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CONSTITUTION OF THE MISSOURI BAPTIST GENERAL  
ASSOCIATION

(Adopted at Cape Girardeau, October 24, 1928)

ARTICLE I—Name

This body shall be called the Missouri Baptist General Association.

ARTICLE II—Object

The object of the Association shall be to extend the Kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ, to provide a convenient means for the co-operation of the churches in their work and an efficient agency for their enlistment in Missions, Education and Benevolence.

ARTICLE III—Time and Place of Meeting

The General Association shall meet annually on Tuesday after the fourth Sunday in October at such hour and place as it may choose at the next preceding meeting.

ARTICLE IV—Membership

This Association shall be composed of accredited messengers and life members as follows:

Sec. 1. Any regular missionary Baptist church in sympathy with the objects of the Association and desiring to co-operate with the Association shall be entitled to one messenger and one additional messenger for every one hundred members or major fraction thereof above one hundred, provided that no church shall be entitled to more than fifteen messengers.

Sec. 2. Each Baptist District Association wishing to co-operate with the General Association shall be entitled to two messengers.

Sec. 3. Such persons as have hitherto been admitted as life members of this Association shall be accredited as members-at-large.

ARTICLE V

Rights of the Churches and of the General Association

Sec. 1. The relation between the General Association and the churches and associations shall be fraternal and co-operative. The General Association shall never exercise any authority over the churches nor do anything that would in any way interfere with

their complete autonomy and independence as New Testament churches nor to limit the exercise of their freedom.

Sec. 2. The General Association shall always have the right to sit in judgment upon the qualification of its own members and may at any time decline to seat as a messenger any person who may be considered by the Association disqualified on personal grounds or by reason of the character or attitude of the church or association from which such messengers shall come.

#### ARTICLE VI—Officers

The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Recording Secretary and Statistical Secretary, who shall be chosen at each annual meeting provided that the office of Recording Secretary and Statistical Secretary may be held by one and the same person if deemed best. They shall serve from the close of the annual meeting of the Association at which they are elected until the close of the next annual meeting of the Association, or until their successors are elected.

#### ARTICLE VII—Duties of Officers

Sec. 1. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the meetings of the Association, keep order, take the vote on all questions properly brought up and perform all other duties usually performed by a presiding officer.

Sec. 2. In the absence of the Moderator, or at his request, the Assistant Moderator shall serve as Moderator and perform all the duties of the office.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep correct minutes of all the proceedings of the meetings and prepare the same for publication. It shall be the duty of the Statistical Secretary to collect, digest, tabulate and present to the Association such statistics and data as will accurately convey to our people the work and standing of our denomination within our state and to perform such other work in the line of statistics as the Association and the Executive Board may from time to time require of him. Each of said secretaries may appoint such assistants to aid him in the performance of the duties of his office as he may desire.

Sec. 4. The officers of this Association shall be chosen by ballot, each messenger casting one ballot, a majority of the ballots cast being necessary for an election, provided, that when there is only one nomination the vote may be taken viva voce.

## ARTICLE VIII—Executive Board

## Sec. 1. Structure:

There shall be an executive board which shall be incorporated under the laws of Missouri under the corporate name of the Executive Board of the Missouri Baptist General Association, which shall have charge of the Missionary, Educational and Benevolent work of the Association, and which shall be composed as follows:

a. The Board shall consist of thirty members, of which at least one-third shall be women, provided that no church shall have more than one representative on the Board at any one time, and that no elected member of the Board shall be eligible to serve more than two successive terms. Any elected member who may serve two successive terms shall be eligible for re-election to the Board after the expiration of at least one year from the close of his second term. The Moderator and Assistant Moderator of the Missouri Baptist General Association shall be *ex officio* members of the Executive Board.

b. The Board shall be elected at the annual meeting of the Association. Those first elected shall divide themselves into three equal classes, one of which shall serve for one year, one for two years and one for three years.

c. After the first year ten members of the Board shall be elected at each annual meeting of the Association to serve for three years.

d. No salaried employee of this Board nor any employee of any institution fostered by this board shall be a member thereof.

e. If a member shall miss two consecutive meetings without, in the judgment of the Board, a good and acceptable reason, his position on the Board shall automatically become vacant.

## Sec. 2. Organization:

The Board shall elect a Chairman, Vice Chairman and Recording Secretary, who shall serve without pay. It shall also elect a Treasurer who shall have custody of all the funds that may come into the possession of the Board; who shall disburse them only as directed by the Board for the purposes for which they were given; whose accounts shall be properly audited; and who shall give such bond as the Board shall require. The Treasurer of the Executive Board shall be the Treasurer of the General Association.

There shall be a committee of four to supervise, control and manage the investment of the permanent funds of the Executive Board and determine the disposition of the real estate, if any, and other investments belonging to the Executive Board. The General Superintendent shall be *ex officio* a member and permanent Chairman of said committee, and the Chairman of the Executive Board

shall appoint the three other members who shall be Baptists, but need not be members of the Executive Board.

Sec. 3. Powers and Duties:

General:

a. The Board shall determine the times and places of its meetings; fill vacancies occurring during the year; adopt all necessary regulations for the conduct of its business; appoint such committees as it may deem wise, and shall report annually in writing to the General Association.

b. The Board shall have full power and authority to act for the General Association in the interim of the sessions of the Association in any and all matters that may arise affecting the interests fostered by the General Association, provided, that this shall not be interpreted as authorizing the Board to reverse any action of the General Association or to do anything contrary to this Constitution or to accepted Baptist faith, polity and practice.

c. It shall present annually to the General Association a budget including both state and Southwide objects. This budget shall be presented to the district associations and churches for their consideration, approval and support. All contributions made to this budget without further designation shall be faithfully distributed among the objects included in the budget upon the basis of the percentage fixed for each institution and interest and shall be promptly and regularly forwarded to said interests and institutions.

Specific:

a. The Board shall elect a General Superintendent of Missions, Education and Benevolence and such other workers as it may deem necessary for the prosecution of the denominational work and fix the salaries of all employees.

b. The Board shall devise means for the creation and increase of a fund to be used for assisting Baptist churches in Missouri to erect meeting houses by gift or loan under such conditions as may be wise.

c. The Board shall have general oversight over any and all educational and benevolent institutions owned, operated or maintained in whole or in part by the denomination; shall keep itself fully informed as to the conditions and needs of all such institutions; shall approve arrangements for all campaigns for funds; shall conduct a continuous campaign for enlightenment as to the claims and needs of these institutions; and, in general, shall promote in every way possible their interests and the things for which they stand.

**ARTICLE IX—Committee on Committees**

There shall be appointed by the Moderator a committee of seven (7) on committees, whose duty it shall be to nominate the Nominating Committee and all other standing committees.

**ARTICLE X—Amendments**

This Constitution may be amended at any regular annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of the messengers voting, provided that notice of such amendment shall have been given in writing at the annual meeting next preceding, and provided that Article V shall not be subject to any amendment that would violate the principles which it embodies.

**BY-LAWS OF THE MISSOURI BAPTIST GENERAL ASSOCIATION****ARTICLE I**

Sec. 1. All sessions of the General Association shall be opened with suitable devotional exercises and closed with prayer.

Sec. 2. The meetings of the General Association shall be given to the promotion of the objects and interests fostered in such manner as may be determined by the Association on the recommendation of the committee on order of business.

Sec. 3. Preachers employed or aided by the Association or by organizations affiliated with the Association shall be of good standing and tried piety and shall belong to Baptist churches in Missouri.

Sec. 4. In case of interruption of the regular meeting of the body or failure through unforeseen events to hold the regular meeting of the Association at the time and place appointed, the Executive Board shall have the power to determine the time and place of the next annual meeting or to call a meeting of the Association at such time and place as it may determine.

Sec. 5. No appeal for funds shall be made at any session of the Association nor shall any collection be taken at such meeting except by a special order of the Association.

Sec. 6. The expenses of the Association and of the Executive Board shall be paid out of funds received for the co-operating agencies affiliated with the Missouri Baptist General Association on the percentage basis as fixed for the distribution of funds among the interests and institutions included in the budget.

Sec. 7. In the absence of the Moderator and Assistant Moderator, the Recording Secretary shall call the Association to order, and in case the Recording Secretary should also be absent any messenger may call the body to order and preside until a temporary organization is effected.



Sec. 8. All reports of the regularly organized state work, and of all standing committees, and of all special committees or commissions appointed at the last preceding session of the Association must be ready in typewritten or printed form and handed to the Recording Secretary on the first day of the Association.

## ARTICLE II

Sec. 1. The Moderator shall appoint at the first session of the Association the Committee on Committees, which committee shall during the second session of the meeting of the Association nominate the following committees to report at the meeting of the Association.

a. Three on place of meeting and preacher of introductory sermon for the next meeting of the Association.

b. Three on Resolutions.

c. The Moderator shall appoint at least 90 days prior to the annual meeting—a committee of ten on nominations. This committee shall meet at the discretion of the Chairman but in any case not later than the day preceding the first session of the annual meeting. This committee shall make nominations for officers of the Association and for members of the Executive Board. Said committee shall also submit or present to the Association for election, confirmation or approval, as the case may be, or for such other purposes as may be requested by the managers thereof, the names of all persons necessary to fill vacancies on the managing boards, or bodies, by whatever name known, of the following Baptist institutions, provided, however, that no salaried employee of any institution shall be placed on the Board of Trustees:

William Jewell College, Liberty, Missouri;

Stephens College, Columbia, Missouri;

Hannibal-LaGrange College, Hannibal, Missouri;

\*Will Mayfield College, Marble Hill, Missouri;

Southwest Baptist College, Bolivar, Missouri;

Missouri Baptist Hospital, St. Louis, Missouri;

Missouri Baptist Orphans Home, Pattonville, St. Louis County, Missouri;

\*Missouri Home for Aged Baptists, Ironton, Missouri;

Home for Aged Baptists, Ironton, Missouri;

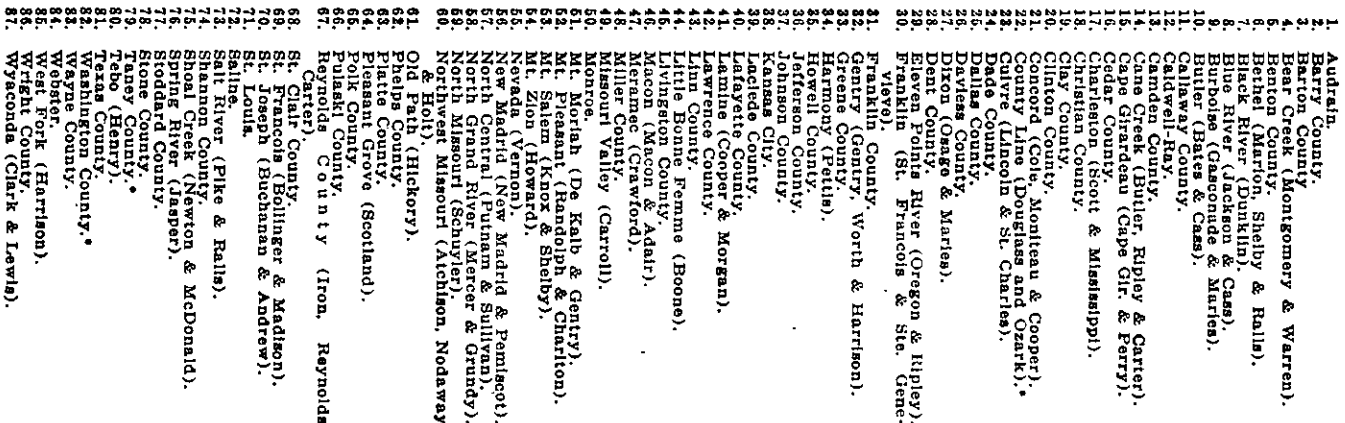
Missouri Baptist Ministers' Aid Society, Mexico, Missouri;

Missouri Baptist Historical Society, Liberty, Missouri;

or any other institution or interest that may be organized or created hereafter.

Sec. 2. The report of the nominating committee shall be presented not later than the third day of the meeting of the General Association. If no other nominations are made, the vote upon the report of the committee may be taken viva voce.

Sec. 3. The Committee on Committees shall appoint on the last day of the meeting the following committees to report at the next meeting of the Association.

a. Three on Order of Business for the next meeting of the Association.

b. Three on Obituaries.

c. Three on Temperance and Social Service (including Sabbath Observance).

d. Three on Religious Literature and Publications.

e. Three on Enrollment.

### ARTICLE III

Sec. 1. For the purposes of these By-Laws and in order that any institution may share in the financial support of Missouri Baptists contributed to and administered by the General Association, and to be considered a Missouri Baptist institution, the institution concerned shall comply with the following conditions: Its president, or chief executive officer, and a majority of the members of its managing board shall be members of Baptist churches in Missouri; their election shall be subject to the approval of the General Association; it shall not be conducted for private or corporate gain but all moneys received in excess of operating expenses shall be expended in improvements or shall be added to its permanent endowment; if it be an educational institution, a majority of the teachers shall be members of Baptist churches in Missouri, and it must conform to the educational standards prevailing in the state and must give each year a reasonable amount of distinctively religious instruction; if it be a benevolent institution, it shall be engaged principally in the care of the sick, orphans, the aged, or other needy persons, and shall do as much gratuitous and charity work as possible; each and every such institution shall have been recommended by the Executive Board for affiliation with the General Association.

Sec. 2. The property of each educational and benevolent institution co-operating with and under the supervision of the Board must be safeguarded to the denomination in a manner satisfactory to the General Association; and each of these institutions shall submit its books and work to the inspection of the Executive Board whenever requested, and shall make annual reports to the Board concerning all matters required by the Board, the financial exhibit of each report to be audited by a certified public accountant.

Sec. 3. The educational and benevolent institutions shall make no personal canvass for funds, nor shall the interest of any one of these institutions be presented on the floor of the Association without the previous approval of the Executive Board.

**ARTICLE IV**

Sec. 1. The women on the Executive Board shall be a committee to whose care shall be entrusted the conduct of the woman's missionary work in the state.

**ARTICLE V**

Sec. 1. No appeal for missionary funds for any purpose shall be made in the state without the approval of the Executive Board.

**ARTICLE VI**

Sec. 1. Any question that may arise not provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws shall be decided in accordance with "Parliamentary Law" by F. H. Kerfoot.

**ARTICLE VII**

Sec. 1. These By-Laws may be amended at any annual meeting by a majority vote of the messengers voting, provided that they cannot be amended on the last day of the session unless notice of such amendment shall have been given in writing on a previous day of said annual meeting.

BAPTIST GENERAL ASSOCIATION****ARTICLE I****Governing Instrument**

Article VIII of the Constitution of the Missouri Baptist General Association is hereby made the governing instrument of the Executive Board.

**ARTICLE II****Meetings**

1. Unless otherwise ordered, the Executive Board shall meet at Kansas City on the second Tuesday of December, April and July and preceding the meeting of the General Association at the place

where the Association meets, the December meeting to be considered the annual meeting of the Board.

2. Special meetings may be called by the Executive Committee at any time and place it may choose.

3. A majority of the entire membership of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

### ARTICLE III

#### Co-operation With Southern Baptist Convention

The Executive Board recognizes the Southern Baptist Convention as the body with which this Board and the General Association shall be in co-operation.

### ARTICLE IV

#### Co-operation With District Associations

The Executive Board recognizes the necessity for co-operation with the district associations of the state and that the Executive Boards of the associations are the proper mediums through which such co-operation should be carried out.

### ARTICLE V

#### Committees

1. The Chairman of the Executive Board shall appoint an Executive Committee of seven which shall have charge of the business of the Board between its quarterly meetings and shall make reports of its work at each meeting of the Board. The Executive Board may from time to time prescribe the duties of and what business shall be transacted by the Executive Committee between the meetings of the Board.

2. The laymen members of the Board shall be the committee for Laymen's and Brotherhood work.

3. The ten women members of the Board shall constitute a committee on Women's Missionary work in the state, shall nominate for election by the Board a secretary for women's work, and such other W. M. U. workers as it may deem advisable and shall use every means for the continuous development of the women of the churches in the support of missionary work now conducted by women and also of the general missionary work of the churches.

**ARTICLE VI****Workers**

For the purpose of carrying out the plans of the General Association, there shall be elected a General Superintendent whose duty it shall be to superintend the entire work of the Board in all its departments and have general charge of the educational, missionary and benevolent interests of the state. The Board shall elect such other departmental secretaries and workers as it may think necessary to the proper prosecution of the work.

It shall be the duty of the departmental secretaries and other field workers to work under the direction of and in co-operation with the general superintendent and to aid him in keeping the interests and institutions both of the state and of the Southern Baptist Convention represented by the Board before the churches and district associations and in seeking to enlist them in the active support of all the work. For their services, they shall receive such salary as may be agreed upon between them and the Executive Board.

**ARTICLE VII****Amendments**

These By-Laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the entire membership of the Board at any regular meeting thereof, provided a written notice of such proposed changes is given at the previous meeting of the Board.

## In Memoriam



MRS. F. W. ARMSTRONG

Laura Dee was the only daughter of Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Malott. She carried the atmosphere of sacrificial service from the Christian home of her preacher father and mother into her own home as the wife of a loyal Baptist layman, Judge Frank W. Armstrong. With him she had a vital part in the planning and the promotion of the Baptist program in Missouri.

For more than a quarter of a century Mrs. Armstrong has held positions of trust and high honor in the Baptist denomination. In 1919 she was elected to membership of the Executive Board of the Missouri Baptist General Association and served for 17 years. She was President of Woman's Missionary Union of Missouri from 1923 to 1934. She was elected to the Presidency of Woman's Missionary Union, Auxilliary to the Southern Baptist Convention, in 1933 which position she held until her death May 13, 1945. She was a member of the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention since 1927 and also a member of the Executive Committee of the Baptist World Alliance. She represented Woman's Missionary Union at the World Congress in Berlin, Germany, in 1934, and also in Atlanta, Georgia, in 1939, and presided at one of the sessions at each of these two Baptist world gatherings.

For twelve years Mrs. Armstrong was on the editorial staff of Royal Service, the Window of Y.W.A. and World Comrades. Her editorials gave evidence of her ability as a writer, a clear thinker and a loyal supporter of missions. Being thus interested in the larger field of denominational activity her interest in her own church and association never lagged. As a teacher in Sunday School, Auxilliary Counselor, Associational Young People's Leader and worker in her local missionary society she gave devoted service.

One of the greatest achievements of Mrs. Armstrong's administration was the erection of the present building of the W.M.U. Training School, Louisville, Kentucky.

Richly endowed with qualities essential to leadership Mrs. Armstrong made a rich contribution to Baptist life around the world. With her home going, May 13, 1945, at her home in Plattsburg, Missouri, Baptists have lost one of their wisest and most beloved and valued leaders.

EDWIN U. MONROE

First Lieut. Edwin U. Monroe, a Chaplain in the United States Army, made the supreme sacrifice in action in France, January 20, 1945. He gave his life in full devotion to his country and the service of his Lord. He leaves his parents, Rev. and Mrs. Geo. C. Monroe of Harrisonville, his wife, Mrs. Doris Driggers Monroe, and children, Leola and Billie Barbara of Kansas City. Also, his brother, Rev. Geo. Calvin Monroe, Jr.

He was a graduate of William Jewell College and had attended Southwestern Seminary and the Southern Baptist Seminary. He served as pastor at Buckner, Adrian, Archie, Peculiar, First Baptist Church of Leavenworth, Kansas, and in Orleans, Indiana.

Chaplain Monroe was killed by a fragment of a shell that exploded near his jeep as he was riding up to the front. His friend and fellow Chaplain, a Jew, wrote "his full Christian heart overflowed to all the men who surrounded him. I am not a Christian and yet I felt it".



CLARENCE STUMP

Clarence Stump was born December 27, 1914, and was killed in action in Germany November 21, 1944. He was a graduate of William Jewell College (1942) and of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. He held the rank of Captain in the Army Chaplaincy and saw action in France, Belgium, Holland, and Germany. He was ordained by the Maywood Church and at the time of his entrance into the Army was Pastor of the Rockwood Baptist Church. He was the son of George R. Stump and Eula V. Stump of Independence, Missouri.

#### REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

T. W. MEDEARIS, *General Superintendent*

✓ We are at the end of another gracious year of Missouri Baptist life. It has been a never-to-be-forgotten year in human history. The greatest war of the centuries has closed in victory for our arms, for which we thank God. We express the fervent hope that we may show ourselves worthy of the mercy and blessing of God which have been so evident. This year has witnessed also the deepest probing into the hidden mysteries of God that human intellects have ever done in the discovery of the atomic bomb with its unearthly potentialities ✓ for destruction of the works of human hands and of human life itself. In awesome recognition of the omnipotent power of God, faintly suggested by the atomic bomb, we ought in deepest humility to order our personal living and denominational program in keeping with His Holy will.

✓ The year has been characterized by fine fellowship and cooperation throughout the entire state. Definite progress has been made in our State Mission work. The William Jewell campaign has met with fine support practically everywhere. The Cooperative Program has attained its largest proportions, more than doubling its 1942 receipts, and actually reaching a total this year of \$432,644.46. A Baptist Foundation is in the final stages of organization the purpose of which is to hold in perpetuity monies contributed by our people for denominational ends, using only interest accruals for institutions or causes designated by donors.

Gasoline rationing is now ended and tight travel regulations and crowded conditions on railroads and buses have been lifted somewhat making the task of covering the territory of our state less taxing to the strength of our workers.

During the year we have lost from our forces by resignation John W. Dowdy, Assistant Superintendent; R. W. Bailes, Training Union Secretary; Mrs. Josephine Medlin, Young People's Secretary; and by death John Goins, Negro Missionary. There have been also various changes in secretarial workers. Miss Helen Heagerty has come to us as Young People's Secretary, and we hope to elect a Training Union Secretary within the next few weeks.

### **A Baptist Building**

✓ Definite steps have been taken during the year looking toward the erection or purchase of a Baptist Building to house our offices. \$25,000 was set aside, from funds already on hands, for this purpose. \$10,000 of the special state mission offering which is now coming in, has been ear-marked for this building. A sizable amount will be in the 1946 budget for this purpose. This fund should be added to as fast as possible until sufficient money is on hand to provide a suitable building for our state organization. Practically all the states of the south now own their headquarters buildings. During the last twenty years we have paid out in rent the sum of \$37,800.00, and have nothing to show for it.

### **American Bible Society**

We recommend that our churches put The American Bible Society into their budgets for whatever amounts they may deem advisable. This society is not a Baptist organization, but since it prints and widely distributes the Bible throughout the world, without comment of any kind, Baptists have everything to gain and nothing to lose by its glorious ministry. Our missionaries around the earth depend upon this Society quite extensively for Bibles to meet their needs.

### **Baptist Service Centers**

We have closed during the year all of our Service Centers, since the conditions which called them into existence have ceased practically altogether. We are continuing, however, our service to the Camp Crowder area by assisting The First Baptist Church of Neosho to maintain a Center in their building which is kept open every evening and on Sunday afternoon, and serves quite a goodly number of the camp personnel, and our assistance in maintaining the full time Center at Springfield where a good work is being done.

