1.00 per year where churches put the paper in their budget and sent it into each home represented in the church. Later these special terms were extended during the months of August and September. We are glad to record that the campaign was highly successful, resulting in the enrollment of over 2,000 new subscribers and the putting of the paper into the budget of 29 churches. This means that each week we are now reaching with the Baptist message about 10,000 of our Baptist people whom we have not reached heretofore. Among the best results of this campaign has been the great increase in the spirit of harmony and co-operation among our Baptist forces. In the future similar campaigns can be put on with greatly increased results.

We must carry the Baptist message, including both the doctrine and the co-operative plans and life of our people, to the Baptist masses. A co-operative Baptist must be an informed Baptist. An informed Baptist must be a reading Baptist. If we do not get our message to the masses of our people through the printed page, we may never hope for an intelligent and enlisted and co-operating constituency. "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge," said the prophet in the olden days. It is equally true today. Every individual which has been regenerated by the Holy Spirit naturally and normally wants to do the Master's will and to share in the Master's work. This he will do if supplied with intelligent information. Our

easiest and most effective method of reaching the masses with the intelligence of Kingdom plans and work is the Baptist State Paper, which to us in Missouri is the Word and Way. We record our gratitude for the success of this campaign and we express our grateful and abiding thanks to the Word and Way for the generous amount of space and the magnanimous support which it has given to all of our work throughout the year. The Word and Way is one of the greatest forces and influences in the broad bounds of our beloved state. We rejoice in the mutual and sympathetic co-operation and support existing between it and all of the institutions and agencies fostered by the General Association.

Spring Round-up Campaign

When the present Superintendent came to the state, he found plans all made for a great state-wide round-up for Home and Foreign Missions leading up to the meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention. Under the leadership of former Superintendent, Rev. O. L. Wood, of Home Board Superintendent of Evangelism and Enlistment, Rev. J. W. Beagle, and of Committee on Home and Foreign Missions of Executive Board, Rev. R. M. Inlow, Chairman, the goal had been set at \$200,000.00 and a large number of regional meetings planned throughout the state. For the expense of this special effort the Home and Foreign Boards and the Sunday School Board had agreed to contribute \$1,000.00 each. In the regional meetings Rev. O. E. Bryan and Rev. Austin Crouch of the Home Board came to speak. The following list of brethren in the state, pastors and others, took part:

Traveling expenses of all pastors attending these meetings and desiring or needing such help were paid; the women of the churches where the meetings were held served meals at the church; great crowds came in spite of the weather and roads. This wisely conceived and vigorously executed plan is the chief explanation of the great increase in our contributions to Home and Foreign Missions and was the beginning of the great, new day which has dawned in Missouri. Only \$1,500.00 of the \$3,000.00 allowed by the three general boards for expenses was used.

One Hundred Per Cent Gain in Home and Foreign Missions

It is a matter of great rejoicing that we are able to report that as a

result of this special effort added to our regular efforts during the last Southern Baptist Convention year we sent to the Foreign Mission Board the sum of \$78,316.48 as against \$39,755.84 for the previous year, and to the Home Mission Board the sum of \$49,156.33 as against \$24,858.56 for the previous year, making a gain of approximately one hundred per cent in our contributions to these two great needy and appealing causes. In the Unified Budget hereafter referred to in this report and recommended for your consideration we have included for Foreign Missions \$150,400.00 and for Home Missions \$64,000.00; the ratio between the two being that established by the Southern Baptist Convention in its Unified Budget and Program for next year.

Personal Canvass for Southern Baptist Theological Seminary

The program of the Southern Baptist Convention for 1925 allocates to the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary ten per cent of the total undesignated contributions to South-wide objects. Thus it is expected that the Seminary will realize a good large sum, but not a sufficient sum to meet the urgent demand of its new building program. In view of this the Southern Baptist Convention voted to regard the Seminary as the preferred object for the coming year and approved of personal solicitation by the Seminary for its building fund throughout the year, subject to the approval of the Executive Boards in the several states and with the specific provision that pledges taken shall not extend beyond the limits of 1925. Some months back, through President E. Y. Mullins, the Seminary requested that your Board give its approval and co-operation to such canvass in Missouri to begin the first of September and be pursued through the closing months of the present year or until such time as it might be completed. The request of the Seminary was cheerfully granted by your Board and for some weeks now Rev. P. T. Hale has been in the state inaugurating and prosecuting this canvass. We recommend that the General Association approve of this canvass and request our well-to-do brethren and sisters throughout the state to have a sympathetic ear and a responsive heart to the needs of the Seminary. We recommend further that by the adoption of this report the General Association request the seminary, through its President or such other officer as he may designate, to make to your Board as often as quarterly full report of all pledges taken and of all moneys received from Missouri through this canvass and to accompany such report of cash with suitable voucher so that the amounts may be properly entered upon our books and the state may receive due credit.

Two Friendly Helpers

As heretofore, the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, Atlanta, Georgia, has continued the policy of generous and much

needed co-operation and help in our co-operative missionary enterprise. The Board has continued its appropriation of \$13,500.00 a year to assist us in maintaining our corps of missionaries.

The Home Mission Board has also continued its appropriation of \$5,000.00 for the salary and expenses of Rev. J. W. Beagle, General Enlistment Evangelist. Brother Beagle has rendered faithful and effective service, in which we rejoice.

Likewise has the Sunday School Board continued to contribute the sum of \$1,175.00 to assist us in maintaining the Department of Sunday School and B. Y. P. U. work. The Sunday School Board has also helped in the rural campaign and by the generous donation of missionary study books and in other ways.

We hereby express our deep appreciation to each of these great agencies of the Southern Baptist Convention for the helping hand it has extended to us.

Ministerial Education

The money contributed on the basis of the former percentage schedule for aiding young ministers in securing their education has been disbursed for the help of the young ministers of the several colleges according to the number of ministerial students attending each college in harmony with former action of the General Association. In the Unified Budget for 1925, there is an item of \$10,000.00 for ministerial and missionary training. We recommend that the Board be instructed to assist impartially needy ministerial students at our several colleges and at the two Theological Seminaries, the Southern and Southwestern and the Baptist Bible Institute and to assist needy and worthy young women at the Training Schools of the Seminaries in training for missionary service, the appropriations to be made upon the application of the students, each application to be approved by the President of the institution in which the student is taking his course.

Church Building Fund

The By-Laws of the General Association in defining the duties of your Executive Board say: "It shall devise means for the creation and increase of a fund to be used for assisting Baptist churches in Missouri to erect meeting houses by gift or loan under such conditions as may be wise." Your Board has on hand funds received from bequests and raised at different times by gift the sum of \$48,895.67. A portion of these funds was bequethed specifically for church building purposes. Others for the general uses of the Board. All of the funds have been made to contribute to the promotion of church building enterprises by being lent to churches

for that purpose. In recent years the income derived from these funds has been used in the general operations of the Board, including payment of our missionaries' salaries.

Your Board hereby recommends that all of the permanent funds now on hand be dedicated as a church building and loan fund to be administered by the Board, the principal to be lent to Baptist churches or invested otherwise at the discretion and wisdom of the Board, the total income each year to be donated to churches to assist them in their building enterprises in such amounts and on such terms as the Board may think best and as will best promote the erection of modern, well-equipped church buildings. It will be noted that in the Unified Budget and program herein recommended for next year an item is included for church building purposes. It is the hope of your Board that from year to year such item may be included in our plan of work, the amount of money raised to be added to the permanent church building and loan fund until in the not distant future the Board may be able materially to aid many struggling churches to have suitable houses of worship.

Evangelism

Missouri, like all other states, has had enough of cheap sensational evangelism. But undoubtedly Missouri needs a great deal more of sane. effective, abiding evangelism after the New Testament type. We must keep the fires of evangelism burning both through warm-hearted evangelistic preaching of the pastors in their own pulpits and through the help rendered by pastors to fellow pastors and through the work of men called of God as evangelists. We do not have enough evangelistic meetings in our Missouri churches. Pastors do not hold as many meetings as they ought to hold. We have not a sufficient number of pastors who have recognized and sought to develop their own evangelistic talents and gifts. We have not a sufficient number of capable men giving themselves wholly to evangelism. We must think and work and pray for a deep statewide revival of religion and for a great conquering campaign of winning souls to the Lord Jesus Christ as Saviour and King. If we do not win souls to Christ all else that we may do is a failure. It may be well if your Board should establish and maintain a department of evangelism in which would be employed a small number of the best and most capable men. It is our belief that such department could be made self-supporting while it would give our pastors and churches the opportunity of securing the help of men who were both thoroughly capable and properly recommended. It will be well for the Board to give the matter serious and prayerful consideration.

Summer Assemblies

The Missouri Baptist Assembly at Arcadia Heights is under the own-

ership and conduct of your Board. A number of other assemblies have been organized and are now being conducted in the state. The list is as follows: Ozark near Springfield, Interstate at Mt. Vernon, Van. Buren at Van Buren, and Jewell at Liberty. Undoubtedly these assemblies are rendering a needed and valuable service. The Board would suggest that a wise and representative commission of seven be appointed to consider the whole matter of assemblies with special reference to the number, location and time of meeting of such assemblies and to make recommendations to the brethren connected with them as to whether or not there should be more or fewer such assemblies in the state and as to the best location of each.

Laymen's Work

The work of our Laymen in Missouri is not so well organized and so vigorously conducted as we desire to see. This is not to disparage the brethren who have given more or less time and effort to organizing brotherhoods and calling out the energies and activities of the men but is only to recognize the fact that we have not done by that department all that we should have done or all that is needed. Brother J. A. Hemphill, Chairman of the Laymen's Work of the State, believes that for sustained, aggressive and successful effort the work should become more closely related to the Executive Board. As the Board understands the sentiment of our people, there is a growing feeling that we ought to have in our employ a wise, well-equipped, experienced layman who would give all of his time to the organization of brotherhoods or men's groups in the churches which would come together regularly and systematically for fellowship, prayer and counsel and for definite missionary study in the manner similar to that prevailing in our women's missionary societies. If it shall be the desire of those in charge of the laymen's work and of the General Association that some such course shall be pursued, the Board will welcome the closer relation and will do everything within its ability to give efficient direction to the work and to the development of the religious life and missionary zeal of the men of our churches as they may be developed by and through the men's organizations.

Student Work

Among the largest opportunities and most pressing needs in our whole denominational life is the student work. It ought to be carried on for the conservation and enlargement of the spiritual life and usefulness of our Baptist students in our schools, both denominational and state. Miss Beagle, the Director of Young People's activities in our Women's Missionary Department, has rendered and is rendering good service in which your Board rejoices. It is manifest that enlarged plans must be inaugurated if we are to meet the needs of the situation in anything like an adequate way. The

Inter Board Commission of Southern Baptist Convention, with offices in Memphis, Tennessee, through its Secretaries, Mr. Frank Leavell and Miss Louise Foreman, is rendering large and effective service among the student bodies of the South. This Commission tenders to us in Missouri its fullest co-operation and its best efforts in helping us to care for our students. Your Board will welcome this co-operation and will seek in every way possible to promote this good work. As soon as practicable, we ought to have in Missouri, as Student Secretary, a thoroughly educated college man, giving all of his time to Baptist students both in our Baptist colleges and all of the state schools. If we are to maintain our de-nominational position, if we are to keep pace with the progress in the material and educational world, we must conserve the religious life of our college students, especially of our Baptist students. The faith and affairs of every generation are determined chiefly by the leaders of that generation; the leaders of every generation for the most part are the products of the colleges and universities. If we fail to hold the student life of this present day to sane religious belief and faithful religious service, then the religious life of the next generation will be largely wrecked.