### **Returning Chaplains**

Many of our Missouri chaplains are being separated from the armed services now, and are ready to re-enter pastorates. We are happy in the splendid ministry which they have performed in the terrifically difficult fields where they have served, on land and sea, at home and around the earth. We wish to express our appreciation

of their unselfish service, their denominational loyalty, and their faithful testimony of the saving and keeping grace of God. We welcome them home and assure them, and all our fighting forces, of our love and full cooperation in their return to civilian life. Our board has voted to give three months employment at \$150 per month as state workers to all our Missouri chaplains who desire it. During this time they will have opportunity to come in touch with the churches and the churches with them. It is hoped that they will be given favorable consideration by the churches. Of course the leading of the Holy Spirit will be sought, as ever, in this holy relationship.

### The Cooperative Program and Special Offerings

The following action was taken by the Executive Board at its July meeting, the report being submitted by C. A. Butler, Chairman, Lloyd W. Collins, Secretary, Grant Davis, Louis Giedinghagen, and W. O. Stanley:

"(1) That the 1946 goal for the Cooperative Program be \$500,000, subject to the action of the General Association in its annual meeting this October.

"(2) That the sum of \$58,000 be set aside from the undesignated funds for the following purposes:

Administrative .....	\$ 9,000.00
Ministers Retirement Plan .....	18,000.00
Word and Way .....	3,500.00
General Promotion .....	21,500.00
W. M. U. ....	6,000.00

"(3) That the remaining \$442,000 be distributable as follows: \$221,000 (50%) to causes within the state and \$221,000 (50%) to southwide causes; and That the southwide funds (\$221,000) be divided according to the plan of the Southern Baptist Convention.

"(4) That the \$221,000 to be used within the state be distributable as follows:

"(5) That the Executive Board be instructed by the General Association to adopt a State Missions budget for 1946 which will be flexible enough to allow whatever adjustments are necessary to prevent incurring debts on this work during the year. We further suggest the same procedure to the boards of all institutions.

"(6) That Missouri Baptists observe the special days principally for their educational value and that the observances of such special days be carried on without previous campaigns for special offerings.

"(7) That Missouri Baptists participate in the 'new century' program of the Southern Baptist Convention and that, as far as financial cooperation is concerned, such participation follow this general plan:

\*1. That we authorize one inclusive special offering for all causes during 1946,

\*2. That we accept the apportionment suggested by the Southern Baptist Convention for southwide causes as a part of our objective for the above mentioned offering.

\*3. That the Executive Committee be instructed to make a careful survey of the needs of the causes and institutions in Missouri, and that such survey be made a basis of our goal for causes within the state in this one inclusive offering.

We further suggest that, for causes within Missouri, such a survey be made annually preceding the annual meeting of the Committee on Cooperative Program Allocations.

"(8) It is our firm conviction that the Cooperative Program is the best plan upon which our denomination can depend, because it is both scriptural and practical. We believe that the suggested goal for 1946 of one-half million dollars can be reached if our churches, our district associations, and all our institutions promote this program to the fullest extent. We urge our pastors to endeavor to include the Cooperative Program in all church budgets for an amount proportionate to the needs of our expanding work. We earnestly suggest that the division in our larger church budgets be on a fifty-fifty basis and in no event should it be less than 20 per cent of the total budget, with the hope that this program will eventually eliminate the necessity for making special campaigns and offerings."

#### Comments

It will be noted that we have set a high goal of \$500,000 for the Cooperative Program for the new year, 1946. We have actually received \$432,644.46 through this channel during the year closing September 30. We have every reason to believe that with the co-operation of all our forces we can reach this new goal.

However, it should be remembered that the budgets of the various institutions do not balance, in all cases, with the expected income including that from the Cooperative Program. To make up this difference we have had during the past, as we are all fully aware, a series of special offerings which have extended through the entire year for this or that institution or object. The special offerings

have been preceded by urgent publicity and appeal which have rendered them really financial campaigns, the pressure from one campaign hardly passing until that of another begins. We have therefore had two parallel, year-long, programs in Missouri. This year the endowment campaign has provided a third. Your Board does not believe that this is the best plan for financing the Kingdom. They believe that it works a direct and distinct hardship on our year the William Jewell endowment campaign has provided a third. Your Board does not believe that this is the best plan for financing the Kingdom. They believe that it works a direct and distinct hardship on our churches and pastors and provides no more funds than could be secured by better and more scriptural methods.

\*In the new plan proposed the Executive Committee of the State Board was instructed to visit the various institutions and to ascertain the amount of money needed in each case beyond Cooperative Program and other receipts to insure balanced budgets. These amounts, together with other interests agreed upon, were to be lumped together, and this total amount was to become the single denominationally sponsored special offering during 1946. The Executive Committee is now engaged in making this survey. Your Board heartily recommends: (1) the plan; (2) that the goal for the special offering be ———; (3) that the time for the special offering be set for ———; (4) in case approximately the full object is not reached in the spring offering, that a "catch-up offering" be made in the fall, in October or November at the discretion of the Board; (5) that special days previously observed continue to be stressed for their educational value but without campaigns for special offerings; (6) that monies, not designated by donors for special purposes, coming to the various institutions, be reported to the State Board at least quarterly, and that such monies be deducted from the amount which the special offering undertakes to provide for these institutions and interests.

We would call attention to the fact that this program recognizes the sovereignty of our churches. They may take offerings for any cause at any time they choose. This is a recognized Baptist principle which we all must forever respect.

Nor does this program propose to control the special giving of any individual. Any Baptist can give in any amount to any cause, through whatever channel he chooses, at any time he wishes, or he may withhold his funds altogether, or give unworthily, and the denomination can do nothing about it.

\*This program does not *guarantee* any given amounts, nor has any other program ever done so. If we reach the total objective of the



Cooperative Program, then we know exactly what each institution will receive from that source. Then if the special offering reaches the goal set, we know what will go to each interest. If the special offering fails to reach its goal, then the various interests will be short by exactly the amount we fall short of the goal. This, however, is just like it has always been. Special offerings for particular institutions and interests have failed to reach their objectives time without number; and in those cases these beneficiaries have always done one of three things—(1) trimmed their needs to the receipts; (2) made another extra appeal; or (3) incurred a debt. It should be remembered that Missouri Baptists provide the money to operate their entire program, whether by a year-long string of "specials", or whether it is done as we propose, mainly through the Cooperative Program with one special offering based upon an intelligent and accepted appraisal of the needs of all interests.

### Hollister Hill

Title has just now been made acceptable to our attorney, Mr. Scott Timmons, by the Taney County Court to Presbyterian Hill, Hollister, Mo. This property consisting of two large hotels, administration building, tabernacle, etc., is located within the city limits of Hollister, Mo., on a beautiful hilltop commanding a lovely view of the upper reaches of Lake Taneycomo, the little city of Branson, and the hills lying beyond known as the "Shepherd of the Hills" country. All together we have something more than a hundred and fourteen acres of land here which presents probably the best site in all Missouri for this sort of activity.

Your Board has appointed a committee to study carefully our program in connection with this institution and to propose a budget large enough to care for the expenses of upkeep, and slowly and carefully build toward the employment of this property in the life of our denomination. We hope that the way may open for the Southern Baptist Convention to take over this property and operate it somewhat after the fashion of Ridgecrest. This would result in the saving of thousands of dollars to our people who travel many, many miles to Ridgecrest, N. C., and would also enable many more of our people to come under the direct influence of the leadership of our Baptist life throughout the South, thus enhancing and strengthening our work from every angle both in Missouri and in other states west of the Mississippi River.

### William Jewell College

At the meeting of the General Association last year William Jewell College was authorized to put on a campaign for \$100,000 of endowment looking toward an ultimate total by 1949, the centennial of the school's founding, of \$250,000. At the December meeting of our Board following that action the College asked for the privilege of undertaking to raise the total \$250,000 in cash and pledges during 1945, presenting the following paper which was accepted by action of our Board:

"The William Jewell Endowment Committee, after reviewing the campaign plans authorized by the State Executive Board of the

Missouri Baptist General Association for an ultimate goal of \$250,000 by 1949, desires to call attention to the fact that if William Jewell College should remain in the field for four years the campaign would greatly interfere with our general work and the work and plans of the other institutions. Upon the suggestion of the President of William Jewell College, we therefore respectfully request your approval of our plans to raise the whole amount of \$250,000 in cash and pledges during 1945." The college campaign has gone forward with vigor under the leadership of Mr. Minetry Jones. Our office and entire organization have cooperated in the campaign to the fullest possible extent. According to information from Mr. Jones' office the goal is about four-fifths subscribed at this time. We believe that our churches and people everywhere should be encouraged to do their best to secure the rest of this money before the year is out since we are launching, with the beginning of the new year, into the first year of a new century with a southwide program which calls for the best that we have in every department of our church and denominational life.

#### Southwest Baptist College Dormitory

The Executive Committee of our Board voted to authorize Southwest Baptist College to go afield in search of private and corporate capital for funds to take care of urgent building needs due to the loss of their boys' dormitory by fire last year, with the understanding that the college would not take offerings for this purpose, nor urge it, *in the churches*. Of course, churches are free to take offerings or not as they will, but it is not to be a part of the college's program for building funds. It is hoped that people who have means, when approached privately, will provide the funds necessary for this emergency need.

#### Word and Way

Long negotiations for the purchase of *The Word and Way* have terminated in the following, subject, of course, to your approval:

1. That we purchase the paper for \$17,500.00.
2. That transfer of the paper be made to our Board by the Western Baptist Publishing Company, the present owners, on January 1, 1946.
3. That the Executive Board of the Missouri Baptist General Association be authorized to take all steps necessary to this transaction, and to the launching of the paper under the new auspices.
4. That we urge all pastors, Sunday School superintendents, training union directors, W.M.U. and Brotherhood officers in all associations and churches to give enthusiastic support to a campaign to be launched next spring to increase the subscription list to at least 45,000.

Your Board wishes to express its appreciation of the services of Editor Joseph E. Brown to Missouri Baptists through the paper and otherwise through the years. He has never sounded a false

note nor failed to advocate the teachings dear to Baptist hearts. It is a source of joy to us to know that he will continue among us as vitally interested as ever in the program and progress of Missouri Baptists though severing his relations with the paper.

#### Missouri State Sanatorium—Mt. Vernon

For too long we have neglected an urgent opportunity to serve our own people and others in the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Mt. Vernon. There are regularly 550 patients under treatment there in various stages of tuberculosis, and *half of them are Baptists*. A state supported chaplain is employed, but is quite unable to take care of the spiritual needs of our folk.

A committee of our Board—Mrs. Kenneth Glover, B. A. Pugh and Grant Davis—was appointed to survey the situation there along with the local pastor, E. F. Hood, and the Associational Missionary, Paul K. Pease. Upon their recommendation we suggest that the Budget Committee be instructed to set aside \$100 per month for this work, and that a suitable person be employed to devote full time to it under the supervision of our Board.

#### Missouri Baptist Foundation

A year ago the organization of a Baptist Foundation was passed upon favorably by the General Association. A committee was appointed later by the Executive Board to organize this Foundation. Copies of the constitutions and by-laws of similar organizations throughout the states of the South were secured, and the committee studied them carefully. We are ready now to announce that within the next few weeks the Baptist Foundation of Missouri will be a reality. Members of our churches and friends who desire to do so, will have in the Baptist Foundation an organization so tied in with our denominational life that funds entrusted to it will be safeguarded perpetually by the denomination to the uses for which they were donated. It is hoped that many of our people will, through this Foundation, by will, by bequest, and by gift, perpetuate their influence and testimony through the Baptist denomination as represented by the General Association throughout all the years that lie ahead. Endowment or trust funds of whatever nature may be received and handled by the Foundation in the interest of any college or institution or type of work fostered by our denomination, or funds may be entrusted to it without designation, in which case the wisdom of the denomination will determine the uses to which such accruals will be put.

#### Pioneer Missions

We are continuing our Pioneer Mission work with evidences accumulating of its success. I. Newton Vance, in Taney and southern Stone Counties; Henry Butts in a large area involving portions of Dent and Crawford Counties; Clarence Dowell at Bunker and adjacent territory for one-half time, the other half being taken by Reynolds County Association; George Walker at Rives and adjacent territory in a most promising work deep down in the Missouri boot-

heel; and we are now seeking a good man to live at Gainsville for Ozark and Douglas Counties. Eternity alone will reveal the real results of this work in areas full of the finest children and young people to be found anywhere, but where, for lack of funds and program, we have not evangelized, organized and enlisted as we should have done.

#### ✓ Rural Field Workers

With the assistance of the Home Mission Board we now have three men in the field as Rural Field Workers. Roy Boatwright, living at Brookfield, ministers in all the area north of the Missouri River; Bruce Maples, Crane, Mo., serves in Southwest Missouri to a line running approximately north from the east boundary of Ozark County on the Arkansas line; Southeastern Missouri is the territory in which Clarence Thompson, Fredericktown, is the new worker.

These men have large fields where rural needs are many, and they are giving themselves without stint to the rehabilitation and development of our country churches. The cooperation of all pastors and missionaries and associational boards is marked and appreciated.

State Missionary W. C. Polson, Chillicothe, has continued his work chiefly across the north part of the state with good effect. His work is particularly with run down and discouraged churches.

#### ✓ Associational and Divisional Missionaries

✓ Practically all the state, with the exception of parts of South and Southeast Missouri, is covered by the services of associational or divisional missionaries many of whom are supported in part out of State Mission funds. We are now assisting 21 of these missionaries. Their influence for the cause of Christ throughout the state is very great. These brethren give themselves to evangelistic meetings, to organized associational stewardship, missionary, revival, and other denominational campaigns, seek to assist the churches in locating pastors in their territories and all of them cooperate heartily with the entire state program. Several associations and divisions finance entirely their work without calling for state funds and we are always happy to see this done since it enables us to use the funds liberated for more needy missionary ends.

In our City Mission work we appropriated last year to the Kansas City Association, C. P. Jones, Superintendent of Missions, \$3,200.00, which was used to support their program as follows: S. B. Colon, Mexican Church, \$1,320; J. H. Hubbard, Parkway Church, \$165; Paul Allison, Swope Park Mission, \$180; Estelle Slater, B.S.U. Worker, \$500; other salaries, \$1,035. Dr. Jones has closed his ministry after thirty-two years of devoted service and the association has employed Dr. Ross E. Dillon as his successor.

To the St. Louis Association, Dr. Paul Weber, Superintendent of Missions, was appropriated last year \$3,900.00 which was used to support their program as follows: Lucille Carter, B.S.U. Worker,

\$800; Susie Timbrook, Jewish work, \$600; Henry Ostertag, Baptist Center, \$420; J. W. Chostner, Carsonville, \$120; Max Payne, Central Church, \$240; Willard Ballard, Bethany Church, \$300; W. G. Wodicker, Meramec Heights Church, \$360; other work, \$1,060.

With the assistance of the Home Mission Board on a fifty-fifty basis we have paid the salary and expenses of the City Superintendent of Missions, Lee Lewis, in St. Joseph Association and in the same manner have paid the salary and expenses of E. L. Brock, Superintendent of Missions in Springfield and Greene County Association. Constructive work has been achieved in all these four cities.

### Missouri Baptist Historical Society

We would call attention again to the fact that the Missouri Baptist Historical Society is continuing to gather and preserve records of Missouri Baptist life. Our preachers should remember to mail items of historic value, anniversaries, special outstanding incidents, etc., to Rev. C. M. Truex, Recording Secretary, Liberty, Mo. We recommend, as we have been doing in recent years, that \$250 be allocated for the work of the Society and that the Society exercise all diligence to accumulate materials of historic importance.

### State Evangelist

During the year Dr. M. M. Barnett was chosen to serve as a State Evangelist. He has given himself with zeal and effectiveness to evangelistic work throughout the state and is already making himself felt in our churches. It is expected that larger churches using his services will make offerings sufficient to enable him to give a reasonable portion of his time to our smaller churches without too much financial strain upon our Board. We are confidently expecting to place in the field within a comparatively short time at least one other State Evangelist.

### Missionary Pastors

We are glad to say that we have been able during the year to assist 22 of our smaller churches in maintaining pastors, and we feel that where a few dollars will enable a struggling church to maintain pastoral leadership and to rehabilitate itself it is money well-spent.

### Western Seminary and Negro Work

We have called attention elsewhere to the death during the year of John Goins who for a generation has been an institution within himself in Missouri Baptist life. He lived and died with Western Seminary upon his mind and heart. We are providing scholarships for five young preachers and one young woman in the Seminary and are paying \$75 a month on the salary of one of the professors. Along with this we are assisting our Negro brethren in the support of Rev. G. W. Simmons, evangelist to his own people in Southeastern Missouri. We recommend that this work be continued and that all possible encouragement be given to the work of Western Seminary by our people during the new year.

**Ministers Retirement Plan**

We now have in the Missouri Ministers Retirement Plan 842 churches and 606 pastors. Certainly it is to the interest of every pastor in Missouri regardless of his age to be in this Plan and we urge that those who are outside the Plan write our office immediately for information regarding the Plan together with application forms. Also every church in Missouri should be in the Plan. We call special attention to the fact that our churches should continue their payments perpetually whether with or without a pastor since these payments from the churches render workable the entire Plan for all preachers and are not directly related to the pastor who serves them at any particular time. We record with sorrow the death during the year of the following participants in the Plan: L. H. Maples; John B. Smith; Wm. R. McEwen; George O. Van Noy; Thomas H. Wiles; Charles E. Hunt; C. C. Jessee; and J. B. Rose.

The Widows Annuity Plan of the Relief and Annuity Board provides that the widows of ministers participating in the Ministers Retirement Plan, who die before retiring from active service, or who die while receiving a disability annuity, will receive forty per cent of the minister's potential annuities. This plan calls for extra dues of one and one-half per cent of the minister's monthly salary to be paid by himself, and one and one-half per cent of the salary to be paid by the State Convention. Further details of the plan will have to be worked out with the Relief and Annuity Board to the satisfaction of our Missouri preachers and churches. We recommend that the General Association act favorably on our entry into the Widows Annuity Plan and instruct its Board to work out the details and get the plan into operation at once.

## REPORT OF STATE EVANGELIST BARNETT

May 1-September 20, 1945

During the four and one-half months in which it has been my privilege to serve Missouri Baptists as State Evangelist, I have had the joy of preaching in seven revival meetings, speaking at the Bap-



tist Hill and VanBuren Assemblies, and visiting eleven of our district associations. While rendering this bit of service I have traveled some three thousand miles, spoken on an average of one and one-half times per day, and seen three hundred and fifteen people come forward, making decisions for Christ and the church, twenty-one of this number were young people, answering the call of God for special, Christian service in our challenging world of today and tomorrow. The offerings from these meetings paid all my expenses and left \$928.18 to turn into our State Office.

At the request of our General Superintendent, I took three weeks from my own work to visit the meetings of several of our district associations in Southeastern Missouri. I found a great Baptist spirit everywhere I went, and all the people seemed to be fully in support of our new program for the year ahead. I heard some old-time Baptist shouting in one of the meetings.

Brethren, with our over two million unsaved and unchurched people in Missouri, and the rapid growth of such heresies as Catholicism, "Chrisitan Science," Unity, Mormonism, Russellism, etc., the fields are surely white unto harvest. "If the blind lead the blind, both shall fall into the ditch," says our Lord. During the year just ahead every Baptist Church should have at least two revival meetings, every community in Missouri should have at least one Baptist revival, and every Missouri Baptist should seek to win at least one unsaved person to Christ each week.

Fellow Missouri Baptists, with re-fired, regenerated hearts, with the Great Commission constantly ringing in our ears, and with a living testimony on our lips, let us anxiously launch forth and take Missouri and the world for Christ.

All transmittal letters received during the year and on file were compared with the recorded receipts, and all checks issued during the year were inspected. In addition, invoices in support of office expenses were examined.

Cash in bank was reconciled with a certificate obtained direct from the depository and cash on hand was accounted for.

Accounts receivable consists of payments made for the Relief and Annuity Board which are to be recovered.

Interest on a note receivable held during part of the year and on government bonds was properly accounted for. During the year certain securities were sold at a gain of \$1,597.00 over par value. Other securities were purchased at a premium of \$1,226.88 which has been deducted from the gain realized on sales.

Furniture and fixtures are stated at cost, less provision for depreciation. During the year the provision was \$1,793.43. Automobiles are stated at cost. A new Hudson car was purchased at a cost of \$1,641.56, less an allowance of \$900.00 on a car traded in.

The Hollister Assembly property, we are informed, is in process of acquisition. A payment of \$4,000.00 has been made and a further check issued for \$6,025.00, which is being held in escrow.

The transactions of the several funds during the year are presented in Exhibits B, C and D. It will be noted on Exhibit B that the General Fund increased \$37,814.90 to a total of \$131,738.87 at September 30, 1945.

#### AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Every man must have the Bible in his own native tongue if the Word of God is to speak to his heart. Someone must translate it into his language, publish it and send it to him, wherever he may live.

*The Regular Work* of the American Bible Society includes all those essential missionary tasks. It aids in translation work, publishes the Scriptures without note or comment, supplies them at cost or less and encourages their use. It provides the Scriptures on foreign fields at less than cost because the income level of the people is so low that they can pay only a fraction of the cost of printing the books. In cases of special need, at home and abroad, the Scriptures are given without charge.

*The War Emergency and Post-War Rehabilitation Work* provides without charge (1) New Testaments and other Scriptures for our

Armed Forces who are yet on duty throughout the world and for the thousands of wounded men still in government hospitals, (2) Scriptures for persons still being held as War Prisoners, and (3) Scriptures in many languages for the spiritual rehabilitation of needy people in the war areas.

Southern Baptists recognize the American Bible Society as an essential part of their own regular program of world-wide missions. Resolutions have been adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention and by state conventions, commending the work of the Society and requesting the churches to contribute to its support. The Society is grateful for increasing gifts from Baptist churches throughout the South.

During 1944 the Society distributed 12,403,541 volumes of Scriptures. From all sources, it received a budget income of \$1,060,647 for its regular work and received for its War Emergency Fund \$423,010. All these records were the largest for any year in its 129 years of service—and yet it had to leave unanswered more needs than in any previous year.

Great needs still lie ahead in the war emergency and post-war rehabilitation work. For the four-year period which began July 1, 1944, conservative estimates show emergency needs for more than eleven million Scripture volumes costing \$3,089,570. This total includes the work actually done since July 1, 1944, and estimates for the future which have been carefully revised since the close of the war. As of September 1, 1945, the amount still needed for this fund is \$1,730,821.

Enlarged opportunities on many mission fields call for an increased regular program of Scripture distribution. This is especially true in lands blacked-out by illiteracy, where millions each year are now being taught to read. These multitudes with eager minds and hungry hearts must have the Word of God.

Scripture distribution is at the heart of the missionary enterprise. It serves as the advance agent and powerful ally of all forms of Christian work. An increase here will strengthen every phase of missions. This is particularly true in evangelism at home and abroad.

Because the Baptist people of the South so strongly believe in the necessity of Scripture distribution, the American Bible Society confidently looks to Southern Baptists for whatever increased support may be required to meet the demands and opportunities for missionary advance in the post-war world.

In the years just ahead, Southern Baptists can give enough each year to make a significant increase in worldwide Scripture distribution just at the time when such an increase is so urgently needed.

## WORLD PEACE

During the year that has passed, by the grace of God the wars which raged in Europe and Asia have been brought to an end. With other Baptists and other Christian peoples everywhere, we have begun to turn our efforts to helping reconstruct a peaceful world.

These efforts began before the fighting stopped. The chairman of this committee attended a conference in Cleveland, Ohio, last January, under sponsorship of the Committee on a Just and Durable Peace, as one of the official visitors designated by the moderator of the Southern Baptist Convention. This conference, attended by about 600 ministers and laymen, drew up a statement of principles on world order and peace.

The chairman also was selected by the Joint Conference Committee on Public Relations, as one of a committee of four to represent the Baptist viewpoint at the conference of the United Nations at San Francisco, April and May, 1945. The Joint Conference Committee spoke officially for the Southern Baptist Convention, the Northern Baptist Convention, the National Baptist Convention and the National Baptist Convention, Inc.

Other members of the committee of four were Dr. Walter O. Lewis, of Washington, general secretary of the Baptist World Alliance, chairman; Dr. J. M. Dawson of Waco, chairman of the Southern Baptist Convention committee on world peace; and Dr. William B. Lippard, New York, editor of Missions.

We were asked to present to the delegates at the United Nations Conference certain statements of the Baptist position, particularly on freedom of religious worship, as follows:

"As the chosen representatives of all the major Baptist bodies, having more than 11,000,000 members, who by personal choice and voluntary action have become members of the more than 65,000 local churches within the United States, we humbly petition you to appoint a Commission on an International Bill of Rights, in which shall be formulated the universal and inalienable human rights that ought never to be invaded by any government.

"We look to you to forge a world in which religious persecution shall be forever proscribed. In this connection we respectfully call your attention to the effort toward this end made by President Wilson at the Paris Peace Conference in 1919.

"Knowing that you are committed to a world organization

founded upon the eternal principles of right, we pray that you give the most serious consideration to the principle illustrated in our national life which has promoted peace, good-will and fraternity among all religious groups, namely, the freedom of religion. We hold that religious liberty is the ground of all human liberties, and it pre-conditions the stability of democratic processes and institutions.

"The political experiment, inaugurated by the adoption of the American Bill of Rights in 1791, as an essential feature of our Federal Constitution, has been so amply proved to be the wise course for a democratic people to adopt, we are convinced that, in founding a world organization, a like course should be followed by the United Nations."

The committee at San Francisco had the honor and privilege to plead for these high principles of Baptist faith, among the delegates of the various nations.

We, your committee of World Peace of the Missouri Baptist General Association, recommend to the people of our churches as follows:

1. That we express our profound gratitude to God for the end of the slaughter and devastation of war, and for the return of peace on earth.

2. That we extend our sympathy to the victims of war in all lands, whether among the victors or the vanquished, for the crimes against humanity which the war has committed, for the suffering the war has caused and for the prostitution of the arts and sciences to purposes of death and destruction.

3. That we work prayerfully, continuously and vigorously for a Christian brotherhood of man, as the basis for a just and durable peace.

4. That we strive to uphold and extend the application of the principle of complete separation of church and state.

5. That we continue our historic battle for freedom of conscience, for freedom of worship, and for freedom of communications, everywhere and among all men and nations; and in this connection, that we insist that future negotiations by representatives of our government with foreign powers in planning peace treaties and agreements be open rather than secret, with full publicity as to proposals, discussions and conclusions, so that we may realize the Christian ideal of open covenants openly arrived at.

6. That we oppose the concepts and practices of power politics, domination of strong states over the weak, creation and maintenance of spheres of influence which prevent free intercourse among peoples, and the exploitation of backward peoples; that instead, we work toward the realization of a federation of nations based upon international law, which embraces and exemplifies the principles of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

7. We recommend that for the troubled years ahead, this special committee be made a standing committee, to be of any possible

assistance to our churches and our people in establishing a lasting peace on earth.

## AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE II OF BY-LAWS

1. Strike out Section 1, C of Article II.

2. Amend so as to read:

The moderator shall appoint at least 90 days prior to the annual meeting—a committee of ten on nominations. This committee shall meet at the discretion of the Chairman but in any case not later than the day preceding the first session of the annual meeting. This committee shall make nominations for officers of the Association and for members of the Executive Board. Said committee shall also submit or present to the Association for election, confirmation or approval, as the case may be, or for such other purposes as may be requested by the managers thereof, the names of all persons necessary to fill vacancies on the managing boards, or bodies, by whatever name known, of the following Baptist institutions, provided, however, that no salaried employee of any institution shall be placed on the Board of Trustees:

or any other institution or interest that may be organized or created hereafter.

19. Announcement was made of the death today of Rev. W. H. Elsey, Aurora; and Rev. A. B. Rose, Holden. On motion of Joseph E. Brown, Kansas City, the Secretary was requested to send a letter of condolence to the family of these two brothers, and also, to reply to the telegram received from John W. Lowe, Richmond, Va.

20. Joseph E. Brown, Kansas City, addressed the Association on the work of the Southern Baptist Hospital, New Orleans, La. Hymn, "Wonderful Words of Life."

21. Time having arrived for the discussion of the Report of the State Executive Board, T. W. Medearis, Kansas City, led in the discussion, using the time assigned for the consideration of this report. On motion of Oliver Shank, St. Louis, the time was extended thirty minutes and each speech limited to three minutes.

On motion of Walter C. Goodson, Macon, it was voted to consider the report seriatim.

C. E. Copeland, St. Louis, presented the following proposal concerning the matter of Special Offerings:

"The Superintendents of the three Philanthropic Institutions propose, subject to the approval of their respective governing Boards, to refrain from taking special offerings through the Baptist churches during the year, 1946, nor will they expect the General Association to take such special offerings during that year, depending for adequate support entirely on the receipts of the Co-Operative Program and individual contributions, with the single exception of the Children's Home Birthday Offering, which will be continued."

In answer to the above proposal, the following motion was made by Ralph M. G. Smith, Kirksville, which motion was seconded and carried:

"If the Boards of Trustees of the Philanthropic Institutions approve of the proposal of their superintendents to do away with all State Denominationally Sponsored Special Offerings in 1946, that all references to any Special Offerings sponsored by the Institutions or the Missouri Baptist General Association in the report of the State Board be deleted from that report."

(This proposal and subsequent motion bring about the following deletion from the State Board Report as originally presented to the Association--namely, under the heading "The Cooperative Program and Special Offerings," beginning with parenthesis six (6) and going to the next heading of "Hollister Hill").

Walter C. Goodson, Macon, spoke relative to the "Hollister Hill" item and offered the following amendment:

"That it is the sense of this Association that it does not invest in any more Assembly property of this kind."

Joseph E. Brown, Kansas City, presented the following amendment:

"That the entire matter of "Hollister Hill" be referred to a Committee of five to be appointed by the Moderator to report back to the Executive Board at its next meeting."

The two amendments, relative to "Hollister Hill" were lost.

On motion of Alvin G. Hause, Kansas City, the further discussion of the Report of the State Executive Board was deferred until 3:15 p. m., under the item of Miscellaneous Business.

#### ✓ SOUTHWEST BAPTIST COLLEGE

The report of the Board of Trustees and Administration of Southwest Baptist College is hereby presented for your consideration. It is presented with gratitude to God and the many friends of the college for every evidence of progress that the institution is able to show.

**Enrollment.** The current session opened September 3, and the college now has enrolled the largest number of students that it has ever had at this season. The total to date is 304. The highest previous enrollment at this season was 286, and one year ago it was 210. The student body is at present divided as follows: sophomores 59, freshmen 165, specials 14, academy 12, special music 54. Included in this number are 46 ministerial students and 27 missionary volunteers. We are particularly glad to note also that these students come from every section of Missouri and from eight other states. They come from some of the very best high schools, and many of them have impressive high school records; therefore our students measure up in quality as well as quantity.

We enrolled for the 1945 summer term a total of 340 for the ten weeks' term and 129 for the five weeks' term. Among the summer students there were about 200 public school teachers. From these figures it can readily be seen that the college is utilizing all its facilities to their fullest capacity. In fact, it would be hard to estimate the number of students the college might enlist if it had sufficient buildings and equipment.

**Financial Condition.** Southwest Baptist College is free of indebtedness, and it is being operated well within its current income, and considerable improvements are being made on the buildings while the educational service is being expanded and strengthened. A copy of our auditor's report for the last fiscal year has been sent to State Headquarters, and a condensed balance sheet will be prepared to supplement this report. It will reveal a favorable operating balance for the year.

The college has made no financial appeal to the churches during 1945. Instead those who have represented the college on the field have done all they could to promote the William Jewell College campaign. We have, however, made some contact with alumni and special friends of the college in the interest of our building program. There has been conducted also a local campaign in the town of Bolivar. All funds received from these sources and other funds which have been sent to the college and so designated have been added to our building fund.

All told, we believe the college is in the best financial condition it has ever experienced. This is due almost entirely to the increased financial support the college is receiving from the churches through the Cooperative Program.

**Building Program.** The college has undertaken to keep our people informed concerning its building needs and plans. The men's dormitory with a capacity of one hundred students to cost about \$80,000 is to be contracted and built this winter so as to be ready for use next fall. The firm Hawkins and Esterly, Springfield, are the architects. This project has been delayed a

few months pending developments in the labor and material markets.

As soon as possible the central heating plant will be contracted also. This project calls for an expenditure of about \$38,000, and it is absolutely necessary for the proper operation of our school plant. It should be completed by the time the men's building is, in order to provide heating facilities for this and the other buildings.

Our longer range plans call for an enlargement of the girls' dormitory and dining hall, and also some additional school buildings. Of course, our Board of Trustees very wisely proceeds on the policy of paying as they go, and it is not anticipated that the institution will incur any building debts.

We are assuming that this meeting of the General Association will project some plans to assist the college in its building program. No more urgent need than this now confronts Baptist people. It would be a crime for us to fail to provide the buildings this very useful and rapidly growing school so urgently needs.

**Board Vacancies.** In compliance with the provisions of our constitution and the procedure of the General Association our Board of Trustees has submitted to the nominating committee of this Association a list of nominees to fill vacancies on the Board.

**General Statement.** The trustees, administration, staff members, and students of Southwest Baptist College record their deep gratitude for the support which Missouri Baptists are giving to Southwest Baptist College. We are mindful of the fact that we are dependent upon this support for the maintenance of the institution and for all our plans and prospects for improvement and expansion. We, therefore, pledge anew our loyalty to the General Association and our purpose to cooperate with the Association in all its program.

#### HANNIBAL-LAGRANGE COLLEGE

The Board of Trustees, the staff, the faculty and students of Hannibal-LaGrange College send Christian greetings to the messengers of the Missouri Baptist General Association assembled in the one hundred eleventh annual session in St. Joseph, Mo., October 30-November 1. We are deeply grateful to all Missouri Baptists for their loyal support of the College, and we are happy to state that

with one accord we have all sought to prove ourselves worthy of your confidence and support.

One year ago we were able to report the liquidation of the old debts of the college. We are happy to report that no new debts have been made at any time by the present administration. The gifts of Missouri Baptists and of other friends have not only made it possible to dispose of the old debts, but also enabled the College to meet current bills and salaries promptly.

The enrollment for the current year is increased by forty per cent above the enrollment of one year ago and has just passed the two hundred mark. This includes both full time students and all special students. There are twenty-two ministerial students and a large number of volunteers for special service. Our dormitories are crowded and more room is urgently needed.

The quality of the student body is a matter of great interest. The students enrolled in Hannibal-LaGrange College this year come from every section of Missouri and from seven other states, namely: Illinois, Arkansas, Georgia, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, North Carolina, and Texas. Two students from Hawaii are also enrolled in Hannibal-LaGrange College. Most of our students have made excellent records in the high schools from which they have come and they are making good records here. Forty-four are from Hannibal. The next largest group is from St. Louis with a total of seventeen students. One very pleasing feature is the fact that there has been a very large increase in the number of men. This number will increase as the men return from military service. Several veterans are already enrolled in Hannibal-LaGrange College.

We note with gratitude that the gifts of Missouri Baptists to the Cooperative Program are increasing. Hannibal-LaGrange College received \$15,104.49 during the past year. This is an increase of \$4,612.25 above the preceding year. The special gifts of individuals and churches reached a total of \$30,672.31, but about \$15,000.00 of this amount should have been in the College office before the books of the College were audited one year ago. The receipts from gifts and pledges for the year amounts to about \$15,000.00 and a part of this is money from the Missouri Hundred Thousand Club. All the above figures, both from the Cooperative Program and the gifts and pledges of individuals and churches, are for the year ending July 31, 1945. Our books are audited annually on July 31.

We have operated the college as economically as possible throughout the present administration. During the past year the net income from the farm was \$2,290.47 as against a net income of \$2,586.35 the preceding year. The net income from the dormitories amounted to \$1,081.38. The college dining hall was operated at a loss of \$692.49 and it was operated with a small loss the preceding year. We have attempted to keep the price of room and board low so that worthy students could attend the college. The executive office expenses during the past year was \$3,038.92 less than the preceding year. The instructional expenses, which included salaries of

teachers and supplies for teachers reached a total of \$21,396.33 which is an increase of \$1,033.82 over the preceding year. The total operating expenses of the college during the past year amounted to \$36,665.72 which is \$4,488.91 less than the total operating expenses of the preceding year. Revenue from tuition and fees amounted to \$11,754.03 which is an increase of \$2,019.03 over the preceding year. Income from all sources other than gifts amounted to \$16,884.97 during the past year, or twenty-seven per cent. Gifts and pledges accounted for seventy-three per cent of the revenue. In summing up the audit for the past year, our auditor says: "The members of the Board of Trustees and the college officials are to be congratulated for their efforts which resulted in the payment of all obligations and debts of the college. An effort should be made to increase the total revenue from students to place the college on a sounder financial basis." It would, therefore, seem imperative that the revenue from the students in various forms must provide a larger per cent of the total funds needed to operate the college.

Hannibal-LaGrange College has a strong faculty. All the work offered in Hannibal-LaGrange College is fully accredited by the committee on Accredited Schools and Colleges of the University of Missouri. During the past year one member of our faculty has resigned. Dr. Glynn A. Brooks closed three years' work with the college on August 15, to accept a position as head of the Social Science Department of East Texas Baptist College, Marshall, Texas. Professor Edwin F. Moore, who has just been released from Military service and who was formerly employed by the college, has returned to the campus and has accepted a position as dean of the college. Mrs. Edwin F. Moore has also returned to the college to serve as head of the Department of Education. No other changes have been made in the faculty of the college during the past year. Rev. A. J. Johnson, college evangelist, has served in that capacity for more than a year. Brother Johnson is a man of much experience and has given a good account of himself both as pastor and evangelist. He has been engaged in revival meetings constantly ever since he came to the employ of the college. Hannibal-LaGrange College believes in Evangelism and is seeking to emphasize evangelism by the employment of Brother Johnson to work among the churches.

Rev. Monte Peterson, a native of Northeast Missouri and for several years pastor of the First Baptist Church, Kahoka, Mo., began work with the college on August 1, as director of promotion. He is well and favorably known in Northeast Missouri. He will give all of his time to student enlistment and to finances. He is already making an excellent record.

The time has come when Hannibal-LaGrange College must expand in order to meet the increasing demands for the service it has to offer. The Board of Trustees, the President of the College, and the Alumni and friends insist on pressing their appeal by every legitimate means in order that we may serve the young people and the churches of Northeast Missouri. The ultimate goal is the building of a college at least twice the present size with buildings, equipment, and endowment sufficient to enable the college to render the

best of service to an ever increasing enrollment. The immediate needs include the following:

(1) A Central Heating Plant. This must be provided before long and must be built on a scale large enough to care for the present buildings and future buildings.

(2) A New Dormitory for Girls. Plans are already drawn for this building. Our present dormitory is full to capacity and applications are now being received for September of next year. These applications are from students we could not admit this year for lack of room.

(3) A Student Center. This building is urgently needed now. The religious and social life of Hannibal-LaGrange College could be made much more effective if we had a building in which to have our various student activities. This building will not cost a large sum of money and we are hoping and praying that this may be erected by some one as a memorial building for a loved one who has passed away.

(4) Endowment and Student Aid Funds. Our endowment should be increased to at least \$100,000.00 at the earliest possible moment. We have added \$1,900.00 to the endowment this year, and the total endowment was \$22,337.84 as of July 31, 1945.

The college places much emphasis on religion. The following organizations are found on the campus at Hannibal-LaGrange College: Baptist Student Union, College Y.W.A., and Ministerial Alliance. Early morning prayer meetings and noon-day prayer meetings are maintained daily. A mid-week prayer service is held each Thursday evening with both faculty and students participating. Four chapel services are held weekly. We reaffirm our statement which was made in this report one year ago and two years ago to the effect that the highest moral standards are maintained on the campus of Hannibal-LaGrange College. No student is allowed to indulge in drinking, profanity, smoking, card playing, dancing, or any other evils too prevalent in other schools, neither on the campus nor off the campus. Moreover, the college is loyal to "the faith once delivered to the saints."

With gratitude to God for His abundant mercy to us and with deep and abiding appreciation of the unfailing support of Missouri Baptists, we pledge ourselves to carry on faithfully in this task which has been committed to us.

24. Hugh Stephens, Columbia, presented the report of

#### STEPHENS COLLEGE

Since inauguration some years ago of the Cooperative Budget there has grown up a tendency to think and speak of institutions in this state as Baptist according to whether or not they received funds from said budget. By mutual agreement between Stephens College and the Missouri Baptist General Association, approved in

1936 at the Kansas City meeting of the Association, Stephens College ceased to receive funds from the Cooperative Budget but did not cease to be a Baptist institution.

It seems advisable at this time to reiterate that Stephens College is historically and legally a Baptist college. It was chartered by the Missouri Legislature as such in 1857. It was established as such by the General Association in 1870. According to the report of the Association's Committee of Ten adopted in 1931 it is "One of the two original and only colleges founded by or at the request of the General Association." It is and has been affiliated with the General Association for seventy-five years.

Unless Stephens College has an appeal as a Baptist institution it has no appeal as the representative of any group.

The status of Stephens College as a Baptist institution requires restatement at this time because in the report of the special Committee of Nine on the relationship of institutions to the Missouri Baptist General Association, which report will be considered at this session, Stephens College is not included among the list of Baptist institutions in this state. That omission results from the use of a formula limiting Baptist institutions to those affiliated with the General Association by participation in the Cooperative Budget.

There was not, of course, any intention on the part of the committee to eliminate Stephens College from the roster of Baptist institutions. However, the report, in our opinion, shows need for some new formula whereby institutions like Stephens College may not lose their status as Baptist institutions when and if they obtain financial support without drawing upon the Cooperative Budget.

To designate a college as identified with a given denomination for a long time and then withhold mention thereof along with others, will obviously create for it serious problems. The Baptist of Missouri invited Stephens College into its family of institutions in 1870 and put upon it the stamp of a Baptist college.

The tangible results of that act have sometimes been difficult to measure, but the intangible results are important. Affiliation with the General Association has a value, although the financial terms of such affiliation are more or less informal. Both the Association's committee of 1931 and the committee of 1945 take pains to repeat that "The Missouri Baptist General Association has no educational work and has no colleges in the sense that the state organization owns any property, underwrites any obligations or directs the details of educational college affairs."

Passing from discussion of the terms of relationship with institutions as to financing, it will be found that the terms as to administration of educational institutions are not much more clearly defined. Baptist educational institutions are required to "maintain educational standards prevailing in the state." They are not required to give denomination instruction or to indoctrinate, but only to give "each year a reasonable amount of religious instruction."

Where institutions "share in financial support of Missouri Baptists" they are required to have certain of their officials and a



majority of their faculties and boards members of Baptist Churches in Missouri.

Here are the facts with reference to Stephens College:

1. Its President, the President of its Board of Curators and its Director of Research are members of Baptist churches in Missouri. At least half its Curators are Baptists but not all members of Baptist churches in Missouri. A large number, but not a majority of its teachers, are Baptists. Its faculty is composed of Christian men and women, all of whom agree to uphold its religious ideals and objectives. It does not require a majority of its faculty membership in Baptist churches. Being without funds from Baptist sources to assure the balancing of its budget, it is not in position to require that a majority of its staff be members of Baptist churches in Missouri.

As evidence that Stephens College is now and has up to this time been regarded as a Baptist institution by the Missouri Baptist General Association, it is accorded a place on the official program of the General Association. It submits to the Association regular reports. In order to carry out resolutions of the General Association voted in 1936, the college submits annually for the information of the Association the names of all curators.

After nearly three-quarters of a century under sponsorship of the Missouri Baptist General Association it became evident that Stephens College could not discharge its mission effectively and maintain solvency without some substantial fiscal arrangement other than that resulting from that sponsorship alone. The college was compelled to work out its own salvation financially, but did not cease to be a Baptist institution.

In the earlier years when the college strove to comply with denominational regulations it incurred yearly deficits and was without funds to pay its debts or to provide for upkeep and improvement. It came face to face with one or the other of two alternatives: Failure and liquidation, the fate of all other Baptist schools for women in this state, leaving the Baptists without representation at Columbia, the state's seat of learning; or adoption of policies which would enable the college to preserve the Baptist good name, and achieve the aims of its founders by whom it was chartered as a Baptist school before it was taken over by the Missouri Baptist General Association in 1870. The college chose the latter course with what success the public acquainted.

We want Stephens College to be a credit to the denomination. Not only have the curators and management been able to preserve the only school exclusively for women the Baptist have in this state, they have been able to devise and develop a program for womanhood, motherhood and the home which has established a preeminence throughout the nation. The college has emphasized and dignified religion on the campus of Stephens College in a way not surpassed upon any campus in America. Although we have on our Board of Curators some who are not members of Baptist churches in Missouri and some who are not members of Baptist churches elsewhere, we have a board composed of some of the ablest educators in the coun-

try. It is the unanimous vote of that board that Stephens College continue as a Baptist school and be affiliated with the Missouri Baptist General Association.

The present enrollment at Stephens College is the largest in its history, 2,170. Students are there from forty-seven states, the District of Columbia and seven foreign countries. Since the report of the Association's Committee of Ten was submitted in 1931 the endowment, the property and the enrollment of Stephens College have all trebled and without receipts from the Hundred Thousand or similar funds it has liquid resources at this time sufficient to retire its obligations which situation has improved in much greater proportion than the other situations referred to above.

#### WILLIAM JEWELL COLLEGE

William Jewell College opened the fall session with 335 civilian students, which is a few more than we had at the opening of the college one year ago. Of this number, 94 are preparing for full-time Christian work. During the college year 1944-45 we enrolled 365 students in the fall, winter, and spring terms, and 120 students in the summer school. Of the 365 students, 278 were from Missouri. The others came from 25 states and from Hawaii and Guatemala.

#### Faculty Changes

Few changes have been made in the faculty during the year.

George Charles Beamer, Associate Professor of Psychology, Joe Sinclair Amery, Jr., Debate Coach and Director of Enrollment, B. Edward Denton, Head of Department of Mathematics, and Wilbur Bruner, Instructor in Spanish and French, are still serving with the armed forces.