Another phase of the student problem is the task of furnishing adequate and inviting Baptist church homes in the cities where colleges are located for the crowds of students thronging the halls of our colleges everywhere. In every college town the problem of adequate Baptist church equipment is a problem real and vital for the whole denomination. It is possibly true that if every Baptist church had done its full duty in all the years past and if every Baptist church were as large-visioned and as liberal as it ought to be, this problem might be solved in each case by the local congregation. But in the very nature of the case, it is a problem and a task which goes beyond local environments and rests upon the denomination at large. It is also a denominational privilege. In several instances in Missouri we are sadly losing our opportunity. We are allowing wastage even among our own Baptist students, not to mention our failure to reach and hold with the Baptist message others who have not had Baptist atmosphere and ideals. Your Board feels deeply and keenly that somehow the Baptists of Missouri must grapple with this task.

It is gratifying to note that the church at Liberty has completed its great new building; that at Kirksville a good Sunday School annex has been completed; and that at Bolivar, Cape Girardeau and La Grange building plans are in progress looking to caring for the religious life of the students in a larger and more worthy way. At Cape Girardeau, plans have been greatly promoted by a recent evangelistic campaign in which Pastor J. Pendleton Scruggs was aided by General Missionary J. M. Haymore, which culminated in definite effort to promote the building project.

A Stronger and More Effective Missionary Policy

As set out in one of the preceding paragraphs, the place made vacant by the resignation of District Secretary George W. Graham was filled by the election of Rev. J. M. Haymore as General Missionary. Your Superintendent and Board have given careful consideration to the question whether or not we should continue the policy of having three district secretaries. We have reached the conclusion that a slight change of emphasis will facilitate our efforts for the promotion of our cause. We think it will be better? to shift the emphasis from the administrative to the missionary phase of these positions and to maintain three general missionaries, strong and wellequipped men with a passion for souls, with Kingdom-wide vision and with good training and experience in church and denominational affairs. Such a man in the position of General Missionary will be expected from time to time as his strength and other duties will allow to hold evangelistic meetings with the pastors and churches as they may wish; to attend the annual meetings of district associations; to visit pastorless churches and hold inspirational services with them for rallying their forces and to assist them in every proper way in securing pastors; to go into churches where hard conditions exist, where a building campaign must be put over or other like services rendered and to assist the pastor and church in the consummation. of their desires and plans. He will also be expected to render aid and counsel to the General Superintendent and to the Board and to advise them concerning conditions existing in his section of the state. It will be the plan to have these missionaries reside at St. Louis, Kansas City and Springfield, as the district secretaries have done, and to maintain broadly the three districts heretofore established but with no hard and fast lines for administrative purposes.

It is the belief of your Board that our missionary policies may be strengthened and made more efficient in two other respects:

1. Many of the district associations are too small and too weak to maintain an associational missionary and in some cases the local association greatly needs the inspiration and the touch of a missionary initiative and policy based upon a broader experience and fuller knowledge of the great world-field than is possible to a local undeveloped constituency. It is equally true that some of the smaller associations do not furnish adequate opportunity for the constant and profitable employment of all the time of a strong, well-equipped man as missionary. It has been our policy to cooperate with the district associations in the employment of associational missionaries, each missionary being limited to one association. It is the belief of your Board that a better and more effective policy would be to group the associations and to create, we will say, eight or ten districts in the state and let the Executive Board employ outright a strong, capable man as district missionary. We have a very fine example of the effective-

ness of this method in what has been called the Federation of Associations in Northwest Missouri in which Rev. C. C. Cunningham has been employed as "Pastor at Large." Such change of policy could hardly be inaugurated at once in every case, but it is an ideal toward which we can well afford to look and if such plan can be put thoroughly into operation we would undoubtedly be able to render more effective service to the association and churches.

2. In the matter of supplementing the salaries of pastors. As soon as possible it will be well to establish a more direct relationship between the pastors and churches aided and the Executive Board. Applications by churches for assistance in the support of pastors should be made by the church directly to the Executive Board but with the approval of the Executive Board of the association with which the church co-operates. When the application shall have been granted, direct communication should be maintained between the missionary pastor and the Board, the pastor's reports being sent to the Board and checks for salary sent directly to the missionary. Duplicate reports should also be filed with the Chairman or Secretary of the Executive Board of the District Association.

We have here outlined three matters which in our opinion will serve greatly to strengthen and make more efficient our missionary policies. We set them up as a sort of ideal ultimately to be attained and suggest that the General Association give its approval to the ideal and leave the Board free to work to that end according to its judgment under the circumstances in every case.

Unified Budget and Program For 1925

In the By-Laws of the General Association defining the duties of the Executive Board it is provided: "It shall present annually to the Association, for apportionment among the churches, a state budget derived from and conforming to the apportionment received from the Southern Baptist Convention, or such parts thereof as it may deem wise and the amount required for the State Mission work, to which shall be added such amounts as the Association itself may decide upon for other purposes."

Concerning the duties of the Board in its educational work the By-Laws read as follows: "The Board shall keep itself fully informed as to the condition and needs of all schools under its supervision; shall approve arrangements for all general campaigns for funds; shall conduct a continuous campaign of enlightenment as to the claims and needs of the schools, and, in general, shall promote in every way possible the cause of Christian Education in this state."

In harmony with, and in pursuance of, these provisions the Board at its quarterly session held in St. Louis, April 8 took action appointing a

committee of seven and calling a conference of representatives of all our Missouri Baptist institutions with a view to planning a unified budget and program for all our Missouri Baptist work for the year 1925. This conference composed of seven members of the Executive Board, two representatives of each of the educational and philanthropic institutions, and a number of invited pastors and leaders, met at Calvary Baptist Church, Kansas City, June 17 and 18. After much earnest thought, conference and prayer covering three full half-day sessions and one night session the conference tentatively adopted a budget and adjourned to meet again in Kansas City July 22. This adjourned session continued throughout the forenoon and a good part of the afternoon.

As a result of these deliberations the conference adopted a unified budget of \$750,250.00 for our next year's work. This amount was apportioned as follows: South-wide or general denominational objects, including Foreign Missions, Home Missions, theological seminaries, general hospital work and general old ministers' relief work, \$320,000; state-interests, \$430,250.00. The percentage of division between the South-wide or general objects and the state objects is: For general objects 42.5% and for state objects 57.5%.

According to the schedule adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention, the \$320,000.00 for South-wide or general objects is to be distributed as follows:

The fractional percantages have been figured exactly. It is impracticable to carry more than one decimal. It will be seen that the exact amounts differ very slightly from the amounts alloted.

As to the general principles and policies upon which this campaign is to be conducted, the conference heretofore referred to and the Board adopted the following statement:

- 1. That a simultaneous every-member canvass of every Baptist Church in Missouri be conducted from November 30 to December 7, 1924, for subscriptions to cover the needs of our several denominational interests and institutions for the calendar year 1925, ever keeping before our people the ideal of an annual increase over the former year's gifts.
- 2. That in this and future campaigns chief emphasis be placed upon the need for permanency in our financial plans through the practice of the Bible principles of stewardship and tithing.
- 3. That we recognize the right of individuals and churches to designate their gifts, but it is earnestly hoped that contributions will be made to the whole program. It is urged that pastors, denominational representatives and all others of our workers shall present the whole program and press upon the people the importance of unity in its support. If, notwithstanding, there be individuals who of their own accord wish their gifts to go to special objects and who indicate the same when the gift is made, such gifts shall not be charged against the sums allocated to the objects for which they are designated. Any solicitation of such gifts through this

Every-Member-Canvass will be regarded as a breach of comity and opposed to the spirit of the campaign. All designated gifts of individuals and churches made subsequent to and above the campaign pledge shall go to the causes for which they are designated without being charged against the percentage which these causes are due to receive from the general fund, but not as counting on the amounts already pledged by churches or on the total amount of the pledges of the members of the church. Bequests shall be considered as "subsequent" gifts.

- 4. We recognize, however, that participating institutions have the right to waive their further claims upon the budget funds when and as their needs set out in the budget may be met by designated gifts and that they are under moral obligation to exercise this right in the spirit of cooperation embodied in this unified effort by which we seek to meet the urgent needs and promote the interests of each of these institutions.
- 5. After the pledges shall have been taken in this simultaneous campaign, participating interests and institutions shall have the right of approach to individuals in soliciting funds, especially large gifts. This should be done in the spirit of unity and co-operation embodied in the campaign. In no case will participating interests and institutions be expected to appeal to the churches and their auxiliary organizations for offerings during the year, and no institution shall have more than one canvasser in addition to its official head.
- 6. That the Executive Board of Missouri Baptist General Association be empowered to put into effect plans for the promotion and conduct of this program, it being understood and emphasized that the representatives of each interest and institution to benefit by the campaign shall give themselves unreservedly to the campaign in co-operation with the Executive Board.
- 7. That the expenses incident to the campaign shall be pro-rated among the several participating interests and institutions according to the proposed allocation of funds.

It is a pleasure to report that in all of the conferences leading up to the adoption of this Unified Budget and Program for 1925 the greatest spirit of harmony and the deepest spirit of consecration and prayer prevailed. The budget was adopted with practical unanimity.

Acting under the instructions of the Board, the General Superintendent to the best of his knowledge and ability apportioned this total amount among the several district associations. The action of your Board in this matter has been received with practical unanimity and with a real spirit of joy and enthusiasm by the district associations assembled in their annual sessions. Almost without exception, they have adopted the apportionment

assigned and have pledged their most loyal support and their most unstinted effort to raise the whole amount. The total amount of the budget is much larger than anything we have done heretofore. But manifestly it is not beyond the ability of the 225,000 white Baptists in Missouri and, even if we raise the whole amount, as we hope and pray God we may do, it will fall far short of meeting the needs of our worthy and growing institutions. We recommend that the budget as herein presented be adopted subject to any readjustments that may be found necessary by any action that the General Association may take upon the report of the Educational Commission.

As is ignerally known throughout the denomination, it is proposed to have an Every Member Canvass in every church in the state during the week November 30 December 7 to secure weekly or monthly subscriptions to meet this budget. The thing can be done if we enter upon the task in a united and joyful way, trusting not to our own wisdom and strength but trusting to the wisdom and strength of the Holy Spirit, our Comforter and Guide. It will take much prayer and deep consecration and in many cases genuine sacrifice, but all these our Savior expects us to do and give for Him and for a lost world, and it ought to be our most joyful privilege to meet as far as it is humanly possible the expectation and obey the commands of our risen Lord.

Growing Spirit of Harmony and Co-Operation

We are exceedingly happy to be able to report that the year has been marked by a growing spirit of harmony and co-operation among all our Baptist forces throughout the state. Your Board cheerfully recognizes the Baptist principle of the complete autonomy and authority which is inherent in and remains with every New Testament church. Each Baptist church is and must forever remain free to decide all of its affairs and to determine for itself all questions of co-operation. This principle is fully recognized by the General Association. This is a matter about which Baptists have no need to contend in an unkindly spirit. On the other hand, it is the high privilege of every Baptist to co-operate with his church and of every Baptist church to co-operate with its district association and with its state-wide body. We cannot but hope that the time is near when all of our churches will recognize and exercise this privilege. To such course we fraternally invite all, believing that our Baptist life and work in Missouri will be greatly strengthened and promoted by the complete unity of all our people in their denominational activities. We would not coerce any Baptist church. We will not be unfriendly among ourselves about questions of co-operation but most cordially and lovingly we invite the fullest cooperation of all our Baptist forces in Missouri through the plans devised and carried forward by the General Association, which is glad to recognize itself not as the master of the churches but as their servant, and which is the expression of the co-operative spirit and life of Missouri Baptists.