Lloyd W. Stark has resigned as Acting Head of the Department of Mathematics and is succeeded by Lee Oran Jones of the Department of Physics. D. V. La Frenz will teach Professor Jones' classes in Physics until Professor Denton returns from the war.

Thurston Fayette Isley, Associate Professor of Education, is promoted to full professor.

After seventeen years of efficient service as Dean of the college, Dr. Allen J. Moon resigned the deanship and was succeeded by Leonard A. Duce, Professor of Philosophy. Dr. Moon will continue his service as Head of the Department of Ancient Languages and Professor of Latin.

#### Death of Trustee

Again the college has suffered loss in the death of a faithful

trustee. Mr. Lex McDaniel died December 1, 1944, following a brief illness. He was an alumnus of the college and had served on the Board of Trustees for eight years. He was faithful in attendance upon the meetings of the Board and the meetings of the Executive Committee. He loved the college and served its interests with pure devotion. He was especially active in enlisting prospective students in his own church where he served many years as a deacon.

### Special Gifts

Since the last report the following gifts have been received:

Mr. Joe L. Clarke of the class of 1898 gave four pieces of Kansas City real estate valued at \$15,000 to provide two scholarships at \$5,000 each and a special gift to the Fruit Memorial.

The late Mr. Arch McGinnis provided in his will a bequest of \$1,000 to the College.

Three annuity gifts have been received, Mrs. Maude Bridges, \$7,200; Miss Emma N. Smith, \$3,000; Dr. W. J. Robinson, \$1,400.

Mr. Harry L. Byler and his wife Nina D. Byler made an annuity gift to the college of an apartment house in Kansas City. They are to receive the net income for life. A committee from the Board of Trustees has been appointed to appraise the value of this property.

### John Phelps Fruit Memorial

On December 10, 1943, the Executive Committee of the Alumni Association adopted a resolution inaugurating the campaign of the alumni to raise \$250,000 for the endowment of the Department of English in honor of Dr. John Phelps Fruit who was Professor of English for forty-five years. Dr. John B. Pew proposed the plan of promoting the campaign through class organization and was elected chairman of the class committee. Dr. Pew and Mr. Minetry Jones have secured fifty class leaders each of whom has personally pledged a minimum of \$500 and has accepted a minimum quota of \$2,500 for his class. The campaign thus far has produced \$36,683.90 in cash. Four classes have already exceeded their minimum goal of \$2,500. Two gifts of property have been received which will amount to \$10,000. Fifteen additional classes will average \$500 each. It appears that up to this date approximately \$130,000 is pledged. Dr. Pew and his associates expect to reach the goal of \$250,000 before Commencement in 1946.

### Missouri Baptist Campaign

The Missouri Baptist General Association at its annual session in St. Louis in October, 1944, approved the recommendation of its Executive Board that complete cooperation be given William Jewell College during the year 1945 in an approach to the churches in Missouri for gifts amounting to \$250,000 toward the Centennial Endowment of the college. Immediately following the St. Louis meeting the college administration organized an Executive Committee to promote the campaign with Mr. Minetry Jones as Director. Mr. Jones and his associates organized the State by divisions and associations, suggested quotas for the churches, presented the campaign to the pastors in a series of group meetings throughout the State and enlisted speakers to help raise the money in the churches.

The progress of the Endowment Campaign thus far has been highly encouraging. The campaign has given the College an opportunity to tell its story to the Baptists of Missouri, and this contact with the churches has resulted in new understanding and new appreciation of the importance of Christian Education.

It is early yet to prophesy the final results of the campaign, but we earnestly hope that during the next two months many more churches will accept the suggested quotas and bring the campaign to complete victory.

### Thomas Portrait

The 96th anniversary of the founding of the college was celebrated February 27th in a formal program in Gano Chapel under the auspices of the Alumni Association, at which time Miss Mamie Thomas of Blue Springs, Missouri, presented a George Caleb Bingham portrait of her great-grandfather, Robert Stewart Thomas, first President of William Jewell College. It was appropriate that Dr. Robert I. Wilson, Pastor of the First Baptist Church of Kansas City, should deliver the address of the occasion because the first President of the college had resigned to organize and become the first pastor of the First Baptist Church of Kansas City.

### Chapel Speakers

The thirty minutes chapel service, held three times a week, is a popular feature of college life. Ordinarily the President is the speaker at chapel. In his absence, a member of the faculty speaks. Among the guest speakers this year the students have enjoyed hearing President Harwell G. Davis of Howard College, President J. R. Grant of Ouachita College, President Ellis A. Fuller of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, President S. H. Jones of Southwest Baptist College, Mr. Chas. A. Wells, cartoonist, Dr. Roberto De La Rosa of Mexico, Rabbi Samuel Mayerberg, Missionary Earnest O. Mills of Japan, Field Secretaries Phil Harris and Sibley Burnett of the Sunday School Board, and the following distinguished ministers: Dr. Marshall Craig, Dr. M. E. Bratcher, Rev. Alvin G. Hause, Dr. James Ivey, Dr. W. W. Pierce, Rev. A. P. Hamrick, Dr. William Benfield, Dr. Allen S. Cutts.

### Achievement Day

Monday, November 20, 1944, marked the inauguration of an annual Achievement Day to honor a group of seven representative alumni who have achieved distinction in various fields of endeavor and to set up an educational forum by which members of the student body can receive inspiration and advice from these alumni who are leaders in the fields of endeavor in which the students themselves plan to build their careers. Dr. Robert A. Millikan, Nobel prize winner, the chairman of the Executive Council of the California Institute of Technology, delivered the Achievement Day address and accepted the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws.

### President Truman

All friends of the College are pleased to know that the President

of the United States has accepted the invitation to attend Achievement Day Convocation at the College on the morning of November 15 to accept the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws. The President will also deliver the Achievement address at a dinner at the Muehlebach Hotel that evening.

#### **New Administration Building**

Through the generosity of Mr. W. D. Johnson, President of the Board of Trustees and generous benefactor of the College, we are to erect within the next year a handsome new Administration Building which will be a memorial to Dr. John Priest Greene who was for many years the beloved President of the College.

"Old Ely" Dormitory will be razed to make room for the new building which will face the Library on a quadrangle.

#### **Historic Jewell Hall**

Jewell Hall is still the center of academic life on the campus. It is the recitation hall for all classes except those which meet in the Science Hall. This beautiful and historic building needs to be renovated and equipped for further service. Here is an opportunity for some friend to make a gift to the College which will bear rich fruit in the lives of future student generations.

#### **Faculty Salaries**

During the war period while we have had the Naval units on the campus, the members of our faculty have received additional salaries by teaching part-time in the Navy School.

The Navy School will close December 15th, and we will be confronted with the problem of faculty salaries. During the war period, when the cost of living has increased so radically and when salaries and wages have increased correspondingly, our teachers' salaries have remained low. The time has come when we must provide an increase. This increase will go into effect in December and will seriously affect our budget problem. We bring this matter to the attention of the Baptists of the State and all other friends of the College in the hope that it will inspire an increased financial support.

#### **Religious Activities**

##### **H. I. HESTER**

In recent years there has been a steady growth in the religious life of William Jewell College. The contagious influence of a wholesome, happy Christian spirit permeates the life of both faculty and students.

We have a number of organizations on the campus whose purpose is the development of Christian ideals and activities. These organizations began their work early in the session and are now functioning effectively. The work of the B.S.U. Council and of the Y.W.A. is especially effective.

The regular worship services held in the Chapel are especially helpful for both students and faculty. Under the direction of President Binns and other members of the faculty these periods of worship are kept at a high level and are genuinely appreciated by the students. The pastors of the various local churches are frequent visitors to the campus. These men are frequently the guest speakers

for the Chapel services. They all cooperate heartily in the development of the Christian ideals of the college.

There are ninety-four ministerial and missionary students enrolled for this session. This is a 28.4 per cent of the student body. The number is a bit smaller this year. In this group there are some outstanding young men and young women who give real promise of leadership in Christian service. The regular weekly meetings of this group are of a high order and are helpful to all of those who attend. From time to time outside speakers appear before this group, and their messages are stimulating and helpful to the students.

Various classes in the Department of Religion and Philosophy are somewhat larger than usual. With the large number of courses now offered in this Department the influence of the Department is exceedingly vital and helpful in the religious life of the school. More than fifty per cent of the student body is enrolled in the various classes in this Department.

We feel that the session of 1945-46 will show steady progress in the realization of Christian ideals for which William Jewell has been so favorably known.

#### Report of Dean LEONARD A. DUCE

Four members of our faculty are still on leave of absence with the Armed Services, Professor A. B. Denton, Head of the Department of Mathematics, Professor George Beamer of the Department of Psychology, Mr. Wilbur Bruner of the Department of Spanish and Mr. Joseph Amery, Enrollment Director and Coach of Forensics.

In May Professor Lloyd Stark resigned to accept a position with Atlantic Christian College in North Carolina and Professor L. O. Jones was appointed Acting Head of the Department of Mathematics.

Mr. D. V. La Frenz, who has been teaching in the Naval School at William Jewell College, has assumed the duties of Instructor in Physics.

In June of this year, Dr. Allen J. Moon, who had been Dean of the College for fourteen years, resigned the Deanship. He is continuing as Head of the Department of Classical Languages and as Professor of Latin. Professor Leonard A. Duce succeeded Dr. Moon as Dean of the College on July 1st.

Miss Alma Hunt, Dean of Women, spent the summer doing graduate work at Columbia University, New York City.

The Department of Social Sciences has been divided into two departments, the Department of Sociology with Professor C. W. Smith as Acting Head and the Department of Economics and Political Science under the direction of Professor C. O. Van Dyke.

Professor P. Caspar Harvey spent the summer assisting Mr. Ted Malone on his "Between the Book Ends" broadcast over NBC.

Dr. Laurence Cleland taught Bible courses in the state summer assemblies of Missouri, Colorado and Wyoming.

Dr. Franklin T. Walker, Acting Head of the Department of

English, has been elected to membership in the Balzac Society of America whose headquarters are in Brooklyn, New York.

During the summer many of our professors were engaged in teaching heavy schedules in the N.A.R.U. school, while others conducted regular summer school classes in the College.

### **Business Manager**

**J. E. DAVIS**

The Navy contract with William Jewell College will terminate December 13, 1945. It began operating January 1, 1943. During the two years they have been with us, approximately 3,700 men have received ground training at William Jewell. It has been a pleasure to have these carefully selected men with us and I believe many will be interested in returning to William Jewell for their academic training when they are out of the Navy. Net income from this endeavor has been \$56,387.61. This has enabled the college to pass through this period of low enrollment during the war without incurring any considerable indebtedness.

The Board of Trustees authorized Tuttle-Ayers-Woodward Company to make a topographical survey of the campus in order that a definite plan of landscaping can be put in operation. The landscape project has been given to Hare and Hare of Kansas City, Missouri, who are now making plans for the future William Jewell campus.

Through the generosity of Mr. W. D. Johnson, funds have been provided for the erection of an administration building. This will necessitate the removal of Old Ely Hall, as the new building will be located just to the east of the present location of this building.

The Turner Memorial Building, which is a part of Melrose Hall, has been remodeled during the summer so as to take care of more girls and at the same time affords a recreation room 42 by 22 feet. This has added greatly to the comfort and pleasure of eighty girls who occupy the building.

The comparison of the 1945 budget and 1941 actual income and expenses results in some very interesting percentages. Student income in the four years has increased 45.3 per cent. Endowment income has increased 3.7 per cent. Dining Hall and Residence income has increased 59.8 per cent. Gifts and bequests have increased 34.5 per cent. Total income has increased 36 per cent. During this same period endowment has been increased 22 per cent. It will be of special interest to Missouri Baptists to note that it is now taking an increase of 22 per cent in the endowment fund to give the college an increased income of 3.7 per cent. If any one has any doubt of the necessity of the campaign to increase the endowment, this will be a complete answer. During the same period, the total expenditures have increased 33.3 per cent. Comparing this with the 36 per cent increase in income, it is evident some progress is being made toward balancing the budget.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE OF NINE TO MISSOURI BAPTIST GENERAL ASSOCIATION AT ITS 1945 SESSION

Your Committee of Nine, heretofore appointed by your Moderator pursuant to authority given him by virtue of the adoption of a motion hereafter set out by your Association at its session in St. Louis last year, respectfully submits its report as follows:

#### Provisions for Appointment of Committee

Paragraph 56 of the minutes of the Association at its meeting October 24-26, 1944, pages 156 and 157 states:

"On motion of Ralph M. G. Smith, Kirksville, it was voted that a committee of nine be appointed by the Moderator to make a study of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Missouri Baptist General Association and the relationship of the various Institutions of Missouri Baptists to the Missouri Baptist General Association and report its findings and recommendations to the 1945 session of the Association."

Your Moderator appointed on this Committee; Scott R. Timmons, Kansas City, Chairman; John B. Edwards, St. Louis; Louis Giedinghaden, St. Louis; Ross E. Feaster, Windsor; Grant Davis, Springfield; Rev. H. H. McGinty, Cape Girardeau; Rev. Ralph M. G. Smith, Kirksville; Rev. B. A. Pugh, Joplin; and Rev. W. W. Pierce, St. Joseph.

#### Circumstances Prompting Provision for Appointment of Committee

When the report of the Nominating Committee, provided for by Article II Section C, of the Associations' By-Laws, was read, it was found that certain names presented for approval by the Missouri Baptist Children's Home had been omitted from the list and other names substituted by the Nominating Committee. Thereupon a ruling was requested from the Moderator as to the right of a Nominating Committee to substitute names on Board of Trustees of various Institutions. The Moderator ruled that according to the By-Laws of the Missouri Baptist General Association, the Nominating Committee could not make such substitutions, and on appeal to the Body to decide the question, the Body sustained the ruling of the Moderator. A request was thereupon made that the Moderator give a ruling concerning the right of the Association to reject the requests of any Institution for approval of its Board of Trustees. Ruling on this request was reserved for further study, after which study the Moderator ruled that the Missouri Baptist General Association has the right to accept or reject in whole or in part the report

of any of our Institutions, provided such acceptance or rejection does not conflict with the Constitution or By-Laws. After this ruling, the Report of the Nominating Committee was approved with the exception of that part relating to the Children's Home, which part so relating was referred back to the Board of Managers of the Home with the request that their final report be submitted to the State Executive Board for disposition.

### Organization and Meetings of Committee

Your Committee held its first meeting on April 9, 1945. W. W. Pierce was elected Vice-Chairman and Mrs. Thelma Hudson, Secretary to Dr. Medearis, graciously agreed to act as Secretary. It was agreed to divide the work of the Committee into three sub-committees; one dealing with Philanthropic Institutions, another dealing with Educational Institutions, and the other with the Constitution and By-Laws of the Association. These sub-committees as appointed were as follows:

Committee on Philanthropic Institutions: John B. Edwards, Chairman; Louis Giedinghaden, and H. H. McGinty.

Committee on Educational Institutions: Ralph M. G. Smith, Chairman; W. W. Pierce, and Scott R. Timmons.

Committee on Constitution and By-Laws: B. A. Pugh, Chairman; Ross E. Feaster, and Grant Davis.

The Committee requested Dr. Medearis to obtain for study the Constitution and By-Laws of some six or eight states in the Southern Convention and also to request copies of the Articles of Incorporation, Charters and By-Laws of the various Institutions receiving help from the General Association. The Institutions complied with the request and your Committee also studied Constitutions and By-Laws of General Associations of several other states. At the next meetings of the Committee, reports of the various sub-committees were received and discussed, and the chair authorized to appoint a Committee to draft our Report, such Committee so appointed being W. W. Pierce, Chairman; John B. Edwards, and B. A. Pugh. We acknowledge with gratitude the gracious cooperation of the heads of our Institutions and of Dr. Medearis and Mrs. Hudson.

Keeping in mind the Motion adopted authorizing the appointment of your Committee and determining the scope of its powers, we present our report in two parts or sections. Part One deals with our findings of the relationship of the Baptist Institutions with the General Association, which necessarily requires a finding as to (a) the nature of the General Association; (b) the Constitution and By-Laws of the General Association as they relate to the Institutions and their managing boards; (c) the Charters or Articles of Association of the Institutions and their By-Laws, all of which determine the legal relationship between the Institutions and the Associations; and (d) the cooperative relationship actually existing. Part Two are the recommendations of your Committee.

**Part I—Findings****A. Nature of the General Association**

The Association is a voluntary organization composed of accredited messengers from any missionary Baptist Church in sympathy with the objects of the Association and desiring to cooperate therewith, the messengers from the District Associations and members at large heretofore named as life members. "The object of the Association shall be to extend the Kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ; to provide a convenient means for the cooperation of the churches in their work and an efficient agency for their enlistment in Missions, Education, and Benevolence." (Constitution Art. II.) The General Association is denied any authority over the churches and is admonished not to "do anything that would in any way interfere with their complete autonomy and independence." (Constitution Art. V.) The Supreme Court of Missouri in the case of *Farm and Home Savings and Loan Associations vs. Mrs. F. W. Armstrong*, 337 Mo. 349, wherein it was sought to hold Mrs. Armstrong and about one hundred other messengers to the General Association liable on the note of Hardin College, held that the Missouri Baptist General Association existed as such only when in session, could own no property as a voluntary association, and its members could not be held liable for the debts of one of its Institutions, merely because, at that Institution's request, the Association *elected* its Trustees. We are in accord with the findings of the Committee of Ten reporting to the General Association at its meeting in St. Joseph held in July, 1931, concerning the Baptist Educational situation in Missouri, when it said: "The Missouri Baptist General Association has no educational work and has no colleges in the sense that the state organization owns any property, underwrites any obligations, or directs the details of the educational or college affairs. Each separate Baptist College operates under a charter, owns and controls its own property, handles its own finances, incurs and pays its own debts. The charters of these schools insure their operation by boards of curators or trustees, the majority of whose members belong to Baptist Churches." This committee of ten was composed of Lewis M. Hale, Springfield; Ryland Knight, St. Louis; Hugh Stephens, Jefferson City; R. S. Douglass, Cape Girardeau; Mrs. John F. Vines, Kansas City; Mrs. W. E. Spratt, St. Joseph; R. L. Davidson, Sedalia; John W. Crouch, Hannibal; David W. Hill, Excelsior Springs; and John B. Pew, Kansas City. We find that the General Association is in the same position with reference to its Philanthropic Institutions, in the sense that it owns none of their property and directs none of the details of their management. It seems apparent, therefore, that the General Association is a voluntary association of messengers of Churches with power to act only while in session as such.

**B. Constitution and By-Laws as They Relate to Institutions and Their Managing Boards****(1) CONSTITUTION**

The General Association was formed "to provide a convenient means for the cooperation of churches in their work and an efficient agency for their enlistment in Missions, Education, and Benevolence." (Art. II.) An Executive Board, incorporated under Mis-

souri laws is provided for, "which shall have charge of the Missionary, Educational, and Benevolent *work* of the Association." (Art. VIII Sec. I.) Among the general powers of the Executive Board is that it "shall have full power and authority to act for the General Association in the interim of the sessions of the Association in any and all matters that may arise affecting the interests *fostered* by the General Association." (Art. III Sec. 3b.) It is charged with the duty of presenting annually a budget for both state and southwide objects and to faithfully distribute all contributions made to the budget without further designation among the *objects* included in the budget upon the basis of the percentage fixed for each institution. (Art. III Sec. 3c.) This is the "Co-operative program." Among the specific powers of the Executive Board is the following: "The Board shall have general oversight over any and all educational and benevolent institutions owned, operated or maintained in whole or in part *by the denomination*; shall keep itself fully informed as to the conditions and needs of all such institutions; shall approve arrangements for all campaigns for funds; shall conduct a continuous campaign for enlightenment as to the claims and needs of these Institutions; and, in general, shall promote in every way possible their interests and the things for which they stand."

#### (2) BY-LAWS

Art. II, Sec. I provides for the appointment of a Committee on Committees which at the second session of the Association shall name, among others, a committee of ten on nominations. Sec. C provides: "This committee shall be appointed on the first day of the meeting and shall make nominations for officers of the Association and for members of the Executive Board. Said Committee shall also submit or present to the Association for election, confirmation or approval, as the case may be, or for such other purposes as may be requested by the managers thereof, the names of all persons necessary to fill vacancies on the managing boards, or bodies, by whatever name known, of the following Baptist institutions, provided, however, that no salaried employee of any institution shall be placed on the Board of Trustees: William Jewell College, Stephens College, Hannibal-LaGrange College, Southwest Baptist College, Missouri Baptist Hospital, Missouri Baptist Orphans Home, Home for Aged Baptists, Missouri Baptist Ministers Aid Society, and Missouri Baptist Historical Society."

#### Art. III provides:

"Sec. I. For the purpose of these By-Laws and in order that any institution may share in the financial support of Missouri Baptists contributed to and administered by the General Association, and to be considered a Missouri Baptist Institution, the institution concerned shall comply with the following conditions: Its president, or chief executive officer, and a majority of the members of its managing board shall be members of Baptist churches in Missouri; *their election shall be subject to approval of the General Association*; it shall not be conducted for private or corporate gains but all moneys received in excess of operating expenses shall be expended in improvements or shall be added to its permanent endowment; if it be an educational institution, a majority of the teachers shall be members of Baptist churches in Missouri, and it must conform to the educational standards prevailing in the state and must give

each year a reasonable amount of distinctively religious instruction; if it be a benevolent institution, it shall be engaged principally in the care of the sick, orphans, the aged, or other needy persons, and shall do as much gratuitous and charity work as possible; each and every such institution shall have been recommended by the Executive Board *for affiliation* with the General Association.

"Sec. II. The property of each educational and benevolent institution co-operating with and under the supervision of the Board must be safeguarded to the denomination in a manner satisfactory to the General Association; and each of these institutions shall submit its books and work to the inspection of the Executive Board whenever requested, and shall make annual reports to the Board concerning all matters required by the Board, the financial exhibit of each report to be audited by a certified public accountant."

The quoted provisions of the Constitution and By-Laws of the General Association indicate the following relationship of the Association, and its agent, the Executive Board, to Baptists Institutions:

1. Acts as the collector and distributor of funds contributed either to the co-operative program or designated to any institution.

2. Gives or withholds consent to any campaign for funds.

3. Elects, confirms, or approves vacancies on Boards of Trustees presented to the Nominating Committee. This is made necessary by provisions in some charters of institutions, that the General Association elects Trustees nominated by the institution to fill vacancies, while others provide for the Board itself to elect its own members to fill vacancies subject to approval of the General Association. There is no provision in either the Constitution or By-Laws giving the Nominating Committee any authority to nominate members on the Boards of Trustees of any institution, that is, to substitute names of its own for those presented by the Institution. Neither is there any *express* provision for the rejection of any nominations submitted. The reason for this omission is probably because the matter very seldom arises. If, however, the Association should fail to elect or confirm, this, of course, amounts to a rejection and there is no provision for a re-submission of new names nor is any power lodged in the Executive Board to elect or confirm names submitted for vacancies.

4. Plainly tells an Institution what it must do to be entitled to be called a Baptist Institution and to have a part in the distribution of funds that the General Association administers for its donors. If the institution does not conform to these requirements, the Executive Board can recommend that it be no longer "affiliated" with the General Association, which means it gets no more funds from that source.

5. Recognizes the management of each Institution to be in its Board of Trustees or Board of Managers, and the "general supervision" which the Executive Board is empowered to exercise can logically be construed to mean only seeing to it that an Institution meets the requirements set out by the By-Laws if it receives any funds disbursed by the Board. This term can mean nothing more,

otherwise it would have been useless to define by many limitations the kind of conditions an institution must meet in order to receive the support of Missouri Baptists.

6. The institutions are recognized as public or charitable institutions, hence the Trustees or Managers thereof are charged with the responsibility of faithfully carrying out the purposes for which they were founded, and administering them as Christian educational and benevolent institutions.

### C. The Charters and By-Laws of the Institutions

#### 1. EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

##### *William Jewell College*

This College was founded in 1849 by the Missouri Baptist General Association. It was incorporated by special Act of the General Assembly of Missouri. The preamble of the Act of the Legislature creating the College as a body corporate is as follows:

"Whereas, the United Baptists in Missouri and their friends are desirous of endowing and building up a college in the state, and for that purpose have, under the direction of the General Association of Baptists in Missouri, already secured pledges to the amount of about twenty thousand dollars, each payable in installments of six dollars per share annually; now therefore, to enable the parties above mentioned to carry out their contemplated purposes," etc.

Under its Charter, the properties of the College are held and its affairs managed by a Board of Trustees which is a self-perpetuating body. Under the Charter the Board has power from time to time to make such by-laws as they deem necessary. One of these by-laws reads:

"At each annual meeting the Board of Trustees may elect Trustees to fill vacancies, and for a term of three years only, and report their names to the General Association of Missouri Baptists for its confirmation, but at no time shall the Board of Trustees consist of more than twenty-six members, seven of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business."

We quote the following from the Report of a Committee, named by the General Association, made at Kansas City, 1927, as same pertains to William Jewell:

"The method of government for the College provided in the original charter is mandatory and exclusive. No departure can be made or authorized from that method by the trustees, the legislature or any other parties in interest. If the governing body (i. e., the trustees) should depart in their government of William Jewell College from the intention of the founders to establish, maintain, and perpetuate a Baptist College they would be guilty of a breach of trust which would amount to a misuser of the corporate franchise." This report was made by three distinguished Baptist lawyers, Judge Albert L. Reeves, Walter L. Hensley, and Maurice H. Winger.

##### *Hannibal-LaGrange College*

This College was a result of a merger in 1923 of LaGrange College, LaGrange, Missouri, and Hannibal College, Hannibal, Mis-

souri. Certificate of incorporation was issued to Hannibal-LaGrange College September 22, 1928. The charter of the merged institutions consists of the charters of the two colleges entering into the merger, together with the merger agreement. Briefly the combined charter provides for a board of control composed of members from the following Baptist Associations: Wyaconda, Pleasant Grove, North Missouri, North Central, Macon, Mt. Salem, Bethel, Monroe, Mt. Pleasant, Salt River, Culver, Bear Creek, and Calloway County. Delegates from other Baptist Associations than those mentioned and from Baptist churches, whether of Missouri or elsewhere, may, upon so being invited by the Board of Control, be entitled to full membership on such Board. If the churches and associations entitled to membership on this Board, should cease to elect members, then the College shall be under the sole control of, and its Board of Trustees elected by, the Missouri Baptist General Association. The Board of Control shall elect the Trustees of the College, as their terms expire, but no trustee so elected shall assume the duties of the office until his election is confirmed by the Missouri Baptist General Association. The Charter then provides: "The latter organization shall have power to fill any vacancy on the Board of Trustees made by its refusal to confirm any Trustee elected by the Board of Control." We take note of the fact that this provision is in the Charter, not in a by-law. The original Charter granted by the Legislature in 1859 provided in substance for a Board of not less than fifteen Trustees who shall hold title to all property of the College for its use and benefit.

#### *Southwest Baptist College*

The Amended Articles of Association of this College granted in 1921, provide for a Board of Trustees of fifteen members "which Board of Trustees shall have the control of and direct the management and business of the College." Section 3, Article V of the Articles provide that each year, prior to the annual meeting of the General Association, the Board of Trustees shall nominate ten persons qualified to act as Trustees, "and two such persons for each vacancy on said Board of Trustees, in order that the said Missouri Baptist General Association may from these nominees elect five Trustees to serve on said Board of Trustees for three years beginning January 1st following, and fill such vacancies."

The Charter recognizes the fact that the Institution and its property is held in Trust for Missouri Baptists by stating in Section 1, Article XIV as follows:

"Southwest Baptist College, its endowment funds and other property shall be forever held in trust by the Board of Trustees for the Baptists of the State of Missouri, to be controlled by the Missouri Baptist General Association, through the Board of Trustees of said College."

These provisions make clear that the management and operation of the college is in the Board of Trustees, and that its property must be held in sacred trust for the Baptists of this state under the "fostering care" (Sec. 2, Art. XIV) of the General Association.

It will be noticed that only in one charter, that of Hannibal-

LaGrange College, is provision made for the contingency of the failure of the General Association to confirm nominees for the Board of Trustees. Nor do we find any provision relating to this matter in any of the by-laws of these institutions.

## 2. PHILANTHROPIC INSTITUTIONS

### *Missouri Baptist Hospital*

This Institution was incorporated by a pro forma decree of the Circuit Court of St. Louis in 1890 under the name Missouri Baptist Sanitorium as provided by the statutes pertaining to benevolent corporations. Its articles or constitution provide that the Association shall consist of fifty persons, four-fifths of whom shall be members in good standing of churches of the Baptist denomination in Missouri and reside in this state. The first fifty members were appointed by the Missouri Baptist General Association at its meeting in Independence in October, 1890. Many names revered in Baptist history are among those named. The constitution provides that its property and all business matters "shall be controlled and managed by twenty-one persons to be designated as the Board of Managers." All members of the Board of Managers, and their successors perpetually must be members in good standing of Baptist churches and reside in Missouri.

The members of the Association are given power to fill vacancies in its own body caused by any reason, and to select its Board of Managers from its membership.

The Board of Managers hold office for three years, the term of one-third expiring each year. The successors of those whose terms expire are elected by the Association from among its own members.

There is no provision for the submission to the General Association for confirmation of persons selected to fill vacancies on the Board of Managers, but this has been consistently done since memory runneth not to the contrary.

### *The Home for Aged Baptists*

Incorporated by pro forma decree of the Circuit Court of Iron County, June 8, 1935.

The constitution provides that the property, business and affairs of the corporation shall be held and managed by twenty-one Trustees, each of whom shall be a member in good standing of a Baptist Church in Missouri and a resident thereof. The term of office of Trustees are for three years, the term of one-third expiring each year. No Trustee can serve longer than two consecutive terms. The Trustees shall recommend to the Missouri Baptist General Association at its annual meeting eligible persons for election to fill the terms of Trustees which may then expire. The Trustees shall be elected by the General Association and in case persons recommended are not acceptable or elected by the General Association, the Trustees are to submit other persons for election. There is no provision, however, to meet the contingency of the failure to elect the "other person" whose name is submitted save perhaps the provision that the Trustees shall have power to fill all vacancies until the next meeting of the General Association.



*Missouri Baptist Children's Home*

Incorporated by pro forma decree of the Circuit Court of St. Louis County. The constitution provides for a governing board of forty-two members who are members in good standing of Baptist churches in Missouri and shall reside therein. This Board elects members annually to fill vacancies subject to approval of the General Association. The management and conduct of the affairs of the home are in the hands of this Board of Control. There is no provision for the contingency of the General Association refusing to confirm names presented for vacancies.

It will thus be seen that the management of our Philanthropic Institutions is fixed by their charters granted by the state in the Board of Managers or Trustees, and that neither the charter or by-laws provide the method for filling vacancies on such boards in case the General Association shall fail to elect or confirm the nominees.

## ULTIMATE FINDINGS

Co-ordinating the findings above made from a consideration of the Constitution, By-Laws and Charters of the General Association and the Institutions, we find the legal relationship between the Association and said Institutions to be:

(a) The Association, or its Executive Board, acts as the agency for the collection and disbursement of funds contributed by Baptist co-operating churches or by individuals, in accordance with the co-operative program plan, or in accordance with the designation made by the donor.

(b) The Association, in its annual session each year, has the right to confirm the election of members of Board of Trustees or Managers to fill vacancies in such boards, the election thereto being made by the respective Boards. In case the charter of any Institution so provides, the Association shall have the right of election of members of such Boards nominated by such Boards. The right to confirm carries with it the power to reject.

(c) The Association has the right to fix the conditions under which it will permit an Institution to participate in the distribution of funds disbursed by it, through its Executive Board, as provided by its By-Laws, it being assumed that local churches in making gifts to the co-operative program are conversant with those conditions and thus assent thereto.

(d) The Association, or its Executive Board, has no authority to manage or control the operation of any Institution, the management and the details thereof, being fixed by law and by charter in the Boards of the respective Institutions.

(e) The Association has the obligation to see that the property of no Institution is diverted to a use foreign to that for which the Institution was founded. The law protects this right, and there has been brought to our attention no instance where the Board of Trustees, or Managers, of any institution have attempted to misuse

the trust imposed in them, or to divert to foreign uses its trust funds. The Association, as the representative through messengers, of the various churches contributing to the various institutions through the co-operative program is the beneficiary of these various trusts.

(aa) The Institutions, through their Board of Trustees or Managers, have the legal right to the sole management and control thereof. This right of management cannot legally be delegated to others. If, however, any Institution desires "affiliation" with the General Association and obtains its proportion of funds distributable by it, then it must of necessity meet the conditions fixed by the Association through its By-Laws.

(bb) The complete autonomy of each Institution in the management of its own affairs is safeguarded by its charter or laws under which organized; the constitution and by-laws of the General Association nowhere deny this autonomy and it should be vouchsafed to each Institution to the same extent as to each local Baptist church, even though such church may receive direct financial aid from the Association or receive other benefits from the services of the consecrated and talented leaders in charge of our denominational work in Missouri. This is historic Baptist principle.

(cc) Unless otherwise provided in the charter of the Institution a Board of Trustees serves, such Board has the right to elect, for confirmation by the General Association (Art. III, Sec. 1 of By-Laws) members to its Board to fill vacancies.

(dd) No Institution can make a special appeal to Missouri Baptists for funds without obtaining the authority of the Executive Board of the Association.

We, therefore, find that the various charters, constitutions and by-laws provide for a greater co-operative enterprise in the field of Christian Education and Philanthropy, between the General Association and our Baptist educational and philanthropic Institutions. Whether this co-operative enterprise works depends upon the good faith and Christian forbearance of all of us.

#### PRACTICAL RELATIONSHIP

The actual relationship between the General Association, the Executive Board and all of its officers, and our Baptist Institutions, has been most cordial and co-operative according to our personal observation. This is not to say that a closer tie is not possible and desirable. We feel confident the Institutions want to co-operate wholeheartedly in all of the board program of the Baptist denomination in Missouri and elsewhere. Sometimes irritants have cropped up first from one side or the other. But none of these are of such moment that solution cannot be reached by a frank, friendly, and, above all, Christian approach. A minor irritant we propose to offer a solution for in the Recommendations made a part hereof.

#### Part II—Recommendations

We have made findings above of the relationship between the Baptist Institutions participating in the co-operative program and

the General Association in accordance with the directions contained in the motion providing for the creation of our committee. These findings were of necessity based upon certain "rights" fixed by the effect of legal documents. But to a Christian, obligations are more compelling than rights. Most of our international and national problems arise out of states or individuals, with seeming divergent interests, insisting solely upon their so-called rights. There is no place for such insistence when Christians deal with one another when a compromise involves no surrender of basic principles (not prejudices). The spirit of the after-war age must be the impelling one of Christian co-operation. In no other way can the great problems of human relationships hope to approach solution.

We mention this because the solution of the problem presented by the "small irritant" mentioned above depends upon the Christian co-operative approach. The problem is this: as evidenced by the action of the General Association at its last meeting (which action led to the appointment of your committee), there are some Baptists who feel that the General Association should have the privilege of not only rejecting one or more names reported for confirmation by Institutional Boards, but also to thereafter nominate and elect a member of that particular Board to fill the vacancy. On the other hand, there are other Baptists who just as sincerely feel that, since the law charges the respective Boards (in most Institutions) with the duty of either nominating or electing members to fill its own vacancies, subject to election or confirmation by the General Association, the matter should be left there and no middle ground solution reached. Of course, the Board of no Institution should be called upon to violate its duties. Our recommendation, which follows, does not so request. It deals wholly with a question of policy. If adopted, it will not provide for the amendment or change of any charter or articles of Association of any Institution. These charters are contracts which must remain inviolate. But whether or not the policy suggested should be adopted depends on the good faith and Christian love of all concerned. If the suggested policy be adopted, it must never be used as a means by the General Association, or its Executive Board, of attempting to obtain the control or management of our Institutions by placing men on the Boards who will represent, not the Institution, but the Association or Executive Board. This would be an attempt to do indirectly what cannot now be done directly. On the other hand, it must never be used by the Boards of the Institutions as a means of insisting upon their legal rights by presenting names for membership for the Association to take or leave regardless of the qualifications of the men suggested. Of course, these things may never and should never happen, but our recommendations must deal with possibilities. Furthermore, if the suggested policy be adopted, it must never be used as a means of personal aggrandizement or personal attack.

The By-Laws of the Association provide for the appointment of a Nominating Committee of Ten on the first day of the annual session of the Association. They also provide that this Committee make its report on or before the last day of the convention. In normal times (and we sincerely pray that we shall remain in such in the sense that we are free from war forever) the sessions extend over a period of three days. If the report is made on the last day,

there is a full day intervening between the time of the appointment of the Nominating Committee and the time for its report. The By-Laws also provide that the Boards of the Institutions nominate those to fill vacancies on their respective Boards, or elect such and present them to the Association for confirmation. We do not recommend a change of these by-laws. We do, however, recommend the following:

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

We recommend: (1) That a duly accredited representative of the Board of Trustees or Managers of each Institution receiving in that year funds distributed to it through the co-operative program of Missouri Baptists, present to the Chairman of the Nominating Committee, immediately after his (or her) appointment, the names of the members on his particular Board proposed for election or confirmation by the Association. This list of names shall also be accompanied by a short statement of the affiliations and qualifications of each. The Nominating Committee should go into session the evening, or late afternoon, of its appointment to consider the names submitted and call in the accredited representative of the Boards of the Institution in any case where the Nominating Committee has any question concerning any nominee or electee presented for confirmation. The accredited representatives should hold themselves in readiness for such call. If after the above procedure there is any name for membership on any Board that seven or more members of the Nominating Committee sincerely believe, for good cause stated in writing, should not serve thereon, it shall communicate such fact to the proper, accredited representative who shall have the privilege of immediately presenting another name for that disapproved, and the same procedure then followed.

(2) If, after following the procedure outlined in paragraph (1) above, seven or more members of the Nominating Committee are still opposed to the person suggested by the Board of the Institution, the Nominating Committee shall segregate from its Report on Nominations the nominations made by the Board of the Institutions where nominees have been rejected, and the Association given the privilege of voting on this group separately, or, in its discretion, the Nominating Committee may submit the Report on Nominations for Membership on all Boards in toto. If the Association confirms or elects the nominee in question, the matter ends.

(3) If after the procedures outlined in paragraphs (1) and (2) above have been followed any person presented for election or confirmation fails of election or confirmation, we recommend the following procedure: The Board of Trustees or Managers of such Institutions whose nominee, or electee subject to confirmation, shall have been rejected, shall submit two names for each such vacancy to the Executive Board of the Association for election or confirmation by a three-fourths vote of such Board; provided, however, that neither of the two names suggested to the Board shall be the person or persons who failed of election or confirmation by the General Association; and, provided further, that the names of such persons shall be presented to said Executive Board in writing within Twenty (20) Days after the adjournment of the sessions of the

General Association, and the Executive Board shall vote upon the election or confirmation of one of the persons whose names have been so submitted for any vacancy at its next regular meeting. If the Executive Board should fail to agree, we would have the right to presume that such failure was the result of arbitrary action, and, therefore, for that very remote possibility we have no recommendations. The provisions of this paragraph do not apply to any Institution whose present charter authorizes the Association to elect, by nomination from the floor, any member of its Board when the name submitted by the Board of the Institution has not been confirmed or he or she fails of election.

(4) We recommend that the By-Laws (not charters) of the Institutions be amended to conform in principle with the foregoing, unless in the considered judgment of the Board of any Institution such amendment would jeopardize vested rights under the charter thereof. If such amendment would be so contrary to any charter, then we request the Board of such Institution to advise the Executive Board of the General Association, by directing a letter to the General Superintendent thereof, Dr. T. W. Medearis, 1023 Grand Avenue, Kansas City, Missouri, whether or not the above recommendations are acceptable to it; provided, however, the above recommendations are first approved by the General Association by vote of the messengers thereof duly assembled and organized.

We offer the above Findings and Recommendations for your considered and prayerful consideration, ever mindful of our own limitations and the magnitude of the task you submitted to us.

After submission of the foregoing report to the General Association, Mr. Scott Timmons, Chairman of the special Committee of Nine on Relationship of Baptist Institutions to the Association, made the following comments regarding the report of Stephens College:

"I listened with much interest to the Report given by Brother Hugh Stephens for Stephens College. Of course, our Committee did not consider that Stephens College was not a Baptist Institution. However, we did not consider it in the formula recommended for adoption for the reason that our Committee understood its authority to be limited to a consideration of the relationship to the General Association of Baptist Institutions as those 'Institutions' are defined in Article III, Section 1 of the By-Laws of the Association. Since Stephens College does not come within that particular definition and does not participate in the allocation of funds under the co-operative program, we considered it should not be included within our Report.

"I have always considered Stephens College one of our great Baptist Colleges. Its President, James Madison Wood, in my judgment, is the outstanding Christian educator of his day. Had I not looked upon Stephens College as a great Baptist school, certain it is I would not have sent my daughter there to be among 943 who received their diplomas in May last year as a part of a student body of over 2,000. Stephens College is a great asset to the denomination."

31. Louie D. Newton, Atlanta, addressed the Association on the subject, "Baptists Tomorrow."

### MISSOURI BAPTIST HOSPITAL

The year ending June thirtieth, 1945, was a year full of great (sometimes even intense) activity and was certainly most fruitful.

Again we have taken care of a record number of patients (11,621), and while our expenses have increased greatly owing to the increased cost of all commodities, we have managed to also proportionately increase our income with the help of very generous contributions (our gross income was more than \$1,000,000) so that we have again had a great year financially. This has enabled us to

retire our remaining capital debts and to launch into a much needed rehabilitation and improvement program.

It has been a year of achievement in the field of organization building; changes and additions made in our personnel have greatly strengthened our organization and increased its efficiency and we feel this is a real accomplishment in the face of personnel shortages occasioned by the war.

During the year there were 11,642 patients treated and a total of 129,837 days of service rendered. There were 5,958 surgical operations performed, 925 babies born, and 838 free or part-free patients cared for. This represents the largest year in the history of the Hospital from the standpoint of service rendered.

The year has seen the nurses' home emerge from a dream and assume the substantial form of mortar, stone, and brick, and as our fiscal year ends, it is practically completed. It is anticipated it will be ready for occupancy by our September class of students. This home meets a long felt need, and when completed, will be entirely debt-free.

But the nurses' home is not the only improvement: Our new elevator in the B division has been installed and is serving a fine purpose.

The contract for the building of a new power plant and the installation of a new 270 horsepower boiler was let and is now in the course of construction and installation which will insure us adequate power and heat. The old plant and facilities were so antiquated and worn as to be inadequate to supply the necessary heat for the new nurses' home in addition to our other requirements. With this installation is included the latest coal storage and handling equipment. This will make our power plant one of the most modern in the city.

The contract has been let for the enlargement of the dining room and new equipment. This will give us a thoroughly modern kitchen and enable us to greatly improve the functioning of our dietary department—an improvement long needed.

We are also building an additional floor on the nurses' home which will be used as a hospital ward. It will give us an additional thirty beds and is a very economical move, since hospital beds in new buildings cannot be constructed under present conditions for less than \$4,000 a bed; our cost on these beds is less than \$2,000 a bed. We have been assisted in the furnishing of these rooms by the following generous gifts:

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has installed in our Hospital an isolation unit for the treatment of poliomyelitis cases which involved no cost whatever to the hospital and was gratefully received. It makes possible a service to victims of infantile paralysis not heretofore rendered.

In addition to these major improvements many minor improvements have been made; these include paving the parking lot, installing new outside lights, cleaning the outside of the building, and a rather extensive installation of fluorescent lights in the hospital proper.

Our spiritual life is a phase of our work in which we are vitally interested and which we are constantly striving to strengthen and deepen.

Reverend C. H. Cosby, our chaplain, was on duty the entire year. His report is highly significant including fifty definite conversions and seventy reconsecrations. The following is an extract from his report:

"Once a business man of about sixty years of age, never having experienced salvation, admitted his need, but suggested he would wait until his pastor came. Urging him to make his decision without delay, he definitely accepted Christ. A few days later he died suddenly of heart trouble. He did not see his pastor, but he did see his Lord."

"A girl of twenty had been rushed to the Hospital from up-state. We found her in terrible agony, crying out in fear and pain. Speaking to her of the Great Physician, she said, 'Oh, I want to believe God; I do want to believe God.' Noting her earnestness, we prayed for peace of heart, holding her hand. She relaxed, and it seemed she had died. Closing the prayer, we found a changed girl; she was quiet and with a smile she said, 'Oh, I do believe God.' For weeks she was desperately ill. Later she returned for the second operation, but always she was sure she was saved that first day she believed God."

Under Brother Cosby's direction two classes in Bible were taught to the student nurses throughout the Training School year as a part of our regular curriculum and religious emphasis week was observed twice a year for the new classes when they entered; services were held each Sunday afternoon throughout the wards.

Starting April first Miss Frances Barbour came to us as personnel counselor for our student body after five years of experience in the Baptist Memorial Hospital in Memphis as Baptist Student Union Secretary. This background with a college degree equips her in an unusual way to work with these students.



She has complete charge of their activities—social, athletic, and spiritual—when they are off duty. Deeply spiritual herself, she is bringing to them an atmosphere distinctly helpful during their period of orientation and development. She is at all times available to the students for personal and confidential interviews; she also has charge of the students' daily morning devotional; and has inaugurated a Sunday afternoon service in the chapel for off-duty students, ambulatory patients, visitors, and employees which has great possibilities. The employment of such a person for full-time work in a hospital is something new and we believe we are starting something which will be followed by other hospitals as they come to realize its value.

We want this institution to lead the way among our Baptist hospitals in its spiritual life; if we fail in our devotion to Christ and his teachings in the Ministry of Healing, we have failed entirely.

God has been wonderfully good to us in so many ways; I believe you will heartily agree with me as you study the following figures.