Baptist co-operation is not at all a matter of sectional feeling or bias. With a true and intelligent Baptist, sectionalism has no place nor part in co-operation. His vision and purpose in the service of Christ are worldwide. To realize his vision and accomplish his purpose, he co-operates with his Baptist brethren. It is always a happy thing and contributes greatly to the harmony and efficiency of our people if this co-operation can be full, complete and regular.

Business Methods

Your Board pursues a policy of wise and strict business methods. The bookkeeping is carefully done by an expert bookkeeper and accountant and all moneys are carefully handled and promptly remitted each month to the object or institution for which they are intended. The General Superintendent, the Treasurer and the Bookkeeper are under bond for the faith. ful performance of their duties and for the proper handling of all funds. We regard ourselves as stewards of a sacred trust and we administer the trust with scrupulous care. We recognize that no business should be conducted in a more careful and prompt manner than the Lord's business. We have recently begun the publication through the Word and Way of all receipts coming into our hands. This policy will be continued and either monthly or quarterly a table of receipts will be published, listing the names of all the churches and giving the amount contributed during the period, the amount previously reported and the total amount for the year. We have no secrets and we believe that all of our people are entitled to all the facts concerning every phase of the work. The support of all Baptist enterprises must be on the voluntary basis and must come from the Christian sympathy and hearty good will of the people. This sympathy and good will cannot be elicited unless the people have full information upon which they may base full confidence in the wisdom, integrity and faithfulness of all our administrative agencies.

Keeping The Books Open

Knowing that we had a great task before us if we were to realize our hopes and clear away the deficit which the Board has been compelled to report for several years and to have an open way for the greater undertakings ahead, the Board decided to keep the books open until the close of banking hours October 15, in order that the churches might have two weeks more in the moneyed season and the season of business activity in which to gather up and forward their offerings. This we have done and our financial reports runs from October 1, 1923, to October 15, 1924. In the opinion of your Board this will not in any way interfere with or reduce

the offerings for the next year. As is well known, and as is sadly true, following each annual session there is a relaxing of effort and a decrease in receipts. This ought not to be and will not be when we shall have been able thoroughly to establish and consistently and efficiently work the budget system. As the figures in our financial report will show, the decision of the Board in closing the fiscal year fifteen days later is shown to be altogether a wise and happy action.

Finances

In a sense, the climax of the report of every mission board is its financial exhibit. We herewith present a full report of the receipts and disbursements of the office by the General Superintendent and the report of Treasurer Lex McDaniel, together with the auditor's certificate. We also present the report of J. W. Tims, Treasurer of the Missouri Baptist Assembly. We ask for them careful study. The story of our receipts and disbursements and the outcome for the year is a short, . simple, joyful story. We have gone over the top with a goodly cash balance in the treasury. The deficit of recent years on the department of State Missions has been entirely wiped out and we close the year with \$3,199.38 cash on hand. For this great victory we praise God and thank our worthy and noble pastors and churches. It is to the Lord and to the Lord's redeemed that praises and thanksgiving are due. A comparison will show that in every department we have made substantial gains. As already recited the gain to Home and Foreign Missions for the Southern Baptist Convention year just closed was approximately 100 per cent. For State Missions we received \$63,417.85 as against \$41,091.45 for the previous year, or a gain of 54 per cent. In the total cash received, contributed from all sources for all objects, leaving out amounts given by the Home Mission Board and the Sunday School Board to our co-operative work, our receipts for the year have been \$252,407.69 as against \$157,742.05 for the previous year, or a gain of 60 per cent. Total amount of cash handled through the office this year \$268,551.57 as against \$172.936.15 for the previous year, or a gain of 55 per cent. These comparisons are made only for our encouragement and not for the disparagement of any man, nor to the credit of any other man. The signal gain we have made is just an earnest of the still larger things that the Baptists of Missouri are able to do and, we believe, under God shall be glad to do.

This balance is already consumed in a large measure by the obligations of the current month. The demands of the work continue to press upon us without cessation and with increasing force. Missouri is a great state and a great mission field. According to best and most reliable estimates, more than two million of her population make no profession of faith. To this vast population our Baptist people must carry the Baptist message. The cash balance which we report should prove a mighty incentive to increased effort and sacrifice.

The year has been one of constant and diligent effort not only on the part of your Board, but on the part of a great host of pastors and churches. Throughout our great state there is an increasing number of pastors and members who are consecrating themselves unto the Lord and to the labors of His Kingdom with more definite purpose and more resolute will than ever before. Difficulties there are; human nature, even redeemed human nature, is selfish and sometimes obstinate; the world, the flesh and the devil still exist; the battle between good and evil waxes warm in the land; the banner of Christ and the flag of Satan are lifted up in mortal combat; the hosts of each go marching on. Thank God that such a mighty host, follows in the train of our Lord and that with increasing valor they do battle for Him. Our task will not be completed until Satan is completely routed and the "King," doms of this world shall have become the Kingdom of our Lord and His Christ." May He, in the riches of His grace and the fulness of His power, hasten that day. "Forgetting the things which are behind and stretching forward to the things which are before," let us "press on toward the goal unto the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL AND B. Y. P. U. DEPART-MENT FOR THE YEAR ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 1924

It is with a deep sense of gratitude for the goodness of God that we come to report the work of this department during the year just past. His hand has been ever guiding, challenging us to greater zeal and more determined efforts. In the very nature of the case many triumphs of teaching the Word must go unrecorded.

This has been a busy and blessed year. The demands of the work in the office have been very great. Sometimes it has seemed as if it were impossible to attend to the many details in connection with correspondence, the issuing of awards and supplying literature needed by our people. Invitations from the field have been so numerous that we have been able to accept only a few of them and our hearts have been heavy because of the many opportunities to help which we have had to decline.

Our Elementary Secretary, Miss Pansy Gray, resigned and left the field January I. She was succeeded June 1 by Miss Geane Roop, who came to take up the work of the Elementary Secretary and has given herself unstintedly to work on the field since that time. It seems impracticable to set down in detail in this report the activities of your Secretaries and we accordingly devote the time and space to the following important features of the work.

Fellowship in Service

We gratefully acknowledge the assistance of an increasing number of pastors, Sunday school superintendents, B. Y. P. U. presidents and other workers who have given wholeheartedly of their time and efforts in training schools, institutes, and summer assemblies in the promotion of Sunday school and B. Y. P. U. work, as well as in the fine co-operation in their churches, during this past year. Without the beautiful fellowship of this help the achievements herein set out would be impossible.

The B. Y. P. U. Work.

The past year has seen a steady growth in the number of our B. Y. P. U.'s. The records of this department show that during the past year we have had 857 Seniors, 117 Intermediates and 211 Juniors. In addition to these which have been recorded with the department, there have been many new unions organized and are yet unrecorded. There are now only two District Associations in the entire state that do not have one or more B. Y. P. U.'s.

Along with the creation of new B. Y. P. U.'s, it has been a source of encouragement to see the growth in efficiency among the existing unions. This has been indicated from quarter to quarter as we have seen the Honor Roll bearing the names of unions that have made a perfect record in Bible Reading, Study Course, Systematic Giving, Attendance and Tithing increase from quarter to quarter. These Honor Rolls now carry the names of almost one hundred individual B. Y. P. U.'s that have made a perfect record during the past quarter in one or more items.

Another indication of the desire for more efficient work has been the growth in the study of Methods. In spite of the fact that we observed the second week in March as B. Y. P. U. Study Course Week, the reports from classes studying Methods continue to come into this office almost daily, so that the issuing of B. Y. P. U. diplomas and other awards occupy a considerable part of the time of the office secretary.

The State B. Y. P. U. Convention

The State Convention was organized three years ago at Arcadia. Heights for the purpose of fostering and promoting the best ideals in B. Y. P. U. work, with the expectation that the affairs of the convention should be directed in the largest measure by the young people themselves. The 1924 session of the convention met at Arcadia Heights and was well attended. It was declared an unqualified success.

The aims of the convention for the ensuing year are in every way worthy of the fine young Baptists of Missouri. The next session of the State Convention will be held at Springfield, April 16-19, 1925.

Our Summer Assemblies

During the past summer the following assemblies met in regular session: Jewell, Interstate, Ozark, Missouri Baptist and Van Buren. The at-

tendance at the assemblies this year was up to the standard of past years and the work done was of the very highest order.

In these assemblies practically all of the books of the Sunday School Normal Course, the B. Y. P. U. Study Course and the W. M. U. Training Course were taught. In addition, many helpful conferences were conducted, bringing the young people of the state into contact with a not inconsiderable number of our finest leaders and workers. Plans are being made for the 1925 session of all the assemblies and if conflict in date may be avoided we can look forward to another year of very fruitful assembly work.

The Rural Campaign

In accordance with the plans of the Executive Board, this department conducted during the months of June, July and August, a campaign for Sunday school and B. Y. P. U. work in rural churches. Under the terms of the plan we furnish a well trained and equipped worker to associations co-operating. This worker spent three months on the field visiting the churches, teaching one or more books of the training course, taking a religious census, assisting in reorganizing the Sunday school for more efficient work, installing the Six-Point Record System, organizing B. Y. P. U.'s, and doing whatever was possible in promoting the work in the churches.

Twelve associations co-operated, calling for the services of thirteen workers. These workers reached 116 country churches, spent a total of 1,805 hours in class work and issued 1,611 awards. The total cost of the campaign was \$2,937.77. Of this amount the Sunday School Board contributed \$1,468.88, the co-operating associations \$797.50 and the State Board \$692.39.

Since the country church is such an important factor in the work and life of our denomination, and since so large a part of our total membership is made up of country people, we ought to undertake a larger work during the next year for our country churches. For immediate and permanent returns we could hardly make a better investment than to place a worker in each of fifty associations for a term of three months during 1925.

Our Sunday School Work

The work with the Sunday schools during the past year has been highly gratifying because we have seen a healthful increase in Sunday school enrollment and attendance. The development of big Sunday schools in many sections of the state is the outgrowth of careful study of the Sunday school opportunities of the community and of the best methods for building the Sunday school.

Sunday schools in fifteen of our churches during the past year have had an enrollment of at least one thousand each. Contributing to the building of great Sunday schools has been the study of the Sunday school by departments. This development of the department idea is showing us the constituency for the Sunday schools and is building the best organization for reaching and enlisting the constituency. The coming of the department Sunday school is contributing very largely to efficiency in teaching, as well as in enlisting the pupils. Our Sunday school enrollment has been increased somewhat also by the organization of new Sunday schools so that we now have just about 1,700 schools and mission schools in the entire state.

Teacher Training Points The Way

By Teacher Training we mean the training of all the officers and workers who have to do with the Sunday school. The Normal Course of the Sunday School Board has been enlarged and strengthened so that it now offers the opportunity for every worker in the Sunday school to study his own task in relation to the whole school.

While Teacher Training work is an educational process, its growth has been rather rapid and Missouri is coming to have an enviable place among Southern Baptists in Teacher Training. The hope of this department is that we may soon take the lead in the number of Sunday school awards issued from month to month by the Sunday School Board. This would seem to be only a reasonable anticipation since large numbers of our pastors and other leaders are joining in the effort to train their workers.

We are now happy to report that Missouri Baptist schools are unanimous in their co-operation in the Teacher Training program. When all these schools have thoroughly established their Teacher Training work we may look for yet larger showing in the way of Sunday school awards than we have been able to make thus far. With the co-operation of all of our forces the other states of the convention will have to be very busy or we shall take the leading place in this important phase of our work.