### MISSOURI BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME, PATTONVILLE, MO.

*First of all, we would express gratitude to our Heavenly Father for the good health of our children. Illness of a serious nature is promptly cared for at our Missouri Baptist Hospital. We would also express thanks to them for this invaluable service. Competent people care for the dental health of the children, and see that defective eyesight is corrected with glasses. Physical examinations are made from time to time and a balanced diet is maintained for growth and development.*

The children have music lessons in both piano and voice. They attend Pattonville Public schools. They have planned recreation. Friday night is designated as "recreation night." Visual education is promoted in a limited way, we have a picture show once a month. Pictures are pre-viewed and selected with the thought of giving entertainment, education and inspiration. Campus recreation includes basketball, volleyball, baseball, croquet, etc. A pony and eight bicycles—a gift to the children has been much enjoyed this summer. We have provided for roller skating by putting a concrete surface in our Outdoor Assembly center, and this can be flooded for ice skating. We hope that every child can have a pair of skates when they are on the market again, as this is wholesome, healthful and very popular recreation.

The development of our Outdoor Assembly Center, which was dedicated as a "Baptist Retreat" is an outstanding accomplishment. Many churches and church groups and organizations have already used this for their meetings, and many people have seen our Home for the first time as a result of such meetings. Equipped for cooking, and with removable equipment for volley ball and other games, it is an ideal place for such gatherings. We urge our church leaders to plan for meetings and use this Retreat. It is a beauty spot in God's great outdoors and you will get inspiration from that and also bring your people to see our Home and they will have closer contact with the children and the work of the Home.

The campus has been further beautified this year with additional flower beds and shrubbery. Vegetable gardens have provided fresh vegetables for our tables. The buildings are in repair. A program of

repairs and improvements is constantly in force and the property is perhaps in better condition than ever before. We have a farm horse, a light tractor, trailer and several head of hogs. We have raised feed for the stock.

The children attend Fee Fee church which property adjoins our campus. Our outstanding need is for an educational building. The children have never had a Sunday school class room. This building would greatly facilitate the Christian education of our children by providing rooms for classes and Christian training. The church has launched a building fund campaign asking for \$10,000. Our state has designated a part of our State Missions offering for this building. \$10,000 has been earmarked, provided the goal of \$40,000 is reached. Please pray with us and help us to raise the funds for this educational building for Fee Fee church.

We have a fully accredited, under the State Board of Education, Nursery school in our Nursery Cottage. In cooperation with the Missouri Baptist Hospital two nurses are in training in this school caring for the children and observing them as part of their nurses training for which they are credited on their training course. We have fourteen (14) children, ages two to four, in this school.

- Our Birthday Greeting plan continues to be an important source of income and we urge our churches to use our Birthday Greeting Cards and glass banks which we furnish free. Every member can have a part in the work of our Home through giving their birthday offerings.

- The Thanksgiving offering exceeded the goal this year. We are grateful for your generous gifts. The PENNY-A-MEAL BANKS have been the medium through which this offering is largely taken. The demand for them has been for 100,000 this season and we trust that this heralds a bounteous offering for Thanksgiving. Our Denominational Calendar designates November 25, "Children's Home Day" for Thanksgiving offering in the churches.

✓ "Memorial Gifts" are growing in favor and we trust that our people will remember that putting money into the training of children creates "Living Memorials."

We invite our 300,000 Baptists in Missouri to remember the Children's Home in their wills. Provide for helpless, neglected children and live again in the lives of the children you have rescued and trained for Christian citizens.

We have 63 boys and 3 girls giving their lives in armed service and defense work to our country. Three girls are teaching school.

- *The Messenger*, published monthly, is going to 26,000 and should reach every Baptist Home carrying news of the Home and the children.

We are most grateful for the barrels of canned fruits, vegetables, jellies and jams, for all food and clothing and other supplies, for all gifts sent to our Home.

It is a great privilege and responsibility to serve our Master through this institution and we are grateful to God for the opportunity. We ask the prayers of our constituency for the work and for the children who might be outcasts of society but for your help in main-

taining this Home. We constantly strive to be worthy of this charge and to be faithful.

### THE HOME FOR AGED BAPTISTS

We are thankful that we are able to report another good year at the Home for Aged Baptists. We realize that every good and perfect gift comes from God, and we are truly grateful and thankful to Him for the blessings of the past year, especially in connection with this work.

We have not done quite as much improvement the past year as usual, due to the fact that it has been impossible to get workmen, and yet we have been compelled to do considerable repair work, due to damage done by storms to the buildings and fences over the place. Some of this work, however, we have been unable to do, due to our inability to obtain workmen. Much repair work needs to be done.

The help situation has been and continues to be one of our major problems. Sometimes it is so serious we hardly know which way to turn. We had hoped it would improve, but there is no relief yet; and really we do not expect relief in the immediate future. It is too serious for words; but we have managed to continue thus far, and we will trust the Lord to provide some way somehow so this great work may be continued. We have cut every corner, so to speak, in order to reduce the necessity for manpower.

We have reduced our herds of cattle, both dairy and beef, to the minimum, and really feel that we have made no mistake in doing so. We now have ten milk cows in our herd, two young heifers 15 months old, and three smaller heifers. We have some twenty head in the beef herd which will furnish us all the beef we use. We also have a fine herd of registered Duroc hogs. We have some 225 hens. We are continuing to produce our own milk, eggs, butter, beef, pork, lard, etc., that we use in the Home. Our dairy has shown a profit of \$856.23 this year, and the chickens have shown a profit of \$240.28. We feel the hogs and beef cattle paid well also. However, we did not have a chance to check as closely on them.

The rains and floods greatly hindered our farm and garden program this year. In fact, we have been unable to do much gardening, due to the rains, and we were only able to sow ten acres of oats. Our pastures are fine and furnish all the grass needed for our stock. We had a nice lot of peaches and berries



for immediate use, but no apples. We feel it pays materially to have our stock, poultry, gardens, etc.; but one of the big advantages is to have it when you want it. We have not been troubled with points and meat rationing, etc.

During the year we have cared for eighty-seven different patients. These patients are all admitted by church application. There isn't a pay patient in the Home. The Home does not receive boarders at any price. Patients are admitted without money and without price. All the work of the Home is strictly charity work. The physical condition of these patients remains just about the same as in former years, which means that they are quite feeble. Some thirty of them are unable to go to our general dining room for their meals and have to have their meals served in their rooms, and quite a few have to be fed and cared for just like helpless babies. The ratio of men and women remains about the same, which means that one-fourth to one-third are men and the rest women. We have a few above ninety, but the major portion of our patients range between eighty and ninety. Let us bear in mind that we do not receive people who have children who can or will take care of them or who can be cared for in any other way save the County Farms.

Donations of canned fruits and vegetables have come in fairly well during the past year, but not so good as previous years. We have had to buy more canned vegetables than usual; such as peas, corn, etc., and we are completely out of peaches, which is very unusual. We are hoping for a better supply of canned food this year, which will be very helpful.

✓ We are glad to report that we closed another year as of April 30th with all debts paid and a cash balance in the treasury of \$1,985.65. The operating expenses for the year were practically the same as last year, \$28,501.00. The total income for the year was \$56,599.23. We received \$16,243.93 of this amount through the Cooperative Program in undesignated gifts, an increase of \$1,909.70, from this source last year. The rest of the income came from special gifts by individuals, Sunday School classes, W. M. U.'s, churches, etc.; and our main source of income, namely, the Annual Easter offering. The total Easter offering to date is \$33,379.43, which is the largest Easter offering ever made to the Home. The offering this year was some \$2,000.00 more than last, \$13,000.00 of this amount has been placed in the Building Fund, which is to be used in finishing the top story of the main building. We now have \$19,039.92 in this fund.

The buildings and contents are fairly well covered by insurance: Buildings, \$148,650.00; contents, \$16,300.00. All employees are covered by Surety Bond to the amount of \$25,000.00, which we feel is ample.

The Lord has been good to us and has blessed the work in a wonderful way, for which we are truly thankful. All credit and glory belongs to Him.

38. T. W. Medearis, Kansas City, presented the following resolution and on motion, it was voted that the Missouri Baptist General Association add its protest to that of the article as indicated below:

"The General Commission on Army and Navy Chaplains, which represents 30 major Protestant Denominations meeting at Washington, Oct. 17, 1945, takes official notice of the remarks of Brig. Gen. Harry Vaughan, military aide to the president of the United States. Their remarks as reported in Time magazine, Sept. 10, and in several Washington papers the last days of August, were as follows:

"I don't know why a minister can't be a regular guy, but unfortunately some of them are not. You have to give the Roman Catholic Church credit. When the War Department requests a Bishop to supply 20 priests for chaplains, he looks over his diocese and picks out the 20 best men. But it is different in a Protestant church. Frequently a Protestant (minister) does not have a church at the moment, or is willing to go on a vacation for about three years."

"The General Commission considers these remarks highly offensive and prejudicial to the service of the Protestant chaplains, since Protestants are asked to provide 68 per cent of all the chaplains.

"Protests to the president by our officers against the utterances of General Vaughan have not elicited any public retraction or expression of regret.

"We, therefore, respectfully call for an official repudiation of this stigma by the president's military aide cast upon Protestant ministers serving in the armed forces as chaplains."

39. Time having arrived for the special order—namely, the further consideration of the report of the State Executive Board, the following recommendation concerning the purchase of the "Word and Way" was approved:

"Long negotiations for the purchase of the 'Word and Way' have terminated in the following, subject, of course, to your approval:

1. That we purchase the paper for \$17,500.00.
2. That transfer of the paper be made to our Board by Western Baptist Publishing Company, the present owners, on January 1, 1946.
3. That the Executive Board of the Missouri Baptist General Association be authorized to take all steps necessary to this transaction, and to the launching of the paper under the new auspices.
4. That we urge all, pastors, Sunday School Superintendents, Training Union Directors, W. M. U. and Brotherhood officers in all associations and churches to give enthusiastic support to a campaign to be launched next spring to increase the subscription list to at least 45,000.

"Your Board wishes to express its appreciation of the services of Editor Joseph E. Brown to Missouri Baptists through the paper and otherwise through the years. He has never sounded a false note nor failed to advocate the teachings dear to Baptist hearts. It is a source of joy to us to know that he will continue among us as vitally interested as ever in the program and progress of Missouri Baptists, though severing his relations with the paper."

Recommendation adopted.

#### WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

This Centennial Year of Southern Baptists marks the 68th year of organized Woman's Work among the Baptist women of Missouri. In 1877 a state organization was formed and at the first annual meeting held in Lexington, October 25, 1877, thirty Missionary Societies were reported. In 1881 the number had grown to 60. Today we report 861 Woman's Missionary Societies and 1709 young people's

auxiliaries in our state, making a total of 2,579 with an enrollment of 43,004. Of the more than 1,700 Auxiliaries, 250 are Young Woman's Auxiliaries, 645 Girls' Auxiliaries, 410 Royal Ambassador Chapters and 404 Sunbeams. In the 861 Woman's Missionary Societies there are more than 200 Business Women's Circles and about 1,100 Day Circles. Interest in W.M.U. work is promoted by leaders in the churches, Associational Officers, Divisional Chairmen and State Officers. Through fine cooperative spirit real progress has been made in each phase of work as the report will show.

Five hundred and eight churches have fostered Auxiliaries and 248 have maintained a FULL-GRADED Union with organizations of each grade. Especially do we commend the following churches for maintaining an A-1, Full Graded Union: Flat River, Houston, Kennet, Kirksville, Portageville, Point Breeze, St. Louis; Swope Park, Kansas City, Grant Avenue; Springfield, Warrensburg.

In the Seasons of Prayer for State, Home and Foreign Missions there were 1,565 organizations that observed the State Mission Day of Prayer, 1,593 Home Missions, 1,637 Foreign Missions. The offerings were an expression of the interest our members have in these special causes. The State Mission offering amounted to \$14,350.34, the Home Mission Offering to \$20,357.61, and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions to \$30,972.22, representing a total of \$65,680.17, or a gain of \$7,258.53 over the previous year.

The record in mission study is encouraging. 2,201 mission study classes were reported (perhaps many more were held but not reported) and 21,508 mission study awards given. Missouri W.M.U. ranked second among the Southern states in the number of mission study awards. One hundred fifty-five Schools of Missions were held and 33 Associational Mission Study Institutes conducted. Missionary Round Tables have been introduced this year to encourage women who have completed Certificate Courses I and II to do more advanced reading which the Missionary Round Tables offer.

Each year we find evidence of greater interest among W.M.U. members in Community Mission work. Last year showed a marked increase in this phase of work. 15,474 members engaged in Community Missions with 969 organizations reporting definite efforts in soul-winning and 733 working for higher moral standards.

During June nine interracial institutes were held in the following places: St. Louis, Louisiana, Macon, Kansas City, St. Joseph, Clinton, Springfield, Poplar Bluff and Kennett. These Institutes were made possible through the financial assistance of the Southern Union and the cooperation of state officers and divisional chairmen of both white and Negro Conventions. They proved to be most helpful in creating a sympathetic interest between the two races in the missionary endeavor in which we are engaged.

For many years Woman's Missionary Union has stressed Tithes and Offerings in its stewardship teachings. This emphasis has led to a better understanding of the stewardship entrusted to us as Christian women in using our material possessions for the further-

ance of the Gospel. Each year new tithers are enlisted among the women and young people and last year the number of tithers reported was 10,406. Eighty-eight churches reported a gift to missions from every resident woman member of the church and many churches observed Stewardship Church Night.

After the debts on the Southwide agencies had been cancelled W.M.U. members joined wholeheartedly in the effort of Missouri Baptists to strengthen and help Southwest Baptist College and Hannibal-LaGrange and contributed through the Missouri Hundred Thousand Club for Missouri \$31,202.36. This year when the William Jewell Endowment Campaign was launched the women and young people accepted as their responsibility the raising of a part of the \$250,000 objective and each month contributions are received for our Senior Baptist College.

Under the direction of Mrs. Kenneth Glover, State White Cross Director, interest and gifts to White Cross have steadily increased throughout the year. Because of the great suffering among the Chinese one-half of the White Cross receipts have been used for relief work and one-half reserved for rebuilding and equipping Warren-Ayers Hospital in Hwanghsien, China. Now that the war is over it is hoped that the missionaries may soon return and the medical work be resumed.

Gifts to the Margaret Fund students showed a decided increase over previous years. This "W.M.U. special" makes possible the sending of a cash gift three times a year, at Easter, Christmas and Commencement, to each son or daughter of our S.B.C. missionaries attending college. The largest contribution from any single Association came from Clay-Platte and amounted to \$66.60.

Missouri had five young women to graduate from the W.M.U. Training School in May, Miss Helen Heagerty, State Young People's Secretary; Miss Lucille Carter, B.S.U. Secretary for St. Louis; Miss Martha McGinty, Social Worker in Hospital at Greystone, New Jersey; Miss Dorothy Clinkenbeard now employed by Home Mission Board; Miss Anna Bell Brame, Director of the Good Will Center at

Meridian, Mississippi. The seven students enrolled this scholastic year are: Miss Everley Hayes of Memphis, and Miss Nina Belle Holaday, Maryville, Seniors. The new students are Dorothy Roberts, Warrensburg; Irene Branum, Bunceton; Harriet Jane Groesbeck, Kansas City; Mary Katherine Pittman, Monett; Mary Flanagan, Springfield. All of these young women hold degrees from accredited colleges and give evidence of exceptional ability and consecration so desirable as qualifications in Christian leaders.

Due to the ruling of Office of Defense Transportation, the State W.M.U. Meeting scheduled to be held at Columbia, Missouri, was cancelled to the great disappointment of many. Without the inspiration that comes from this meeting and others of a similar nature, our leaders have continued steadfastly in the promotion of W.M.U. plans and their devotion and loyalty merit our highest praise.

Associational W.M.U. work is promoted through quarterly meetings in which plans from the State Office are presented and put into operation, together with informational reports and inspirational programs prepared in the State Office. At the present time there are 79 Associational Unions functioning. Black River and Lawrence County were A-1 last year, and Cape Girardeau, Clay-Platte, Charleston, Franklin, Kansas City, Missouri Valley, Nevada and Salt River missed being A-1 by only one point. Sixteen other Associations lacked two points of being standard which is a good record when travel difficulties were increased because of tire and gas rationing.

The attendance at Divisional Meetings held last November totaled 6,428, an increase of 1,422 over the previous year, and the offerings were the largest ever received and were used to provide missionary speakers, to employ an R.A. Secretary for the summer and to print a second edition of the Guide Book for the Negro Baptist Women. The theme of these 23 Divisions was "This Is the Message", and guest speakers were Mrs. C. D. Creasman, Miss Juliette Mather, Mrs. L. E. Blackman, Mrs. A. Worthington, Miss Margaret Marchman, Mrs. T. W. McKee, and our own W.M.U. workers from the state office.

The work among the young people in the Auxiliaries has made marked progress under the leadership of Mrs. Josephine Riley Medlin and Miss Helen Heagerty. When Mr. Medlin returned in May from 22 months service overseas and was assigned shore duty in this country Mrs. Medlin offered her resignation as Young People's Secretary effective June 1st, and Miss Helen Heagerty was elected as her successor. Our deepest appreciation is expressed to Mrs. Medlin for her untiring zeal and labor in behalf of the young people in our Baptist churches and her splendid qualities of leadership.

Miss Heagerty, who received her Masters Degree in Religious Education from the W.M.U. Training School last May, needs no introduction to Missouri Baptists. She is a Missouri girl trained at Southwest Baptist College and Southwest Missouri State Teacher's College, Springfield. She has been a successful school teacher for several years and is eminently fitted to lead in the important work to which she has been elected.

Since the Y.W.A. Camp at Ridgecrest could not be held this year, a program entitled "The Camp that Stayed at Home" was arranged and observed by Y.W.A.'s in our state and all over the Southland.

The Assemblies at Baptist Hill and Van Buren were more largely attended than ever because of cancellation of all meetings at Ridgecrest this summer. More than 600 were enrolled in W.M.U. classes at Baptist Hill. Miss Rose Marlowe of China, was the inspirational speaker at the "Morning Watch" hour and her messages were most challenging. Others who led conferences or taught classes were, Mrs. C. M. Truex, Miss Helen Heagerty, Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Benedict, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Sherer, Mrs. Bonita Lindsey, Mrs. Frank Frisloe, Mrs. Kenneth Glover, Miss Agnes Stephens, Miss Qualls and Dr. Medearis.

The teachers and speakers at Van Buren were Miss Auris Pender of China, Mrs. W. D. Cunningham, Mrs. Howell Word, Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Benedict, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Sherer, Mrs. Lloyd Barker and Miss Helen Heagerty.

Between 50 and 60 Associational G.A. and R.A. Camps were held with fine success. Through the cooperation of the Home and Foreign Boards, fourteen missionaries were used during the summer and their messages were listened to with eager interest by the thousands who attended the Camps. Many conversions were reported and rededications to Christian service.

Miss Heagerty, assisted by Miss Pearl Caldwell of China, Miss Juliette Mather, Southwide Young People's Secretary, and Miss Eva Berry, W.M.U. Field Worker, conducted 10 Y.W.A. House Parties during August. The theme "This I Know" used as a basis for all programs brought inspiration to the more than 600 young women in attendance. An offering amounting to \$134.39 was given for Chinese Relief. The entertaining churches were Cameron, Brookfield, Vandalia, California, Mountain Grove, Jackson, Hayti, Owensville, Carthage, Bolivar. The careful preparation and gracious hospitality of these churches contributed much to the success of the meetings.

College Vistation was made last fall by Mrs. Medlin and Miss Harriette King of China. Their visits to the College Y.W.A.'s and Grace McBride Y.W.A. at the Missouri Baptist Hospital proved inspirational and helpful. They counseled with officers and leaders in planning for a successful year's work. We congratulate the Y.W.A.'s of William Jewell College and Southwest Baptist College for being on the Honor List, having attained the Standard of Excellence again last year.

The interest in Royal Ambassador work received an added impetus through the service of Mr. Leroy Benedict, who gave three months during the summer to directing R.A. activities at Associational Camps and Assemblies. Mr. Benedict is a student from Missouri at Southwestern Seminary, and the contacts made with pastors and R.A.'s will bear fruit in the coming months. Several of the states employ a full time Royal Ambassador Secretary and we look forward to the time when Missouri will follow the example of these progressive states. The employment of Mr. Benedict this summer

was made possible by the generous offerings made at the W.M.U. Divisional Meetings last fall.

An innovation in R.A. work was the "Fellowship Banquet" held at Euclid Church, St. Louis, at the time of the meeting of the General Association last fall. Pastors, R.A. Counselors and R.A. members were special guests. There were 165 in attendance and so successful was this venture that it was voted to make it an annual affair. Mr. J. I. Bishop, Southwide Royal Ambassador Secretary, presided at the R.A. Investiture Service which was most colorful and challenging.

The work done by Miss Eva Berry as Field Worker has been constructive and will yield permanent results. Many new Missionary Societies have been organized and the Associational and Divisional work strengthened.

The plan adopted for the Field Worker in the state, at least for the time being, is as follows: During the months of January, April, July and October, she visits Associational Quarterly W.M.U. meetings. To each Division which it will not be possible to reach in quarterly meetings during the year a week is offered which may be used in that Division in the way the Divisional Chairman and Associational Presidents think best, the aim being to reach as many unenlisted groups as possible and the remainder of the time in places where needed most.

Detailed accounts of the field work have appeared from time to time in the *Word and Way*. The activities during the year have consisted of the giving of missionary messages to Missionary Societies and young people's organizations, mixed church groups, women and young people in unenlisted churches, Associational and Divisional Meetings, colleges, teaching of mission study classes in organizations and Schools of Mission, conducting methods conferences for W.M.S. officers and Young People's Counselors in local and Associational organizations, holding of individual conferences with officers and Counselors, assisting with Associational Methods Institutes, Mission Study Institutes, planning for and assisting in Clinics held for Associational Presidents and Young People's Leaders, preparing State Mission Day of Prayer Program, July Quarterly Meeting program, and assisting in various ways in the office routine.

The interest in missions and denominational work has been quickened through a wider reading of the missionary magazines—Royal Service, The Window of Y.W.A., World Comrades, The Commission, Southern Baptist Home Missions and our state denominational paper The Word and Way. Subscriptions continue to increase steadily and our state was on the Honor List again last year for exceeding its quota in subscriptions to the W.M.U. magazines.

Many thousands of packages of literature have gone from the W.M.U. office during the year. These have included literature on Enlistment, Mission Study, Community Missions, Stewardship, White Cross, William Jewell Endowment, Auxiliary materials of all kinds, Seasons of Prayer for State, Home and Foreign Missions, Year Books, Hand Books, Minutes, mission study certificates, quarterly reports, camp information booklets, R.A. Focus Week and Stewardship Church Night suggestions, G.A. Coronation and R.A. Investiture Services. Program material for use in quarterly Associational W.M.U. meetings, Divisional meetings, Negro Institutes, Missionary Clinics, Y.W.A. House Parties, R.A. Fellowship Banquet, has been prepared by the State Office. Also the annual reports to the Southern Union and the General Association have been compiled and articles prepared for each weeks issue of the Word and Way.