Our Sunday Schools and The Standard of Excellence

As Teacher Training work progresses the Standard of Excellence is coming to be better understood and appreciated and more of the schools are really striving to reach its requirements. The requirements on preaching attendance, the use of Bibles in the school and Normal Course diplomas are now challenging the best efforts of many Sunday schools.

During the whole of the year 1923 we had nine schools that were approved as standard. During the nine months of this year the following eighteen schools have been approved and placed on the Honor Roll:

Aurora; Billings; Calvary, Hannibal; Centralia; Chariton; Glasgow; Dry Pork; Jack; Ellington; Fifth Street, Hannibal; Farmington; Harrisburg, Leadwood; Marionville; Mt. Pleasant; Charity; Mt. Vernon; Park, Brookfield; Selmore; Ozark; Senter, Humansville; Victor; Anutt.

The Future

. While we rejoice in the progress of the past, we would not be blind to the fact that one third of the constituency of the Baptist schools in the state are unreached and one half of the churches in the state have no B. Y. P. U. for the training of the young members. This ought to challenge us to the building of better church houses, to the enlarging of our working forces and to the utmost efforts to enlist them, to teach them and to win them for the Lord.

We would expect during the year to come to have at least twice as many of our people doing Teacher Training work as we have had during the past year. We would hope to see many of our Sunday schools greatly enlarged and made more effective. We would hope to have at least fifty Sunday schools reaching the requirements of the First Standard of Excellence and a number of the larger schools working toward the requirements of the Advanced Standard. We would hope to see B. Y. P. U.'s organized in at least 1,500 of our churches, with associational organizations for Sunday school and B. Y. P. U. work in every association in the state. The Lord has blessed us in the past and is leading us on to greater service for the future.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Mrs. J. G. Reynolds, Cor. Sec. Miss Viola Beagle, W. M. U. Young People's Leader

It is with feelings of deepest gratitude to our Heavenly Father for His gracious and manifold blessings of the year that has passed that we present the report of the Woman's Missionary Union department of our state work. We have not traveled the road of our service at a rapid pace, nor have we found the way of our feet easy going, but progress along many lines has been made and a growing spirit of interest and unity in our task is manifest in every quarter of the state.

Organization

V On Monday, Oct. 29, in Brookfield, there was held the first annual meeting of the Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Missouri

Baptist General Association, organized one year ago in the belief that Missouri Baptist women so organized could become in a more vital way a true helper to that body. The officers are chosen from the women members of the Executive Board of the General Association in order that there shall continue to be perfect unity in program and policies.

For purposes of fellowship and inspiration, District Associations have been so grouped as to form six Divisions in the state with a chairman of each who co-operates with the President and Corresponding Secretary of the Union in developing the work in her Division. Last spring a meeting of two days duration was held in each Division with the Corresponding Secretary and Young People's Leader in attendance at each, except one in which the Young People's Leader could not be present. Miss Blanche Sydnor White, Field Worker of the Woman's Missionary Union, S. B. C., contributed greatly to the worth of these meetings by her inspiring messages and participation in the conferences. The roads and the weather were unfavorable to a large attendance, but more than a thousand women from forty-three associations were brought together in these groups and encouraged in the work.

In fifty-six of the District Associations there are Associational Woman's Missionary Union organizations for the purpose of promoting and developing W. M. U. ideals and work in the association. Two of these were organized during the past year. In twenty-four other Associations we have from one to four Women's Missionary Societies. There are seven District Associations in which we have no organization. Of the 593 Women's Missionary Societies in the state, 44 of them were organized last year. There are full graded unions in 19 of our churches, which means a Woman's Missionary Society, a Young Woman's Auxiliary, a Royal Ambassador chapter, a Girls' Auxiliary and a Sunbeam Band in working order. There are 342 other missionary societies fostering one or more of the Auxiliaries and we report, with regret, 254 societies fostering none of these organizations for the young people in their churches.

It gives us pleasure to report eighteen A-1 societies, these having attained the ten points of the Standard: The Ann Judson Circle, Kennett; LaGrange, Shelbina, Charleston, Rockport, Fredericktown, Holt, Metz, Farmington, Marble Hill, California, Higginsville, Mayview, Lexington, Union (Saline), Fairville (Saline), Slater, and McCroskie Creek, (Mo. Valley.)

Another link in our organization would we give brief mention. When we adopt our plan of work for the year it becomes the working basis for each local and associational organization and State Headquarters is constituted the center where the attempt is made to preserve unity of effort in our program, furnish information about the work, record results in our march and supply inspiration along the way. Statistical figures tell a

small part of the story. It takes some use of the imagination to clothe them with life and energy and persistent effort which they represent. The following may suggest at least a faithful effort on the part of the W. M. U. office to stimulate, inform, enlist and conserve our Baptist strength for our denominational program:

Information

For intelligent missionary activity, there must be training along the way, Interest and enlistment are dependent largely upon information and the purpose of missionary knowledge is to fit us to render intelligent and wholehearted service in Kingdom work. Bible and mission study is a prominent feature of Woman's Missionary Union ideals. Bible study from the viewpoint of its missionary messages primarily, though not a few of our societies are using general outlines in their study classes. Reports from 318 mission study classes have come to State Headquarters, and 388 certificates, 585 small seals, 72 official seals and 1 First and 1 Second Honor certificates were awarded in our women's societies last year. Many of our women were in the stewardship study classes conducted in our churches last year, mainly for the sake of influence since the book taught has been in our course of study for several years. We have profited, however, by the stewardship impetus thus given for 1211 new tithers reported.

In four of our summer assemblies full graded W. M. U. mission study classes were conducted, with an enrollment of over 500. The Woman's Missionary Union. S. B. C., graciously gave to us the services of Mrs. Maud R. McLure, former principal of W. M. U. Training School, Louisville, for the Jewell Assembly, and Miss Blanche Sydnor White, Field own communities helping the poor, comforting the sorrowing, encourage Worker, for Arcadia Heights.

No small part of our missionary training is found in the more than 5,000 subscriptions to Home and Foreign Fields, Royal Service and Missionari Baptist Bulletin, with the addition of other missionary publications and our State paper. Missionary news fresh from the fields and up-to-date information about denominational activities produce enthusiasm for the work and a steady step together in the ongoing of the program.

From the thought of missionary intelligence we turn naturally to our girls preparing for life service in our training schools and find we have only one from Missouri in the Louisville Training School, 9 in Fort Worth, Texas, and — in Baptist Bible Institute, New Orleans. It is a pleasure to record, also, that Woman's Missionary Union, S. B. C., provides scholarships in our colleges for the children of our foreign missionaries and assigns to each state a certain number of these students to "Mother" in the far-away absence of their parents. Missouri's three, so to care for, are children of Missouri missionaries and are in colleges in our state, one at Stephens and two at William Jewell.

Intercession

Acquaintance with the world's needs and the greatness of the missionary undertaking brings the realization that resources and strength beyond our own must be drawn upon for supply. The W. M. U. calendar of prayer comes as an aid in the ministry of prayer and books on prayer in our study courses direct us to the way of real prayer and quicken the sense of responsibility and privilege of becoming intercessors in the Kingdom. The special seasons of prayer in January, March and September for Foreign, Home and State Missions are times of spiritual uplift to the women who give themselves to the service and surely bring blessings upon the work.

Personal Service ,

When we know and pray, the impulse surely comes to do and our women are finding more and more the joy of Christ-like living in their own communities helping the poor, comforting the sorrowing, encouraging the down-hearted, winning the lost, and taking active interests in all conditions touching the welfare of women and little children. Their hearts have gone out in tenderest sympathy to the sick and aged and orphans in our institutions and they have supplemented money gifts with boxes of clothing and fruits, preserves and jellies. Neither have they forgotten the hospital set for the ministry of healing in the Orient and white cross supplies have gone regularly to the hospital assigned to Missouri. Nor has the crying need in Russia gone quite unheeded, for bundles of clothing valued at almost \$1,000.00 are now on the way to give warmth and comfort.

Contributions

We are prone to measure success in terms of dollars and cents and find uppermost in our minds the question, "How much did we give?" We cannot answer as satisfactorily as we could wish since the amount is based largely on credits instead of accurate accounts. Every member of a Woman's Missionary Society and Young Woman's Auxiliary is expected to

make and pay her pledge to missions in and through her church and in our organizations, with few exceptions, no record is kept of amounts so pledged. By the action of the Executive Board when the united apportionment plan was agreed upon, one-third of the amounts contributed to missions are credited to the women's societies. According to this system we are credited this year with \$69,639.16. This is one-third of the money given for foreign and home missions and the state mission contributions from the churches.

Reports were received from only about one-third of our societies, but those reports record the sum of \$20,739.30 in special offerings. Some of these amounts are doubtless counted in the total above, but were given in addition to what they gave through the regular church channels.

For White Cross supplies and personal service work they expended \$1,611.70 and gave \$5,407.81 in box values to missionaries, Orphans' Home, Home for Aged Baptists and the Baptist Sanitarium. This does not include what the women of either Kansas City or St. Louis are doing for these institutions or other local charities. The estimate, we believe, is below fact when we present the total of our contributions as being in cash \$91,590.16 and box values \$5,407.81. We heartily welcome a unified budget, we willingly accept a united apportionment, we will cheerfully assist in an every member canvass, but we earnestly request that every woman's society and young woman's auxiliary keep a record in their organizations of the annual pledges made by the women, that these figures may be determined with more certain accuracy.

Young People's Organizations

The joy and hope of the Woman's Missionary Union are her auxiliaries and the report of the W. M. U. Young People's Leader, is herewith submitted:

It is said that a friend once asked the great composer, Haydn, why his church music was so full of gladness, and he answered, "I cannot make it otherwise."

Our hearts should be full of gladness today as we think of the opportunities we as members of the W. M. U. have of instilling into the lives of boys and girls the knowledge that this world can be made a better place in which to live only as the Spirit of the Master is taken into their lives. Our boys and girls are looking to the older members of the W. M. U for leadership. May we lead them gladly because we cannot do otherwise.

Gladly do we report 56 new W. M. U. Young People's organizations, thus making a total of 107 Y. W. A.'s, 89 G. A.'s, 30 R. A. Chapters and 116 Sunbeam bands. Just as gladly do we report 25 A-1 so-

cieties, even though we should love to have seen many more reaching every point on the Standard of Excellence.

How eagerly we are looking forward to the time when every boy and girl shall have the privilege of a mission study class during the year. There have been 240 Y. W. A. certificates and seals granted this year, 77 G. A. certificates and seals, 65 R. A. certificates and seals and 214 Sunbeam certificates and seals. Earnestly are we looking forward to a much larger report this new year.

This report would be almost endless were we to try to tell of the organizations doing Personal Service work. But we know that many hearts have been gladdened the past year by the thoughtful, loving deeds of our boys and girls and many of our young people have found their sweetest joy as they have led their friends to the Master.

Last year we reported 4 of our Baptist Colleges, with College Y. W. A.'s, three of which were on the college Y. W. A. Honor Roll. We are happy to add one more to our list. William Jewell College has recently organized an enthusiastic Y. W. A. We hope our women who have daughters in our colleges will urge them to uphold the Y. W. A. in every way, for we are counting especially on our young women in our colleges to soon take important places in the ranks of our W. M. U.

Particularly proud are we of our Young Woman's Missionary Unions. We now have Young Woman's Missionary Unions in most of our larger cities and we are hoping that before another year shall pass we shall have these Young Women's Missionary Unions in many of our associations. It was the privilege of your Young People's Leader, this past year, to attend the assemblies at William Jewell College, Baptist Hill and Arcadia-Heights. At William Jewell she conducted the story hour for the children. At Baptist Hill she taught the mission study class for the young women and at Arcadia Heights she taught the mission study class for the girls.

Now, as we face another year, let us take a glimpse of the possibilities for service among the young people. Instead of 107 Y. W. A.'s, may not we have 150? Instead of 89 G. A.'s, does not 125 seem quite possible? It makes our hearts a bit sad to know there are only 30 R. A. Chapters in Missouri; 75 Royal Ambassador Chapters by October, 1925, should be our goal. Again a tinge of sadness comes to our hearts as we read 116 Sunbeam Bands. Every W. M. S. should be fostering a Sunbeam Band and we hope this may be true this year.

Additional Items

- 1. Our church at Bethany has gone to full time preaching. Through the year the membership was more than doubled. A recent revival was held with several additions. The church raised for all purposes something over \$2,700. In community influence and power she is growing. She hopes to be self supporting in the very near future.
- 2. At Lancaster our church has secured Rev. S. W. Brandon as pastor for half time. Properly directed it will go to full time preaching some of these days. Queen City is also considering Brother Brandom. This will make a fine combination.
- 3. Our revival at Gilman City was a decided victory. The weather was very unfavorable during the entire time. There were nine professions, and ten additions to the church. A new house of worship was an objective also. The church is busy right now raising the necessary money for its construction.
- 4. Unionville, Browning, Milan, Green City, and Downing are pastorless. All are important centers. The secretary is endeavoring to help these churches and is pushing the work with cautious haste.
- 5. Ludlow church has a pastor now. The work is half time and the pastor lives on the field. Rev. Grant Jones is the man called. He is a denominational worker.
- 6. Our church at Warrensburg is going well. Rev. R. L. Payne is the pastor and is well liked. An up-to-date basement has been put under the meeting house. It furnishes a large auditorium, eight fine class rooms, and a good kitchen. The pastor is called for a period of five years.
- 7. Maryville church is pastorless. Brother C. C. Cunningham is assisting the church in a fine way and will soon have a pastor located. The Board must keep its eye on Maryville.
- 8. The church at Gallatin under Brother O. L. Wood is gaining every way. In these days she is making herself felt for the Kingdom throughout the entire county and association.
- 9. The secretary made 19 district associations. In all of these he was given a fine hour and a hearty welcome. All endorsed the Unified Budget for 1925 and all save two accepted their apportionment. The committee of one was unwilling to recommend its apportionment; and the other reduced its apportionment somewhat. I feel certain that the first will get back of its amount. Anyway the secretary will do all in his power to get the association to raise it.

Some Reflections

- 1. Our church at Grant City is anxious to go to full time work. Brother S. Riggs is the pastor. The Board will do well to assist in this undertaking. Grant City is an important center.
- 2. The likelihood is the Board will be asked to assist in the work at Lancaster and Queen City. Lancaster is a county seat and is important. The secretary recommends this aid.
- 3. Maryville may call for aid. In case it does, the Board will find the investment worth while.
- 4. Our enlistment work must be pushed with all possible haste. Virtually two-thirds of our churches are unenlisted. This sleeping giant we must awaken for the Kingdom.
- 5. Revivals, searching revivals, must sweep the entire state. And these revivals constructive.
- 6. The secretary has enjoyed the year's work. On every hand he found open doors and constructive service.

LA GRANGE COLLEGE

J. W. Crouch, President

By the favor of God and the co-operation of the Baptist brotherhood La Grange College has added another successful year to its useful history. Our chief glory is in the kind of Kingdom service we have been able to render during all these years. Our chief aim is to render larger service of the same kind.

The following record of attendance shows the growth of our work since our re-organization in 1919:

The attendance during any one term of the above years would be approximately half the enrollment for the entire year. This is due to the fact that the enrollment for the summer terms consists largely of a different group from those who attend during the fall and winter sessions. The largest attendance at any one time was during the last summer, which was one hundred seventy-three.

The enrollment for the present semester is one hundred forty-eight. Of these twenty-two are ministerial students. These young preachers continue to perform a large denominational service in Northeast Missouri. They furnish from thirty to forty churches with pastors and each year hundreds are converted and added to the membership of the churches under their ministry.

Another supremely important feature of the work of La Grange College is the training under Baptist influences of teachers for our public schools. This work is fully accredited by the state department of education toward teachers certificates. Not less than one hundred and fifty who were students of the College during the last year are now teaching in the public schools. The reports of fine christian influence and work of many of these teachers in their schools and in their churches is a source of great encouragement.

The greatest asset of La Grange College is the fine christian atmosphere maintained by the faculty, student body and the local church. The Y. W. A. of A·1 rank, under the leadership of the pastor's wife, continues its excellent work. Another earnest group compose the Volunteer Band. The spirit of co-operation between the church and college is more delightful and helpful. The participation of the students in the services of the church is highly satisfactory.

During the year a commodious gymnasium has been built. This has long been a real need and we expect it to be a large factor in our future work and growth.

There is pressing need for the improvement and enlargement of our administration building, for large dormitories, and for increased income with which to enlarge the number of courses in our curriculum.

SOUTHWEST BAPTIST COLLEGE

J. C. Pike, President

It is with a feeling of profound gratitude that we come with our annual report to the Association. The blessings of the Father and the support of the denomination have been ours in large measure.

The enrollment for the session of 1923-24 reached a total of 282, an increase of nearly 40 per cent. Our ministerial enrollment reached 66, being an increase of exactly 100 per cent. When to this is added a large number of volunteers for special service and wives of ministers, we feel entirely safe in saying that Southwest Baptist College was last year the largest Baptist training camp in Missouri.

We ran a very successful summer term, enrolling 225 therein. Not counting duplicate names our individual enrollment for the year reached 465.

Present Enrollment

The present enrollment is 236. Of this number 56 are ministerial students, an increase of 11 over the corresponding period of last year. The enrollment in the college proper shows an increase of 20 over the same time last year.

Needs

We can simply reiterate from the last report the statement that "Our problem is not one of securing students," though we are ever anxious for them. "It is one of funds for buildings, equipment, endowment and teach-

ing force." We have begun an effort for a combination chapel and gymnasium. Other buildings must follow, if we at all meet the needs of our field.

Unified Budget

The school joins most heartily with our other institutions in the support of the unified budget. We trust that the day is at hand when our Baptist hosts in Missouri will present a united front in the support of christian education from the Baptist standpoint.

WILL MAYFIELD COLLEGE

- A. F. Hendricks, President

In October, 1923, the College, by authority and under the direction of the State Mission Board, launched a campaign for \$100,000 for the purpose of erecting a new building, repairing old ones, and installing a central heating plant and water system. The campaign was set up for the week of December 2-9, at which time the subscriptions were taken. The results of the campaign were small in money but large in getting the school and its work deeply impressed upon the hearts of the people.

A central heating plant has been constructed, water placed in all the buildings, an addition built to Mayfield Hall, much repair work done, and a new \$65,000 building three-fourths completed. It is now believed that the building will be completed and equipped before the beginning of the second semester.

According to "Teacher Training" published by the Sunday School Board, Will Mayfield gave last year 20 of the 21 Blue Seals, and 223 of the 496 awards given in the colleges in the State. The ministerial students are serving the churches of Southeast Missouri in a very efficient way both as pastors and supplies.

The enrollment has constantly increased for three years. The registration for the regular term last year was 178 and the summer term 176 making a total enrollment of 296 different students for the year. This year the registration has reached 178 which is a thirty per cent increase over the number enrolled at this time last year.

Twenty-four ministers and 8 ministers' wives are now enrolled. Twelve other young men and women are training for special Christian service. That is, 44 students are in training for Kingdom work.

The College has two immediate needs; namely, about \$35,000 to complete the present building and equipment program, and a student loan fund. A hundred students in Southeast Missouri are desirous of coming to Mayfield who cannot come without material help.

HARDIN COLLEGE

S. J. Vaughn, President

During the past year of 1923-24, Hardin College enrolled 295 students, approximately 200 of whom were boarding students. This exceeds the enrollment of any previous year and taxes the boarding capacity of the institution. The enrollment thus far this year is almost identically the same as at this date last year.

This increase in attendance these last two years has been made possible by the erection of the new dormitory, Richardson Hall, at a cost of \$130,000. The total valuation of the Hardin College property is now approximately \$450,000, wholly unincumbered by mortgage or bonded indebtedness.

The policy of Hardin College has always been to invest denominational money in permanent improvements that will year after year make the institution a more permanent and a more efficient instrument in the hands of the denomination. The experience of this institution seems to prove the wisdom of this policy, for never in its history has the College been so thoroughly and so unquestionably a Baptist asset as now. A larger percentage of Baptist girls have been in attendance the last two years than at any time in the past. A more genuine and effective spirit of co-operation exists between the College and the local Church than ever before.

The department of Religious Education, the first to be established in Missouri, and the very first ever established in a Junior College anywhere, has in the past year influenced our student life in a most remarkable and effective way. Almost the entire student body have elected courses in the Bible. These courses are taught by a Baptist preacher, trained and experienced in the work, a man of Godly life, rich scholarship, and sound thinking. The girls leave Hardin College with their faith strengthened and fortified, their vision and their thinking clarified, and their knowledge of the Bible and of the denominational tenets and program greatly increased and enriched.

The world will be saved by a knowledge of the Word of God, quickened and fired by the love of Jesus Christ in the heart, and effectively translated into the acts and thoughts and aspirations of everyday life. To this end, Hardin College bends its every energy and asks your prayerful interest and assistance.

It may be of interest also to call your attention to the fact that ten years ago the equities in your properties at Stephens College were not sufficient to enable the Board of Curators to borrow the \$50,000.00 that was absolutely necessary at that time to keep the properties from being sold at public auction without signing the bonds and making them a personal obligation of individual members of the Board. Estimating your equities at that time at the very liberal sum of \$100,000.00 adding to that the amount donated from all outside sources, \$175,181.31 and deducting that amount from the present net equities indicated by the records of the certified accountants, you will find that the Board of Curators have through their own exertions increased these equities by the sum of \$428,955.86.

These figures are all the more striking if the comparisons be made between the \$53,938.72 contributed by the Baptists of Missouri during the period of the 75 million campaign and the 430 thousand dollar increase that has resulted from the business management of your Board of Curators.

The Appraisal Company whose report is submitted above was selected, employed and paid by Whitaker and Company, brokers, of St. Louis. Their figures may therefore be depended upon to be conservative. In view of these facts we respectfully ask whether in your judgment the Curators of Stephens College have been faithful to the trust imposed upon

them and further more whether the time has not come for the denomination to redeem the promises made to the college in 1870.

In the language of the proposal regarding the establishment of the Baptist State Female College afterwards known as Stephens College, that institution was founded by the General Association to be "A separate and distinct institution, to be endowed as richly and supported as amply," as the state college for boys.

The following from the minutes of the General Association 1869-1870, gives verbatim the record of the terms and conditions and the consideration upon which the College was established and under which it is still operating.

Quotations From Minutes of 1869.

The communication from Lexington in regard to a State Female College, was referred to the following brethren, to report at the next session, viz.: E. S. Dulin, W. R. Rothwell, L. B. Ely, R. H. Smith, S. C. Major. The Lexington brethren propose to raise ten thousand dollars to repair the former College and for the sanction and aid of the General Association to give them the privilege of annually appointing the Board of Trustees.