We record with sorrow the passing of a former beloved President of Missouri W.M.U., Mrs. F. W. Armstrong, whose death occurred May 13. When the Woman's Missionary work in our state was organized in 1923 under the present plan, Mrs. Armstrong was elected President. So ably did she meet the responsibilities of this important office that she soon became recognized as a leader of unusual ability, not only in her own state but in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention. When the annual meeting of the Woman's Missionary Union Auxiliary to Southern Baptist Convention, met in Washington in 1933, Mrs. Armstrong was elected President, which office she filled with honor and distinction for 12 years until her untimely death. Through more than a quarter of a century Mrs. Armstrong served her denomination in various capacities as a valued worker in her church, as an Associational and State officer, as a member of the Executive Board of the Missouri Baptist General Association for 19 years, as a member of the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention for 18 years, and also of the Executive Committee of the Baptist World Alliance. In every position of trust she gave unselfishly of her time, thought and the talents with which she was so richly endowed to advancement of Kingdom work.

This report is submitted with grateful appreciation to all who through loving and unselfish service have made possible the achievements recorded. "One soweth and another reapeth - - - and ye are entered into their labors."

### HOME MISSIONS

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention is confronted with complex and far-reaching responsibilities that call for earnest, prayerful and patient leadership.

The war has disturbed many centers of our work and had sent thousands of our people to the cities. The relocation and reenlistment of these war workers who had moved to the metropolitan centers of the South, will require great wisdom and large means.

The Home Board has had the responsibility of approving our chaplains and now must help these fine, consecrated ministers who are returning from the war to relocate in pastorates. Our pastorless churches can assist the Board as well as these fine men by getting in touch with the State Secretary concerning available and suitable men.

The problem of the city has passed the experimental stage. A few years ago the Home Mission Board had no city work whatsoever. St. Louis and Kansas City were unique among the cities of the South in that they maintained a City Missions program. Today the Home Mission Board has work in 44 cities maintained wholly or in part by the Home Mission Board.

The Home Mission Board has work among its Jews, Indians, Foreigners and other minority groups. Wide open spaces are being evangelized by our Board. Through the Building Loan Department it is assisting weak churches in building suitable houses of worship. One-third of the churches of the South have received aid of one sort or another from the Home Mission Board through its years of existence.

The Home Mission Board is deeply conscious of its responsibility to the ten million Negroes in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention. Many young Negroes have been in the armed service of our country and their return may give encouragement to radical agitators who are demanding rights for Negroes too long withheld. Our Christian leaders, white and black, know full well that only the enlightening transforming power of the Gospel of the Son of God and the healing balm of brotherly love can save us from racial disturbances and social injustices.

Our Home Mission Board has opened the door of opportunity in the Gospel to many groups and neglected areas and solicits your earnest prayer and hearty cooperation in its efforts to evangelize our waste places and to preach Christ and Him crucified throughout the length and breadth of our Homeland.

#### FOREIGN MISSIONS

In its many years of interesting history the Foreign Mission Board has never faced so great a challenge as now—the challenge of desperate need, of unlimited opportunity and of an informed interest on the part of the Southern Baptist people. “Three demands come to us,” says Dr. Rankin, the executive secretary of the Board, “the demand from our needy world, the demand from the five and one-half million prosperous Baptists who are able to meet those needs, and the demand from God who expects us to express our gratitude for innumerable blessings through generous sharing of that which He has given us.”

A big program is presented to Southern Baptists by the Board but not big enough for the urgent, desperate needs of a broken world. Christians must hurry with their gospel of peace and good will; Southern Baptists must do their share. “It is difficult to formulate a program of missions that is big enough for the world need with the resources our people are giving us,” continues Dr. Rankin. An over-all budget of approximately \$3,000,000 was adopted for 1946 at the last meeting of the Board, with \$1,670,105.97 provided from Cooperative Program receipts. The remainder of the over-all budget will be provided by Lottie Moon offerings and other designated gifts. This budget is \$350,000 over the 1945 budget.

We are getting back into the Orient sooner than we thought possible—three men have sailed back to coastal China to reoccupy stations and Baptist property taken by the invaders. Others will follow as soon as transportation and passports are obtainable. Two Japan missionaries will go back when the authorities permit to survey work in the islands and recommend procedure for reopening the stations.

The Number One problem in Europe is keeping alive. Multi-

tudes are starving. Our Baptist brethren there are looking to us for help. Surely we shall not fail them. It is estimated by the Church Committee on Overseas Relief and Reconstruction that a million Europeans will probably die of starvation this winter. The Board has estimated a needed \$2,000,000 for an emergency fund. One million of this amount is in hand.

Africa continues to be a field of a growing constituency and opportunity. The Board is planning to send fifty new missionaries there in the next eighteen months. The work in Hawaii is very encouraging. It promises to be a great field for Southern Baptists.

Difficulties in securing passports for missionaries to South America have disappeared and visas are readily available to all missionaries to enter the countries of their choice for evangelical work. Secretary Everett Gill, Jr., now on tour of the continent, writes, "We could use fifty new workers in strategic places; advancement in this field must wait on the increased giving of Southern Baptists."

Plans for opening a new field in Arabia are being contemplated. This will be a medical station.

The Board is finely organized for its world task—its executive secretary, Dr. M. T. Rankin, is completing his first year of service in that capacity; three regional secretaries, Dr. George Sadler, secretary for Europe, Africa and the Near East; Dr. Everett Gill, Jr., secretary for Latin America; Dr. Baker James Cauthen, newly elected secretary for the Orient, take much of the burden from the executive secretary and are advancing the work in their various fields. Dr. J. W. Marshall, personnel secretary, is giving valuable service to the Board in seeking and finding volunteers for missionary service. A new department was approved by the Board, a Department of Missionary Education. A secretary will be selected later. There has been a tremendous growth in this field with ever increasing demands for literature and other mission study material, including films.

Secretary Rankin expressed the conviction that instead of 540 missionaries which we now have, we should have within the next few years at least 750 missionaries. This will require the appointment of 50 new missionaries a year for six years, as we must take care of many replacements.

The Sunday School Department wishes to present the following report. First of all, we are deeply grateful for the splendid cooperation shown by all our Missouri Baptist forces this year. Each member of our department has been well received as we have gone throughout the state in our program of field work and promotion. These words of appreciation come not only from the office force, but from our fine corps of approved workers who have given graciously of their time on the field.

#### Field Forces

We wish to express our gratitude for Associate Secretary, Miss Geane A. Roop. She has gone tirelessly in field promotion both in individual church and associational campaigns. Our approved workers have been: Rev. Loren S. Goings, Extension Department; Mrs. W. D. Cunningham, Adult Department; Miss Louise Phillips, Young People's Department; Mrs. E. L. Heying, Intermediate Department; Mrs. Allen Milner and Mrs. S. L. Shepherd, Junior Department; Miss Gladys Webster, Primary Department; Mrs. Rose Cobb, Beginner's Department; Mrs. Walter L. Jones, Cradle Roll Department; and Mrs. T. J. Farris, Vacation Bible Schools.

#### Miss Naomi J. Moddrell

Miss Moddrell terminated a long period of very faithful service as Office Secretary to go with the Sunday School Board of Nashville, Tenn. We deeply appreciate these years of service. We are glad to announce the coming of Miss Betty Kyle to this position.

#### Associational Promotional Activities

Since October 1, 1944, we have personally conducted 13 Association-Wide Sunday School Campaigns with approximately 135

churches cooperating. Over 2,000 individual workers have been reached in these efforts. The size of the task in our great state has forced us to give the larger share of our time and strength to promoting our Sunday School program by Associations. In most of our campaigns, however, we have been able to provide individual workers for each cooperating church. Ten Association-wide Campaigns have already been tentatively planned for 1946. These include a number of Inside Enlargement Campaigns which we expect to feature this coming season.

#### Individual Church Campaigns

It has been a pleasure to direct nine individual church campaigns. In addition, many pastors have renewed their interest in the regular Enlargement Campaigns. At least 750 of our churches could well have such a campaign in the coming year.

#### State-Wide Meetings

We regret that due to war emergencies in transportation we were not able to launch a State Sunday School Convention as planned at first. We expect to carry out this plan in 1946. The date set is May 29, 30, 31. We were able, however, to have a State-Wide Meeting of Associational Officers in Moberly last February 20. It was gratifying to have 22 Associations represented in this meeting. A similar meeting for the coming season will be held at the First Baptist Church, Columbia, Mo., December 14, 1945.

#### March 6 Associational Meetings

March 6, 1945, was set aside for simultaneous Associational Sunday School meetings throughout the Southland. The Missouri response was gratifying. Forty-eight Associations held meetings on this date with a total attendance of over 4,000. Kansas City Association had a registered attendance of 1,025. Only four other Associations in the South had an attendance over 1,000.

#### 1945 Vacation Bible School Promotion

We felt it quite urgent this year to give extra attention to the promotion of Vacation Bible Schools. Beginning April 1, a series of 13 regional meetings were conducted. We are deeply grateful to Brother Sibley Burnett of the Sunday School Board for his tireless leadership in these meetings. Following this, teams of voluntary workers conducted a series of Associational meetings. There were, also, individual conferences for some of our larger cities. During the month of April, we reached 78 Associations, 457 Churches, and 3,378 Vacation Bible School Workers.

## BAPTIST TRAINING UNION DEPARTMENT

J. O. GASH, *Associate Secretary*

The Training Union has had a fruitful year. In the South in 1944, the enrollment increased 31,000 over that of the preceeding year. In our report as of March 9, 1944, it showed a loss from March, 1943, to March, 1944, in every department of our Training Union. From March 9, 1944, to March 16, 1945, there was a gain in every department. Out of the 1,732 churches in Missouri 664 have Training Union work. There are now 2,848 unions and story hours with an enrollment of 32,822. From July 1, 1944, to June 30, 1945, 201 new unions were organized. During the same time the churches had 458 study courses with 1,179 classes and 11,474 awards issued.

Baptist people on the whole are not as informed in Training Union work as they are in other phases of our church program. This may be attributed to the fact that it is comparatively new, particularly so in its present form. However, the Baptist Training Union is developing Christian leadership. Its task is unfinished until every new member is filling adequately some place of responsibility. There are indications that our training work is beginning a new day. At first, it was youth-centered. Then departmental-centered. Now, it is church-centered, with the idea of training in church membership.

### Our Workers

Rev. R. W. Bailes, Secretary, left the department on July 1, 1945, to re-enter the pastorate. He did a good work and is affectionately remembered by those with whom he served. Mrs. Paul Branstetter is the efficient office secretary.

Mrs. Marion Furgerson, State Approved Junior Worker, and Mrs. George Hammon, State Approved Story Hour Worker, resigned during the year. They, too, made valuable contribution to the training program. Their places have not been filled.

Those who remain as approved workers are as follows: Miss Leta Lindsey, St. Louis, Adult Worker; Rev. Harold Renfrow, Liberty, Young People's Worker; Mrs. B. M. Bush, Mexico, Intermediate Worker.

### State Convention

The State Training Union Convention was held in Mexico, November 23-24, 1944. There was an enrollment of 825 (this was about double that of the preceeding year.) It was a great convention.

The officers of our convention are: Mr. Burt W. Pratt, Jefferson City, President; Mr. A. R. Black, St. Louis, Vice President; Mrs.

Margaret Appelgate, Joplin, Secretary. The Approved Workers serve as departmental leaders.

### Assemblies

We had a faculty at each of the assemblies, Baptist Hill and Van Buren. Also, our workers assisted in some of our smaller camps. Our department has led in a large number of church and associational campaigns, which need not be listed here, to say nothing of the many meetings attended and engagements filled.

### One-Day Conference

The Southwide Simultaneous Associational Day was held April 24, 1945, with an attendance of 5,321 in Missouri and more than 100,000 in the South.

### DEPARTMENT OF STUDENT WORK

A. DONALD BELL, *Secretary*

Perhaps no department of work has been greater affected by the war situation than the Department of Student Work. However, there has been a consistent growth in the program and in the promotional side of the work. Although the enrollments of the various schools have been low, student work has apparently been better received. Various changes have come in the way of program and personnel.

#### Changes in Personnel

Since the last report was made of this department, the following new workers have come as student secretaries in the state of Missouri: Miss Estelle Slater, Kansas City area; Miss Lucille Carter, St. Louis area; Miss Mary Lou Robertson, Springfield area; Miss Fern Shields, William Jewell; Miss Ruth Lucas, Warrensburg; Mrs. Charlean Moore, Missouri Baptist Hospital; Mr. Dick Wallace, has been office secretary during the past year.

These new workers have put a new stimulus into the work and have enabled us to promote a much larger program than in previous years. The first three mentioned are full-time workers. The others are part-time. The field of Baptist Student Work in Missouri has



crystalized to such a degree that volunteer leadership is no longer sufficient. We find ourselves very fortunate in having these workers to carry on the program in our local situations.

#### **New Groups**

We have new Baptist Student Unions in the following places: General Hospital, Kansas City; Trinity Lutheran Hospital, Kansas City; Kansas City Secretarial School, Kansas City. The Department has started one new plan for the benefit of our students in schools where there are not enough Baptist Students for a fully organized B.S.U. We now have a complete mailing list of all Baptist Students in the State, and can contact them regularly and encourage them in Christian Service and tying them on to the local church. This is a large undertaking, but we feel that we should have some contact with these "isolated" Baptist Students.

#### **Convention**

Last year a splendid convention was held with Calvary Baptist Church in Kansas City. Over 300 students were registered, and a large number of local people were in attendance. The program was very well accepted and several decisions for Life Service were made. The general atmosphere of the meeting was superb, and we feel that it made a great impact on the spiritual lives of our students. The 1945 Convention will be held in Cape Girardeau, Mo.

#### **The Nashville Office**

Our State Department of Student Work has sought in every move to work in conjunction and in cooperation with the Southwide Department of Student Work at Nashville. We have benefited by their help. We have used their literature and we have tried to take the advice they have so wisely given. Their attitude toward our local work has been very gratifying and we appreciate every effort that is put forth in that Southwide Office. Also, Miss Frances Barbour, formerly our Student Worker at Missouri Baptist Hospital, has gone to the Nashville office to take over as Associate Secretary. She will be in charge of hospital and business college work. We feel that she has gone to a greater field of service and we appreciate the honor of having her selected from among our Missouri Baptist Student Workers.

#### **Youth Revivals**

The department has sponsored a number of Youth Revivals in various sections of the state earlier in the year at Vandalia and with single meetings at Bolivar, Springfield and Kansas City. Later on in the year full week Youth Revivals were held in Springfield, Kansas City, and St. Louis. These meetings have always been combined with forums and open discussion meetings for our Young People. These have proved very profitable and we find that students are seeking the help of the church during the days of decision like the ones in which we have been.

#### **The Local Church**

Our department still tries to focus the emphasis of the B.S.U. on the local college church. We want to take this opportunity to

express our gratitude to the various pastors who have been of a special help to the work in the past year. In various situations these pastors have been instrumental in securing our workers. We are especially grateful to Dr. Willis E. Howard of Springfield, Dr. Ross E. Dillon of Kansas City, Dr. Ross Edwards of Warrensburg, Dr. Allen S. Cutts of Liberty and to Dr. Paul Weber, Dr. C. P. Jones, and Mr. C. E. Copeland. Also we are ever thankful to our General Superintendent and Executive Board and look forward to a greater field of service in the way of professional leadership in our Student Department.

#### **Business Colleges and Nursing Schools**

Probably the most interesting work this year has taken place in these two types of institutions. Heretofore, we have had successful work in our schools of nursing, but because of the accelerated program due to the war effort among these groups, we find ourselves with a greater responsibility. Our nurses groups in St. Louis and Kansas City have been excellent, and certainly they have benefited greatly by our work.

The work among Business Colleges is encouraging. These schools were low in attendance in the midst of the war, but in recent months have grown and are very active. We find this particular group of young people very responsive to the call of the church and our workers in these college centers are exerting every effort to make the program apply to their particular needs. A pioneer in this field is Miss Estelle Slater in the Kansas City situation. Most of these students are from rural areas and we find that B.S.U. is making a great impact on their lives.

Our yearly program of special emphasis weeks, retreats, prayer services, and study courses have continued in spite of the irregular times, and we have not changed our program in the least. The only radical variation in our regular schedule was that of the cancellation of Student Week at Ridgecrest. We hope to save this emphasis for future years and make it a greater opportunity for college students.

#### **Centennial Crusade**

The Missouri Baptist Students have cooperated with the South-wide Department in the Student Crusade, working in conjunction with our Centennial Campaign. We have found that this emphasis was greatly needed on the campuses and we feel that good work has been done. The secret to such work was prayer. We have re-established prayer groups on the various campuses and they have been more active this year than in the past. The personnel element in Christian witnessing has also been evident.

#### **The Annual Seminar**

The 1945 Workers Seminar was held at the State Headquarters at Kansas City with every school in the state represented with the exception of one. All of our Student Secretaries were there. The Council Presidents and State Officers were also invited. This large number of student leaders plan the program for the ensuing school year. Two and a half days were spent in this work and it was most profitable and to the point. These student workers sought to look

into the future and outline some of the plans in reference to our returning servicemen. The approach is very difficult to work out, but we felt that our discussions and our planning were profitable. The students this year were particularly interested in the work and we found that each of the periods had to be extended in length of time.

#### The "Newsletter" and the "Prescription"

A new instrument for the work which was started this year is the *Bi-Monthly Newsletter*. It is printed twice each month by the state department and sent to each campus. It is mainly a promotional bulletin but also contains news items. The *Prescription* is a paper published every six weeks for the student nurses and medical students over the Southland. Some of our Kansas City nurses were instrumental in getting the publication started and have been serving on the staff.

#### The Student Himself

We have been able to do a limited amount of work among our military boys situated on the various college campuses. Although the government regulations handicap this work, we were able to have some organization and exert quite a bit of influence on this particular group. Also we found that student interests in religious things were above average and we of course took advantage of this tendency. Over 300 student council officers are particularly interested in the work at this time and we feel that the ensuing school year will bring blessings to our Baptist students throughout the state of Missouri.

#### ✓ BAPTIST SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

The purpose of the Sunday School Board is to meet a grave need and to render a definite service in the spiritual life of the Southern Baptist Convention. It was that need which brought the Sunday School Board into existence. The Board has had more than a half century of remarkable development and enlarged service.

#### Lived to Serve

The Sunday School Board has lived to serve. The receipts and the gifts to denominational agencies is sufficient proof that the Board has served well. The Board received from all sources last year \$4,157,884.14, and the total gifts of the Board, in denominational appropriations for last year were \$656,618.25.

In the fifty-four years of ministry the Board has turned back to the denomination through its agencies \$12,078,291.87. All of this has been for the advancement of the cause of Christ.

All of the receipts of the Board are for denominational services rendered. With that in mind, let us take another look at the Board's

receipts. In the Board's report to the Southern Baptist Convention in 1921 the total receipts had gone for the first time over a million dollars. In 1939 the Board reported receipts in the two million dollar bracket. In 1943 the receipts had passed the three million dollar mark. This year, in the face of many difficulties, the receipts have exceeded \$4,000,000. Think of the denominational service rendered by these figures.

#### Constantly Enlarged Production and Circulation

During the past year there have been printed 3,410,000 copies of tracts. The Board is making a complete revision of the tracts as rapidly as the paper situation will permit. These tracts are available for wise distribution through pastors and workers throughout the convention.

The grand total of all periodicals circulated last year was 24,099,687, which was an increase of more than one and one-half million over the previous year, and that year showed a gain of almost one and one-half million over the year before that.

From May 1, 1944, to May 1, 1945, the Board manufactured 1,358,998 volumes of books, of 221 titles. There were 28 new books and 193 reprints.

#### The Home Curriculum

Through "The Better Home", a very helpful ministry has been rendered to Christian homes. Just as soon as the supply of paper will permit, it is the Board's purpose to issue a periodical prepared specifically for parents and in the interest of Christian home life. Mr. Joe W. Burton has recently been elected by the Board to edit such a periodical.

#### Church Architecture

The department of church architecture has also been a very popular department with the people of our convention during the past year. According to Dr. E. P. Alldredge's report, Southern Baptists had a net gain during last year of 259 church buildings and 321 pastor's homes. His report also shows a net gain during the year of \$11,572,219.00 invested in church buildings and pastor's homes. Southern Baptists now report 24,165 church buildings and 5,045 pastor's homes.

#### RADIO COMMITTEE

The following recommendation adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention at its meeting at Atlanta, Ga., 1944, defined the work of the Radio Committee:

"That the Radio Committee be instructed to thoroughly study the radio needs of the entire Convention, including the various agencies, boards and institutions of the Convention, and in cooperation with said agencies, boards and institutions to provide the needed equipment and program to meet their needs, when feasible and in keeping with the budget of the Radio Committee.

"The above service is to be rendered in addition to the regular broadcasting of The Baptist Hour and in addition to the Committee's regular transcription programs."

Thus, it will appear that the Radio Committee is to render the denomination a two-fold service, as follows:

1. Provide the Baptist Hour programs with as extensive coverage both in the matter of time and territory as the budget of the Radio Committee will permit, together with regular transcription programs provided by the Committee for broadcast throughout the Convention territory.

2. It is the responsibility of the Radio Committee to provide the needed equipment and programs to meet the radio needs of all the agencies of the Convention.

#### The Baptist Hour Program

The Baptist Hour program was broadcast on twelve Sundays, January through March, over a network of thirty-six stations,

giving good coverage from Washington, D. C., to Florida, and westward to include Texas, Oklahoma, and Missouri. The estimated audience hearing each broadcast was three million and a half. The cost was one dollar for every two thousand people.

The Baptist Hour will be broadcast for thirteen Sundays, January through March in 1946.

#### Transcription Series

1. There are two evangelistic services, The Dodd Series and the Herring Series. These are series of fourteen thirty-minute evangelistic programs. These series were heard over 65 different stations during the past year.

2. Inspirational Sermon Series—Dr. Geo. W. Truett, Preacher. The programs are 30 minutes in length. There is no music. A total of 55 stations broadcast 770 of his messages during the past year.

3. Christian Home Series—Dr. T. F. Adams, Preacher. There are fourteen 15-minute programs. A total of 30 stations broadcast 241 programs during the past year.

4. Bible Study Series—Dr. Harold W. Tribble, Speaker. This is a study of the Book of Philippians. Dr. Tribble is an effective radio speaker. This series is now available.

5. Devotional Sermon Series—Dr. Kyle M. Yates, Preacher. This is a new series and is now available.

#### Broadcast in Army and Navy

A total of 522 transcribed programs have been sent from the Transcription Library of the Radio Committee to Chaplains in military service. The Chaplains report that the men in the service appreciate the program.

#### Finance

The Committee has lived within its budget. They believe that its work is firmly established in our denominational program and the results of its labor more than justify the cost of its work.

#### TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

For generations temperance and social service committees have been appointed by this association. They have made reports to which this body has listened. These reports have been filed away in the minutes and forgotten. This one can meet no other fate. Then why make a report? The answer is you listen. Nature is extremely profligate. Multiplied numbers of seed perish, and

must be provided for in securing a crop. eg. It is estimated that 20,000 bits of pollen fall from each corn tassel. Certainly if the ground be fertile and well prepared and select seed sown under ideal conditions, a bountiful harvest results. On the other hand if conditions are reversed the yield will be proportionately small. I have read the splendid reports of the Temperance Committees for the past several years before writing this report, and wondered if they did any good. If they quickened the desire on the part of those who hear or read them. I then am reminded that some seed grow, though many perish. For a number of years as teacher in a Medical College, I wondered if it was worthwhile —if the students gained enough to make the effort worthwhile. No doubt every teacher; every preacher has those unworthy thoughts. In the end one finds a surprising fruition; and that more effect was secured than was evident while pouring out ones best to what seemed an indifferent uninterested group.