Report of Committee on Schools and Colleges

Whereas, the Constitution of this body requires the Board of Ministerial Education to submit a report of their doings during the year, and that the Trustees of William Jewell College shall also report on the condition of that institution, your committee refer you to these two boards for information in regard to these two great interests.

As we know of no sex in the soul we therefore plead for as extensive and thorough intellectual culture for our daughters, as we provide for our sons. We cannot see why our daughters, possessed of equal mental abilities, should be robbed of their birthright by being denied equal advantages with our sons. Reason, justice, revelation—the position assigned to woman by her Creator—the sphere in which she moves—the fact that she is the first teacher of every generation—all combine to render it obligatory that enlarged provision be made for her mental development and education.

We believe the time has already come when we should rear a Female College—a college not in name but in fact, endowed as richly and supplied as amply as we contemplate doing for William Jewell College. We would have it a separate and independent institution, furnishing our daughters every facility that our universities furnish our sons. Other denomination will supply this need if we do not, and it will not be strange if our daughters find spiritual homes where they receive their mental culture.

We would therefore urge this subject, and beg that steps may be promptly taken to secure its consummation.

Quotation From Minutes of 1870

Your committee to whom was referred the communication from Lexington in regard to a State Female College beg leave to submit the following as their report:

1. Is such an institution needed at this time by the Baptists of Missouri?

We believe it is, for the following reasons:

First: At the last session of this body you adopted a report containing the following language, viz: "We plead for as extensive and thorough intellectual culture for our daughters, as we provide for our sons. We cannot see why our daughters, possessed of equal mental abilities, should be robbed of their birthright by being denied equal advantages. Reason, justice, revelation; the position assigned to woman by her Creator; the sphere in which she moves; the fact that she is the first teacher of every generation, all combine to render it obligatory that enlarged provisions be made for her mental development and education. We believe the time has already come when we should rear a Female College—a College, not in name but in fact—endowed as richly and supplied as amply as we contemplate doing for William Jewell College. We would have it a separate and independent institution, furnishing our daughters every facility that our universites furnish our sons." Such was the sense of this body at your last session.

Since that time, Blue River Association, one of the largest District Associations in Missouri, unanimously adopted a report which was submitted by a committee composed of brethren from thirty different churches, containing the following language: "We recommend that this Association urge upon the General Association the early establishment of a State Female College of a high order, equal to the best Female College in our land."

In adopting these reports, without one dissenting voice, these two bodies stand pledged to this great work.

Second: We believe that such an institution is needed, because parents are compelled to seek, out of their state, higher culture and larger

advantages for their daughters than can be obtained at home in our Denominational Schools.

Therefore, in addition to the schools which we now have, or may have of a similar grade, we should have a College equal to the best out of the state, and which will afford our daughters every facility for acquiring as thorough an education—literary, scientific and ornamental—as can be obtained elsewhere.

The mental training, which our daughters must have in order to be fitted for their Heaven appointed mission, can be had only in precisely such institutions as we have provided for our sons. An institution of learning, which perpetuates the name of an illustrious founder, which boasts of its good and great teachers, and which points to a long line of noble men who constitute its alumni-has lingering around it inspiring and ennobling associations; about its altars the spirit of the honored dead seem to linger, and along its silent halls the voices, which have been hushed forever, seem still to reverberate; to listen to the same instructors, study within the same walls, ramble amid the same scenes, occupy the same rooms, and kneel beside the same holy places where other human beings have equipped themselves to do great deeds and achieve a deathless fame, must of necessity awaken high and holy thoughts. Lofty aspirations, holy emotions, grand idéas and great thoughts are begotten amid such scenes and associations. And shall our sons receive honors, win rewards, earn distinctions, enjoy privileges and share instructions, and yet our daughters be excluded therefrom? If our daughters should form friendships as enduring as life; learn lessons never to be forgotten, and take enlarged views of human duties and human responsibilities they must enjoy similar advantages. In such institutions as attract to them young ladies, from all sections, of various talents and social positions, the advantages are of the highest importance in the development of manners and character, in compelling thought and in educating the heart. As William Jewell College is bringing together and forming our sons into one common brotherhood, so should a State Female College introduce our daughters to each other and send them forth an educated and consecrated sisterhood to exert an enlightened and holy, as well as deathless, influence upon the generation that will come after them.

Third: We believe such an institution is needed because the providence of God and the age in which we live make it the part of wisdom and justice to help our daughters forward to a higher standard of education, and to a more thorough course of study than they now enjoy. The great leading minds of the age have conceded that the "human soul has no sex." Revelation has made it evident that there is but "one commandment, one baptism, one condemmation, one redemption and one judgment. In all that concerns the existence and nature of the soul, the revealed law

has made no distinction between the sexes, and acknowledges none in the world to come. This is enough: it is decisive for all the purposes of the soul and of its future-human nature is one." The immaculate law of God contains no recognition of the idea that sex affects the attributes of spirit. Therefore sex should not be recognized as a reason for denying to woman an education, the very object of which is the improving of the soul and the effects of which must endure through all eternity. In all social and moral elements the sexes are equal before God, and therefore should be equal before man. The revelation of God and the law of men make it evident that it is but sheer justice that our daughters have an equal chance with our sons to mature whatever of intellect God has given them -it is their birthright to enjoy equal culture. It is refreshing that parents have at last made the discovery that a little moiety of knowledge, a few accomplishments, and a limited and defective course of study are crowding the world with empty-minded and hollow-hearted girls who are destitute of all the elements of womanly glory; unqualified for the sterner realities of life; unprepared to fulfil the higher duties of their spheres, and unfitted for the position which God intended them to occupy. Is it wise, is it honest, is it parental to thrust our daughters into the most solemn and responsible spheres in which immortal beings can possibly act, and where they must meet obligations and duties for which they are wholly unprepared? Think of what God's providence imposes upon woman; think of the awful responsibility that necessarily adheres to her; think of the far-reaching interest committed to her hands; think of the destinies of the race and the generation with which woman is entrusted; think of the influences which she must project onward through this life, and even into eternity, and which will never die; and then decide by your vote here today whether our daughters and the daughters of our children shall have a College in which to prepare for their heaven appointed mission.

Fourth: We believe such a College is wanted, because, in gathering the white and perishing harvest we need—absolutely need—educated, as well as sanctified, womanhood. If we admit that the master spirits, which have swayed the destinies of nations, moulded the ages in which they lived and ruled the world were developed by educated mothers; if we recall the fact that the English literature sent forth its most vigorous shoots under the shadow of a woman's throne; if we will remember that the pawned jewels of another woman secured to our race this western hemisphere; if we will remember that woman, by her peculiar constitution, sympathies, sensibilities, tenderness and nature is the first teacher; that she takes the whole work in its infancy, when most susceptible and most pliable, and makes, moulds, shapes and stamps it for weal or for woe; that she lays the foundations of human character with all its relations, interests and destinies; if we will but learn that the world's curse will never be lifted off from the race, until it shall be done by woman, the daughter of her who listened

to the serpent, and the daughter also of her who was "given as a bride to the Holy Ghost;" if we will remember all this, and more than this, we shall realize the magnitude, grandeur, solemnity and responsibility that surrounds the question before us. To elevate woman, develop her thinking faculty, expand her heart and help her forward to a more exalted future; is worthy of the loftiest ambition, exalted philanthropy and enlightened piety.

In 1840 Michelet said: "At this very moment there are in France 620,000 girls being brought up by Nuns under the direction of Priests. These girls will shortly be wives and mothers; and they will hand over to the Priests, as far as they are able, their sons and daughters." And how fearful, how startling is the fact, that the girls of today will hand over the next generation to a higher future or to a deeper degradation! Such is woman's influence; God has made it so, and to doubt it or fail to properly direct it will be as unwise as it is wicked. Out from eternity God, in His providence, is calling upon us to seize upon this mighty element and mould it for its heaven appointed mission.

The profound responsibilities, committed to us and made obligatory, render it our paramount duty to secure to our daughters a Female College, possessing ample grounds, buildings, library, apparatus, cabinets and, above all, an endowment sufficiently ample to procure the best teaching talents in the land. When we shall have done this, then—but not till then—we shall have discharged our obligations to our daughters; to the age in which we live, to the generation that shall come after us; and, above all, to the God, at whose judgment bar we must speedily stand and give an account for our stewardship.

II. Where shall this College be located?

We answer, at Lexington, by all means, if the greatest advantages and largest inducements are offered at that point.

Your committee would specially emphasize the necessity, that in locating this College we thoroughly comprehend the magnitude of this enterprise, both in its conservation and perpetuity.

Firstly: Ample grounds, not only for the present but for the future must be secured. We may commence with few and small buildings, but we must have room for enlargement as the years go by.

Secondly: The locality should be healthy beyond a single misgiving; it should be central and easy of access, and it should have around it a refined, educated and moral people.

Thirdly: Above all, it should be in the midst of brotherhood and sisterhood who will cheerfully care for our daughters while with them, and

who will also provide for them the most liberal religious privileges and instructions.

Therefore your committee recommend that all places, churches and Boards of Trustees desiring the College and possessing these local advantages be permitted to become competitors for it, and that the Association award it to that people who offer the most numerous inducements and the greatest amount of money to aid in its endowment.

When shall the location be made?

We believe it should be done at our present session.

First: Because if it be our duty to educate our daughters, it is our duty to set about this work now. Wealthy brethren, who can bear the expense of sending their daughters out of the state, where they can obtain higher culture and those brethren who believe that our present schools unfurnished, unsupplied and unendowed, are good enough for their girls, can afford to oppose immediate action; but the great mass of Baptist parents who are trying to educate their daughters cannot afford to delay, because they believe that imperative duty and impartial justice to their daughters, as well as fealty to Jesus, demand that this College be located now. With that man who can stint his daughter and bid her wait, while his son has privileges, we have no controversy-we refer him to that judgment bar where he must speedily stand with son and daughter and account for his unnatural partiality.

Secondly: Because building up a College for our daughters will not injuriously affect any other interests or keep back one dollar from the endowment of "the School of our Prophets." For there are brethren and sisters, too, who will give a very large portion of their wealth for the endowment of a Female College, who will not give to any other object. Shall we lose-can we afford to lose-so much when nothing will be gained by delay? This interest ought not, and will not, be antagonistic to any other; but on the other hand, it will be a deathless parent and an endless blessing to the Baptist daughters of Missouri. All of which is respectfully submitted.

E. S. DULIN S. C. MAJOR R. H. SMITH W. R. ROTHWELL Committee

On motion of Bro. E. S. Dulin, it was resolved that we now proceed to locate the Baptist Female College for the State.

Propositions being in order, the Curators of Baptist Female College, Columbia, offered their grounds and buildings, free of debt, and valued by them at \$35,000, to the General Association, provided they will adopathe same as the Denominational Female School of the State. Mr. J. L. Stephens also offered in connection with it, an endowment of \$20,000, with a conditional amount of \$12,500, total \$67,500.

A proposition was also received from the Lexington Female College offering college property valued at \$20,000 to the General Association on the preceding conditions. An offer of \$50,000 endowment was also made in connection with the above making a total of \$70,000.

An offer of the St. Louis Female College, near Jennings' Station, North Mo. Railroad, valued at \$13,000 was also made to the body.

On motion, Resolved, That we accept the offer made by the Curators of Baptist Female College at Columbia.

The resolution was adopted and the General Association of 1870 immediately appointed Curators for the College and proceeded to perfect its organization.

In bringing this matter again to your attention it is not the purpose of the Curators to embarrass in any way these denominational programs. The friends of Stephens College are insistent, however, upon knowing whether it is still the wish of this body that the promises made in 1870 shall be fulfilled.

WILLIAM JEWELL COLLEGE

H. C. Wayman, President

The school year of 1923-24 in many ways proved to be the most successful in the long history of William Jewell College. During the year there were two events which brought together large numbers of the Alumni and friends. The first was in November, the occasion being the Inauguration of President Wayman, at which time more than 1,000 of Alumni and friends gathered in the new auditorium of the Liberty Baptist Church. The other event was the celebration of the 75th birthday of William Jewell College. At this time again more than 1,000 people gathered for this celebration. Suitable exercises were held, Dr. Fruit giving

a brief sketch of the history of the College through the three-quarters of a century of faithful work.

The enrollment in the college for the year 1923-24 reached 418. This year we shall enroll 460 students in the College—an increase of about 50. This number is just twice the enrollment in the college five years ago. You can readily see that the Baptist people of the state are realizing more and more the advantages of a first class college education under Christian influence. This is as it should be and on behalf of the College I wish to thank our people for sending us their boys and girls.

Last year we had our first Summer Session. We enrolled more than one hundred teachers and all agreed that the Summer School was a success in every way. It is now the fixed policy of the college to have a Summer School of ten weeks.

We have been successful in collecting a little over half of the sum that was pledged during the 75 Million Campaign for Endowment. All of this money has been placed in our Endowment Fund and if we are successful in collecting the remainder, we shall then receive the gift of \$200,000 from the General Education Board of New York City. We do hope and pray that our people will help us so that we may secure this gift. If we are not thus successful in increasing our Endowment, it will be quite impossible for us to maintain our standard of scholarship even within the immediate future.

I might say further that we are in immediate need of a new chapel building. Several of the friends over the state have signified their willingness to help in this matter. This we appreciate but because of our great desire for the success of the Unified Budget, we are refraining from making any campaign to secure the building. We are hoping that some of the friends who have funds will feel moved upon to make a free-will offering to build this building.

Thirty-Ninth Annual Report

Come let us live with the children So shall their lives bring peace and joy to us So shall we begin to be, and become wise.

Vari-colored are the threads which enter into the fabric at the Home, but hands have been busy and purposeful in the effort to give direction to the work and sustain the interest of the workers.

This is the last year of the five year campaign, while all pledges were not paid in full, we appreciate what has been so cheerfully given to this service, whereby we have added a sleeping porch for the babies, and a sun-parlor for the boys; thus relieving the congestion in the dining room.

A fire escape has been placed on the west side of the Main Building, at a cost of Six Hundred and Nineteen Dollars.

Twenty-three trees have been planted up the drive-way; each member of the Board paying for one tree as a memorial."

We maintain the Main building with executive rooms, school rooms, dining rooms and kitchen on the first floor. Nursery, two dormitories, Matron's, Teacher's and Housemother's room on the second floor. Two dormitories for boys and a Guest Chamber and three rooms for helpers on the third floor.

The four cottages are gifts of friends as memorials for loved ones. One hospital, which is a source of help in contagion, such as measles, whooping couph and mumps.

Have you a birthday bank in your Sunday School? If not, we shall be glad to send you one free of charge. The children love to hear their money jingle.

A number of our boys are scouts. We paid One Hundred and Sixteen Dollars for their outfit. We feel this is money well invested. Some one has said: "Plant a dollar and save a soul."

They have a new ball field. Then we have new swings, garden seats, all things to contribute to the comfort of our little ones.

The children enjoyed a delightful Christmas. Friends from all parts of the State sent individual gifts. The Shriners brought out a large box of filled stockings, a box of candy and a separate gift for each child. The Burrall Class of Columbia sent two hundred filled stockings and individual gifts. All our city churches as usual visited the Home bringing fruit, toys candy and books.

These were anxious days for your Board of Managers—with our President, Mrs. Eilers in the Sanitarium critically ill. We are grateful for her recovery—and after a stay in California of three months we are happy to have her with us again, "All Hail to our Alma Mater."

Though these were trying weeks, Mrs. Monks, our Vice President, and Mrs. Gautier, our Treasurer, with the help of our efficient committees, many problems were solved.

Death claimed two of our faithful co-workers: Mrs. Newman Lee, of the Fourth Church, and Mrs. Horace Locke of the Water Tower Church. We have the assurance that "Our Heavenly Father Careth, and will supply all need."

The Board of Managers consists of forty-eight women elected from the various churches in St. Louis and County, and twenty-five members at large. As representatives are wanted from other churches, we recommend the appointment of a member by each association or church.

Expenses continue to soar. Monthly bills total from Twenty-five Hundred to Twenty-nine Hundred dollars. But for the endowment fund,

and the fact that our church societies and friends throughout the state generously supply canned fruit, vegetables and cookies, our little ones would feel neglected.

One Hundred and forty of our children enjoyed their annual treat at Forest Park, August 27th, when the Rotary Club entertained Twenty-two hundred Orphan children of our city and county. These noble men have discovered that "True happiness comes when you have given more than your tenth."

- Mrs. A. H. Eilers is entering her twenty-seventh year as president of this Board of Managers. Mrs. F. H. Dodge, her thirty-third year as recording secretary.
- Mrs. S. V. Monks, chairman of the admission committee, reports eight children placed in homes, four indentured. We receive orphans, half orphans, and children of needy parents.
- Mrs. Marshall Hall has secured two competent teachers for the Home. Thirty-four of the older children go out to the public school.
- Mrs. Edward Goecke, chairman of the house committee, reports all buildings in good condition.
- Mrs. J. W. Hill, chairman of supply reports our shelves show the demand made upon them. We need more vegetables and pickles. Thanking you in advance.
- Mrs. C. M. Shirley, chairman of committee on bedding reports one hundred sixty-six quilts, thirty comforts, one hundred seventy sheets and two hundred seventy-three towels received.
- Mrs. A. O. Young, chairman of clothing reports many wonderful gifts of dresses, hats, caps and sweaters.

TEMPERANCE

Your committee on Temperance respectfully submits the following report:

From every quarter of our land comes encouraging reports of the growing sentiment favoring the Eighteenth Amendment of our Constitution and the Volstead Law prohibiting the use or sale of intoxicating liquors.

Instead of the ruin predicted by the liquor interests on the eve of the adoption of this law, there has been great prosperity, increased construction in home building, larger bank deposits and savings accounts, with a more complete employment of laboring people than has been known in this country in years.

We have indeed witnessed a great victory, but the end of this struggle is not yet. There are some duties and some dangers at the present time, which should be seriously considered.

We do not believe that the big danger lies especially with the liquor interests, but we do believe there is serious danger in letting up on our own efforts to make this law effective, which condition might result in the law being resubmitted to the vote of the people and finally repealed. While no Constitutional Amendment has ever been repealed, such a thing is not impossible, should the amendment become unpopular or ineffective.

Our people should be informed as to the fruitful results obtained by strict observance and enforcement of this law, and in addition to this the right kind of men must be elected to public office, men who are in sympathy with prohibition and have the courage to enforce the law.

Dr. Samuel Z. Batten of Philadelphia, writing in recent editions of the "Word and Way," on "The Temperance Situation," uses the following words which we submit for your careful consideration. He says: "There is danger in false security. There is danger lest we rest in the mere fact of a written law and relax our work in education and agitation. There is danger lest a lax enforcement of this law cause people to lose faith in the possibility and practicability of prohibition. There is danger lest men effect a practical nullification of the Amendment by allowing a large proportion of alcohol. In fact there is cause for watchfulness lest the amendment be resubmitted and repealed. The unfinished task is a real one and calls for united effort."

Recognizing the great work which has been done and is yet being done by the W. C. T. U. and The Anti-Saloon League, we commend these organizations to the favor and loyal support of our pastors and people. Harris, prepared a small folder giving the life, history and purpose of this corporation and had about 20,000 copies printed and the most of them have been mailed to our ministers and other Baptists of the state who are interested in this work, by our corresponding secretary, John S. Jesse, who has been faithful in collecting pledges, answering letters and assisting the work in many ways.

Your Board has been diligent in the work and not one of them receives a cent of salary. The only money expended is for the salary of the corresponding secretary, postage, printing, etc. We regret to say that the amount of money we have at our command is not enough to meet the demands of those who depend upon us for help, and we feel like our good Baptists should see to it that they are better provided for.

The resolution concerning the "Teaching of the Bible in Public Schools," was recommitted to the Committee to be re-written. The resolution concerning the "Establishment of a Baptist Hospital in the western part of Missouri," was referred to the State Executive Board instead of a committee of three as suggested by the Resolutions Committee. On motion, the report of this committee, as amended, was adopted.

RESOLUTIONS

'I. Whereas: It is commonly reported and we have reason to believe that there are teachers in our public schools, including our higher institutions of learning in the state of Missouri, who are teaching that the Bible is not the inspired word of God, and that attacks are being made upon our evangelical faith therefore,

Be It Resolved by the Missouri Baptist General Association that we deplore such a condition and condemn such practice in any school that is supported by taxation.

And Be It Further Resolved that the moderator appoint a committee of three to confer with other evangelical bodies for the purpose of securing their assistance and co-operation in working for the passage of a law at the earliest possible date prohibiting any act or word of irreverance or disrespect of the Bible before the children in the public schools.

And Be It Further Resolved that we request and encourage our pastors and delegates to use their influence against the practices referred to above and that they encourage their representatives to favor the enactment of such laws as are necessary in this respect.

II. Whereas: Missouri Baptists owe a great debt to the Sears Name for the life long service of Rev. P. M. Sears and to his son the late Will Sears, who gave more than thirty years of his life to China, and,

Whereas: The Baptists of Prairie Hill, the home of Rey. P. M. Sears, and birthplace of Will Sears, are erecting a Sears Memorial Church building and

Whereas: Many Missouri Baptists may desire to have a part in this serviceable and durable memorial therefore

Be It Resolved: That this body heartily indorse the erection of the Sears Memorial church building and encourage the pastors and churches to give a sympathetic hearing to the cause of this church for assistance in this building project.

III. Whereas: "The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention entered into an agreement with the Near East Relief that on the 18th day of January, 1925, or a date approximate thereto a joint appeal for relief funds should be made to every Baptist church, Baptist Sunday School and individual in the Southern Baptist Convention and that the money received from this appeal should be sent to the Foreign Mission Board and divided by the Board with the Near East Relief fifty-fifty. The observation of this agreement by our Baptist people throughout the South will enable the Foreign Mission Board to keep a record of the relief contributions of Southern Baptists and to meet greatly distressing human needs both in the territory of the Near East Relief and of the Foreign Mission Board."

Therefore be it resolved that we earnestly request our pastors and churches to take an offering for relief funds and forward same to A. J. Barton, General Superintendent, Terminal Trust Building, Kansas City, Mo.

IV. Whereas: A memorial signed by Rev. C. F. Kerr, clerk of the Northwest Missouri Baptist Association for the Association came into the hands of your committee which is as follows:

"We earnestly request that definite steps be taken at once to establish a Baptist Hospital in the Western Part of Missouri in the very near future." We, your committee, recommend that this resolution be referred to the Executive Board to report at the next annual meeting of this body.