I therefore conclude that those reports are worthwhile. That they have in some degree kept alive the subject and perhaps stimulated some effort to continue the endeavor to sow bountifully the seed of temperance, that all humanity may become conscious of the worthwhileness of temperance and the worthlessness of the use of intoxicating beverages. That is a difficult task! Indeed it is; but in the sowing and resowing lies the promise of a harvest. Which is better, coercion or persuasion? Perhaps with one accord you would answer "moral suasion," but is it? From certain viewpoints it is. From the viewpoint of accomplishing the purpose it may not be best. To illustrate: It would be better could you depend on human nature to tell people they must not drink poison when despondent. You, however, will agree, it is best to say to the druggist, you cannot sell the poison to any and all who wish to buy. It were better could you depend on all parents to send their children to school than make a law forcing them to do so. There are perhaps none who would vote to leave the matter of sending their children to school entirely to the parents.

Were the laws of the land abolished and each human being allowed to choose his own procedure in all matters, we would find civilization retrograding to the dark ages. Did not the Master drive the money changers from the temple? If law says you must respect your neighbor's property; if it says you must not drink carbohic acid, you must send your child to school, you must feed and clothe your family, why then is it wrong to say you cannot drink intoxicants which all too often causes suffering and grief, not alone to him who drinks the intoxicants, but to so many others. Your committee believes in moral suasion, but we also believe in a law to prohibit the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages. Yes, we secured such a statute some years ago. The effort at enforcing that law was but a gesture. Some said it is unenforcible and should be repealed. If consistent, then they would advocate the law against robbery and murder be repealed, for they cannot be enforced. Statistics clearly show that the prohibition law, though feebly administered, did great good in lessening accidents and crime. The repeal of the law did not as promised, replace the illicit still, and the boot-

legger with a law abiding wholesome place where decency and morality would prevail. Why was the prohibition law repealed? The answer is "because too many church members wanted it repealed." The survey as revealed in the Year Book of American Churches, indicated that in 1944 52 ½% or 72,000,000 people had their names on some church registry. This includes four and a half million Jews. Thus a majority of the people are church members. They could have retained the law. This leads to the conclusion that a fertile field for cultivation of the liquor question is in the church. Can this fact be brought to the consciousness of all church members? The answer is no! The Master chose twelve—one of the twelve proved unreliable. The proportion of unreliable church members seems to be vastly greater. You ministers find it difficult to train your members in the way of righteous thinking, largely because the ones most needing the training are not in church to hear you. Nevertheless, the teaching must continue—the seed must be bountifully sown, your committee believes that our ministers should do more teaching along the line of temperance as it is usually understood.

The largest group of church people, some 23,000,000 do not seem to seriously regard the drinking of alcoholic beverages. Oh, that all who name His Name could collaborate on such questions—could such be brought about the impact against any evil would be overwhelming. How can that be brought about? The answer is not obvious. It is well known that great quantities of grain that could have fed hungry people was consumed in liquor manufacture, shiploads of it were sent overseas to our boys while calls for munitions were answered with, "there are piles of it on the docks but shipping space is short."

The degradation wrought by liquor is too well known to need comment. The FBI reports show that arrests for drinking have increased from 1932 to 1942, 174%. The arrests for driving while drunk in 1942 were double the number in 1932. The number of murders runs a similar curve to that of alcoholic deaths. The absorption of alcohol begins at once after it is imbibed, and is demonstrable in the blood stream three minutes after it reaches the stomach. Food slows the absorption. In dealing with a drunkard, keep his stomach properly supplied with food. If you can get him to eat first, many times the desire for drink is lost. The Department of Commerce tells us seven billion dollars were spent in this country for alcoholic beverages in 1944 through legal channels. It is estimated two billions were spent through bootleg sales, 10 ½ billion spent in gambling, 15 billion spent on crimes, 5 ½ billion on vice and dance halls, making a total of 40 billion dollars. The national income was 160 billion, while gifts to religious and charity interests were \$1,600,000,000.

The social question has become acute. Much social progress has been made internationally. We've come to find such a wealth of character and intellect in such unsuspected quarters, we are persuaded that a better day is approaching. People will recognize the value in others, those of different races, and accord to them their rightful place. Perhaps the most acute question of social relations in America is the negro question. It would seem that

they have made marked progress in education, culture, the arts and scientific achievements. Their recognition is being achieved. We as Christians should be the first in such recognition.

The home, the church and the school have suffered decline in standard during the war period. The re-establishment of those institutions is necessary if we stem the tide of juvenile delinquency and that of our women. It is deplorable that women bartenders and patrons are no longer rare but customary. The Baltimore News-Post says. "The majority of the saloon customers are women; where talk is excessively free and prurient. Every decent restraint and convention is either relaxed or hooted down. Clearly something must be done to re-awaken our social conscience; to open our eyes to the degrading ugliness of the situation and its inevitable consequences; return to the usages of dignity and self respect. If appeals to virtue and propriety are not sufficient or effective, then the community should act to protect its mothers and daughters from their own folly, by making illegal their presence in such places."

Riotous misconduct and depravity, inurement to obscenity, calousness to immorality and immodesty can as surely destroy a generation and the children of that generation as an epidemic of disease or annihilation in the field. P. Wenger found in a study of the history of the drinking habit of 400 inmates of the Clinton prison of New York that 61% began between the ages of 10 and 19 years. One or both parents were alcoholics in 39% of the cases. Venereal diseases was found in 40%. The motive for drinking was sociability in 76%. Among the offspring of alcoholic parents infant mortality is high. Idiocy, psychosis, and excessive drinking are high. Inebriety in children of alcoholics has been shown to occur in 30 to 40%; mental and nervous disorders about 20%. In healthy adult offspring of alcoholics 20 to 30% is a fair expectation. Dr. Haven Emerson states, "there is no more preventable disease in the world than alcoholism." Something must be done! Something is being done! In "The Voice of the Board of Temperance" of the Methodist Church of June, 1945, is an article by Harry S. Warner, Ph.B. General Secretary of the Intercollegiate Association for study of the alcoholic problem, we find the statement that a new educational approach to the study of the alcohol problem is being made by some of our leading University and College Educators. Organized instruction in the results of modern research and scientific application is being made. This is a recent activity by men of high academic standing and in University atmosphere. This is of far reaching influence for the future. Advanced University forums, courses of lectures, and seminars, that bring the teaching and the results of the research of the highest scientific experts to the leaders, educators, writers, social welfare workers, ministers, and leaders of alcoholics anonymous, temperance workers of all varieties, to those who promote and those who oppose the alcohol custom and trade—to all interested in seeking a better and more scientific understanding of the alcohol problem of today. The Yale University School of Studies with 27 experts and 79 students in its first 1843 summer session is the outstanding example in University leadership. An increasing number of colleges widely scattered over the

country have been offering courses of instruction in this study in recent years as part of their college work, with academic standing and credit. This form of educational service is largely for teachers and those preparing to teach. This has been increasing for six years. One-day specialized conferences, seminars, forums, "Little Yale Schools," have been organized in many cities for and by social welfare and public health workers, police officials, educators, ministers, alcoholics anonymous leaders, for all interested in the new understanding of alcoholism, its treatment and cure and the social conditions surrounding heavy drinking. In addition to facing the problem of the alcoholic, these democratically conducted forums have developed a vital method of public education and a spirit of cooperation between groups sometimes antagonistic in the past. Examples in the past two years include two held in Cleveland and one each in Washington, Boston, Baltimore and Lansing. Provision is being made for education in the public school systems of several states, usually in connection with health instruction and under the supervision of state boards of education. In five states directors or supervisors of health and narcotics education, give full time to these new forms of education. Altogether, these new educational activities are bringing the problem realistically into every-day interest, and thinking, making it less a specialized problem, treating it more comprehensively than has been usual in the past. It seems to indicate, too a new interest and willingness among some educators, to face positively and frankly, the possibilities of the service that they, more than anyone else, are qualified to render in college, school and community education on the problem. From the leadership and prestige of the renewed scientific approach, now well under way among these University men, a greatly enlarged program of similar activities may well be expected in 1945, within and out from the colleges, universities and high schools, of the country.

In the face of the coming post war period, the serious determination of most thinking people to prepare in advance, to meet dangerous tides and tendencies of release from restraint and reaction, this new leadership in connection with the alcohol problem, is most strategic. Both the occasion and the opportunity for positive programs of education and the problem as it faces youth, and all of us—today by and under college leadership, are fully ripe and imperative. It seems that no such courses of study have been offered in our state. We, your committee, recommend that our paper the *Word and Way*, be requested to feature information concerning such study and instruction. That our executive board be asked to incorporate such in their study courses, when and where ever held in our state. That our Pastors be asked to present the subject frequently in their churches, and in every practical way teach the people the facts and findings of these research studies.

62. Jos. E. Brown, Editor of the "Word and Way", Kansas City, made a statement concerning the sale of the "Word and Way" to the Association and its future policy, etc. Upon the request of the Moderator, Mr. Brown was asked to prepare the statement for printing in the Minutes. It is as follows:

"You will perhaps expect me, since the lack of time yesterday did not permit it, to say a brief word concerning the plan to put *The Word and Way* under denominational ownership and management.

As Dr. Medearis stated yesterday, he made the suggestion something like eighteen months ago. It has now come to fruition after a number of conferences with Dr. Medearis, with a special committee for negotiation, with the Executive Committee of your Board, and with your Board, the recommendation of which you have adopted. Only the details of arranging the transfer of the paper from the Western Baptist Publishing Company, in which I am only one stockholder, remains.

It will be fifty years next July since *The Word and Way* was launched. I was a little too young—not much too young—to realize what was happening though I know that my sainted father spent a whole night in prayer and then went forward to do what he thought

God had called him to do.

The paper went through many vicissitudes. The Western Baptist Publishing Company, formed for the purpose, put multiplied thousands of its income into the support of the paper during the period of its establishment. At the suggestion of the General Association it, in 1912, paid \$7,000 cash for another paper with 7,000 subscribers at that time.

By extreme economies during the last seventeen years and the help of Missouri Baptists it has been put on a sound financial basis. With careful management I believe it may continue without excessive cost to the denomination.

Why should this Association own the state paper? There are several reasons. This one seems impelling. Our paper needs a large circulation. While *The Word and Way* list has grown during the last few years in as large proportion, I believe, as the average of all Southern Baptist papers, many feel that its circulation should be further vastly increased.

Times have changed. For many years the circulation of all our papers was a matter of individual, voluntary subscription. It is not so now. Large lists are the result of official, group subscriptions through the church budgets. This plan can no doubt be better advanced in behalf of an officially owned paper.

I have one suggestion made in all earnestness: It is fundamental to a cooperative democracy from which Baptists, if they are true to their principles, will never depart, that the denominational press shall be free. The editor should be cooperative in spirit but free to express his considered opinions on all subjects.

The General Association which owns its paper must certainly control it. But the manner in which, the Board or agency through which the General Association conducts its paper will be a vital factor in determining whether the paper measures up to its responsibility as a free and influential medium of expression not only for its editor but for all others in our Baptist brotherhood throughout the state. This matter should be given most careful study and consideration.

I pledge my continued help, as we may be asked from time to time, in effecting this transition and forwarding the cause of Christ through *The Word and Way*, which, of course, has been very dear to my heart for a very long time."

### RELIGIOUS LITERATURE AND PUBLICATIONS

In laying stress on the reading of good literature, one can hardly overlook mentioning the great amount of unwholesome literature available for our people. Vast is the corrupting stream of literature, both periodical and permanent, that flows from many of our nation's presses, floods the news stands, channels into homes and finds its way into the minds of impressionable youth. Records show that crimes have increased along with growth of salacious literature. It becomes our duty to help keep the news stands as free as possible from such debauching literature and certainly it is our obligation to keep it out of our homes and from our boys and girls.

For our purpose in this report we will divide Religious Literature and Publications into four different groups of publications, namely, The Bible, Religious Books, Baptist Magazines and Periodicals, and the State Baptist Paper.

#### I. The Bible

Although our nation is one of the few nations where people may read the Bible with liberty and interpret it according to the dictates of the individual conscience, we are forced to recognize a deplorable neglect in exercising the privileges. Baptists appear to be as guilty as others in their indifference to the Word of God. According to the prophet, Amos, there can be no famine so tragic as a famine of God's Word. Bible knowledge is indispensable to individual Christian growth, church growth, and denominational growth. Recognizing the need of Bible reading and study among our Baptist people, we emphasize these necessary factors: (1) Bible reading and religious devotion in the home, (2) the attendance of all our Baptist people at Sunday School, Training Union, worship, and other services of our churches where the teaching of the Bible is available, (3) the adoption of the Bible by our young people as the safest book for guidance in all matters of life, and (4) the prominent place that the department of Bible must have in all our Baptist Colleges.

We would not pass by the Bible as the first source of religious literature without commending the work of the American Bible Society in the printing and distribution of the Word of God in hundreds of languages and dialects.

#### II. Religious Books

First under this heading we wish to call attention to the service rendered us by our Baptist Book Stores in making good books available for us. We congratulate our Baptist Book Store in Kansas City on the spacious, attractive, and well-arranged new quarters. We also feel it fitting to express our appreciation for the courtesy and efficiency of Miss Mary Tongee and her helpers in keeping us informed about books and in handling orders in the store and by

mail. There is a distinct service rendered by the Book Store exhibits at our conventions. We commend also the work of Miss Eula Stotts in the Book Store in St. Louis serving that great city and its adjacent territory in direct purchases at the store. Our Baptist Book Store in Kansas City is laying special emphasis on the mail order department, endeavoring to build up a mailing list of the purchasers for church, Sunday School, Training Union, and W.M.U. supplies. Since our Baptist Book Stores are desirous of rendering the greatest possible service, we urge our people to visit our Book Stores, patronize them and seek their help in finding the best books available for reading.

### Church Libraries

It is gratifying to see the interest displayed in establishing church libraries. Most valuable to the promotion of this work will be the services of Miss Mildred Baker, recently employed by our Baptist Book Store as a special worker in the promotion of church libraries. Our Book Store is also offering gift books for starting libraries and is also making the splendid offer of a fifteen (15%) per cent discount on books purchased for church libraries. We hope many more of our churches will become interested in this project and avail themselves of this generous church library source.

### Lending Libraries

Another available help is offered by our lending libraries. The Ministers' Circulating Library at the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville has a collection of 500 or more of the best biblical and other religious books. The cost is small and the service is available to all our pastors and workers. While our college libraries do not have regular lending arrangements to those outside the schools, the librarians at each of our college libraries are always anxious to make available to a trustworthy borrower a much needed book.

### College Libraries

We should not overlook the valuable literary assets we have in our Baptist college libraries. In addition to the Spurgeon, Hubmaier, and Missouri Baptist Historical Society collections, the library at William Jewell College contains about 7,500 biblical and religious books. Hannibal-LaGrange College has about 1,800 books in the section on Religion, and Southwest Baptist College about 1,350. Especially in our junior colleges there is a need for more recent copyrights. Many of their religious books are gifts from preachers' libraries and a great many of them date back to the early 19th century. William Jewell College library spends \$200 annually for books in the department of religion and philosophy; the library at Hannibal-LaGrange College spends \$75 and Southwest Baptist College \$100. Our Baptist young people who go to college for four years of reading and study are deserving of the best in the way of good books. Our people can help by increased gifts to the Cooperative Program thus making more money available for our schools and improve their libraries. There is a trend in establishing memorials by placing gift books in libraries. Our people who desire to do such

a noble thing should seek the help of our college librarians as to the best books to buy and give.

### III. Baptist Magazines and Periodicals

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL AND TRAINING UNION HELPS

We owe a debt of thanks to the untiring editors of our Baptist Sunday School Board for the perennial stream of good Baptist literature flowing out to our churches and homes. Aside from the Graded Literature, Sunday School and Training Union helps, there is an abundance of good reading in the weekly story papers, *The Teacher*, *The Sunday School Builder*, *The Baptist Training Union Magazine*, the *Quarterly Review*, and the *Baptist Student*. All these publications are attractive on the outside and meaty on the inside. They should be read fully and thoroughly.

#### MISSION MAGAZINES

We take time and space to mention for commendation the publications of our mission boards, the Commission of the Foreign Mission Board and Southern Baptist Home Missions by the Home Mission Board. Both are informative and refreshing.

#### W.M.U. PUBLICATIONS

In commenting on Baptist Literature assets, we must not overlook *Royal Service*, official organ of the W.M.U., *The Window of Y.W.A.* for girls, and *World Comrades* for Royal Ambassadors, Girls Auxiliary members and Sunbeams. These publications greatly assist in keeping our women and youth missionary minded.

#### BROTHERHOOD QUARTERLY

A real magazine for real Baptist men is the Southern Baptist *Brotherhood Journal*, published at Memphis, Tenn., by the Baptist Brotherhood of the South. There are thousands of Baptist men who should have an introduction to this brotherhood magazine even though a church does not have a Brotherhood organization.

#### PUBLICATION OF MISSOURI BAPTIST INSTITUTIONS

Worthy of greater circulation and reading are the bulletins and magazines of our state institutions as *Church and College*, published by William Jewell College; *The News Letter* of Southwest Baptist College; the *Hannibal-LaGrange College Bulletin* of the same institution; *The Foundation Herald* of the Southeast Missouri Baptist Foundation; *The Baptist Home* of the Home for Aged Baptists of Cape Girardeau; and *The Messenger* of the Missouri Baptist Children's Home.

#### THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY QUARTERLY

*The Review and Expositor*, published by the Southern Baptist Seminary at Louisville is a ready supply of fine reading for our pastors and workers. We greatly regret that we will no longer be able to read the informing and edifying articles of Dr. James McKee Adams of the Louisville institution.

### IV. State Baptist Paper

That emphasis might be placed upon it we have left the matter of our report on our state Baptist paper to the last. We should like to express our deep feeling of appreciation for Brother Joseph E.

Brown, Editor of *The Word and Way*, and we should like to voice our high estimate of the worth of our state paper to the program of Missouri Baptists. It is the principal medium through which the energies of our program are "elicited, combined and directed." For nearly 40 years *The Word and Way* has served the Baptists of Missouri as the exclusive denominational paper within the state. Though it has served widely and effectively in the past, its greatest opportunity of service appears to be ahead of us. Our state Baptist paper is indispensable to our Missouri Baptist program and there is no substitute for it. Our obligation to *The Word and Way* is to avail ourselves and all Missouri Baptists of the weekly information it brings. To the Missouri Baptist program and to the state Baptist paper the inadequate circulation is a mutual handicap. All of our people need to read it and the paper needs the help from a larger circulation.

The goal for the circulation of *The Word and Way* should be a subscription in every Baptist home in the state. Many of our leaders are convinced that by the old individual plan of securing subscriptions we will never accomplish the goal. The most successful plan to date for accomplishing our circulation goal and solving the circulation problem is the church budget subscription plan now being used successfully by a number of states. An estimate is made as to the number of subscriptions needed to reach every home in the church and the entire amount is made on item of the church budget. Everybody pays and everybody reads. An increase in the work of the church is certain with more people reading the state Baptist paper and records are available to show that the budget subscription plan has increased church gifts beyond the cost of the paper. We recommend this plan to our churches and suggest that our pastors and leaders acquaint themselves with the plan, become sold on it, sell the church on it and present it for adoption.

#### STEWARDSHIP AND BROTHERHOOD REPORT

Since we have no Secretary of Stewardship and Brotherhood work, we desire to make our report in the nature of recommendations or suggestions rather than a so-called report of work done.

1. We would like to suggest that we give as much place to the preaching of stewardship as is given in the Word of God. Careful examination of the Bible will show that an average of one verse out of every six in the New Testament is given to the teaching of stewardship of giving, let alone the teaching of the other phases of stewardship found in the Bible.

2. That we promote in our churches and associations stewardship revivals. While the money comes easily for our present program we need to greatly enlarge our program for the future. Then also with our present plan we are failing to adequately teach stewardship leaders that we are going to need very badly in the future. Times will not always be as they are now. Money will not always come in as it is at the present time—therefore, the great need for trained stewardship leaders.

3. That we preach and teach stewardship as a doctrine with the same behemence and power that we preach and teach other Bible doctrines. Altogether too long too many of us have been pushing to one side the matter of teaching and preaching stewardship on an equal basis with other doctrines. It is time for us to come out in the open and admit that the Lord put the program of financing the cause in the Bible, and preach it and teach it with the same regularity that we handle other doctrines. Since we know that our rewards are given to us on the basis of our works we are failing this generation and generations to come if we fail to instruct them and insist upon them practicing the doctrine of stewardship. When we fail our Baptist constituency we fail the churches and the Lord's cause of tomorrow. The outcome can only be chaos.

4. That we properly relate evangelism and economics. They are

taught together in the Word of God, Acts 4:32-37, and therefore should be kept together in our preaching, teaching and practice. They support each other. Without one the other will fail.

### EVANGELISM

Evangelism is the effort of Christian people to enlist non-Christians in the cause of Christ. It is not a program of enrolling people as members of a church, but the effort of Christian people to persuade the lost to turn from sin to the Savior. It is the primary business of all Christians to thus witness for Christ. Witnessing for Christ is the testimony of personal experience to the saving and keeping power of the Lord Jesus Christ. Obedience to such a program has made our denomination great. May we ever remain true to the primary purpose of our churches, the winning of the lost to Christ Jesus the Lord.

#### Looking Backward

As recommended at the meeting of the General Association last year at St. Louis by the Centennial Steering Committee, a number of plans have been executed during this centennial year: A state-wide rally was conducted in January, fifteen divisional conferences were conducted in February, and a series of conferences and rallies were conducted in the district associations in March. City-wide revivals have been conducted in several of the larger cities. Revivals have been promoted and conducted by district missionaries, city missionaries, rural missionaries, pioneer missionaries, and the state evangelist.

The Steering Committee has met several times during the year in the interest of evangelism. Dr. John W. Dowdy directed the activities of the committee until he left the state, and since that time Dr. T. W. Medearis has been in charge.

At the April meeting of the Executive Board it was decided to employ one state evangelist immediately, and ultimately to employ four others. Dr. M. M. Barnett was employed in May, and has been doing a splendid work.

Financial assistance has been given to district mission work throughout the state by the Executive Board of the State.

Special emphasis was given to the subject of evangelism by the representatives of the Executive Board at each of the district associations in their annual meetings.

#### Looking Forward

We urge that evangelism be given first consideration in all our denominational activities during the coming year.

We recommend that the General Superintendent and the State Executive Board direct the evangelistic efforts of the state, using whatever they deem wise in money, methods, and men.

We suggest that another series of rallies be conducted in 1946, beginning with another state-wide rally on evangelism in January. At such a meeting, we would do well to follow the pattern of our Lord and hear reports from those who have been doing various types of evangelistic work. We feel that such a meeting should be characterized by contrition, confession, and consecration.

We urge the pastors in Missouri to lead our great Baptist host in doing personal soul-winning. We urge that prayer be made in the interest of more laborers in the harvest field. May every known method be employed in the winning of the lost to Christ during the coming year.