V. Whereas: The people of Brookfield have taken extraordinary care to give royal entertainment to the delegates and visitors to the Missouri Baptist General Association and to provide every possible convenience and comfort and to express hospitality on every side to the extent that they have decorated their town, with flags and flowers, they have driven their automobiles along side every curb with an invitation to ride, they have suspended business if by so doing in any way they could extend a courtesy or accommodation to any one of us, they have opened their homes for our entertainment with generosity, they have given us the free use of their churches and halls for our meetings;

And Whereas: The Baptists of Brookfield have endowed this nintieth session of the Missouri Baptist General Association with a Holy atmosphere and have made possible the fine fellowship we have enjoyed, therefore be it resolved that by a rising vote we extend to these, the people of Brookfield and especially to the Baptist Church of Brookfield, our expression of deep gratitude with thanksgiving and trust that our visit at Brookfield will leave a blessing and benediction upon every home and upon the life of this good church.

Your committee begs leave to report as follows:

It is essential, if our program is to succeed, our people must be informed. We rejoice at the increased circulation of the Word and Way. It's columns are always rich with Baptist news and comment. But even it's large clientele constitutes but a small per cent of our people.

MISSOURI BAPTIST HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Missouri Baptist Historical Society is still active in a quiet way, chiefly in the effort to maintain its existence and to let its friends know the fact. It still pleads for more active interest in its work in the brotherhood in Missouri.

The Society is of mature age, but is not yet independent, financially, of its honored parent, the General Association of Missouri Baptists. The report of the Treasurer will show that in the Treasury there is not one dollar that can be used for incidental expenses. Its present condition otherwise, is about as it has been in the past. We are continually receiving small deposits of valuable data for the future historian, in the form of Minutes of one kind and another; addresses; old church records, all of real value as regards Baptist History in Missouri; and all are carefully preserved in the archives in a fireproof building.

The Committee on Missouri Baptist Biography submits the following statement of the work it has accomplished to date: It was appointed in 1910, during the meeting of the General Association at Nevada, Missouri, to take measures for preserving the memory of those who had been instrumental in bringing the Denomination to its present influental condition, and had passed away, leaving us to carry on the noble work.

. In 1913 the first volume of Biography was issued. It contains the Life Sketches of 36 ministers and 15 laymen.

In 1916 the second volume, containing Life Sketches of 32 ministers; 7 laymen; and 8 women.

In 1918 the third appeared containing sketches of the lives of 46 ministers; 22 laymen; and 8 women.

In 1920 the fourth volume with sketches of 63 ministers; 18 laymen; and 5 women was printed.

In 1923 the manuscript of the fifth volume, embracing the sketches of 63 ministers; 25 laymen; and 42 women, was offered for publication, and is still in the hands of the Committee on Publication.

This makes a grand total for the five volumes of 390 sketches, 239 of which are ministers; 88 laymen; and 63 women.

The fifth volume is dedicated to the Godly Women of the Past and Those who may "Follow in Their Train."

With the hope that the fund for the publication of the fifth volume may be completed, and that a sum of not less than \$50.00 for incidental expenses be supplied; and with the expression of our gratitude to the Father of us all for the opportunity and ability to serve Him in this simple way, this report is humbly submitted.

"Whereas, we have learned that our Baptist people in the city of Columbia and vicinity are now about to enter upon the endeavor to provide an adequate church edifice to meet the extraordinary conditions of that city, and

Whereas, there are now in the Missouri University Center some 500 Baptist students, and in Stephens College over 600 students, and

Whereas, these conditions furnish ground for an appeal to our Baptist people throughout the entire state, and

Whereas other denominations are investing large sums of money to provide for facilities to meet the extraordinary conditions presented at Columbia, therefore be it

Resolved. That we most heartily commend this cause to our people."

Resolution adopted.

RELIGIOUS PUBLICATIONS

All organizations in this and other countries have a publication for the information of their constituants. These publications are but the electric torch to illuminate the way for better and more proficient service of the organizations in the world.

The great legal fraternity has its great magazine. The physician, the dentist, the school teacher and even the mechanics, then the business organizations have their publications. The bankers, merchants, manufacturers, the hospitals, the schools, farmers and Federated labor, so also have the churches. It is hardly short of criminal for the constituants of the above mentioned organizations to be ignorant, relative to conditions in said organization. It is like wilfully closing their eyes at noon day and refusing to behold the light.

The politician who does not read his political publications is a failure as a politician. The farmer who fails to read his publications on farming, is a poor farmer. A school teacher who does not read all of the journals, etc., and new books written on the great subjects of the time, will soon be out of the profession. So also with the church. The Baptists of Missouri can be as well informed in their denominational and christian affairs, as many of them are, relative to the business or profession in which they are engaged. It is nothing short of a sin to be ignorant today in denominational and christian affairs, with all of the good books and magazines that are coming almost daily from the religious press and as cheaply

as they may be had. It is a sin against the light of knowledge to be ignorant in our great religious affairs.

We therefore recommend that all the Baptists of Missouri, read the "Word and Way." It is the greatest medium through which we may inform ourselves relative to Baptist affairs. We further recommend that every Baptist family in the state become a regular subscriber to it. We also recommend the Missouri Baptist Bulletin "Home and Foreign Fields" and many books that can be had at a very nominal sum, one of which is the "Cross of Christ," edited by Dr. S. M. Brown of the "Word and Way" and others that are published by the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, Nashville, Tenn., and American Baptist Publication Society.

We further recommend that where it is at all possible, the church put these journals, especially the "Word and Way," in their annual budget.

MISSOURI BAPTIST SANITARIUM

The past year, in many ways, has been one of the most remarkable years in the history of the Sanitarium. The number of patients far exceeds that of any other year. The working force, therefore, in each department of the institution has necessarily been increased. Four new buildings have been purchased in order to properly care for the nurses. The kitchen and dining room facilities have been enlarged. Additions have been made to the staff, calling to service of the Sanitarium the foremost specialists of the city.

Members of the Sanitarium Association attending the annual meeting held Wednesday, October 15, 1924, were not only enthusiastic and grateful for the report of the year, but felt duty bound to take steps for the enlargement of the present plan and the completion of improvements now under way.

We quote from the report of the staff as follows:

"We congratulate you upon your many improvements, additions and achievements during the past year. The enlargement of the Nurses' Home and the building of the Nurses' Hall for their lectures, class work, study and recreation will greatly increase their efficiency, comfort and the standing of our school as compared with other like institutions. The many other improvements and equipments that have been added to the hospital itself will greatly facilitate the handling of patients and the general care of the sick."

School of Nursing

There are now on file eighteen applications for entrance January 1st.

The morale of the school was never better than at present. The better home comforts provided for the nurses are greatly appreciated.

THE BAPTIST BIBLE INSTITUTE

The Baptist Bible Institute enters upon its seventh session under favorable auspices. We have already enrolled more than two hundred regular students and several taking special courses. We have the best beginning of our brief, phenominal career. The spirit of the school is improving, and its solidarity increasing with the passing of the years. We are developing an educational distinctiveness and institutional individuality which elicits the favorable comment of even a casual visitor.

We have representatives from 19 states and several foreign countries. They are loyal to the word of God and to the ideals of the institution.

The young women hold their fellowship meeting in their dormitory every evening immediately after supper, and the men hold theirs at the some hour in Managan chapel. The faculty hold their prayer meeting at 8 o'clock every morning. At ten thirty the entire school assembles in Managan chapel for prayer, praise and devotional talks. Thus attention is paid to the deepening of the spiritual life, the supreme need of every christian worker.

One day at the beginning of each month is set apart as missionary day. The exercises are begun by an early morning prayer meeting, followed by state group meetings. Some leading Baptist then brings us a vital and practical message as the crowning inspiration of the day.

We have an able faculty of varied gifts and experience. It consists of thirteen teachers and seven tutors, all devoted to their task.

The Baptist Bible Institute is generally recognized as a child of providence and prayer. It is the youngest educational enterprise of the Southern Baptist Convention and deserves and receives their prayerful sympathy and hearty support. It is co-educational and therefore makes its appeal to preachers, laymen and women. It was established to give the best possible educational and practical training to various kinds of christian workers for service at home and abroad.

In order to fulfill its mission the Baptist Bible Institute offers a variety of thorough courses leading to standard degrees in christian training, missions, gospel music, religious education and theology. French, Italian, and Spanish are taught, and the usual Seminary courses in the Biblical languages. Greek and Hebrew are also given. An adequate business course is provided for those studying to become pastor's assistants.

Since we "learn to do by doing" we lay great emphasis upon practical activities. Fidelity in meeting assignments is graded as well as knowledge revealed by written examinations. New Orleans offers an unsurpassed field for service to students preparing for any kind of christian work. Weekly written reports are made of the work done and Report Hour is a feature of the Baptist Bible Institute's life.

We have a good administration building, a woman's dormitory, a men's dormitory, apartments for professors, and quarters for about fifty married student families.

Our greatest material need is a library building to accommodate our important and unique 40,000 volume library. We must have at an early date, at least the first unit of our future dormitory for men.

The Institute Memorial Press, made possible by the generosity of Dr. J. E. Gwatkin and wife, has been installed and is doing first class work with its Linotype equipment. In order to make any considerable progress the Baptist Bible Institute must receive from all the States of the Southern Baptist Convention its full quota of (3%) out of the 20% contributed to Southern objects, the amount recommended by the Southern Baptist convention to be given to christian education.

We stand solidly for one unified program for 1925 and pledge our loving loyalty to the faith of our fathers and the co-operative plans of our brotherhood.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE

That a great tidal wave of corruption and lawlessness is sweeping over our land and country cannot reasonably be called in question. One explanation of this is the fact-that one of the divinely given breaks has been, either cast aside, or it is not allowed to function. The Sabbath as God gave it, and intended that it should be observed is absolutely essential to mans well-being both physically and morally.

Man needs rest. If he is not busy, has nothing to do, has no work that drains and weakens him physically, he is not meeting his obligation to himself or humanity. If he is going and doing constantly, regardless of his physical limitations, he is none the less a sinner.

So the Sabbath in demanding that one day in each week be given to rest, is in perfect accord with man's physical necessities.

In view of this fact, the state has a perfect right to enact a law that demands, for the good of its citizens, a rest day. Having put such a law in it's statute book, every state should see that this law is enforced.

But man has a moral and spiritual nature also, and the Sabbath, as divinely given, was intended to enter this realm and make its contribution to man's highest and eternal interests. While he says to his labors, his cares, his worldly interests: "You tarry here while I go yonder and worship" and lifts himself into the higher and purer atmosphere of meditation on divine things, prayer, praise and communion with the Father of his Spirit, he is as truly strengthened mentally and morally as he was physically by his resting from his labors.

If this day should be thus observed what a change, for the better, could come over us. Instead of making this day a "holiday" it would be a Holy Day, devoted to the highest and best interests of man, in preserving the body and in gratifying his head and heart for the service of God and humanity.

Unless this tide of Sabbath desecration can be checked and rolled back, all that is holy, sacred and essential to happiness and usefulness in this life and that, fits for the life to come will be weakened if not destroyed. Its strong allies and loyal supporters are lovers of pleasure, and lovers of gold. These two altars are having more worshippers around them than are the altars of piety and God. Sabbath baseball, Sabbath movies, Sabbath excursions, Sabbath visiting, and other things that are thrown into this day are crowding out of the hearts and life of our people an atmosphere that is absolutely essential to good citizenship and forceful christianity.

The old "Puritanical Sabbath," with all of its objectionable features, as portrayed by modernists, is far more productive of good than is the New Satanical Sabbath.

Unless something is done to check this growing evil, the home, the church, the state, will suffer irreparable loss, for this is the soil in which these are rooted, and in which they reach their highest development. As citizens, let us see to it that our "Sunday Laws" are enforced. Then let the church and the home join hands in making this day a real day and a day for worship and divine service and soon the desert will be blossoming as the rose, for God's smile will be resting upon the home, the church and our nation.
